WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of an Act of the second and third years of Her present Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of an Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Harlow, in the parish of Harlow, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Harlow aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Rochester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Harlow described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John, Harlow,' and with the like consent of the said George, Bishop of Rochester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient, that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms,

churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference

"The District Chapelry of Saint John Harlow, comprises all that part of the parish of Harlow, in the county of Essex, and diocese of Rochester, which is situated on the western and northern sides of an imaginary line commencing at a point marked A, on the map or plan hereunto annexed, in the middle of the turnpike road leading from London to Sawbridgeworth, where such road crosses the northern boundary of the said parish of Harlow, and extending thence in a south-easterly and westerly direction along the middle of the old London road to a point opposite to the middle of a footpath leading from the said road near the parish engine house to Harlow common, and thence extending southward along the middle of such footpath as far as the middle of the occupation road leading from Arkwright's gravel pit to the London road, and thence extending westward along the middle of the said occupation road as far as the middle of the London road aforesaid, and thence westward in a straight line as far as the point marked B on the boundary between the said parish of Harlow and the parish of Latton, in the said county and diocese, such point being situate at a distance of one hundred and eighty yards from the south-western corner of a field numbered 542 on the tithe map of the said parish of Harlow."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate in the parish of Harlow, in the county of Essex, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint John, Harlow," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns

and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that the whole of the lands and tenements, tithes, or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, and other hereditaments, and all profits and emoluments of what kind soever and wheresoever, which lately belonged to or were held and enjoyed with the deanery of the collegiate church of Middleham, in the county of York and diocese of Ripon, to which we are entitled under the provisions of the fifty-first section of the said Act, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Middleham, and his successors incumbents of the same parish.

"And we further recommend and propose that the lands and premises, tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes and other hereditaments, particularly described in the first and six following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us for the purposes of the said Act, and all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner and by the same authority be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: that the land described in the first schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or perpetual curate for the time being of the new parish of Ocker Hill, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, and his successors, incumbents of the same new parish; that the land described in the second schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or perpetual curate for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Revelstoke, in the county of Devon and diocese of Exeter, and his successors, incumbents of the same perpetual curacy; that the land described in the third schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or perpetual curate for the time being of the new

parish of Saint Paul, Derby, in the county of Derby and diocese of Lichfield, and his successors, incumbents of the same new parish; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llanfawr, in the county of Merioneth, and diocese of Saint Asaph, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or vicar for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Llanfawr, and his successors, incumbents of the same vicarage; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the last-named parish, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or perpetual curate for the time being of the district chapelry of Rhos-y-Gwalia, in the last-mentioned county and diocese, and his successors, incumbents of the same district chapelry; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, described in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Billingham, in the county and diocese of Durham, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent or vicar for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Billingham, and his successors, incumbents of the same vicarage; and that the tithes or rentcharge in lieu of tithes, described in the seventh schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llanfihangel, in the county of Montgomery and diocese of Saint Asaph, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the consolidated chapelry of Pont Robert, in the last-mentioned county and diocese, and his successors, incumbents of the same consolidated chapelry.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Act mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the eighth schedule hereunto annexed, and to their successors, incumbents of the same benefices or churches respectively, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit, when there shall be sufficient means for that purpose; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"FIRST SCHEDULE.

"All that piece or parcel of land, situate at Ocker Hill, in the parish of Tipton, in the county of Stafford, containing half an acre or thereabouts, and lately forming part of the estates of the prebend of Prees otherwise Pipe Minor, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, which by a deed, dated

the fourteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, was surrendered by the Reverend Henry Dudley Ryder, Clerk, Master of Arts, fourth canon residentiary of the said cathedral church of Lichfield, and as such, prebendary of the said prebend of Prees otherwise

