PROCEEDINGS OF NAVAL BRIGADE.

SIR,
ON the 20th ultimo Lieutenant Vaughan joined me at Allahabad, with a reinforcement of 126 officers and men, which raised the total strength of the "Shannon's" Brigade at Allahabad to 516. This reinforcement was composed for the most part of merchant seamen raised at Calcutta, and the fine appearance of the men, their good behaviour, and excellent discipline displayed the ability and zeal of Lieutenant James W. Vaughan. I beg to recommend this excellent officer to your favourable notice. I think, also, that it showed the fine spirit of the Merchant Service, as these men entered on board the Shannon without any conditions, and against £6 per month wages offered by the shipping.

On the 23d ultimo, in obedience to a telegram from the Chief of the Staff, I sent a party of 150 seamen, consisting of Lieutenant Novell Salmon's Company of small arm men, and a field piece party, the whole under the command of Lieutenant Vaughan, to proceed with four siege train 24-pounders to Cawnpore. That party is now with the column before Lucknow.

On the 27th ultimo, a further detachment of 170 men, under the command of Lieutenant Thos. J. Young, the gunnery officer of the "Shannon," consisting of Lieutenant Edward Hay's company of small arm men, a field piece party, and the Marines

under Captain Thos. C. Gray, with a siege train of four 24-pounders and two 8-inch howitzers, and a large amount of ammunition, under convoy of troops, was sent on the same service; and on the following day, by order of the Commander-in-chief, I was sent to accompany it. Lieutenant-Colonel Powell, with the head-quarters of the 53rd regiment, soon afterwards joined us on the march; and the battle that ensued at Kudjwa, the defeat of the enemy and the death of the gallant Colonel Powell, are reported in the accompanying copy of my despatch to the Chief of the Staff. I have since been informed that the Commander of the rebel army was also among the slain.

Since that battle was fought, with the exception of one day's rest for the footsore men, who had marched 72 miles in three days, besides fighting a severe engagement, we have made daily marches, and are now on our way to join the column before Lucknow.

At Cawnpore I was obliged to leave Lieutenant Hay with 50 men, to serve as artillerymen for that important position.

The remainder of my brigade, consisting of nearly 240 officers and men, are at Allahabad under the command of Lieutenant Wm. C. F. Wilson, assisted by Lieutenants Hy. R. Wratislaw, and Lind ap Hazeley (Swedish Navy). They are doing duty at the garrison.

I am much gratified with the conduct of all the Brigade, and there is no departure whatever from the ordinary rules and custom of the service.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the details of the battle of Kudjwa, with the circumstances that preceded it.

Detachments amounting to 700 men under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Powell of Her Majesty's 53rd Regiment, in charge of siege-train guns, and a large convoy, were proceeding from Allahabad to Cawnpore, and had arrived on 31st ult., after a march of 12 miles, at the camping ground of Thurrea. The same afternoon intelligence was received from Futtehpore that the Sepoy mutineers of the Dinapore Regiments, with three guns, had passed the Jumna with the intention of either attacking Futtehpore, or crossing over into Oude. The camp was immediately struck, and we arrived at the camping ground of Futtehpore at midnight.

Colonel Powell then made arrangements for marching at daylight upon the enemy who were reported to be about 24 miles distant at Kudjwa, beyond the village of Binkee. The column of attack consisted of 162 men of Her Majesty's 53rd Regiment, under Major Clark, 68 of Royal Engineers under Captain Clarke, 70 of a depot detachment under Lieutenant Fanning of Her Majesty's 64th Regiment, and 103 of the Naval Brigade under Captain Peel. It marched at daylight, and was joined from the garrison of Futtehpore by a company of 93rd Highlanders, 100 in number, under Captain Cornwall, and two 9-pounder guns under Lieutenant Anderson, Bengal Artillery.

After marching for 16 miles, the column halted for refreshment, and then resumed the march at a

rapid pace, passing through the village of Binkee at about 1-30 P.M., where the intelligence was confirmed that the enemy was at hand.

