THE QUEEN'S LEVEES.

NEW REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come, to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the day but one previous to each Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

THE Secretary of State for War has this day received a Despatch, of which the following is a copy, addressed to his Lordship by Major-General C. T. Van Sraubenzee, C.B., Commanding Her Majesty's Land Forces in China :

My LORD, *Canton, December 29, 1857.*

I HAVE great satisfaction in reporting that Canton City was escalated and captured this day at nine o'clock, with a more trifling loss than could have been expected. Great emulation was

displayed by the whole Allied Force, amongst whom the greatest cordiality and good feeling exists.

We have to deplore the loss of Captain Bates, of the Royal Navy, also of Lieutenant Hackett, of the 59th Regiment. Lieutenant Bowen, of the same regiment, has been seriously wounded.

All is still in confusion, and the mail leaving ; I must therefore defer further details till the next opportunity.

DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty from Rear-Admiral Sir Michael Seymour.

OPERATIONS AT CANTON.

No. 357.

*Her Majesty's Ship Coromandel, at Canton,
Sir, December 28, 1857.*

MY Letter, No. 343, of the 15th instant, conveyed the intelligence of the peaceable occupation of Honan Point by the forces of the Allied Powers, and that a letter had been sent in to Yeh, the Imperial High Commissioner, by the Ambassadors of the Allied Powers, stating the demands of the two Governments, and granting ten days for a consideration of the same, failing compliance with which, coercive measures would be commenced against the city of Canton.

2. The brigade of Royal Marines and Royal Marine Artillery were immediately afterwards brought up to the large storehouses on Honan, and comfortably quartered, as well as a portion of the Naval Brigade. The troops were left on board the transports "Lancashire Witch" and "Mooresfoot," at Whampoa, and the French Contingent remained on board their own ships, except a small party in conjoint occupation at Honan.

3. On the 18th, I received a communication from the Earl of Elgin and Baron Gros, stating that the reply of the High Commissioner had been received—that it was most unsatisfactory, and inviting the naval and military commanders-in-chief to a conference on board the "Audacieuse," to consider what further steps should be taken, in consequence of Yeh's determination to resist the very moderate demands of the two Governments.

4. The conference was held on the 21st instant, when it was determined that the Plenipotentiaries should address a letter to the Imperial High Commissioner, informing his Excellency that, in consequence of his non-compliance with the demands submitted for his consideration, the further settlement of the question had been transferred to the naval and military authorities, and that we should also address a letter to his Excellency stating the above fact, and that if, at the end of a further term of forty-eight hours, the city should be peacefully surrendered into our hands, life and property would be respected, but that, if the terms were not accepted, the city would be attacked.

5. All our efforts to avert the evils of war from the Chinese having failed, through the obstinate determination which has characterized the proceedings of the Imperial Commissioner from October 21, 1856, nothing remained for the Commanders of the Allied Forces but to address the Imperial Commissioner, and to carry into execution the painful alternative of attacking Canton, which was commenced at daylight this morning. The departure of the packet will prevent my giving any further reports. I am now on the point of joining the forces disembarking at Kuper's Island for the assault on the city walls.

6. I beg to enclose copies of two General Orders of the 26th instant, and of Memoranda issued by Major-General Van Siraubenzee, containing the necessary arrangements for the attack, which I hope will put their lordships in full possession of our intended proceedings.

7. I have pleasure in reporting that the most perfect unanimity exists between the Commanders-in-Chief of the Allied Forces.

GENERAL ORDER.

Before Canton, December, 1857.

The naval and military Commanders-in-Chief of the allied forces before Canton have agreed to the following order of operations against the city. First bombardment to commence at daylight on Monday morning the 28th of December.

The ships and vessels named in the note (under letter A) on the signal hereafter indicated being made, will open fire on the south-west angles of the city walls, with a view to breach them, and impede the communication of the Chinese troops along their parapets to the eastward.

