IT is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council that the Parliament be prorogued, from Friday, the twenty-eighth day of this instant August, to Friday, the sixth day of November next.

THIS day the Right Honourable Sir Edmund Walker Head, Bart., was, by Her Majesty's command, sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

Her Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Most Noble John Winston, Duke of Marlborough, to be Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the county of Oxford, and Edward Lewis Pryse, Esq., to be Her Majesty's Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the county of Cardigan, they this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

WHEREAS an Order in Council was made on the second day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, reciting that it had been represented to Her Majesty that certain contagious or infectious disorders were then prevalent among cattle in certain countries or places bordering upon the Baltic Sea, and that there was danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle and horns, hoofs and raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, from such

countries or places, and prohibiting the importation or introduction into the United Kingdom of cattle and horns, hoofs, and raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, which should come from, or should have been at, any place within certain territories, therein mentioned, of the Emperor of Russia, or of the King of Prussia, or of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburgh Schwerin, or the territories of the Free City of Lubeck.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that there is no longer danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of live cattle from the aforesaid countries or places, but that there is still danger of such disorders being introduced into this country by means of horns, hoofs, bones, and raw or wet hides or skins of cattle imported thence.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby order that the whole of the said Order of the second day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall henceforth be revoked, and cease and determine, but nevertheless, without affecting anything done, or any liability incurred, under the same Order, as to which the same Order shall remain in full force.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that from and after the date hereof, no horns, hoofs, bones, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall have come from, or shall have been at, any place within those territories of the Emperor of Russia, or of the King of Prussia, or of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburgh Schwerin, which respectively are in, or border upon, the Gulf of Finland, or any other part of the Baltic Sea between the Gulf of Finland and the territories of the Free City of Lubeck, or which shall come from, or shall have been at, any place within the territories of the Free City of Lubeck; and also, that from and after the date hereof, no cattle, and no horns, hoofs, bones, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, shall be imported into the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any horns, hoofs, bones, or raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, which shall have come from, or shall have been at, any such place as aforesaid.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that all cattle, and all horns, hoofs, bones, and raw or wet hides or skins of cattle, the importation or introduction whereof is so prohibited as aforesaid,

and also all hay, straw, fodder, litter, or manure, being or having been in or on board any vessels at the same time with any such cattle as last aforesaid, shall, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed, or otherwise disposed of as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the 410th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that upon the completion of any new light-house, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable; and may, from time to time, alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the *Light Dues*, authorised to be levied by the said Act, are paid and collected.

And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting and about to light certain new lighthouses at the undermentioned places; viz. :—

- 1st. At the north extreme of Rona Island, in the Sound of Skye.
- 2nd. On Gillian Island, off Kyleakin, in Loch Alsh.
- 3rd. On the Island of Oronsay, in Sleat Sound.
- 4th. At Ushenish, on the island of South Uist.
- 5th. At Rhu Vaal, on the north point of Islay.
- 6th. At Runa Gall, near Tobermory, in the Sound of Mull.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to direct that upon the completion and lighting of the said lights respectively, there shall be paid in respect of each of the said lights for every British vessel, and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton, of the burthen of every such vessel, for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and for every foreign vessel not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed. And that the said tolls in respect of each of the said lighthouses shall be levied by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the abatement or discount of 25 per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of 10 per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the 26th June, 1855; and subject also to the further abatement or discount of 15 per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages,

and of 15 per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the 20th day of March, 1857; and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, sanctioned by the said Order in Council, dated the 26th day of June, 1855.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-ground or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation, shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and Vestry Clerks of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the hereinafter mentioned places:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-fifth of June last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixth of August instant, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the above recited Act.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discon-

tinued from and after the seventh of September next, in the undermentioned parishes as follows; viz.:

SHOREDITCH.—Entirely in the *parish churchyard of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch*, and in the *Jews' Burial-ground, Hoxton*; also in the churchyards of *Saint Mary, Haggerstone*, and of *Saint John's, Hoxton*, except in family vaults and brick graves in existence prior to the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, in which each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and in which the only bodies interred shall be those of the husband, wife, parents, unmarried children, and brothers and sisters of persons already buried therein.

LAMBETH.—Beneath the church of *St. Mathew, Brixton*, and the church of *Saint Luke, Norwood*, both in the parish of Lambeth; and it is further ordered, that in family vaults and brick graves in the churchyards of the above churches, each coffin be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, that in family earthen graves a layer of earth eighteen inches in thickness, be left between each coffin, and that in no grave shall any interment take place without a covering of earth, four feet in thickness at the least, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

BATTERSEA.—In all parts of the *churchyard of Saint George the Martyr*, in the parish of Battersea, in which burials have taken place, and from and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, wholly in the said churchyard.

CHELSEA.—Wholly in the *old churchyard of the parish of Saint Luke, Chelsea*; also in the *old burial-ground, King's-road*, and in *Saint Luke's New Churchyard*, except in family vaults and brick graves which were in existence prior to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, in which each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and that the only bodies buried be those of the husband, wife, parents, unmarried children, and brothers and sisters of persons already buried therein. And it is further ordered that in the *Jews' Burial-ground*, in the above parish, burials be conducted in accordance with the 7th, 8th, and 9th Official Regulations for conducting Interments in New Burial-grounds.

MARYLEBONE.—Wholly in the vaults and catacombs under the vestry of the *Roman Catholic Chapel, Grove-road, Saint John's Wood*, in the parish of Marylebone; also in the two *burial-grounds in Paddington-street*, and in the *High-street, or Parish Chapel Burial-ground*, and in *Saint John's Wood Burial-ground*, except in vaults and brick graves which were in existence prior to the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has already been buried in, in which each body shall be imbedded in a

layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and that the only bodies interred be those of the husband or wife of persons already buried therein.

