The Secretary's Fee for collation includes all charges for correspondence with the clerk to be collated, for all searches in the registry, for all communications with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, for examining the letters of orders and letters testimonial, for all communications with the registrar of the diocese, for the entry of the collation in the Bishop's Act Book, and obtaining the seal of the bishop to the instruments connected with the collation in all cases where the same are sealed with such seal, and the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when made by the bishop.

The Fee of the Registrar, or other officer by usage performing the duty, includes all charges for preparing the sentence of collation, and procuring the necessary stamps, but not the stamps themselves, for preparing the certificate of subscription to the 39 articles and the 3 articles of the 36th canon, and the certificate of the declaration of conformity to the liturgy, for attending on the bishop when the collation takes place, and the oaths of allegiance, supremacy, canonical obedience, and against simony are administered, for entering the collation in the register-book of the diocese, and for preparing letters testimonial and the mandate of induction addressed to the archdeacon, and obtaining the seal of the vicar general to those instruments in all cases where the same are sealed with such seal, and the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when not made by the bishop himself.

Institution.

The Secretary's Fee includes all charges for correspondence with the presentee, for examining the deed of presentation, the letters of orders and letters testimonial, for all communications with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, for preparing the bishop's fiat or his commission, when the latter is issued, for all communications with the registrar of the diocese, for the entry in the Bishop's Act Book, and obtaining the seal of the bishop to the instruments connected with the institution in all cases where the same are sealed with such seal,

and the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when made by the bishop.

The Fee of the Registrar, or other officer by usage performing the duty, includes all charges for preparing the instrument of institution, and procuring the necessary stamps, but not the stamps themselves, for preparing the certificate of declaration of conformity to the liturgy, and of subscription to the 39 articles and 3 articles of 36th canon, for attending on the bishop or his vicar general when the institution takes place, and the oaths of allegiance, supremacy, canonical obedience, and against simony, are administered, for drawing a notarial act of the proceedings and entering the same in the register book of the diocese, for preparing the letters testimonial and the mandate of induction to the archdeacon and obtaining the seal of the vicar general to the several instruments in all cases where the same are sealed with such seal, and making the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when not made by the bishop himself.

Licenses to Perpetual Curacies.

The Secretary's Fee includes all charges for correspondence with the clerk to be licensed, for examining the nomination, the letters of orders and letters testimonial, for preparing the bishop's fiat or his commission when issued, for all communications with the registrar of the diocese, for the entry in the Bishop's Act Book and obtaining the seal of the bishop to the instruments connected with the license, in all cases where the same are sealed with such seal, and the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when made by the bishop.

The Fee of the Registrar or other officer by usage performing the duty, includes all charges for preparing the license and procuring the necessary stamps, but not the stamps themselves, for preparing the certificate of declaration of conformity to the liturgy, and of subscription to the 39 articles and 3 articles of 36th canon, for attending on the bishop or his vicar general when the oaths of allegiance, supremacy, canonical

obedience, and against simony, are administered, and for entering the license in the register book of the diocese, and obtaining the vicar general's seal in all cases where the instruments connected with the license are sealed with such seal, and making the return to the Barons of the Exchequer, when not made by the bishop himself.

Installation and Induction to Cathedral Preferment.

The Fee of the Registrar or other officer by usage performing the duty, includes all charges for preparing and engrossing all necessary instruments and certificates, for entering the several chapter acts and schedules, for attendances, and for registering the whole proceedings in the chapter book, but not the stamps.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-eight, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, section twenty-one, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the prebendary of the prebend of Clifton, in the cathedral church of Lincoln, for the property belonging to him as such prebendary.

"Whereas, by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said prebend of Clifton will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of the said prebend, become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the hand of any prebendary of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, belonging to

such prebendary, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Edward Fane, the present holder of the said prebend, that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the said Edward Fane, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments, whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), now belonging to the said Prebend of Clifton as aforesaid, or to or in which he has or ought to have any estate, right, title, or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title, and interest, therein (except as aforesaid), be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said Edward Fane to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, as from the twenty-second day of May last past, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said Edward Fane, during the term of his natural life, the annual sum of eighty pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the twenty-second day of May and the twenty-second day of November; and that the first of such half-yearly payments shall be made on the twenty-second day of November next; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall, since the twenty-ninth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, have been or shall be granted or made by the said Edward Fane; and that if the decease of the said Edward Fane shall happen on any other day than one of the said two half-yearly days of payment, then a proportionate sum only shall be paid to the representatives of the said Edward Fane.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections nine and twenty, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, sections one and two, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act, of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections nine and twenty, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, sections one and two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Baschurch, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the portion of the said parish of Baschurch comprised within the townships of Weston Lullingfield and Stanwardine-in-the-Wood, and hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds, Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our names in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by Charlotte Barrett, of Prescott, in the county of Salop, Spinster, upon an understanding that the endowment hereinafter mentioned should be provided by us for the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

"And whereas the said Charlotte Barrett has caused to be erected, at her own cost and expense, a church within the limits of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, to be appropriated and used as and for the church of the said district; and the said church has been approved by us, and consecrated by the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, by the name of The Holy Trinity, Weston-Lullingfield; and whereas the said Charlotte Barrett has also provided a house of residence for the incumbent of the said district; and it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of such benefactions as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, should be assigned to the said Charlotte Barrett in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Baschurch which is comprised within the boundaries and limits of the townships

of Weston Lullingfield and Stanwardine-in-the-Wood, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named "The District of Weston-Lullingfield."