The troops pressed on without interruption; the Highlanders advancing in skirmishing order, supported by the Royal Engineers, and followed by the 53rd Regiment in column, and then by the Naval Brigade; the depot detachment was with the baggage. We advanced along the road which led straight for the village of Kudjwa, and saw that the enemy's right occupied a long line of high embankment on our left of the road, which embankment, screened by a grove, continued towards the village, and that their left was higher up on the other side, with their guns posted in the centre on the road, two of them in advance, and one on a bridge near the village.

A round shot, coming down the road, opened the battle at about 2-20 P.M., and the column was ordered to edge to the right, and advance on the guns through the corn-fields—the skirmishers of the 93rd and the Royal Engineers pushing up on both sides of the road. The enemy's artillery was well served, and did great execution, and the flank fire of musketry was very severe. The gallant Colonel Powell himself, on the left of the road, pressed on the attack, and had just secured two guns of the enemy, when he fell dead with a bullet through his forehead.

In the meantime the Naval Brigade had advanced on the right of the 53rd, and carried the enemy's position in their front. It was then that the death of Colonel Powell was reported to me, and I was requested to assume the command. The great force of the enemy, the long line of their defences, and the exhaustion of both officers and men after such long marches, rendered our position truly critical. The front of the battle had become changed to the line of the road, and the enemy with all their force behind their embankments, threatened to intercept our rear. I left Lieutenant Hay, R.N., supported by the two 9-pounder guns, to hold the position which his party had gallantly carried, and which secured our flank; and collecting as many fresh troops as were available, assisted principally by Lieutenant Lennox, R.E. (Captain Clarke being unfortunately severely wounded), and by Ensign Truell of the 53rd, we rushed across the road, and passing round the upper end of the embankments, divided the enemy's force, and drove them successively from all their positions. The enemy then retired in confusion, leaving us masters of their camp, and with two of their guns and a tumbril in our possession.

The late hour of the evening (it was half-past four when the enemy fired their last shot,) and the excessive fatigue of the troops prevented any pursuit. We therefore spoiled their camp, and leaving it with cheers, formed on the road by the bridge near the village, and sent out parties to collect our dead and wounded.

With the body of the Colonel on the limber of the gun he had so gallantly captured, we then returned, and encamped near the village of Binkee.

Our loss in the action was very severe, amounting to 95 killed and wounded.

The behaviour of the troops and of the Naval Brigade was admirable, and all vied with each other, and showed equal courage in the field. The marching of the 53rd, and the accurate firing of the Highlanders deserved special recommendation.

I received the greatest assistance from Captain Cox, Her Majesty's 75th Regt., whom I would wish to bring to the favourable notice of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, and the arrangements of the Field Hospital under Dr. Grant, Her Majesty's

53rd, and those of the Quartermaster's department under Captain Marshall, were everything I could wish.

The total number of the enemy was reported to be about 4000 men, 2000 of whom were Sepoys, who fought in their uniform. Their loss was estimated at above 300 killed.

I have the pleasure to inform his Excellency that the remaining gun of the enemy, with three tumbrils, were brought in this evening by the police, having been abandoned by the rebels in their flight about 8 miles beyond Kudjwa, and that the Sepoys have dispersed in all directions pursued by the villagers.

India Board, January 4, 1858.

THE following despatches have been received from India.

No. 1.

Captain Boileau to Lieutenant-Colonel Gordon.

SIR, Azimghur, September 20, 1857.

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Colonel Gordon, commanding the district, that, having been reinforced by the arrival of the Shere regiment of the Goorkha force from Jaunpore, at 6 P.M., yesterday, I determined to attack the largest body of insurgents in our neighbourhood at once.

2. At half-past one o'clock, A.M., I accordingly moved out against them, and reached their position at the village of Mundree, 10 miles from this, a little after sunrise.

3. I found them strongly posted, the village covering their centre, and extensive fields of sugar-cane (now at its greatest height) protecting both their flanks, with a grove of mangoe trees in rear.