FULHAM.—With the exception of private vaults and graves, in all that part of the *parish churchyard of All Saints, Fulham*, in which burials have taken place within the last twenty years; and it is further ordered that in the burial-ground of *St. Thomas's Roman Catholic Chapel* (with the exception of family vaults), only one body be buried in each grave; that in family vaults and brick graves in *All Saints Churchyard*, in the burial-grounds of *Saint Mary, Northend*, and of *Saint Thomas's Roman Catholic Chapel*, each coffin be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented; that in family earthen graves a layer of earth, eighteen inches thick, be left between each coffin, and that no interment shall take place in any grave without a covering of earth four feet in thickness, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

PADDINGTON.—Wholly in the *old churchyard of Saint Mary, Paddington*, and in the manor-ground adjoining, except in family vaults and brick graves which were in existence prior to the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, in which each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and in which the only bodies interred, shall be those of the husband or wife of persons already buried therein.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order,

and so from time to time, as circumstance may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made two representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-fifth of June last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixth of August instant; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the seventh of September next (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

KINGSWINFORD, STAFFORDSHIRE.—Wholly in the churchyard of *Brierley-hill*; and in the *Wesleyan* and *Primitive Methodist Burial-grounds*, in *Brierley-hill*, within three yards of any building; and also in the rest of the said burial-grounds, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and except in graves which are free from water and from remains, no coffin to be placed within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet below the surface of the ground.

NEWARK-UPON-TRENT.—In the burial-grounds of the *Independent* and the *Jehovah Jireh Chapels*.

MELBOURNE, DERBYSHIRE.—In the *parish church*; and from and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the *churchyard*, in the *Friends' Burial-ground*, in the *New Jerusalem Chapel Burial-ground*, and (with the exception of the now existing reserved grave spaces in which the only bodies interred shall be those of the husbands and wives of persons buried in the adjoining graves) in the *Baptist Chapel Burial-ground*,

SELBY.—In the *parish church*; and from and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the *churchyard*, with the exception of family vaults and brick graves existing on the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, which are free from water and can be opened without the disturbance of soil that has been already buried in, and it is also ordered that each coffin be embedded in charcoal and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and that the only bodies interred be those of the husbands, wives, parents, unmarried children, brothers, and sisters of those already interred therein.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the Great Synagogue Jewish Burial-ground, in the parish of *St. Matthew*, **BETHNAL GREEN**, from the first of August to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven;

In the parish churchyard of **CHOBHAM**, Surrey, from the first of September next, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight;

In *Christ Church Burial-ground*, *Every-street*, *Ancoats*, in **MANCHESTER**, from the first of September next to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, on condition that all the regulations prescribed by certain Orders in Council of the seventh of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and twenty-second of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in reference to this burial-ground, be strictly observed;

In the churchyard of the parish of SARRATT, Herts, from the first of August to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven ;

In the churchyard of Saint Gregory, SUDBURY, from the thirty-first of March to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, so far as relates to the new portion of the same ;

In the parish churchyard, in the burial-ground of the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, and in Brook-street Burial-ground, TOTTENHAM, from the first of September next to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight ;

In the parish churchyard of TWEEDMOUTH, from the first of September next to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight ;

In the New Synagogue Jewish Burial-ground, in the parish of St. Mary, WHITECHAPEL, from the first of August to the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven ;

In the churchyard of NEW WINDSOR, in the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel, and in the Acre Burial-ground, in Windsor, from the first of August to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven ;

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eleventh of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the church of *St. Matthew, Holbeck*, in LEEDS, from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and such time was extended to the thirty-first of December last, and whereas by another Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of December last, (varying such former Order) burials were directed to be wholly discontinued in the said churchyard from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and it seems fit that the said last-mentioned Order be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the burial of widowers and widows of those already interred in now existing vaults and walled graves in the said churchyard, be allowed, provided such vaults and graves can be opened without the disturbance of soil that has been buried in, and that every coffin be imbedded in charcoal and entombed in an airtight manner.

And, whereas, by an Order in Council of the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, interments were directed to be wholly discontinued, except in then existing private vaults and graves, in the churchyard of *St. Mark Woodhouse*, in LEEDS, and certain regulations were made in respect of interments in such private vaults and graves, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order in lieu thereof, and it is hereby ordered, that interment in the said churchyard be discontinued except so far as is compatible with the following regulations, viz. : that there be no burial within sixteen feet of the church wall ; that one body only be buried in any grave, and that no grave or vault previously buried in be re-opened except to bury another member of the same family ; that every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an airtight manner ; that no coffin in an earthen grave be buried within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four feet beneath the level of the

ground ; and that no remains be exposed in opening or forming any grave or vault.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the eighth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed wholly to cease in the churchyard of *All Saints Chorlton*, in MANCHESTER, from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order in lieu thereof, and it is hereby ordered, that in the said churchyard interment be discontinued on and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight ; and that in the meantime no coffin be buried therein within a foot of any other coffin, or less than four and a half feet below the surface of the soil, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an airtight manner, and except in now existing private graves.

And whereas, by an Order in Council of the fourth of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of OLD SWINFORD, with certain exceptions so far as regarded vaults and brick graves, and also except (as respected part of the churchyard) in other graves so far as was compatible with the observance of certain regulations therein set forth, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that one foot in thickness of earth be left above a previously interred coffin, and between new and old graves, in the new part of the said churchyard, instead of half a yard, as directed by the said Order in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and Vestry Clerks of the undermentioned parishes ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made two representations, stating, that for the protection of the public health, burials should be forthwith discontinued in such parishes as follows, viz. :

ST. GILES-IN-THE-FIELDS.—Forthwith in the *new burial-ground* belonging to the parish of St. Giles-in-the-fields, situated in the parish of St. Pancras, with the exception of family vaults and brick graves which were in existence prior to the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, which are free from water, and can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, in which each coffin shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and in which the only bodies interred shall be those of the husband, wife, parents, unmarried children, and brothers and sisters of persons already buried therein.