"And we further recommend and propose that the church which has been so approved by us, and consecrated by the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, by the name of The Holy Trinity, Weston-Lullingfield, as aforesaid, shall be and be deemed to be the parish church of the said district.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the incumbent for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said secondly-named Act, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such incumbent as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the incumbency of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the incumbent making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the incumbent succeeding to such district; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of the said district, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed or secured to such incumbent and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Charlotte Barrett, her heirs and assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has been given in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, to the incumbent and to the patron of the said parish of Baschurch, and no objections have been made thereto;

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Bangkok, transmitting the following copy of Regulations for the Custom House at that port :

On and after Monday next, the 27th day of April, a Custom House will be opened within the Dockyard of H. E. Soundel Oug Noi, (about 200 yards south of the new site for the British Consulate), where all business will be transacted in conformity with the general regulations under which trade is to be conducted at Siam.

The following additional rules have likewise been entered into by the undersigned, and the Siamese authorities :

1. Every English Merchant having cargo to load or discharge, must give due intimation thereof to the Custom House, where a pass, if for export cargo, will be granted on application for each lighter proceeding to deliver cargo at the Bar ; on arrival at Pateman this pass must be delivered to the chief authority there.

2. Both import and export duties must be paid at the Custom House ; and upon a vessel being ready to proceed to sea, the master or consignee, on application at the Custom House, will receive two certificates, the one for the payment of import the other of export duties. These being obtained the master will proceed to the British Consulate and deliver unto the Consul a true manifest of outward cargo, together with the certificates. The ship's papers will then be returned to the master and the vessel allowed to leave.

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, information, communicated by Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid, as to the continued imposition, in Spanish ports, of terms of quarantine on British vessels, although arriving with clean bills of health, and certificates from Spanish Consuls attesting that there is no epidemic disease whatsoever in the place of departure or its vicinity, but that the port is in communication with all the world.

As the Government of Spain, notwithstanding uniform remonstrance, firmly refuse to make any change in the system under which British shipping is thus subjected to detention and its consequences, the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade think it their duty, for the information and guidance of the owners of British vessels, to give publicity to the existence and enforcement of these vexatious regulations of the Spanish Boards of Health.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of, letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by the said Act, powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, and at any time thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post, of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any of such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid, and the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage, is extended to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," the provision fixing the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post in the first-mentioned Act is repealed; and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands to fix the maximum weight of letters to be sent by post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof. And it is provided that all letters shall be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered, by the post in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with, and under and subject to, all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions, as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct. And by the said Act power is also given to the Postmaster-General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to require the postage, British, colonial, or foreign, of any letters sent by the post to be prepaid either in money or in stamps as he may think fit on the same being put into the Post-office. And also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and also to refuse to receive or send by the post, any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made. And it is also declared and enacted that in all cases in which the British postage chargeable on any letters sent by the post

shall exceed the sum of one penny, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, reduce such postage to any other rate of postage they may from time to time think fit. And also that the Postmaster-General may, if he shall think fit (with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury) allow any printed words, writing, or marks (in addition to the direction) to be put on any printed newspapers or other printed papers sent by the post, or on the covers thereof; and that any such newspapers or other printed papers shall from thenceforth be forwarded either free of postage or subject to such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct; and it is also declared and enacted that the Postmaster-General and any officer of the Post-office may detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post, contrary to the regulations of that Act or the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to any regulations made under the authority of that Act, or of the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the first-mentioned Act, and open such letters, and either return them to the senders thereof, or forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall from time to time direct.

And whereas the Postmaster-General hath with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have at various times since the passing of the said two before-mentioned Acts, and in pursuance and in exercise of the powers reserved to them thereby, by divers Warrants, under their hands, made and given certain orders, directions and regulations relating to the weight, size and dimensions, and to the rates of postage in conformity with and under, and subject to which certain printed papers and parliamentary proceedings therein respectively mentioned, were to be transmitted by the post, certain of which said Warrants, since the making thereof respectively, have been wholly, and others have been in part repealed and revoked. And it is expedient that certain other Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, made for the like purpose and now in force respectively, and bearing date respectively, the 22nd day of February, 1855, the 31st day of March, 1855 (which last-mentioned Warrant relates to the transmission of packets between the United Kingdom and the colony of Sierra Leone), the 12th day of January, 1856, the 12th day of May, 1856, the 15th day of August, 1856, the 8th day of December, 1856, and the 19th day of May, 1857, and the several orders, directions, regulations and rates of postage therein respectively mentioned and contained, should also be repealed and revoked, and that such other orders, directions, regulations and rates should be made and substituted in lieu thereof, as are hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order, direct, and declare, as follows;

1. The said several Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date, respectively, the 22nd day of February, 1855, the 31st day of March, 1855 (which last-mentioned Warrant relates to the transmission of packets between the United Kingdom and the colony of Sierra Leone), the 12th day of January, 1856, the 12th day of May, 1856, the 15th day of August, 1856, the 8th day of December, 1856, and the 19th day of May, 1857, and every of them, shall be, and the same are, hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, respectively; and that the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage in such several Warrants respectively made, mentioned, and set forth, shall wholly cease and determine; nevertheless, no Treasury Warrant or part of a Treasury Warrant, repealed by the said several last-mentioned Treasury Warrants respectively, or either of them, shall be revived by this Warrant.

