The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Thursday, May 7,

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

E are commanded to inform you, that Her Majesty has availed herself of the earliest opportunity of having recourse to your advice and assistance after the Dissolution of the last Parliament; and Her Majesty trusts that there will be found sufficient time during the present session to enable you satisfactorily to deal with various important matters, some of which had occupied the attention of Parliament in the beginning of this

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that the general aspect of affairs in Europe affords a well-grounded confidence in the continuance of Peace.

All the main stipulations of the Treaty of Paris have been carried into execution, and it is to be hoped that what remains to be done in regard to those matters will be speedily accomplished.

The negociations upon the subject of the differences which had arisen between the King of Prussia and the Swiss Confederation, in regard to the affairs of Neuchâtel, are drawing to a close, and will, Her Majesty trusts, be terminated by an arrangement honourable and satisfactory to all

The negociations in which Her Majesty has been engaged with the Government of the United States, and with the Government of Honduras, in regard to the affairs of Central America, have not yet been brought to a close.

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that a Treaty of Peace between Her Majesty and the Shah of Persia was signed at Paris on the fourth of March, by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, and by the Ambassador of the Shah; and Her Majesty will give directions that this Treaty shall be laid before you as soon as the ratifications thereof shall have been duly exchanged.

Her Majesty commands us to express to you Her regret that, at the date of the latest advices from China, the differences which had arisen between the High Commissioner at Canton and Her Majesty's Civil and Naval Officers in China still remain unadjusted. But Her Majesty has sent to China a Plenipotentiary fully instructed to deal with all matters of difference, and that Plenipotentiary will be supported by an adequate naval Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the

and military force, in the event of such assistance becoming necessary.

We are commanded to inform you, that Her Majesty, in conjunction with several other European Powers, has concluded a Treaty with the King of Denmark for the redemption of the Sound Dues. This Treaty, together with a separate Convention between Her Majesty and the King of Denmark, completing the arrangement, will be laid before you, and Her Majesty will cause the measures necessary for fulfilling the engagements thereby contracted to be submitted for your consideration.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty has directed the estimates for the present year to be laid before you.

They have been prepared with a careful attention to economy, and with a due regard to the efficiency of the departments of the public service to which they severally relate.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty commands us to recommend to your earnest consideration measures which will be proposed to you for the consolidation and improvement of the law.

Bills will be submitted to you for improving the laws relating to the testamentary and matrimonial jurisdiction now exercised by the Ecclesiastical Courts, and also for checking fraudulent breaches of trust.

Her Majesty commands us to express to you Her heartfelt gratification at witnessing the continued well-being and contentment of Her people, and the progressive development of productive industry throughout Her dominions.

Her Majesty confidently commits to your wisdom and care the great interes's of Her empire, and fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may be vouchsafed to your deliberations, and may lead you to conclusions conducive to the objects of Her Majesty's constant solicitude, the welfare and happiness of Her loyal and faithful people.

HEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her

such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Moorish subjects), who desert from British merchant ships in the territories belonging to the

Sultan of Morocco and Fez.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign De-" serters' Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the Sultan of Morocco and Fez within Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships.

Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any)

has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS by the "Passengers Act, 1855," it is amongst other things enacted, that before any Passenger Ship shall be cleared out, the Emigration Officer at the port of clearance shall satisfy himself that there is on board a sufficient quantity of pure water, carried in tanks or casks, to secure, throughout the intended voyage, the issue of three quarts daily to each statute adult for the use of the passengers, exclusive of the quantity required for cooking; and whereas it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for permitting the use on board of Passenger Ships of an apparatus for distilling water, and for defining, in such case, the quantity of fresh water to be carried in tanks or casks for the passengers.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and in exercise of the authority vested in Her by the said "Passengers Act, 1855," hereby

order as follows:

Any "Passenger Ship" propelled wholly by steam engines of not less power than is sufficient, without the aid of sails, to propel the ship at the Majesty may by Order in Council, stating that I rate of five statute miles an hour, may be cleared out and proceed on her voyage, having on board, in tanks or casks, only half the quantity of pure water required by the said Act to be carried for the use of the passengers; provided,