The ships and vessels named in the note (under letter B), near the Dutch Folly, with a similar object, will breach the city walls opposite the Viceroy's residence; the mortars in the Dutch Folly, and the Niger and Avalanche, likewise shelling the city heights and Gough heights.

The ships and vessels named in the note (under letter C), between the Dutch Folly and the French Folly, will open fire on the south-east angles of the new and old city walls, and the walls forming the east side of the city.

These three several attacks will commence simultaneously, when a white ensign shall be hoisted at the fore of the Actæon, and a yellow flag as a corresponding signal at the same time hoisted at the fore of the Phlegethon.

The Hornet and the Avalanche will repeat these signals at their fore so long as the flags shall remain flying on the beforementioned ships.

The bombardment is to be in very slow time, and continued day and night, not to exceed per each gun employed 60 rounds during the first 24 hours, except the ships under letter C, which will fire 100 rounds.

Immediately the bombardment opens the landing of the allied forces will take place at the creek in

(A) Actæon, Phlegethon, and gunboats.

(B) Mitraile, Fusée, Cruiser, Hornet; and a gunboat.

(C) Nimrod, Surprise, Dragonne, Marceau, and gunboats. After one P.M. the three first-named ships will alter their fire to the city and Gough's heights. The Marceau and gunboats will, after one P.M., alter their fire to the north-east city gate.

Kuper Passage, where the British and French flags will be planted) in the following order, commencing at daylight :—

1. Sappers and Miners, 59th Regiment, Royal Artillery, stores and ammunition.

2. The French Naval Brigade, stores, &c.

3. The Naval Brigade, under the orders of Commodore the Hon. C. G. I. B. Elliot.

4. The Naval Brigade from Canton.

5. Lieutenant-Colonel Lemon's battalion of Royal Marines, &c.

6. Colonel Holloway's Brigade of Royal Marines, &c.

(When last boat of No. 1 has passed No. 2 will commence and so on with the remainder.)

The disembarkation of the French forces will be superintended by Captain Reinaud, flag captain; the British troops and Royal Marines by Major the Hon. H. Clifford.

The British Naval Brigade, by Captain W. K. Hall, C.B., flag-captain.

The following will be the disposition of the united forces after landing :—

British Naval Brigade on the right.

Centre brigade, composed of Lieutenant-Colonel Lemon's provisional battalion, 59th Regiment, Royal Artillery, and Sappers.

French brigade on the left.

Colonel Holloway's brigade in reserve, with Royal Marine Artillery.

After getting into position the Allied Forces will remain in line of continuous columns of brigade until further orders for an advance, which will be made to a position for the night, preparatory to active service on the following morning.

GENERAL MEMORANDUM.

*Coromandel, Canton,
December 26, 1857.*

THE Naval Brigade of seamen will be in three divisions. The divisions will be told off into companies, each division commencing No. 1, and the last number companies in 1st and 2nd divisions will be composed of boats' crews.

The field pieces of the Calcutta only will be landed, and designated the Light Battery, under the command of Lieutenant Goodenough, to be composed of three light 12-pounders, and the Heavy Battery of two 12-pounders, under the command of Lieutenant Beamish.

The two first companies of each division to carry scaling ladders.

The whole brigade to land with three days' provisions.

Four medical officers to be selected, to go with each division when landing, and names transmitted to the Medical Inspector.

Each division to be provided with four bags, capable of holding 100 lbs. of powder, with a proportion of Bickford's fuze.

Commodore the Honourable C. G. I. B. Elliot, C.B., to command the brigade.

MEMORANDA.

ON the 1st day the 59th Regiment is to be told
 off for the attack on Fort Lin, supported by a
 battalion of the French Brigade.

Fort Lin is afterwards to be occupied by
 Colonel Holloway's Brigade.

The following morning, the whole of the 59th
 Regiment and 38th Madras Native Infantry are
 to form the covering party to keep down the fire
 from the walls.

The ladders of the French, Centre, and Naval
 Brigades having been placed on the first night as
 near the ditch as practicable, the parties told off
 for them will, when ordered, advance, and form
 the storming party, the remainder being in
 support.