2. All packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the several places mentioned and set forth in the Schedule A, to this Warrant annexed; and all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between the several colonies and places mentioned and set forth in the Schedule B to this Warrant annexed; and that all such respective packets shall be so transmitted respectively, in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter respectively mentioned and contained, and that as respects certain of the said places in the said schedules respectively mentioned, such transmission may also be by the routes mentioned against such places in such schedules respectively; and that the single rate of postage for the transmission thereof, respectively, shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedules A and B; and that all such respective packets so transmitted, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedules A and B.

And on every such packet, exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say: on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and one half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

No such packet which in length, or breadth, or width, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post, under the provisions aforesaid.

No such packet, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom, exceeding the weight of three pounds, shall be forwarded by the post, under the provisions aforesaid.

The terms "books, publications, or works of literature or art," in this Warrant used, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and comprise all such articles as, in their general character, are either literary, or consist of printed, written, engraved, or lithographed matter (although not strictly literary), including books (whether printed, written, or plain), publications or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), almanacks, printed or lithographed letters, and such artistic productions, as prints, maps (whether on paper, or canvass, or cloth, and whether printed or written), and photographs, when not on glass, or in frames containing glass, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, lithographed, written upon, or plain, or any mixture of the four), together with any binding, mounting, or covering, of or upon, or belonging to any such article or production, or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and including also any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book markers (whether of paper or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other thing usually appertaining to any such article or production, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article or production to which they or it shall belong; Provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorise the sending by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, of any patterns, or books of patterns, or papers of patterns, of any article or thing whatsoever.

That every packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope, open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no written letter either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter, either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to, or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed or any other person), nor any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure, not authorised by this Warrant, sent in or

with any such packet, nor shall there be any written letter or any written communication in the nature of a letter, in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof.

Upon every packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A., which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account; and upon every such packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A., which shall be posted in any of the colonies respectively mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A., to this Warrant annexed, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted; and upon every packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, between the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule B, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by the proper colonial postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto.

3. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post any officer of the Post-office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be despatched in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

4. Nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to extend to interfere with or in anywise to affect any privileges relating to the transmission by the post of printed newspapers or any printed publications which are allowed to pass by the post under the newspaper privilege; nevertheless, any printed newspapers which are not authorised to be transmitted by the post under such privileges, may be transmitted by the post at the rates of postage, and under the regulations contained in this Warrant.

5. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales, addressed to the United Kingdom, shall exceed the weight of three pounds, or if any packet, sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A, or if any packet, sent, or tendered,

or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, between the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule B, shall in length, or breadth, or width, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if any packet, or the cover or envelope of any packet, sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall not be open at the ends or sides, or if there shall be any written letter, or any written communication in the nature of a letter, in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof (whether such letter or communication be addressed to, or intended for, the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), every such respective packet, shall, and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, and such postage may be either paid by the sender or be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be forwarded.

6. If any packet, sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule A, or between the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule B shall contain any written letter or any written communication in the nature of a letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, every such letter or communication or enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post-office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or forwarded to the address on the packet, charged in either case not only with the full rates of postage, as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under the provisions of this Warrant on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, and the remainder of the packet, if the postage be duly paid when posted, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

7. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant respectively, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule A (any such packet sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account only excepted), shall be posted in the United Kingdom, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under this Warrant if such packet did not exceed four ounces in weight, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto and the postage to which such package would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further

and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight; but if any such packet shall be posted in the United Kingdom having thereon, or affixed thereto, a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant, or if any packet sent or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant respectively, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A (any such packet sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall keep a postage account with the General Post-office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account only excepted), shall be posted in the United Kingdom without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp; every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be dealt with and chargeable in like manner as is herein-before directed with respect to any packet not open at the ends or sides, or exceeding in length, or breadth, or width, the dimensions of two feet.

8. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant respectively, between the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned and set forth in the said Schedule A, shall be posted in any of the colonies respectively mentioned in the said Schedule A, and the postage paid thereon at the time of the same being posted, shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions and conditions herein-before contained, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under this Warrant, if such packet did not exceed four ounces in weight; every such packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant, on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight; but if any such packet shall be posted in any of the colonies mentioned in the said schedule A, without any postage having been paid thereon or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant, every such last mentioned packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination. And every such last mentioned packet, on being so returned given up or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, and such postage may be either paid by the sender or may be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be forwarded.

9. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant respectively, between the several places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule B shall be posted in any of the colonies respectively mentioned in the schedule B, and the postage paid thereon or postage stamps affixed thereto at the time of the same being posted, shall be less in