Pipe Minor, to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with a view to its annexation to the new parish and church of St. Mark, at Ocker Hill aforesaid, as a site for a parsonage house for the incumbent or perpetual curate of the said new parish.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, and of the Act of sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections nine and twenty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections nine and twenty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Barthomley, in the county and diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the portion of the said parish of Barthomley comprised within the township of Crewe, and hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas, by a deed dated the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and made, or expressed to be made, between the Right Honourable Hungerford Lord Crewe, Baron Crewe of Crewe, in the said county of Chester, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners of England, of the other part, which deed is deposited in the Diocesan Registry at Chester, a messuage and premises and certain lands and hereditaments situate in the said township of Crewe, in the said parish of Barthomley, and particularly described in the said deed, and also the tithe rent-charge, or portion of tithe rent-charge of one hundred and ten pounds (variable according to the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed for the commutation of tithes in England), for which the great or rectorial tithes arising within the township of Crewe aforesaid have been commuted, under the powers of the last-named Acts, together with all other, if any, the great or rectorial tithes or rent-charges in lieu thereof, or other commutations for tithes arising within the said last-mentioned township, have been assigned and conveyed to us, in fee simple in possession, upon the understanding that the same shall be applied in manner following; that is to say: that the said tithes or tithe rent-charges shall be appropriated towards the permanent endowment of the minister of the district herein recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall, according to the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, have become a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the perpetual curate thereof; and that such portion of a parcel of the said lands, which is numbered 8 on the plan drawn on the said deed, as may be required for the purpose, shall be appropriated as a site for a church and burial ground for the said district or new parish, and for the use and benefit of the minister or perpetual curate and inhabitants thereof; and that the said messuage and premises, together with the residue of the said lands and

hereditaments, shall be appropriated as a parsonage and glebe for the said minister or perpetual curate.

"And whereas by the same deed a clear annual sum of sixty pounds has also been granted and secured to us by the said Hungerford Lord Crewe, in the form of a rent-charge issuing out of and charged upon certain freehold lands and premises belonging to the said Baron, situate within the township of Crewe aforesaid, and made payable by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in each and every year, upon the understanding that the same shall be applied towards the further permanent endowment of the minister or perpetual curate for the time being of the said district or new parish.

"And whereas the said Hungerford Lord Crewe hath also signified his intention to erect a church upon the said land marked with the number 8 on the plan drawn on the said deed, by which the same land has been assigned and conveyed to us as aforesaid, and to offer such church for approval by us, and for consecration as the church of the said district or new parish, and for the use and service of the minister or perpetual curate and of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the benefactions aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of, and nomination of the minister or perpetual curate to, the said district or new parish should be assigned in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Chester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Barthomley which is comprised within the boundaries and limits of the township of Crewe, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan herunto annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Crewe.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the minister of the district so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, the perpetual curate thereof shall be permanently endowed in manner following; that is to say: that the clear annual sum or yearly rent-charge of sixty pounds so made payable to us by the herein-recited indenture, and all our estate, right, title, and interest in and to the same and every part thereof, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, become and be transferred from us and shall be vested in the said minister or perpetual curate, and that he and his successors, ministers or perpetual curates of the said district or new parish, when duly licensed as aforesaid, shall become and be seised and possessed thereof, and be entitled to receive the same for his and their own use and benefit, in as full and ample a manner as we, the said Commissioners, or our successors, now are or would have been.

"And we also recommend and propose, that such minister or perpetual curate shall be further permanently endowed with the tithes, tithe rent-charges, or portions of tithe rent-charge, and with the messuage and premises, lands and hereditaments, so respectively assigned and conveyed to

us by the hereinbefore-recited indenture, except so much of the parcel of the said land numbered 8 on the plan drawn on the said deed as shall be appropriated as a site for a church and burial-ground for the said district or new parish, and for the use and benefit of the minister or perpetual curate and of the inhabitants thereof, and that such tithes, tithe rent-charges, or portions of tithe rent-charge, messuage, and premises, lands and hereditaments, except as aforesaid, and all our estate, right, title, and interest in and to the same and every part thereof, shall in like manner and by the same authority be transferred from us, and shall become and be absolutely vested in such minister or perpetual curate so soon as he shall be duly appointed and licensed as aforesaid, and in his successors, ministers or perpetual curates of the said district or new parish.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish herein recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Hungerford Lord Crewe, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, been given to the incumbent and to the patron of the church of the said parish of Barthomley respectively, and no objections have been made thereto :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for compensating certain spiritual persons whose emoluments have been diminished by reason of proceedings under the said Act.