The French Brigade will escalate as near as
 possible to the north side of Blind Man's House,
 the British Naval Brigade 600 yards to the north
 and the Centre Brigade between the two.

After entering the place, the French Brigade
 will form on the open ground inside the wall,
 advancing southwards, to take, close, and occupy
 the Eastern Gate. This accomplished, the re-
 mainder of the Brigade will move northward
 along the wall.

The British Naval Brigade will form on the
 wall, and advance northward along the ramparts,
 taking the North-East Gate, which they will open
 for the Artillery, and continue to hold.

Lieutenant-Colonel Lemon will form his Bat-
 talion on the wall, and will follow and support the
 French Naval Brigade.

Colonel Graham, having formed the 59th Regi-
 ment, so soon as the walls are in our possession,
 will order it to advance in support of the British
 Naval Brigade, unless he should see that the
 French Brigade requires support, in the attack on
 the East Gate, when it will be his duty to afford it.

Each Battalion will leave one company on the
 wall to assist in mounting on the ramparts such
 howitzers and field pieces, as may not be in position
 outside the walls. They will afterwards rejoin
 their respective brigades.

The whole force is to bear in mind that the
 principal object is to capture the heights within
 the city; no move is therefore to take place, after
 the capture of the two northern gates, Magazine
 Hill, and five-storied Pagoda, until special orders
 be given.

No soldier is, on any account, to be permitted
 to leave the ranks.

Colonel Holloway's Brigade, being in reserve,
 he will superintend the forwarding of the reserve
 ammunition, and the protection of the wounded,
 and see that such artillery as may be in position is
 properly supported. He will occupy so much of
 the first position, vacated by the other brigades as
 he may deem necessary, with a view to oppose any
 attack that may be made from the hills on our
 flank and rear.

The mot d'ordre or parole, throughout the
 operations will be "France and England." The
 guns on the walls and on the captured forts and
 gates will be turned on the city, except the north-
 ward ones, which will be directed on Gough's and
 the adjacent forts.

CAPTURE OF CANTON.

Head Quarters,

IT is with the highest feelings of satisfaction
 that I have the honour to report, for the informa-
 tion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty,
 that the city of Canton was assaulted this morn-

ing by the naval and military forces under the command of Rear-Admiral Sir Rigault de Genouilly, Major-General Van Straubenzee, and myself, and was taken by escalade. Full particulars will be given by the next packet.

2. Our gratification at this quick success, with trifling loss, has been damped by a great calamity, in the death of Captain William Thornton Bate, of Her Majesty's ship *Actæon*, who was killed by a gingall ball, whilst reconnoitering a suitable spot for placing our scaling ladders.

3. This sad event has thrown a gloom over the whole force, Captain Bate being no less beloved for his many virtues, than respected and admired for his professional ability. By the death of Captain Bate, Her Majesty has lost a most able, zealous, and faithful servant.

4. We have the loss of one other officer to deplore, Lieutenant Hackett, of the 59th. Regiment, who, shortly after landing, was murdered by a party of Chinese soldiers.