1. That there be on board such Passenger Ship an efficient apparatus, to be approved by the Emigration Officer at the port of clearance, for

distilling fresh water from salt water;

2. That the Owners, Charterers, or Masters of the ship, before clearance, lodge with such Emigration Officer a certificate from the Engineer or Surveyor of the Board of Trade, or other competent person to be named by the Emigration Officer, declaring that the apparatus has been, within the seven days immediately preceding the date of such certificate, examined by a competent person, and is then in good working condition, and stating the number of imperial gallons of pure fresh water which it is capable of producing in every twentyfour hours;

3. That the Emigration Officer is satisfied that this number of gallons is not less than the whole number of persons about to proceed on the intended voyage of such ship; that is to say, the whole number of cabin passengers, passengers,

and crew;

4. That there is rated on the ship's articles, and on board the ship, some person who, to the satisfaction of the said Emigration Officer, shall be competent for the proper management of such

distilling apparatus.

And to prevent all doubts on the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered, that the terms "Passenger Ship," "Emigration Officer," "Statute Adult," and "Master," shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said "Passengers Act, 1855."

And the Right Honourable Henry Labouchere, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS by the 333rd Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that, subject to the provisions contained in the 5th part of the said Act, it shall be lawful for every pilotage authority, by bye law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, to do within its district all or any of the things specified

in that behalf in the said section.

And whereas the Llynvi Valley Railway Company, being the pilotage authority for the Bay and Harbour of Pwll Cawl, otherwise Porth Cawl, in the county of Glamorgan, according to the meaning of the said recited Act, have submitted for the consent of Her Majesty in Council, certain bye laws (a copy whereof is, set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed) for the government of the pilots under their jurisdiction. And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye laws are proper and reasonable: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve and doth hereby approve of, and signify her consent to,

the said bye laws as bye laws of the said Llynvi Valley Railway Company, with respect to the pilotage of the Bay and Harbour of Pwll Cawl, otherwise Porth Cawl, in the county of Glamorgan.

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order.

Bay and Harbour of Pwll Cawl, otherwise Porth Cawl, in the county of Glamorgan.

BYE LAWS and REGULATIONS made by the Llynvi Valley Railway Company (being the "Pilotage Authority" for the said bay and harbour, according to the provisions of "The "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854"), at a General Meeting of the said Company, held at the Great Western Royal Hotel, at Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, on Friday, the 27th day of February, 1857, in pursuance of the several powers and authorities contained in the said Act, and in the following Acts of Parliament (local and personal); that is to say: the 6th Geo. 4, cap. 104, and 18 Vict. cap. 50, or some or one of them, and in pursuance of all other powers and authorities enabling the said Company in that behalf, for the government of the pilots licensed by the said Company, and for insuring the good conduct of such pilots, and their constant attendance to, and effectual performance of, their duty at sea and on shore, for punishing any breach of such regulations committed by such pilots, and for fixing the rates and prices or other remuneration to be demanded and received for the time being by pilots licensed by the said Company.

1. That in construing the following bye laws and regulations (if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter) the following terms shall have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them; that is to say: -

"Harbour Master" shall mean any person appointed by the Company to be Harbour Master, and any person appointed by him to act for him during his absence.

"Master" shall include every person (except a pilot) having command or charge of any ship. "Ship" shall include every description of vessel

used in navigation not propelled by oars, and "Pilot" shall mean any person duly licensed by the said Company to conduct ships to which he does not belong.

2. That an alphabetical list of the pilots shall be kept at the office of the Harbour Master, and they shall take their duty in rotation from such list, and each pilot shall remain on duty for such time as the Harbour Master shall direct, at the end of which time he shall be relieved by the next pilot in rotation on such list, and so on; and if any pilot shall neglect, omit, or refuse to take his duty at his proper time (unless prevented by illness), he shall be liable to be dismissed from his office, or shall incur a penalty not exceeding five pounds; and in case of such neglect, omission, or refusal, the next pilot on the said list shall be required to go on duty, and so on, and shall be liable to dismissal, or shall incur a similar penalty for neglect, omission, or refusal.