ST. MARY, WHITECHAPEL.—Forthwith wholly, in the *churchyard of St. Mary, Whitechapel*, and in the *Friends' Burial-ground, Thomas-street*.

ST. JOHN, HACKNEY.—In the *parish churchyard*, and in *West Hackney Churchyard*, with the exception of vaults and family graves, forthwith in ground which has been already buried in, and from and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, wholly in the said churchyards; and that in family vaults and brick graves in *South Hackney Old and New Churchyards*, and in the *Unitarian Chapel Burial-ground, Paradise-fields*, each coffin be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented; and that in family earthen graves in *South Hackney Old and New Churchyards*, in *St. Barnabas Churchyard, Homerton*, and in the *Unitarian Chapel Burial-ground, Paradise-fields*, a layer of earth eighteen inches in thickness be left between each coffin, and that four feet of earth be left above the last coffin, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

STREATHAM.—Burials to be discontinued under *Streatham Church*, and that from and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, with the exception of now existing family vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each body shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, burials be discontinued in the *churchyard*.

SAINT DUNSTAN, STEPNEY.—Burials to be discontinued in the *churchyard of the parish of Saint Dunstan, Stepney*, except in family vaults and brick graves which were in existence prior to the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, in which each body shall be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and in which the only bodies interred shall be those of the husband, wife, parents, unmarried children, and brothers and sisters of persons already buried therein.

That burials be forthwith discontinued in the catacombs and vaults beneath *Holy Trinity Church, Mile End*, and that in the *churchyard burials be conducted according to numbers three, five, six, seven and eight of the official regulations for new burial-grounds*.

That burials be forthwith discontinued in the *Friends' Burial-ground, Brook-street, Ratcliffe*; and that in the *Jews Burial-ground, East-street, Globe-fields, Mile End*, and in the *Spanish and Portuguese Jewish Burial-ground, Mile End*, burials be conducted according to the third official regulation for new burial-grounds.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventh day of October next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be

affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the said parishes, or on some conspicuous places within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before the said seventh day of October next.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

CHORLEY, LANCASHIRE.—Burials to be discontinued in *Saint George's Churchyard*, except in vaults and walled graves, existing this day, free from water, and in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and except in graves which are free from water, and have never before been buried in, one body only to be buried in each; and that interments in *Saint Peter's Churchyard*, and in the *Roman Catholic Chapelyard of Weldbank*, be discontinued, except so far as is compatible with the Regulations for Burial-grounds, and that interment in the *Chapel of Weldbank* be wholly discontinued.

YALDING, KENT.—Burials to be discontinued forthwith in the *church of Yalding, Kent*, and also in the portion of the *churchyard* bounded by the Hunton footpath, leading to the north entrance of the church, and, from and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the *churchyard*, with the exception of the unoccupied ground, and of now existing family vaults and brick graves.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventh day of October next;

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said seventh day of October.

ORDINANCE above referred to.

ORDINANCE framed by the COMMISSIONERS appointed for the Purposes of the STATUTE 17th and 18th Vict., chap. 81, in relation to the Scholarships of the foundation of George Townsend, Esquire, in PEMBROKE COLLEGE, within the UNIVERSITY of OXFORD.

WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act, passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Oxford, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint Mary, Winchester," ordain as follows, in relation to the Scholarships of the foundation of George Townsend, Esquire, in Pembroke College, within the said University:

1. The emoluments of the foundation of George Townsend, Esquire, shall be divided quarterly, in equal shares among such Scholars of that foundation as shall not have exceeded the sixteenth term from that of their matriculation inclusive, and such graduate Scholar or Scholars as shall be residing in the University in order to keep the one term now necessary to enable Bachelors of Arts to proceed to the degree of Masters of Arts, so that no Scholars shall receive any part of the emoluments of the foundation for more than one term after he shall have completed his sixteenth term from matriculation.

2. Each of the four junior Scholars of that foundation for the time being, while resident in the University, and until he shall have completed his sixteenth term from matriculation inclusive, shall enjoy a separate set of rooms rent free. The four senior Scholars shall have no claim to rooms.

3. In elections to Scholarships of that foundation, no Scholar shall be considered duly qualified according to the instrument of foundation as a Scholar of any of the Schools named in the will of the said George Townsend unless he shall have been receiving education in such School for the continuous period (inclusive of vacations), of two years out of the three years immediately preceding the day of election.

4. It shall be lawful for the persons in whom the election of each Townsend Scholar is vested

under the said will, to elect on each occasion, if they, or a majority of them, shall think fit, two or more candidates, out of whom the Master and Fellows shall choose the most proficient if, in their judgment, of sufficient merit for election.

ORDINANCE framed by the COMMISSIONERS appointed for the Purposes of the STATUTE 17th and 18th Vict., c. 81, in relation to WINCHESTER COLLEGE.

WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further Provision for the good Government and Extension of the University of Oxford, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint Mary Winchester," ordain as follows in relation to the College of Saint Mary of Winchester, near Winchester, otherwise and hereinafter called Winchester College:—

1. No person shall be incapable of being elected or appointed Warden of the said College by reason of his not being or not having been a Fellow thereof, or a Fellow of the College of Saint Mary of Winchester, in the University of Oxford, otherwise and hereinafter called New College. No person shall be capable of being elected or appointed who shall not be a Priest of the United Church of England and Ireland, and either a Graduate in Theology or Law, or a Master of Arts. The electors shall choose, and in case of lapse the Bishop of Winchester for the time being shall appoint the person (being otherwise duly qualified according to the Statutes of the College in force for the time being), who in their or his judgment, as the case may be, shall be most fit for the government of the College as a place of religion, learning, and education.

