Convention between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French, relative to Portendic and Albreda.

Signed, at London, March 7, 1857.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, March 25, 1857.]

Le Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the Emperor of the French, being desirous to prevent all future cause of misunderstanding with regard to the right of trading at and near Portendic, on the west coast of Africa, and at Albreda, in the River Gambia, asserted or assumed respectively by the Governments or subjects of Great Britain and France, have resolved to conclude a Convention for that purpose, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries; that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable George William Frederick, Earl of Clarendon, Baron Hyde of Hindon, a Peer of the United Kingdom, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Her Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; and the Right Honourable Henry Labouchere, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, a Member of Parliament, Her Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies;

And His Majesty the Emperor of the French, the Sieur John Gilbert Victor Fialin Count of Persigny, Senator, Grand Cross of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, Grand Cordon of the Imperial Order of the Medjidié of Turkey, Grand Cross of the Order of St. Maurice and St. Lazarus of Sardinia, Grand Cross of the Order of Danebrog of Denmark, His Ambassador to Her Britannic Majesty;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:

ARTICLE I.

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland relinquishes the

Sa Majesté la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, le Très Honorable George Guillaume Frédéric, Comte de Clarendon, Baron Hyde de Hindon, Pair du Royaume Uni, Conseiller de Sa Majesté Britannique en Son Conseil Privé, Chevalier du Très Noble Ordre de la Jarretière, Chevalier Grand-Croix du Très Honorable Ordre du Bain, Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique pour les Affaires Etrangères; et le Très Honorable Henri Labouchere, Conseiller de Sa Majesté Britannique en Son Conseil Privé, Membre du Parlement, Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique pour les Colonies;

Et Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français, le Sieur Jean Gilbert Victor Fialin, Comte de Persigny, Sénateur, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre Impérial de la Légion d'Honneur, Grand Cordon de l'Ordre Impérial du Medjidié de Turquie, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre des Saints Maurice et Lazare de Sardaigne, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre du Danebrog de Danemark, Son Ambassadeur près Sa Majesté Britannique;

Lesquels, après s'être communiqué mutuellement leurs pleins pouvoirs respectifs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, ont arrêté et conclu les Articles suivants:

ARTICLE I.

Sa Majesté la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande renonce au droit right hitherto enjoyed, under Treaty, by the subjects of Her Britannic Majesty, of trading from the mouth of the River St. John to the Bay and Fort of Portendic, inclusively.

ARTICLE II.

His Majesty the Emperor of the French cedes to Her Britannic Majesty the French factory or comptoir at Albreda, on the north bank of the River Gambia, on the western coast of Africa, together with all possessory or other rights whatever appertaining to the said factory.

ARTICLE III.

Her Britannic Majesty consents that French subjects shall have free access to the River Gambia for the purposes of their commerce. They shall be allowed to reside at the town of Bathurst, and at such other trading station or stations as may hereafter be appointed by Her Britannic Majesty in Council, but not elsewhere; except so far as regards Albreda, where such French subjects as are now resident, and may wish to remain, are authorized so to do by Article IV of the present Convention: conforming themselves, however, to the laws and local regulations which are or may be in force in the British Settlements in the Gambia.

French vessels in the Biver Gambia shall be subject to the same duties, tolls, and regulations, as British vessels; and every article imported or exported in French vessels, shall pay the same duty as is or may be imposed upon the like article when imported or exported in British vessels.

The French Government shall be allowed to maintain a Consular Agent at Bathurst; it being clearly understood that such Consular Agent must first be approved and admitted in the usual manner by the Government of Her Britannic Majesty.

ARTICLE IV.

French subjects already settled at Albreda, and who may wish to remain there after the cession to Her Britannic Majesty of the French factory or comptoir, shall preserve their property, and the rights attached thereto, and shall be protected and treated in all respects in the same manner as all other French subjects in the Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

ARTICLE V.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible, within three weeks from the date of its signature.

In witness whereof, the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seals of their arms.

Done at London, the seventh day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

que les Traités ont jusqu'à présent donné aux sujets de Sa Majesté Britannique, de commercer depuis l'embouchure de la Rivière St. Jean, jusqu'à la Baie et au Fort de Portendic, inclusivement

ARTICLE II.

Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français cède à Sa Majesté Britannique la factorerie Française, ou comptoir, d'Albreda, sur la rive septentrionale de la Rivière de Gambie (côte occidentale d'Afrique), de même que tous les droits de possession, ou autres, quels qu'ils soient, attachés à la dite factorerie.

ARTICLE IIL

Sa Majesté Britannique consent à ce que les sujets Français aient libre accès dans la Rivière de Gambie, pour s'y livrer à leur commerce. Ils pourront résider dans la ville de Bathurst, ou dans telles autres localités commerciales qui viendraient à être ultérieurement désignées en Conseil par Sa Majesté Britannique, mais point ailleurs; sauf en ce qui concerne Albreda, où les Français qui s'y trouvent actuellement, et qui désireraient y rester, y sont autorisés par l'Article IV de la présente Convention, et en se conformant d'ailleurs aux lois et 1 églements locaux qui sont ou peuvent être en vigueur dans les établissements Anglais de la Gambie.