3. That every pilot whilst on duty shall keep a close watch and look out for ships about to enter and depart from the harbour, and no pilot shall take charge of more than one ship entering or departing from the harbour at the same time or tide;

and if any ship shall be compelled to enter or depart from the harbour without the assistance of a pilot, in consequence of the neglect, omission, or refusal of duty of any pilot, such pilot shall incur a penalty not exceeding five pounds, unless he is prevented by stress of weather. If any ship shall enter or depart from the harbour or bay without a pilot having previously tendered his services to pilot the same, the pilot during whose watch or look out such event shall have occurred, unless he be prevented by stress of weather, shall, if such occurrence shall take place by day, incur a penalty not exceeding ten shillings, and if the same shall take place by night, incur a penalty not exceeding one pound, or he shall in either case be liable to be dismissed from his office.

4. Every pilot shall be subject to the control, order, and direction of, and liable to be suspended by, the Harbour Master, but shall be liable to dismissal by order of the directors of the said Com-

pany only.

5. Every pilot passing in his boat any ship inward bound shall, unless prevented by stress of weather, tender his services as pilot, to the master of such ship, and in default thereof he shall incur

a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

6. No pilot shall engage himself to any ship in any other capacity than as pilot, without having first obtained the leave in writing of the Harbour Master for that purpose, and every pilot offending against this regulation shall, on complaint of the Harbour Master, incur for every such offence a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

7. That the rates, prices, and remunerations to be demanded and received for the time being by pilots licensed by the said Company shall be as

follows; that is to say: -

For piloting any ship from any place between Sker or Nash Points, and inside the sands into the harbour, and safely mooring her therein—and out of the harbour, to every such place:

And if any master of a ship shall engage a pilot and hands to take his ship out of the harbour, and she is not ready to be taken out during that tide, or if after having been moved for the purpose of being taken out she does not proceed, 1s. 6d. for each pilot, and 9d. for each hobler or assistant.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall affect the provisions of the 47th George 3rd,

cap. 33, which relate to the exemption from compulsory pilotage of coasting vessels and Irish traders.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the churchyard of St. James Ratcher Cross;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twentieth of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourth of May instant, and such Order has been published

in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have to order that the same be taken into consideration been affixed as required by the above recited Act. by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued from and after the sixteenth of this instant May, in the said churchyard of St. James Ratcliff Cross.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixtcenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of "the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such

parish;
And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made two representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Orders in Council of the twentieth of March last, to give notice of such representations, and

to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fourth of May instant; and such Orders have been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the sixteenth of this instant May, (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz.:

CROYLAND, LINCOLNSHIEE.—In the parish church; and from and after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and brick graves, provided that, when required, they be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and that each coffin be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work cemented in an airtight manner, and also except in reserved earthern family graves, provided they be opened without disturbing human remains, and that no body be buried without a covering of four feet and six inches of earth, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

Husbands Bosworth.—In the parish church; and from and after the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the churchyard and Baptist Chapel Burial ground, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

KIMBOLTON, HUNTINGDONSHIRE.—In the parish church (except in the vault belonging to the Duke of Manchester under the said church, which may be used on condition that the present entrance to the vault be closed up with brick or stone work well cemented, that a new entrance be made from without, that each coffin be embedded in powdered charcoal and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, and that the use of the vault be limited to members of the family), also, in the churchyard, and in the New Chapel Burial-ground within three yards of all dwelling houses; and from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented), in the whole of the churchyard.

SUTTON IN ASHFIELD.—In the parish church; and from and after the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine (with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already

buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented), in the parish churchyard and in the Particular Baptist Chapel Burial-ground.

SELSTON, NOTTS .- In the parish church and also within the Independent Chapel, and in the Burial-ground attached to the same, within three yards of all dwelling-houses; and from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the parish churchyard, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone

work properly cemented.