2. The Warden shall be required to reside in the College eight calendar months at least in each year: Provided, that in case of the Warden's sickness, or for any other urgent cause, it shall

be lawful for the Visitor to dispense with the Warden's residence for such a period as may seem to the Visitor to be required by the necessities of the case. This regulation shall take effect in lieu of the provisions of the existing Statutes relating to the residence of the Warden.

3. The Warden and Fellows may at any time hereafter, if they shall think fit, commute the emoluments of the Wardenship, wholly or partially, for a stipend or annual sum of money payable in any other manner out of the revenues of the College, or for a certain proportion of the said revenues; and may fix the time at which such commutation shall take effect, and may also from time to time regulate, increase, or diminish the Warden's emoluments, whether commuted or uncommuted, as they shall think proper: Provided, that no exercise of this power shall affect the person then being Warden without his consent: Provided also, that the Visitor, upon the petition of the Warden or of any one or more of the Fellows, may disallow any such commutation, regulation, increase, or diminution, if he shall think fit.

4. If at any time it shall appear that the Warden has become permanently incapable of performing the duties of his office, the Sub-Warden shall, upon the request of any two or more Fellows, convene a meeting of the Fellows, after notice sent to such of them as may be within the United Kingdom, for the consideration of the matter; and it shall be lawful for a majority of the Fellows present at such meeting to present a petition to the Visitor, setting forth the circumstances of the case, and praying the Visitor to inquire into the truth of them; and the Visitor shall institute such inquiry accordingly. And if upon such inquiry, or upon a petition presented by the Warden (as the case may be), it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Visitor that the Warden has become permanently incapable of performing his duties, then the Visitor shall nominate one of such two Fellows as, by the vote of the greatest number of the Fellows present at a meeting convened by the Sub-Warden, shall be presented to him, to be Pro-Warden of the College, and shall assign to him for his maintenance, in addition to his Fellowship, so much (not exceeding one-third) of the Warden's emoluments as the Visitor shall think fit; provided that the Warden shall be at liberty to retain his lodgings. And such Pro-Warden shall, so long as the Warden shall retain his office and be incapable of performing its duties, receive the proportion so assigned to him, and shall exercise and perform all the functions and duties and have all the powers and authorities of Warden except the power of consenting to any commutation, regulation, or diminution of the Warden's emoluments, and shall be bound to residence in the same manner, and shall be liable to deprivation for the same causes, and in the same manner. If any Pro-Warden shall die, resign his office, vacate or be deprived of his Fellowship, or become incapable, the Visitor shall appoint a new Pro-Warden in the same manner. It shall be lawful for the Visitor, if at any time he shall be satisfied that the Warden's incapacity has ceased, and that he is capable of performing the duties of his office, to reinstate him in his powers and functions, and in the receipt of his whole emoluments.

5. In elections to Fellowships within the College, the electors shall (subject to the provisions in that behalf of the Statutes in force for the time being) choose that person who shall appear to them to be of the greatest merit, and most fit to be a Fellow of the College as a place of religion, learning, and education. The preference given

by the existing Statutes to those who are or have been Fellows of New College shall be extended alike to the Master, Usher, and Assistant Masters of the School of Winchester College for the time being, and to those who shall have held any of the said offices, and to those who shall have been educated for two years at the said School. No person shall be entitled to preference by reason of his place of birth.

6. Thirty days, at least, before the day of election to a Fellowship, notice of such intended election, and of the conditions of election, shall be given by the Warden, in such manner as he shall deem best adapted to ensure publicity.

7. It shall be lawful for the Warden and Fellows to elect distinguished persons to Honorary Fellowships within the College. Persons so elected shall be termed Honorary Fellows, and shall not be entitled to vote on any occasion as Fellows, or to receive any emolument whatever, but shall be entitled to enjoy such other privileges and advantages as the Warden and Fellows shall, by resolution, from time to time determine. The conditions of eligibility to and tenure of Honorary Fellowships, and the time and mode of election thereto, may also be determined by the Warden and Fellows from time to time. Honorary Fellows shall not, in the construction of this Ordinance, be counted among the Fellows of the College, nor Honorary Fellowships among the Fellowships of the College.

8. The provisions respecting the residence of Fellows and Scholars, and the mode of granting leave of absence from the College, contained in the existing Statutes, shall be henceforth void. Such regulations respecting the residence of Fellows and Scholars within the College, and respecting the mode in which and the conditions under which leave of absence may be granted to any Fellow or Scholar, as may be expedient for the interests of the College as a place of learning and education, shall be made with all convenient speed, and may be varied from time to time, and may be enforced by pecuniary penalties, and in case of non-compliance, by deprivation. Such regulations shall be made and varied, so far as they may relate to Fellows, by the Warden and Fellows; so far as they may relate to Scholars, by the Warden alone.

9. Thirty additional Scholarships shall be established and maintained within the College; and twenty Exhibitions, of the annual value of Fifty pounds each, shall be established and maintained within the School of the College.

10. The first, third, fifth, and seventh Fellowships, or, if the Warden and Fellows shall deem it more desirable for the interests of the College, the second, fourth, sixth, and eighth, which shall become vacant after the approval of this Ordinance by Her Majesty in Council, shall not be filled up, and the emoluments thereof shall be applied, together with any other available resources of the College, in establishing and maintaining the said thirty Scholarships and twenty Exhibitions. The emoluments of the Fellowships hereby directed to be not filled up shall be the sums which would in each year have been payable to the holders of the same if the same had been filled up. If any Fellowship or Fellowships shall be vacant at the time of the approval aforesaid, such Fellowship or Fellowships shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, be considered as having become vacant immediately after such approval.