"Whereas by certain duly gazetted Orders of your Majesty in Council for confirming certain schemes prepared by us, pursuant to the said Act, certain new parishes have been duly constituted, and the perpetual curates thereof respectively have become entitled to receive certain fees, dues, and other emoluments arising therein, and we deem it just and reasonable that compensation should be made to the incumbents of the churches or chapels hereinafter mentioned, whose fees, dues, or other emoluments have been diminished by or in consequence of such proceedings, and that the annual sums hereinafter mentioned should be secured to such incumbents:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that in respect of the new parishes mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereunto annexed, there shall be paid by us, to the several incumbents named and described in the second column of the same schedule, so long as they shall respectively remain such incumbents, and no longer, the annual sums mentioned in the third column thereof, by way of such compensation as aforesaid, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and duly published in the London Gazette on the seventh day of March following, the said district was duly assigned out of the parish of Almondbury, in the said county and diocese.

Harrogate described in the Schedule hereunto annexed (all which part is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, and is thereon comprised within and bounded by a red line), shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Bilton.'

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of an Act of the second and third years of Her present Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of an Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twentieth day of August,

in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, situate at Little Common, in the parish of Bexhill, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mark, situate at Little Common aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Bexhill, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District chapelry of Saint Mark, Bexhill.'

"And with the like consent of the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"The district of Saint Mark, Bexhill, being all that part of the parish of Bexhill, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, lying to the west of an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary between the said parish and the parish of Ninfield, in the middle of the high road leading from Bexhill to Ninfield, at or near a place called Lunsford's Cross, and opposite to the middle of the road or lane leading from such high road through the high woods, and thence extending southward along the middle of the last-named road or lane to a point opposite to the middle of the road or lane called Turkey-lane, and thence extending eastward along the middle of the last-named road or lane to a point opposite to the middle of the road or lane called Clinch's Green-lane, and thence extending southward and eastward along the middle of the last-named road or lane, and of the roads or lanes called respectively Broad Oak-lane and Collington-lane (crossing the high road from Bexhill to Pevensey) and along the middle of a path or roadway leading from the last-mentioned lane to the inclosure numbered 1565 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Bexhill, and upon the map hereunto annexed, and thence extending westward along

the middle of the fence which divides the last-named inclosure from the said path or roadway, and southward along the middle of the fences which divide the same inclosure and the inclosures numbered respectively 1564, 1066, 1559, 1558, 1555, and 706, on the said maps, from the inclosures numbered respectively 1065, 1067, 1578, 1557, 1556, and 666, on the same maps, and thence in a straight line, due south, to the seashore."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, at Little Common, in the parish of Bexhill, in the county of Sussex, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Bexhill," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

And that the single rate of postage for the transmission thereof respectively should be that which was mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively in the said Schedules A and B. And that all such respective packets so transmitted should be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage thereinafter mentioned.

And whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of the said recited Warrant (except as hereinafter mentioned) to packets of a like kind to be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the colony of Ascension, and also between Hong Kong and the other colonies hereinafter mentioned.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows:

1. All packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or the colonial legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the colony of Ascension, and all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or the colonial legislatures, may be transmitted by the post between Hong Kong and the East Indies, Ceylon, the Mauritius, or Australia (without passing through the United Kingdom); and on every such packet so transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant as aforesaid, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage of three pence; and on every such packet exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken and paid such progressive and additional rates of postage as are directed to be charged, taken and paid on and in respect of the several packets mentioned and contained in, and authorized to be transmitted by the post under the provisions of the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857.

2. All packets to be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this present Warrant, shall be so transmitted respectively in conformity with and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions respectively mentioned and contained in the said recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, with respect to the several packets therein mentioned (except such as relate exclusively to packets posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales addressed to the United Kingdom), that is to say: All such respective packets, so to be transmitted under the provisions of this present Warrant, between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the colony of Ascension, shall be subject as well to the several progressive and additional rates of postage aforesaid as also to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions (except as aforesaid) respectively mentioned, expressed, and contained in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, so far as the same respectively are applicable to packets transmitted between any part of the United Kingdom and the several places mentioned in the said Schedule A to the said recited Warrant annexed; and all such respective packets, so to be transmitted under the provisions of this present Warrant, between Hong Kong and the East Indies, Ceylon, the Mauritius, or Australia (without passing through the United Kingdom), shall be subject as well to the several progressive and additional rates of postage aforesaid as also to the several regulations, orders, directions, and