SAINT MARKS, SHELTON, STAFFORDSHIRE. VICTORIA, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith,

To Our right trusty and well-beloved Councillor, the Right Honourable Sidney Herbert; and to Our trusty and well-beloved Augustus Stafford Stafford, Esquire; Sir Henry Knight Storks, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, a Colonel in Our Army, and Secretary for Military Correspondence in Our War Department; Andrew Smith, M.D., Director-General of Our Army Medical Department; Thomas Alexander, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath; Sir Thomas Phillips, Knight; James Ranald Martin, Esquire, F.R.S.; Sir James Clark, Baronet, M.D.; and John Sutherland, M.D., greeting;

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to Us that, considering the great importance of maintaining and improving the health of all ranks of Our Army, at home and abroad, and of providing for their medical care and treatment in cases of disease, wounds, and other casualties whatsoever, in the most approved manner, it is expedient that certain enquiries should be made into the constitution of the Medical Department of Our Army, the mode of appointment of its officers, and the system which regulates their rank, pay, promotion, and retirement; likewise it is further expedient to examine into the condition and administration of the Hospitals of Our Army, with a view to their increased efficiency.

Now know ye, that We, having taken into Our consideration the premises, do hereby order and direct you the said Sidney Herbert, Angustus Stafford Stafford, Sir Henry Knight Storks, Andrew Smith, Thomas Alexander, Sir Thomas Phillips, Sir James Clark, James Ranald Martin, and John Sutherland, to enquire into the organization, government, and direction of the Medical Department of Our Army.

And firstly, to enquire into the mode by which candidates for first Commissions are selected, and the system adopted for their promotion and routine of service; also the mode adopted in regard to their pay and retiring allowances.

And further, We do order and direct you to enquire into the means now adopted for acquiring, keeping up, and adding to the professional knowledge of the officers of Our Medical Department, and to consider whether it will be expedient to encourage them to combine civil practice where compatible with military duty.

And further, We do order and direct you to enquire into the operation of the regulations now in force, with a view to the prevention of disease in Our Army, both at home and abroad, as regards barrack accommodation, encampments, clothing, rations, and other matters relating thereto, having regard to the various climates to which our troops are exposed, and the duties and responsibility of the medical authorities on these matters.

And further, We do order and direct you to enquire into the state and condition of military hospitals, both general and regimental.

Also into the system adopted in the same, or the treatment of Our soldiers, and the powers possessed or exercised by the Medical Superintendents or other functionaries in such hospitals, for providing diet, medicines, and every requisite for the medical and surgical treatment of the patients under their charge, together with the character of the diet, medical comforts, furniture, and other hospital supplies.

Also, We do further direct you to enquire generally as to the expenditure of such hospitals, and the financial control now exercised in and over the same, and the relative authority of the various departments whose functions are exercised within the hospitals.

And further, We do order and direct you to enquire into the rules and regulations, or the practice, in force for invaliding and discharging the soldiers of Our Army, when brought forward for discharge, as unfit for further service.

And further, We do order and direct you to enquire into the system of management and treatment of, and the provision made for, patients in civil hospitals, whether in immediate connection with Our Army or otherwise, and to consider whether such management or treatment, or any portion thereof, can be introduced with advantage in the Medical Department of Our Army.

And We further order and direct you to enquire into the expediency of making provision in Our military hospitals for the officers of Our Army suffering from disease or accident incurred in Our service, and to consider whether it will be advisable to provide in Our military hospitals for the treatment and cure of lunatic officers or soldiers, or to establish a separate military hospital or hospitals for that purpose, or in any other manner to provide for the treatment of such cases.

And We do further command and require you to report what changes you may consider it expedient to make in the organization, management, and expenditure of the Medical Department of Our Army, with a view to the utmost efficiency of this branch of Our military service, and what measures you may recommend to be adopted, with a view to the preservation of the health of Our troops at home and abroad; and also that you do report your opinion upon such returns or records as should be kept by the medical officers of Our Army, with a view to the preparation of a well digested and accurate body of military medical statistics.