11. Provision shall be made from time to time by the Warden and Fellows for the board of the Scholars out of the revenues of the College, in lieu of the commons assigned to them by the

existing Statutes. No Scholar shall be entitled to receive any special allowances in respect of his being of the blood or kindred of the Founder.

12. In elections to Scholarships within the College, no person shall be either entitled to preference or ineligible by reason of his being or not being of the blood or kindred of William of Wykeham, the Founder of the College, or by reason of his place of birth. No person shall be ineligible by reason of his having any bodily imperfection which might operate as a disqualification for Holy Orders, or of his not being instructed in plain song, or by reason of any restriction in respect of property or pecuniary circumstances contained in the existing Statutes; but the electors may refuse to admit as a candidate any one whom they may deem to be not in need of a Scholarship, and all other things being equal in candidates, shall have regard to the pecuniary circumstances of such candidates. No person shall be eligible to a Scholarship who shall have attained the age of fourteen years. The conditions of tenure in respect of age shall be the same for all persons, whether of the blood or kindred of the Founder or not.

13. The candidates for Scholarships shall be examined in such subjects as the electors shall from time to time determine, and those candidates (being otherwise duly qualified according to the Statutes in force for the time being) shall be elected, who after such examination shall appear to the electors to be most proficient and most fit to be Scholars of the College.

14. The electors to the Scholarships of Winchester College and to those of New College shall not, in electing thereto, be bound to observe any regulations contained in the existing Statutes of Winchester College, which shall be inconsistent with the Statutes of New College in force for the time being.

15. It shall be lawful for the electors to Scholarships, so soon as in their judgment it can be done without injustice to the candidates of the year in which the change shall be made, to discontinue the practice of electing to prospective vacancies.

16. The Warden and Fellows may deprive any Scholar of his Scholarship for any misconduct which, in their judgment, shall merit deprivation, subject to such appeal to the Visitor as is hereinafter provided.

17. No Fellow of New College shall be incapable of being appointed an elector to the Scholarships of Winchester College by reason of his faculty.

18. The electors, and the time and mode of examination and election, and the conditions of election in reference to superior proficiency and fitness, shall be the same in the case of Exhibitions as in the case of Scholarships, but no person shall be eligible to an Exhibition who shall have attained the age of fifteen years, and all other things being equal in candidates the electors shall have regard to the pecuniary circumstances of such candidates.

19. Thirty days at least before the annual day of election to Scholarships and Exhibitions, notice of such intended election shall be given by the Warden of Winchester College in such manner as he shall deem best adapted to ensure publicity.

20. Every Scholar, who shall be elected to an Exhibition shall thereby vacate his Scholarship, and every Exhibitioner who shall be elected to a Scholarship shall thereby vacate his Exhibition.

21. The Master of the School shall, immediately before every annual election to Scholarships and Exhibitions, make a report to the electors respecting the conduct and proficiency of each

Exhibitioner; and it shall be lawful for the electors, or the major part of them, on such report, to terminate any Exhibitioner's tenure of his Exhibition. Subject to the foregoing provision, each Exhibitioner shall hold his Exhibition, as long as he remains at the School, or until he is elected to a Scholarship. The Exhibitioners shall be subject to such regulations respecting residence at the School as the Warden shall from time to time appoint.

22. Eight Exhibitions shall be established previous to any increase in the number of Scholarships; the relative rate at which the remaining twelve Exhibitions, and the thirty additional Scholarships shall be established, shall be in the discretion of the Warden and Fellows.

23. When the thirty additional Scholarships shall have been established, it shall be lawful for the Warden and Fellows, if they shall have sufficient means at their disposal, to increase the number of Exhibitions to forty, and when the number of Exhibitions shall have been increased to forty, it shall be lawful, in like manner, for the Warden and Fellows to restore the four Fellowships hereinbefore directed to be not filled up.

24. In addition to the branches of instruction specifically mentioned in the Statutes, the Scholars and Exhibitioners shall be instructed in the mathematical and physical sciences, and such other branches of instruction as are proper to complete a liberal and religious education.

25. The number of Fellowships within the College shall never be less than six, unless the Visitor shall think fit, on a petition in writing presented and subscribed by the Warden and not less than three-fourths of the Fellows of the College, to direct that the number shall be diminished, either permanently or during any limited period, by not filling up vacancies, for the purpose either of increasing the emoluments of the Warden and Fellows, if the same shall appear to be insufficient, or of augmenting the number or emoluments of the Scholars or Exhibitioners, or of improving the property of the College, or in order to apply the surplus income to be obtained by such diminution to any purpose specified in the petition, and directly expedient for the interests of the College as a place of religion, learning, and education.

26. The Warden and Fellows shall, once at least in every ten years, lay before the Visitor a statement in writing of the annual revenue and expenditure of the College for the preceding ten years, or for the period which shall have elapsed since the date of the last statement (as the case may be); and shall also furnish to the Visitor such additional information (if any) as he shall require for enabling him to form a judgment of the means and requirements and general state and condition of the College.

27. The Warden and Fellows shall not, by reason of any clause or provision in the existing Statutes of the College, be prohibited or restrained from dividing amongst themselves or otherwise disposing of the clear surplus of the corporate revenues of the College, as they might have done if the Statutes had contained no such clause or provision.

28. The Warden and Fellows may, if they shall think fit, commute the allowances now payable to Fellows, or any part thereof, for annual stipends or aliquot shares of the corporate revenues of the College. It shall be lawful for the Visitor, upon the petition of any person who shall be a Fellow at the time of such commutation being determined on, and shall feel himself aggrieved thereby, to disallow such commutation, if he shall think fit.

29. The Warden and Fellows may from time

to time appoint such officers as they may deem expedient for the better instruction and discipline of the School, and may assign to such officers such stipends or emoluments as the Warden and Fellows shall think proper.

