

Pursuant to the Act for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors in England.

The Court for Relief of Insolvent Debtors.

In the Court of Francis Stack Murphy, Esq., Commissioner, on the 7th day of January, 1858.

In the Matter of Thomas Nelson Pickering, being a person of unsound mind, and a Prisoner in the County Gaol for Surrey, Horsmoneger-lane, in the county of Surrey.

Whereas it appears to the Court, by the record of Richard Robert Roberts, Esquire, Justice of the Peace for the said county, made and certified to the Court by the said Justice of the Peace according to the said Act, that the said prisoner is of unsound mind, and therefore incapable of taking the benefit of the said Act in such manner as a person of sound mind might do; and whereas the petition of John Keene on behalf of the said prisoner, hath been filed in the Court, it is ordered and appointed, that application shall be made to the Court for the discharge of the said prisoner, at the Court-House, in Portugal-Street, Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, on the 9th day of February, 1858, at the hour of Ten in the Forenoon precisely, in order that the Court may proceed to the discharge of the said prisoner, if otherwise entitled thereto, according to the true intent and meaning of the said Act.

The following PRISONERS, whose Estates and Effects have been vested in the Provisional Assignee by Order of the Court, having filed their Schedules, are ordered to be brought up before the Court, as hereinafter mentioned, at the Court-House, in Portugal-Street, Lincoln's-Inn, as follows, to be dealt with according to the Statute:

Leudesdorf and Co.), late of No. 27, Fore-street, Cripplegate, before then of No. 16a, Lawrence-lane, previously of No. 31, Noble-street, all in the city of London, and part of the time residing at No. 24, Southampton-terrace, Waterloo-road, Lambeth, Surrey, Commission Agent.

On Saturday the 30th January, 1858, at Eleven o'Clock, before Mr. Commissioner Phillips.

Christian Druke, formerly of No. 15, Garlick-hill, Upper Thames-street, City, Drysalter, then of Rose-cottage, Shepperton-cottages, Islington, Drysalter, and late of No. 1, Aske-terrace, Hoxton, both in Middlesex, Drysalter and Commission Agent for the sale of Drysaltery Goods.

On Monday the 1st February, 1858, at Eleven o'Clock, before Mr. Commissioner Phillips.

John White Boyd, known as Captain Boyd, formerly of Clyde-place, Glasgow, Scotland, from December 1854 to February 1856 voyaging to and from Melbourne, Australia, from February, 1856, to June renting apartments at No. 16, Manchester-buildings, Westminster, Middlesex, from June to July renting lodgings at Bisternep-place, Poplar, Middlesex, from July, 1856, to October, 1857, voyaging to and from Melbourne aforesaid, then of No. 16, Manchester-buildings aforesaid, and next and late of No. 4, John's-terrace, East India-road, Poplar, Middlesex, during the whole time a Master Mariner.

Thomas Paice, of No. 3, Spring-gardens, Stepney, Middlesex, occasional Waiter, formerly of No. 16, Union-street, Ryde, Hampshire, Tobacconist, News-vendor, Stationer, and occasional Waiter, and part of the same time residing at No. 3, Spring-gardens, Stepney, Middlesex.

On Monday the 1st February, 1858, at Eleven o'Clock, before Mr. Chief Commissioner Law.

Edward Leech Leake, formerly of No. 3, Ratcliff-terrace, Goswell-road, and also of Old Ford, Bow, both in Middlesex, Chemist and Druggist, then of No. 3, Ratcliff-terrace only, Chemist and Druggist, then of No. 4, Marlborough-terrace, Bridge-road, Battersea, Surrey, Commercial Traveller, then having apartments at Park-walk, Chelsea aforesaid, then of Church-street, and afterwards of Upper Sydney-street, both in Chelsea, Middlesex, out of business, but during a portion of the time, whilst of Upper Sydney-street, Commercial Traveller, then of Ann's-terrace, Fulham, part of the time Commercial Traveller, and part out of business, and then and late of No. 1, Somerset-place, Stockwell-green, Surrey, Chemist and Druggist.

TAKE NOTICE.

1. If any Creditor intends to oppose a Prisoner's discharge, notice of such intention must be given, by entry thereof in the proper page and columns of the book kept for that purpose at the Office of the Court, between the hours of Eleven in the Forenoon and Three in the Afternoon, two clear days before the day of hearing above mentioned, exclusive of Sunday, and exclusive both of the day of entering such notice and of the said day of hearing; but in the case of a Prisoner, for the removal of whom for hearing in the country an order has been obtained, but not carried into effect by the Creditors, notice of opposition will be sufficient if given one clear day before the day of hearing.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination until the last day for entering opposition inclusive; and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided by the proper Officer, according to the Act 1 and 2 Vict. c. 110, sec. 105.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned, on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
