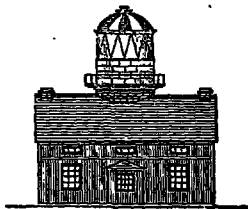
#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 13.) ATLANTIC OCEAN.—NEWFOUNDLAND.  
*Light on Green Isle, Catalina Harbour.*

The Colonial Government at Newfoundland has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of March, 1857, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Green Isle, on the south side of the entrance of Catalina Harbour, Trinity Bay, on the east coast of Newfoundland.

The light is a fixed white light, and will be visible seaward from the deck of a ship in a favourable state of the atmosphere at a distance of 8 miles from E.N.E. round southerly to S.W.

The lighthouse consists of a keeper's dwelling, of wood, of a story and a half high, with a pitched roof, through the centre of which rises a low stone tower surmounted by a lantern, the height from the base to the top being 32 feet.

About the 1st day of June next this light, which is temporary, will be replaced by a more powerful light of the same character, the illuminating apparatus being a lens of the fourth order.

The light will be placed at a height of 86 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible through the same arc of the horizon, from E.N.E. round southerly to S.W., for a distance of 15 miles.

Green Isle is in lat. 48° 30' 45" N., long. 53° 6' W., of Greenwich, nearly.

#### Mid Sussex Railway.

(Abandonment of Branch from Billingshurst, otherwise Billingshurst, to Petworth, and substitution in lieu thereof of Branch from Pulborough to Coultershaw Mill, all in the county of Sussex.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that in pursuance of special leave given by the House of Commons, in conformity with a resolution of the Standing Order Committee to that effect, an additional provision will be made in the Bill now depending in Parliament under the above short title, "For making a Railway from the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway at Horsham, through Billingshurst to Pulborough, with a branch from Billingshurst to Petworth, all in the county of Sussex, by which additional provision power will be taken to abandon the construction of the following branch railway (that is to say):

1stly. A branch railway commencing by a junction with the said intended main line of railway, in or near a certain field, at a point about

150 feet to the northward of Great Daux Farm House, in the parish of Billingshurst, otherwise Billingshurst, in the county of Sussex, to Petworth in the said county, and to expunge from the said Bill, all powers, provisions, and clauses connected with the construction of the said branch, or in any way relating thereto.

2ndly. In lieu of the branch so to be abandoned, to substitute and to authorize the construction of the following branch (that is to say), a branch railway commencing by a junction with the terminus of the said main line of the proposed Mid Sussex Railway, in the parish of Pulborough, in the county of Sussex, in or near a certain field, numbered 113 on the deposited plan of the said main line of the said railway, on the north side of, and adjoining to, the turnpike road leading from Pulborough to Petworth, at a point about 1150 feet to the westward of the Swan Inn, at Pulborough aforesaid, and terminating in or near a certain field, in the parish of Petworth, in the said county, at a point adjoining the east side of the turnpike road, leading from Duncton to Petworth, about 720 feet to the southward of the toll-gate at Coultershaw Mill in the parish of Petworth aforesaid, which said intended branch railway and works will pass from, in, through, or into, or be situate within the several parishes, townships, and extra-parochial, or other places following, or some of them (that is to say), Pulborough, Hardham, Coldwaltham, Fittleworth, Bury, Coates, Sutton, Burton, and Petworth, all in the said county of Sussex.

And it is intended to abandon all powers for the compulsory purchase of lands, tenements, and hereditaments, for the purposes of the said branch line of railway and works, to be abandoned as aforesaid, and firstly hereinbefore mentioned.

And it is intended to take powers for the compulsory purchase of lands, tenements, and hereditaments, for the purposes of the said intended new branch railway, and works, and to levy, tolls, rates, and duties, upon, and in respect of the use of the same, and to vary and extinguish all powers, rights, or privileges, which might interfere with the carrying into effect of the said undertaking.

And notice is hereby further given, that duplicate plans and sections, describing the lines and levels of the said intended new branch railway and works, and the lands to be taken for the purposes thereof, with a book of reference to such plans, and a published map with the line of the said intended branch railway and works, delineated thereon, and a copy of this notice as published in the London Gazette, will, on or before the 31st day of March next, be deposited for public inspection, with the clerk of the peace for the said county of Sussex, at his office, at Lewes, in the said county, and that copies of so much of the said plans, sections, and book of reference as relate to each of the several parishes, townships, and extra parochial or other places, in, or through which the said intended branch railway and works are proposed to be made, together with a copy of this notice, as published in the London Gazette, will, on or before the said 31st day of March next, be deposited with the parish clerk of each such parish, at his residence, and in case of any extra parochial places, with the parish clerk of some parish adjoining thereto, at his residence.