30. The Warden shall, as soon as conveniently may be, make regulations for the performance of Divine Service according to the Liturgy of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the College, and for attendance on the same, and may vary such regulations from time to time; but the Visitor shall have power to disallow and annul any such regulations, or any variation thereof. The provisions of the existing Statutes relating to Divine Service shall be henceforth void.

31. The oaths prescribed by the existing Statutes shall not hereafter be taken; but every person elected or admitted to any place or office (other than a Scholarship), on election or admission to which an oath is now required, shall, at the time of his election or admission, take an oath or make a declaration, as the Warden and Fellows shall by resolution determine, to the effect that he will faithfully perform the duties of such place or office, and obey the Statutes and Byelaws of the College in force for the time being so far as they may concern him; and the electors to any place or office before electing to which an oath is now required (not being an annual office), shall, before electing, take an oath or make a declaration, as the Warden and Fellows shall by resolution determine, to the effect that they will elect the person best qualified in their judgment for such place or office.

32. The common seal of the College may be affixed by the Warden, if he shall think fit, to any act or document at any meeting at which the major part of all the Fellows shall be present, with the consent of the major part of the Fellows so present.

33. The power which is given by the existing Statutes to the Sub-Warden to act in place of the Warden, and the power of any officer of the College who may hereafter be authorized by any Statute or Byelaw to act in place of the Warden, shall be deemed to extend to all the acts which the Warden is hereby authorized or directed to do, except the giving consent to any commutation, regulation, or diminution of the Warden's emoluments.

34. The particular provisions of the existing Statutes respecting the devotions, dress, recreations, and other personal habits of the members of the College, and the clothing to be provided for them respectively, and the conditions of their going beyond the precincts of the College; and respecting the meals of the members of the College, and the mode of serving and conducting the same; and respecting the inquiries to be made into the life and conduct of the members of the College, and the mode of making the same; and respecting the punishments for offences not being such as require deprivation; and respecting the treatment and support of Fellows and Scholars in case of sickness or infirmity; and respecting the distribution of the rooms, and the use of the Common Hall and other common rooms or buildings of the College; and respecting the use of the Library; and respecting the times of opening and closing the gates and doors of the College; and respecting the admission of strangers into the precincts of the College; and respecting the reading of the Statutes; and respecting the service of the College; and respecting progresses and other matters relative to the supervision of the property of the College; and respecting the custody and inspection of the monies, plate, and other goods of the

College other than the muniments and seals, shall be henceforth void. Such regulations shall be made from time to time as may be deemed necessary or desirable for effecting the main objects which the aforesaid provisions or any of them are respectively intended to effect; and may be enforced by such penalties as may be thought fit, subject to such right of appeal to the Visitor as is hereinafter provided. Such regulations shall be made, so far as they may relate to the Warden and Fellows, by the Warden and Fellows; and so far as they may relate to Scholars, by the Warden alone.

35. No member of the College who may be charged with any offence, shall, by reason of any provision in the existing Statutes, be prohibited or restrained from calling for a copy of the charges made against him, or for the name or names of the person or persons making such charges.

36. If in any case it shall appear to the Visitor that, by reason of any change in the value of money, any specific sum fixed by this Ordinance, or which may be hereafter fixed in exercise of any power given by this Ordinance, has become insufficient or excessive, and that such insufficiency or excess is productive of injustice or hardship, or is injurious to the general interests of the College, it shall be lawful for the Visitor, from time to time, for the purpose of correcting or obviating such injustice, hardship, or injury, to direct that such annual sum shall be increased or diminished as he shall think fit, and the increased or diminished sum shall thenceforth be substituted for and stand in the place of the sum originally fixed as aforesaid.

37. It shall be lawful for the Visitor in person, or by his Commissaries or Commissaries duly appointed, once in every ten years (or oftener, if and whenever he shall deem it expedient for enforcing the due observance of the Statutes in force for the time being to do so), without any request or application by the College or any of its members, to visit the College, and to exercise at such visitation all the powers which are by law incident to the office of General Visitor of a College, any Statute or usage of the College to the contrary notwithstanding. It shall be lawful for the Visitor at any such visitation, or, if he shall think fit at other times, to require the Warden and Fellows to answer in writing touching any matter as to which the Visitor may deem it expedient to inquire, for the purpose of satisfying himself whether the Statutes in force for the time being are duly observed.

38. As often as any question shall arise on which the Warden and Fellows shall be unable to agree, depending wholly or in part on the construction of any of the Statutes of the College, it shall be lawful for the Warden and Fellows, or for the Warden or any three of the Fellows, to submit the same to the Visitor; and it shall be lawful for the Visitor to declare what is the true construction of such Statute or Statutes with reference to the case submitted to him.

39. It shall be lawful for the Warden, or for any Fellow, if he shall conceive himself aggrieved by any act or decision of the Warden and Fellows, and for any Scholar who shall have been deprived of his Scholarship, to appeal against such act or decision or sentence to the Visitor; and it shall be lawful for the Visitor to adjudicate on such appeal, and to disallow and annul such act or decision, and to reverse or vary such sentence, as he shall deem just.

40. It shall be lawful for the Visitor, either *propria motu*, or on the complaint of the Warden or of any of the Fellows, to disallow and annul

any Byelaw or resolution of the Warden and Fellows which shall in the Visitor's judgement be repugnant to any of the Statutes of the College in force for the time being.

41. The Warden and Fellows, by a majority consisting of not less than two-thirds of the votes of those present at a meeting convened by the Warden for that purpose, may from time to time, subject to the provisions of the section, numbered XL, in the Queen's Printers' copy of the said Act, amend the Statutes of the College in force for the time being, with the consent of the Visitor.