conditions (except as aforesaid) respectively mentioned, expressed, and contained in and by the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, so far as the same respectively are applicable to packets transmitted between the several colonies and places mentioned in the said Schedule B to the said recited Warrant annexed, in like manner in all respects, and as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as if the said several progressive and additional rates of postage, and the said several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions (except such only as relate exclusively to packets posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales, or posted in the East Indies or New South Wales addressed to the United Kingdom) respectively mentioned and contained in the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July 1857, were contained, inserted, expressed, and repeated in this present Warrant, and as if the said colony of Ascension, with a single rate of postage of three pence set forth against such colony, had been and was mentioned and contained and included in the said Schedule A annexed to the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857, and as if the words "between Hong Kong and the East Indies, Ceylon, the Mauritius, or Australia, without passing through the United Kingdom," with a single rate of postage of three pence set forth against such last-mentioned words had been and were mentioned and contained and included in the said Schedule B annexed to the said hereinbefore recited Warrant of the 21st day of July, 1857.

3. The terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as the like terms and expressions used in the said recited Warrant, bearing date the 21st day of July, 1857.

4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant order and direct, that so much of the said recited Warrant, bearing date the 11th day of October, 1843, as imposes the said uniform colonial rate of two pence on all letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post (whether by packet boat or private ship) between any place in the United Kingdom, and any place in British North America, or the British West Indies, wherever situated, in addition to the rates of British postage payable on such letters and any progressive and additional colonial rates payable under or by virtue of such Warrant on all letters so transmitted, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, shall be and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and that the said uniform colonial rate of two pence and any progressive and additional colonial rates mentioned and imposed in and by the said recited Warrant of the 11th day of October, 1843, on the letters in this clause mentioned and the several orders, regulations, and directions relating to the same shall wholly cease and determine. Nevertheless nothing herein contained shall affect any foreign postage imposed or payable upon such letters in and by the said recited Warrant of the 11th day of October, 1843.

6. And we do further order and direct that this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October next.

Arran Islands' Lights.

THE Port of Dublin Corporation hereby give notice that two new lighthouses have been erected on the Arran Islands, off the west coast of the county of Galway, from which lights will be exhibited during the night of the 1st of December, 1857, and thenceforth will be lighted every night from sunset to sunrise.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the Lights, by Mr. Halpin, Superintendent of Lighthouses.

Arran Islands North Lighthouse is built on Rock Island, the outermost of the chain, in lat. $53^{\circ} 8' 55''$ N. and Long. $9^{\circ} 51' 30''$ west of Greenwich, bearing from Slyne Head South Light, S. b E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., distant $20\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles; from Skird Rocks, S. b E., distant $8\frac{3}{4}$ miles; from Loophead, N.E. b N., distant 36 miles.

This light will be a revolving light, of the natural appearance, giving a bright flash once in every three minutes, and will be visible from seaward between the bearings of W.N.W., round by the westward to N.W. by N. The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric of the first order, its focal point 115 feet over the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather the light should be visible at a distance of 16 miles.

The tower is circular, of gray stone colour, 101 feet in height from base to summit; the top below the lantern sash will be painted red, also two horizontal belts will be coloured red, on the tower.

Arran Islands South Lighthouse is erected on the south-western point of Inisheer, the most southern of the islands, in lat. $53^{\circ} 2' 40''$ N., and long. $9^{\circ} 31' 30''$ W., it bears from Blackhead, W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distant $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles; from Finnis Rock, (off S.E. point of Inisheer) W. b N $\frac{1}{4}$ N., distant $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles; from Loophead, N.E. b E. distant 33 miles.

This light will be a fixed light, visible from seaward between the bearings of S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., round by the southward to W. b S., and having its focal plane 110 feet over the mean level of the sea, should be seen in clear weather within a distance of 15 miles. The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric of the first order. A strip or sector of red light will be shown in the direction of the Finnis Rock—in all other directions the light will be of the natural appearance.

The tower is circular, of gray stone colour below the projecting gallery, and is 112 feet in height from its base to the top of the dome.

From and after the date of exhibition of the new lights, the old light heretofore on the summit of Inishmore, or the Great Island, will be discontinued, and the lantern and top of the old lighthouse tower will be removed.

The duplicates of the petitions and schedules, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the Clerks or Assistant Clerks of the said County Courts, for inspection and examination, at the Offices of the said County Courts respectively, at the Towns aforesaid, and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided according to sec. 106 of the Act.