4. They had received no notice of my approach, and I am told that many parties had quitted their camp in search of plunder; the number left amounting to not less than 1000 men with three (3) guns.

5. When within a quarter of a mile of their position, the Goorkhas broke into 5 columns, and advanced with great rapidity and spirit to the attack, rushing straight to the guns, receiving their fire, and capturing them in less than 10 minutes after the first shot was fired.

6. The insurgents retreated at once, and were pursued for nearly 3 miles, losing men at every step. They finally dispersed in the sugar cane. The country is covered with fields of this plant, and afforded an admirable shelter to the enemy, whose loss on this account was much less than it would otherwise have been. We were also unable to make use of our guns against them, as, owing to the rapidity of the advance, they were unable to keep with the troops.

7. I would estimate the loss of the rebels at from one hundred and fifty (150) to two hundred (200) killed; and many wounded must have crept into the sugar cane.

Our loss is two (2) killed and twenty six (26) wounded: I annex a return. Lieutenants Dunbar and Hay, and Assistant-Surgeon Wright, were present in the field, and Messrs. Wynyard, of the Civil Service, and Venables, Deputy-Magistrate, volunteere (r services, and accompanied the

troops throughout, the latter gentleman killing 3 of the enemy with his own hand.

SIR, Azimghur, September 21, 1857.
I HAVE the honor to forward, for your information, a memorandum of the casualties which occurred in the action yesterday.

The unusual number of severe cases is in consequence of the large proportion of gunshot wounds, 23 out of the 26 wounds having been from gunshot, and most of them from grape.

It is not unlikely that several slight wounds may be under the treatment of the Baidis attached to the force.

SIR, I have the honor to report that, on the morning of the 23rd instant, Captain Simpson, commanding at Neemuch, marched out with a force, strength as per margin,† to attack some rebels reported to be at a village, or walled town, called Jeerun, about ten miles distant from Neemuch. It had been ascer-

tained that these rebels had come from Mundisore, and had threatened to make an attack upon Neemuch.

Two advanced guards from the 2nd Cavalry, under Captain Tucker and Lieutenant Blair respectively, were sent on the previous night by different roads, the main column following at half-past five a.m.

The advanced guard, under Captain Tucker, fell in with a large party of the rebels near Jeerun, at daylight; and Captain Tucker, leaving a reserve under Lieutenant LeGeyt in a concealed situation, advanced with a few men towards the enemy, who it appears were about 100 in number, and charged right through them. In this charge, I regret to say that Captain Tucker lost his life; and Captain Lawrie 21st Regiment Native Infantry, who accompanied him, and who appears to have behaved nobly, was very severely wounded. It is due to Captain Lawrie to say that he endeavoured at the first to dissuade Captain Tucker from charging rashly with his small body of men into so large a force, but, seeing that Captain Tucker was determined to charge, he added his voluntary services to support Captain Tucker and give greater effect to the charge. Captain Lawrie was wounded severely in the breast with a lance, and was much cut about with the swords of the enemy. His horse was shot under him. One trooper was killed in this charge. The rebels appear to have retired to a position out of the reach of cavalry before Lieutenant LeGeyt, who had but a handful of men in reserve, could approach them. Captain Tucker's body was taken away by the enemy, but was afterwards recovered by the men of his own troop. His head, which was severed from the trunk, was never recovered. Our main body arrived in front of the walls of Jeerun at about half-past seven a.m. The enemy were assembled 200 yards in front of the walls on the brow of a hill, when our column first saw them. They remained till our 9-pounders moved forward and fired a few rounds; they then retired slowly, taking up a stronger position behind some huts. At about this time I was sent with a squadron to the other side of the town to cut off stragglers, and consequently did not see the action; but, on returning, after the action, I was informed that our infantry had, at first, failed to dislodge the enemy from their position; that, in their advance for this purpose, Captain Read commanding Her Majesty's 83rd detachment had been killed, and Captain Soppitt, commanding 12th detachment Native Infantry, had been dangerously wounded; that both Infantry detachments, seeing their commanders fall, made a momentary retreat; that the enemy, emboldened, rushed upon them and took one mortar and were nearly on the guns, when Captain Simpson, with Lieutenant Blair, Lieutenant LeGeyt and Riding-Master Steers, charged with a squadron upon the enemy, retook the mortar, and dispersed the rebels, who fled to the fort.