42. This Ordinance shall be without prejudice to any existing interest (being such an interest as is intended to be saved by the said Act) of any member of the College, and shall be construed to speak and take effect as if framed immediately before the approval thereof by Her Majesty in Council.

ORDINANCE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

ORDINANCE for the appropriation of a portion of the Revenues of New College in aid of the Professoriate of the University, and respecting certain Exhibitions within the College.

We, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the 17th and 18th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Oxford, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint Mary, Winchester," ordain as follows, in relation to the College of Saint Mary of Winchester, in the said University, otherwise and hereinafter called New College.

As soon as the number of Fellowships, and that of Scholarships, within the College shall have been respectively made up to thirty, pursuant to the provisions in that behalf of an Ordinance made by us in relation to the said College, and dated the 19th day of March, 1857, an annual sum shall, from the 25th of March or the 29th of September then next ensuing (whichever of those

days shall first happen), become payable, and shall always thereafter be paid out of the corporate revenues of the College to each of the two Savilian Professors within the University for the time being. The said annual payment to each Professor shall be one hundred and fifty pounds for the first five years after the same shall become payable, and three hundred pounds after the expiration of such five years. This direction and the charge hereby imposed on the revenues of the College shall take precedence of the direction contained in the aforesaid Ordinance, that the number of Fellowships shall be further increased to forty. If any Professor shall, after the said charge shall have come into operation, fail to reside within the University for six calendar months, between the tenth day of October in any year and the first day of the next ensuing July, he shall forfeit one year's payment of the annual sum appropriated to him, unless previous leave of absence, or a subsequent dispensation in respect of the default, shall have been granted to him, on account of sickness or any other very urgent cause, by or by authority of the University; and the payment so forfeited shall sink into the divisible revenues of the College.

In appointments to the Exhibition of the foundation of Nicholas Aspinall, Clerk, no person shall be ineligible or entitled to preference by reason of his place of birth.

It shall be lawful for the Warden and Fellows to dispose in every year of the emoluments specified in the Schedule hereto, in such manner as they shall deem best for promoting study and improvement among the undergraduate members of the College, or to bestow the same, or any of them, on such undergraduate members of the College as they may deem to stand in need of support at the University.

ORDINANCE above referred to.

ORDINANCE made by the Master and Fellows of BALLIOL COLLEGE, OXFORD, for the amendment of an Ordinance made by the Oxford University Commissioners, and approved by Her Majesty in Council, dated the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

Whereas the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act, passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Oxford, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of Saint Mary, Winchester," framed and settled an Ordinance, dated the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, for the consolidation of Scholarships within Balliol College, in the said University, and for other purposes, and such Ordinance, after being submitted to the College in manner directed by the said Act, was duly approved by Her Majesty in Council on the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And whereas the said Ordinance after directing (amongst other things) that certain Scholarships and Exhibitions within the College should be consolidated into eight Scholarships in manner therein mentioned, contains the following clause or portion of a clause:—

"The holders of the eight Scholarships to be established pursuant to this Ordinance and the two scholars on Dr. Bell's foundation, shall be entitled, in addition to their respective stipends or emoluments, to receive tuition free from all charges, and shall be elected on the same days, by the same persons, and in the same manner, and shall be liable to deprivation by the same authority, for the same causes, and in the same manner as the Scholars of the original foundation are now elected and liable, and shall be subject to such regulations as to their instruction, discipline and attendance on divine worship as the Master and Fellows may from time to time prescribe."

And whereas by an Act, passed in the 19th and 20th years of the reign of Her said Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her Majesty concerning the University of Oxford, and the College of Saint Mary, Winchester," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for any College of or in relation to which any regulation, ordinance, or statute shall have been approved by Her Majesty in Council under section thirty-six of the first hereinbefore mentioned Act, from time to time, with the approval of the Commissioners and during the continuance of their powers under the said Act, to amend or alter such regulations, ordinance, or statute, subject to the same conditions and provisions as are imposed by the Act, in relation to the making of the original regulation, ordinance, or statute.

And whereas it is expedient that the said ordinance of the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, should be amended as hereinafter mentioned.

We, the Master and Fellows (otherwise styled the Master and Scholars) of Balliol College aforesaid, do ordain as follows:

The said Ordinance of the ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall henceforth be read as if in lieu of the clause or part of a clause hereinbefore set forth there had been inserted therein the clause or part of a clause following:

"The holders of the eight Scholarships to be established, pursuant to this Ordinance, and the two Scholars on Dr. Bell's foundation, shall be entitled, in addition to their respective stipends or emoluments, to receive tuition free from all charges, and shall be elected on the same days, by the same persons, and in the same manner as the Scholars of the original foundation are now elected, and shall be subject to such regulations as to their instruction, discipline, and attendance on divine worship as the Master and Fellows may, from time to time, prescribe. The Master and Fellows may deprive any Scholar of his Scholarship for any misconduct which shall in their judgment deserve deprivation, but any Scholar so deprived shall have liberty to appeal to the Visitor, who may reverse or vary the sentence of deprivation as he shall deem just."

NOTICE TO SHIPOWNERS AND MASTERS.

REGULATIONS of the Turkish Authorities for Merchant Vessels passing through the Dardanelles.

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, enclosing a copy of the Regulations of the Turkish Government now in force for vessels passing through the Dardanelles, of which the following is a translation:—

(Copy.) (Translation.)

REGULATIONS drawn up for the protection of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus, as agreed upon by the Sublime Porte.