Les bâtiments Français dans la Rivière de Gambie seront sujets aux mêmes droits, péages, et réglements que les navires Anglais; et tout article importé ou exporté par bâtiments Français paiera le même droit que celui qui est ou pourra être imposé sur le même article importé ou exporté par bâtiments Anglais.

Le Gouvernement Français pourra entretenir à Bathurst un Agent Consulaire; étant bien entendu que le dit Agent Consulaire devra être préalablement agréé et admis en la forme ordinaire par le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique.

ARTICLE IV.

Les sujets Français déjà établis à Albreda, et qui voudront y rester après la cession à Sa Majesté Britannique de cette factorerie ou comptoir, y conserveront leurs propriétés et les droits en dérivant, et y seront protégés et traités, à tous égards, de la même manière que le sont tous autres sujets Français dans les possessions de Sa Majesté Britannique.

ARTICLE V.

La présente Convention sera ratifiée, et les ratifications en seront échangées aussitôt que faire se pourra à Londres, et dans les trois semaines qui suivront le jour de la signature de la dite Convention.

En foi de quoi, les Plénipotentiaires respectifs l'ont signée, et y ont apposé le cachet de leurs armes.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it has been represented to Her Majesty, that certain contagious or infectious disorders are now prevalent among cattle in certain countries or places bordering upon the Baltic Sea, and that there is danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle and horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides, or skins of cattle, from such countries or places: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date hereof, no cattle and no horns, hoofs, or raw or wet hides, or skins of cattle, shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which shall come from, or shall have been at any place within, those territories of the Emperor of Russia, or of the King of Prussia, or of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburgh Schwerin, which respectively are in or border upon the Gulf of Finland, or any other part of the Baltic Sea between the Gulf of Finland and the territories of the Free City of Lubeck, or which shall come from or shall have been at any place within the territories of the Free City of Lubeck; and also that from and after the date hereof, no cattle and no horns, hoofs, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle or horns, hoofs, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle which shall have come from or shall have been at any such place as aforesaid.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that all cattle, and all horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides, or skins of cattle, the importation or introduction whereof is so hereby prohibited as aforesaid, and also all hay, straw, fodder, litter, or manure, being or having been in or on board any vessels at the same time with any such cattle, or horns, hoofs, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle as aforesaid, shall, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed, or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a

scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

- "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Littlebury, in the county of Essex, and now vested in us.
- "And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said sinecure rectory of Littlebury (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us on the vacancy of the said rectory, which occurred on or about the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fiftythree, by the resignation of the Reverend John Henry Sparke, the then sinecure rector, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.
- "And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:
- "We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said sinecure rectory of Littlebury, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.
- "And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Monte Video, enclosing copy of a Decree recently issued by the Monte Videan Government, throwing open the ports of Maldonado, Colononia and Paisander, for the despatch of articles which may be introduced through them from Montevideo, strictly subject to the Customs' laws and regulations. This permission is not however accorded to foreign vessels, the trade being considered as coasting trade from which foreign flags are excluded.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister to the Argentine Confederation, enclosing copy of the following Decree recently issued by the Argentine Government, explanatory of a Decree issued by that Government

on the 19th July last, and which appeared in the London Gazette of the 6th October, 1856.

1. The capes to which the law of July 19th refers, are those of Santa Maria and San Antonio, at the entrance of the River Plate.

2. The trade carried on by the Cordillera of the Andes comes within Article 2 of the Law, and will continue to pay simply the ordinary duty.

3. The said Article 2 of the Law does not forbid vessels coming from outside the capes, bound for the ports of the Confederation, to touch at the intermediate ports of the River Plate.

- 4. The said vessels can bring cargo for the ports of the River Plate and for others of the Confederation, without the fact of their doing so, or of the discharge of the part destined for them, involving the merchandize directed to the ports of the Confederation in the payment of differential duties.
- 5. Also merchandize coming from outside the capes which, having been directed to the ports of the River Plate, has been sent on, either all or in part, to those of the Confederation without having been discharged or transhipped in the former ports, will be considered as coming under Article 2 of the Law.
- 6. As a general rule all merchandize introduced into the Confederation in vessels which have touched at intermediate ports inside the capes, shall be subject to the differential duties, if the parties interested do not clearly prove that they are included in Articles 3, 4 or 5 of the present decree.
- 7. To facilitate the fulfilment of the preceding Article, the Argentine Commercial Agent at Buenos Ayres, and the Consul General at Monte Video, shall be authorized, in the cases mentioned in the said Articles 3, 4 and 5, at the request of the parties interested to deliver proper certificates, having previously taken all necessary steps for the full verification of the fact which they certify.