5. I have only heard of two officers wounded, Lieutenant Lord Gilford, of the *Calcutta*, severely, arm broken by a gingall ball; and Mr. Thompson, Midshipman of the *Sanspareil*, severely wounded by a rocket. I am busily employed with my gallant colleagues in securing our position.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make regulations as to the rates and scales of payment according to which costs, expenses, and compensations shall be allowed and ordered to be paid under the Act of the seventh year of the reign of King George the IVth, cap. 64, and divers other Acts of Parliament authorising such payments to prosecutors and witnesses, and to persons attending Courts in obedience to recognizances or subpoenas in the cases of criminal prosecutions, for their travelling expenses and trouble and loss of time incurred in attending such Courts, and also to make regulations as to the rates and scales of payment according to which certificates may be granted by the examining magistrate or magistrates in respect of the travelling expenses of prosecutors, and witnesses for the prosecution and other persons, of attending before such magistrate or magistrates, and of compensation for trouble and loss of time therein in the cases aforesaid: And whereas to the end aforesaid, it has become necessary to revoke divers regulations made under the 26th section of the said Act hereinbefore recited: Now I, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, acting under and in pursuance of a certain Act of Parliament made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to the expenses of prosecutions, and to make further provision for the apprehension and trial of offenders in certain cases," do revoke, annul, and make void, all rules and regulations made under the said 26th section of the said Act, whereby any costs, expenses, and compensations may be allowed or ordered to be paid to such prosecutors and witnesses, or other persons attending on recognizance or subpoena, for their travelling expenses, trouble, and loss of time in attending before such Courts or before such examining magistrate or magistrates, to a larger or greater amount than the allowances hereinafter authorized to be made in that behalf: and I do make, constitute, and appoint the following rules and regulations to be observed by all Courts and magistrates, and the officers and clerks of such Courts and magistrates, and by all others whom it may concern, as to the rates and scales of payment of such costs, expenses, and compensation; and I do direct that the same shall take effect and be in force in all places where the same may be capable of taking effect, that is to say—

1. I do make, constitute, and appoint the following rules and regulations as to the rates and scales

of payment according to which such certificates may be granted, by such examining magistrate or magistrates, in respect of the travelling expenses of prosecutors, and witnesses, for the prosecution, of attending before such magistrate or magistrates, and of compensation for their trouble and loss of time therein in the cases aforesaid, namely:—

There may be allowed to prosecutors or witnesses being members of the profession of the law, or of medicine, if resident in the city, borough, parish, town, or place where the examination is taken, or within a distance not exceeding two miles from such place, for their loss of time and trouble in attending to give professional evidence on such examination, but not otherwise, a sum, in the discretion of the magistrate or magistrates, for each attendance not to exceed 0 10 6

If such prosecutor or witness shall reside elsewhere, then a sum for the same not to exceed 1 1 0

And for mileage, a sum not to exceed 3d. per mile each way.

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables attending the bench of magistrates where such examination is taken on any police duty, and to constables paid by salary, and attending from a distance not exceeding three miles, there shall be allowed Nil.

Unless the magistrate or magistrates shall certify that there were special reasons for making an allowance, and shall specify such reasons upon his or their certificate, and then a sum not to exceed for each day .. 0 1 0

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables paid by salary, and not attending the magistrate or bench of magistrates on any police duty, for their trouble in attending such examination, from a distance greater than three miles, and not exceeding seven miles from the place where the examination is taken, a sum not to exceed for each day .. 0 1 0

To the same if attending from a distance greater than seven miles from the place where the examination is taken, a sum not to exceed for each day .. 0 1 0

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables paid by salary, if necessarily detained all night for the purposes of the examination, a sum for the night, not to exceed .. 0 2 0

(The said allowances to prosecutors and witnesses being constables paid by salary, are to be conditional, upon the same being applicable for their personal benefit.)

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables necessarily travelling to the place of examination in discharge of any police duty, there shall be allowed for mileage Nil.

(Unless the examining magistrate or magistrates shall certify that there were special reasons for making an allowance, and shall specify the same upon their certificate, and then the same as other constables.)

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables not attending the place of examination in discharge of a police duty, and entitled to be conveyed under 7 & 8 Vict., cap. 85, sec. 12, and able to travel by railway, there shall be allowed mileage as follows:—

To superintendents, inspectors, serjeants, and constables, the lowest amount per mile authorized by Act of Parliament for their conveyance, and no larger sum;

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables able but not so entitled to travel, and not attending the place of examination on any police duty, there shall be allowed for mileage, railway fare, the same as to ordinary witnesses;

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables not able to travel by railway, and not attending the magistrate or magistrates on any police duty, for every mile beyond four miles each way they shall travel to reach the place of examination, a sum not to exceed each way, 2*d.*;