Merchant ships in general belonging to foreign nations or to subjects of the Ottoman Empire, have been from former times prohibited from passing through the above straits after sunset, and also, with regard to steamers engaged in commerce, it has been officially notified to foreign missions that these are not to enter or leave the straits after sunset, but regulate the periods of their course accordingly; and this arrangement has been accepted and confirmed by the above missions. Accordingly, upon any merchant vessel, whether steam or otherwise, persisting in trying to pass the straits after sunset, the prohibition will first be stated and made known, and, if not attended to, a blank gun will be fired three times, and, should the vessel still persist in her course, however much the principle of exclusion from the straits applies to men-of-war, it is equally applicable at night time to merchant ships, seeing that by night it is impossible to distinguish between the two classes, consequently such vessel will be subject to the treatment above specified with regard to men-of-war. She will be

fired at with shotted guns, and prevented from entering under any circumstances.

As above stated, vessels are prevented by treaty from passing the Bosphorus and Dardanelles after sunset; the former strait, however, is not in the same category as the latter, and when a vessel is overtaken by heavy weather she cannot lie to or find a safe harbour there, before she gets to Buyuk Liman. On the appearance of a vessel off the Black Sea mouth of the Bosphorus, by night, she is signalled to from the two lighthouses by burning blue lights and powder, in order to stop her; if she holds on her course, she is signalled to stop in like manner from the batteries of Til Bumu and Buyuk Liman, and if she still persists, shotted guns are fired to stop her. Vessels putting in under stress of weather are allowed to proceed as far as Buyuk Liman, where they are detained, and the (necessity of the) circumstance investigated by day light, when they are allowed to continue their course. The above is the current practice and usual proceeding, and attention will be paid to the continuance of its operation for the future being confined to the Bosphorus, at the same time that the strictest regard is paid to the important circumstance of the prohibition (in general).

Although the principle of closing the straits was recently suspended on account of the late war, yet as that event is now terminated and exchanged for peace and harmony, and as communications have taken place with the Porte upon the subject of carrying the ancient principle into execution, calculating from the 30th of March last, the straits are now closed for the future, the exclusion having commenced on that day.

Light Ship at the Entrance of the Mutlah.

No. 2.—Painted White. At the eastern entrance to the Subtermookey channel, 400 yards to the northward of the point that forms from Bulcherry island, and 200 yards from high-water mark. It is in the midst of thick low jungle.

No. 3.—Painted Black. At the eastern entrance to the Jumera channel, 400 yards to the north of the point that forms from the entrance of the Subtermookey channel, and 200 yards from high-water mark.

No. 4.—Painted White. On the south-east part of Dalhousie island, at the eastern entrance of the Mutlah river, on a sandy patch, about five feet above high-water mark, and about 100 feet in shore, distinguishable by a White Flag from a long spar and bamboo, which have been put up close alongside of the House, visible above the surrounding trees.

No. 5.—Painted White. On Bangadoonee island, about seven miles eastward of No. 4. It stands on the south-eastern part of the island, above a small sandy beach, about 100 feet from high-water mark. A long spar and bamboo, with a Flag, have been put up alongside, and may be seen considerably above the trees.

In each House, there is a supply of water and biscuit, a Catamaran and paddles, a letter of instructions, and a Chart of the Sunderbunds.

Persons cast away reaching land to the east of Saugor, should make search for the Houses of Refuge; and it should be borne in mind, that when a vessel is lost with a pilot on board, the fact would soon become known at the Pilot Station and in Calcutta. Parties, therefore, finding their way to the houses should remain there, and husband the means of subsistence, in the assurance that succour will speedily reach them; or if compelled to leave, endeavour to get westward to Saugor island, and travel along the beach until they arrive at the lighthouse; or make their way to a large fishing village, situated on the south-east side of Saugor island, using the Catamaran as far as practicable.

The only lights now in the Bay are two small red fixed lights, one on each side of the entrance of the Darsena, or inner harbour.

Change of Light at Messina, Sicily.

The Sicilian Government has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of July, 1857, a fixed white light, varied by a red flash every two minutes, will be substituted for the former light on the tower of San Ranieri, Messina.

Day-Marks along the Florida Reefs.

The Superintendent of the United States Coast Survey has given notice, that the following Day-marks have been erected along the Florida Reefs, from Sand Cay Lighthouse north-eastward to Cape Florida.

These Beacons occupy the positions of the signals used in the survey of these reefs, and consist of an iron shaft 36 feet high, erected upon an iron screw foundation, distinguished by a vane marked by a letter, and above it a lattice-work hoop-iron cylinder or barrel. They are painted Black, White, and Red, and so combined that no two adjacent beacons have the same colours upon like parts.

Masters of vessels may ascertain their latitude and longitude with tolerable certainty by examining closely the colours of the beacons as they are approached, and if the letter painted on the vane is distinguished, there can be no mistake in determining their positions.

These Day-marks are placed on the most projecting and dangerous points of the Florida Reef; and are in general from four to six miles from the outside (seaward) shores of the Florida Cays, and within half a mile, in every case, of the edge of the Gulf Stream.

The depth of water where these signals stand does not exceed four feet at low tide in any case; and just outside of them to the eastward, in the Gulf Stream, it is of unknown depths.

These Day-marks may be approached from seaward within a few hundred yards; but it would always be prudent, and particularly with very light winds, or in bad weather, to give them a good berth.

In moderate weather it often happens, especially after easterly gales, that the force and direction of the Gulf Stream sets across the reefs, and then vessels are imperceptibly carried amid its dangers, although the course steered should, if made good, carry them outside of all danger.

When the master of a vessel finds one of these beacons to the eastward of him, he may be sure that he is between the reefs and Cays, and consequently surrounded by shoals and dangerous rocks:

If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given to the said Prisoner, in writing, which may be left at the Gaol two clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of giving such notice and of the said day of hearing.

2. The petition and schedule will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination at the Office of the Court in London, between the hours of Eleven and Three, on this notice being exhibited; and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act of 1st and 2nd Victoria, cap. 110, sec. 105.

3.
