Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, all the provisions of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," (except such as are contained in the sections of the said Act, numbered, respectively, 2, 17, 75, 76, 77, 95, 97, 98), and the whole of the 99th section (except so much thereof as explains the meaning of the word "action"), and also except such as are contained in sections 100, 101, 102, 104, 105, and 107, and the rules made and to be made in pursuance of the said Act, except such rules, if any, as apply exclusively to the said excepted sections, shall extend and apply to the said Court of Record of the city of *Norwich*, called the Guildhall Court:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the advice aforesaid, that all the

powers or duties incident to the provisions of the said Act hereby applied to the said Court of Record shall be exercised, in respect to matters in the said Court, by the Judge thereof.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to make better provision for 'the spiritual care of populous parishes,'" duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of 'populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property situate in the parish of Llandaff, in the county of Glamorgan, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things), enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property herein-after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase-money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein; and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas, under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the sixteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, made between the Reverend George Thomas, of the one part, and ourselves of the other part, an estate consisting of ninety-four acres, two roods and twenty perches of land, with certain messuages and cottages thereon, situate in the said parish of Llandaff, and county of Glamorgan, became vested in us in fee simple, subject to the provisions of the said Act.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly

executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, or hereditaments, so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Llandaff.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 11.) AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST.

Revolving Light on Cape Moreton.

The Colonial Government of New South Wales has given notice, that on or about the 1st day of March, 1857, a light would be exhibited in the light-tower recently erected on Cape More-

ton, at the north end of Moreton Island, on the east coast of Australia.

The Light will be a white revolving light, visible once a minute all round the horizon. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors, and of the first order. The bright face will last 15 seconds, and be followed by an eclipse of 45 seconds' duration. The light will be placed at a height of 385 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen from the deck of a ship, in ordinary weather, at a distance of 26 miles.

The light-tower is of white stone, 67 feet high, including the lantern; it stands on the summit of the Cape, in lat. $27^{\circ} 2' 24''$ S., long. $153^{\circ} 28' 56''$ East of Greenwich.

Ships bound to Moreton Bay ought never to mistake Point Lookout, on Stradbroke Island, for Cape Moreton, if they will bear in mind that there is not a building of any description along the coast to seaward from Port Macquarie to Cape Moreton, a distance of nearly 300 miles.

Wimbledon and Dorking Railway.

WHEREAS a Bill was introduced into the Honourable the House of Commons in the last session, intituled "A Bill for making a rail-

way from the London and South-Western Railway, at Wimbledon, to Epsom," which Bill was, in pursuance of the Standing Orders of the said House of Commons, passed on the 12th day of March last, in reference to the suspension of Private Bills, suspended on the 17th day of March, and will be re-introduced and proceeded with in the next session. And whereas the said Bill contained, among others, a provision empowering the Company thereby proposed to be incorporated, and all other Companies and persons lawfully using the railway thereby authorised to be constructed, to pass over and use with their respective engines and carriages the railway belonging to the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway Company, together with the stations, watering places, water, sidings, platforms, booking and other offices, works, warehouses, buildings, conveniences, and accommodations, upon the same or connected therewith, upon terms and conditions to be settled as therein expressed; and the said Bill also contained a provision that all reasonable accommodation should be provided, and facilities afforded, by the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway Company, for the booking and transit of passengers and goods destined for, or coming from, the Wimbledon and Epsom Railway, upon terms and conditions to be settled as therein also expressed.

Now notice is hereby given, that it is proposed to apply to Parliament in the next session for leave to insert in the said Bill, when so introduced into the Honourable the House of Commons, clauses and provisions for conferring on the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway Company and all other companies and persons lawfully using the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway, the like powers and authorities with reference to the passage over and user by them, with their respective engines and carriages, of the railway from Wimbledon to Epsom, proposed to be constructed under the said Bill, or some part thereof, and of the stations, watering places, water, sidings, platforms, booking and other offices, works, warehouses, buildings, conveniences and accommodations upon the same, or connected therewith, as are or may be by the said Bill conferred upon the Company thereby proposed to be incorporated, and all other companies and persons lawfully using their railway, in respect of the passage over and user of the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway, and the stations, works, and conveniences connected therewith aforesaid; and also provisions requiring that the like reasonable accommodation shall be provided and facilities afforded by the Company proposed to be incorporated by the said Bill for the booking and transit of passengers and goods destined for or coming from the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway as are or may be by the said Bill required to be provided and afforded respectively by the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway Company for the booking and transit of passengers and goods destined for or coming from the railway from Wimbledon to Epsom proposed to be authorized; and also provisions for fixing and determining, either by agreement or arbitration, or otherwise, the amount of rate, toll, or other sum, either annual or in gross, which shall be paid by the Epsom and Leatherhead Railway Company for the use by them of the said intended railway from Wimbledon to Epsom, stations, works, and conveniences, respectively, and in respect of such accommodation and facilities aforesaid.
