THE QUEEN'S LEVEES.

NEW REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written*

thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. It is also necessary, in order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come, to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the *day but one previous* to each Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the city of Carlisle in Council assembled, beg leave humbly to approach your Majesty with the deepest feelings of attachment towards your Majesty's royal person and throne, and to offer our sincere congratulations to your Majesty on the occasion of the Marriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal with Prince Frederick William of Prussia, which is this day to be solemnized.

We sincerely trust that the alliance of Her Royal Highness with so august a scion of the Illustrious House of Brandenburg, may be productive of much domestic happiness to your Majesty and your royal offspring, and may also tend to unite in closer bonds of amity this country and the Prussian nation, so distinguished in the annals of modern Europe, and conduce to the mutual prosperity and advantage of each.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of an Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine, and of an Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following ; that is to say :

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen, of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Luke, situate at Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and in the Diocese of Ripon.

" Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Luke, situate at Eccleshill aforesaid.

" Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Bradford, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Eccleshill.'

" And with the like consent of the said Robert Bishop of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being, subject to his paying over to the Reverend John Burnet, incumbent of the said parish of Bradford, during such time as he shall remain such incumbent, all the fees which

may be payable in respect to the performance of marriages at the said Church of Saint Luke aforesaid.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"All that part of the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and Diocese of Ripon, which is comprised within the township of Eccleshill."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Luke, situate at Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Eccleshill," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

Light at Lanriec, Finistere.

This light is a *fixed red* light, placed at a height of 42 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible from the deck of a ship in clear weather at a distance of 9 miles.

This light on the coast of Lanriec, to the eastward of the harbour of Concarneau, is intended to guide to the anchorage the vessel which may have passed the shoal of *Men-Fall*, after having followed the direction of the existing lights of Concarneau, namely, that of the battery of La Croix and that of the heights of Beuzec. It will only light an area of 19° free of danger, and the line of separation of light and darkness on the south side will pass about 90 yards to the north of the shoal *Men-Fall*. The light will be lost sight of before the vessel reaches the shore on which it stands. Lat $47^{\circ} 52' 3''$ N.; long. $3^{\circ} 54' 45''$ west of Greenwich.

Directions. The mariner who wishes to enter the little roadstead of Concarneau by night should keep very exactly (especially when he has reached near to the *Cochon* shoal) on the line pointed out by the two fixed white lights of the battery La

Croix and of Benzec, until he sees Lanriec red light on the right, when he should steer for it.