In this charge Captain Simpson was very severely wounded in the head, Lieutenant Blair was wounded severely with a sword, and Lieutenant LeGeyt slightly by a bullet.

The day was now fast coming to a close, and we heard some reports that another column of the enemy was advancing on Neemuch from another direction.

Captain Simpson being unable to perform his duty, the command devolved upon me.

I omitted to state, which is an important point, that a great part of the ammunition of the mortar was never recovered, but fell into the hands of the enemy. For this reason, as well as on account of the great natural strength of the place, which would have rendered it impossible, with the small force at my command, and no breaching guns, to take

the town, also on account of the fagged state of the men, the want of officers to command the detachments, and the necessity of returning to protect Neemuch, I ordered a retreat, which we effected before night closed in.

The enemy were not completely routed till the cavalry had charged several times.

Sir, Camp, Neemuch, October 25, 1857.

I HAVE the honor to forward Surgeon Pelly's return of the killed and wounded in the action before Jeerun, on the 23rd instant. It does not entirely agree with the list which I made out on the evening of the 23rd, and which was forwarded by express early in the morning of the 24th to Brigadier Macan; but, at that time, it was very difficult to obtain correct information, the surgeon being occupied in attending to the wounded.

Since the despatch of the communication to which I have alluded, the town of Jeerun has been evacuated by the rebels, and is now occupied by some troops sent there for that purpose by Captain Loyd, the political agent in whose district Jeerun lies.

I omitted to mention in my despatch that, in retiring from Jeerun, we halted and bivouacked within sight of the town, and only at about 1200 yards distance, in order to make the enemy believe that we intended a second advance. This very probably caused the enemy to evacuate the town during the night.

NEWS from Commander-in-Chief's Camp at Alum Bagh, 9 A.M., the 13th. After several skirmishes on the day, ending in capture of two guns, the fort of Jullabad was taken and blown up. The Commander-in-Chief communicated with Sir J. Outram by means of a semaphore, and will probably occupy the Dilkhosa to-day. The country people round Lucknow are hostile.

Cawnpore, 16th November, 11 A.M.

Captain Bruce, by order of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, to the Governor-General, at Calcutta.

THE Commander-in-Chief occupied the Dilkhosa and the Martinière, after a running fight

of two hours, yesterday, at noon. The enemy came forward to attack at 3 P.M. After a struggle of an hour, he was beaten back, repulsed heavily. An advanced picquet having cleared some villages across the canal, we took post there for the night. Our loss was very trifling—Lieutenant Mayne, Horse Artillery, Quartermaster General's Department, and Lieutenant Wheatcroft, Carabiniers, killed.

Major-General Mansfield to the Private Secretary to the Governor-General at Calcutta

Head Quarters, Secunder Bagh, Lucknow, November 18, 1857.

ON the 16th, the Commander-in-Chief advanced across the canal straight on Secunder Bagh, which was carried after a very severe struggle, the enemy suffering enormously. These positions having been occupied, the Sahmack was attacked with heavy artillery for three hours; it was carried at dusk, after one of the severest fights ever witnessed. Early on the 17th, communications were opened to the left rear of the barracks, towards the canal. A cannonade having been kept up all the morning on the Mess House, that very strong position was carried by assault at 3 P.M. The troops pushed rapidly on, after carrying the Mess House, and were able to seize the Mothee Mahal before dark. Sir James Outram and Sir Henry Havelock then came out to meet the Commander-in-Chief.

The Commander-in-Chief's wound is very slight, and does not interfere with his duty.