To prosecutors and witnesses being constables, able partially to travel by railway, for every mile after the first four miles each way, in reaching such means of conveyance, a sum not to exceed 2*d.*, and railway fare as other constables

To prosecutors and witnesses not hereinbefore provided for, resident in the city, borough, parish, town, or place where the examination is taken, or within a distance not exceeding two miles from such place, for their trouble and loss of time in so attending, there shall be allowed a sum for each day, not to exceed . . . 0 1 0

If resident elsewhere and beyond the distance of two miles, or if such prosecutors or witnesses shall be necessarily detained from home, for the purpose of the examination, more than four hours, a sum at the like discretion, not to exceed . . . 0 1 6

If they shall be necessarily detained from home more than six hours, then a sum at the like discretion, not to exceed . . . 0 2 6

When he or they shall reside at such a distance from the place of examination as to render it necessary that he or they shall sleep from home, then at the like discretion, a sum for the night, not to exceed . . . 0 2 6

There may be allowed for mileage, as follows:—

If the prosecutor or witness reside at a greater distance than two miles from the place of examination, and the whole or any portion of the journey can be performed by railway, second-class fare for such whole, or portion of the journey, as the case may be; and for a journey, or part of a journey, performed otherwise than by railway, a sum not to exceed per mile each way 0 0 3

In pursuance of the power in me vested, I do make the following rules and regulations as to the rates and scales of payment of costs, expenses, and compensations to be allowed, or ordered to be paid, under the said Act of the seventh year of the reign of King George the Fourth, and other the Acts of Parliament aforesaid, to prosecutors and witnesses attending Courts of Assize, Oyer and Terminer, jail delivery, general session of the peace, or any other courts having power to allow such costs, expenses, and compensation to prosecutors and witnesses, and persons attending such courts, in obedience to any recognizance or subpoena in cases of criminal prosecutions, for their trouble, loss of time, and travelling expenses in so attending.

For the purpose aforesaid I do make, constitute, and appoint the following rules and regulations; (that is to say), there may be allowed:—

To prosecutors and witnesses, being members of the profession of the law or of medicine, attending to give professional evidence, but not otherwise, for their trouble, expenses, and loss of time, for each day they shall necessarily attend the Court to give professional evidence, a sum not to exceed . . . 1 1 0

For each night the same as ordinary witnesses, and for mileage a sum not to exceed, per mile each way . . . 0 0 3

To prosecutors and witnesses, being constables and paid by salary, if resident in the city, borough, town, or place, where such Court is held, or within a distance not exceeding two miles of such place, a sum, in the discretion of the Court, not to exceed for each day . . . 0 1 0

If resident elsewhere, and if they shall attend from a greater distance than two miles, a sum, in the discretion of the Court, for each day not to exceed . . . 0 1 6

To the same if they shall be necessarily detained all night for the purposes of the prosecution, a further sum for the night not to exceed . . . 0 2 0

If such prosecutors and witnesses shall be chief constables or superintendents attending from a distance greater than three miles, and they shall be necessarily detained all night for the purposes of the prosecution, instead of the foregoing allowances there may be allowed to them the same as ordinary witnesses.

(The said allowances to prosecutors and witnesses, being constables paid by salary, are to be conditional on the same being applicable to their personal benefit.)

To prosecutors and witnesses, being constables who shall be entitled to be conveyed under the 7th and 8th Vict., cap. 85, sec. 12, and able to travel by railway, there may be allowed for mileage as follows:

To superintendents, inspectors, serjeants, and police constables, the lowest amount per mile authorized by Act of Parliament for their conveyance, and no larger sum;

To prosecutors and witnesses, being constables not so entitled to travel, there may be allowed railway fare the same as to ordinary witnesses;

To the same if paid by salary, and where they are not able to travel by railway, for every mile beyond four miles each way they shall travel to and return from the Court where the prosecution takes place, a sum not to exceed 2*d.*;

To the same if paid by salary, when able partially to travel by railway, for every mile after the first four miles each way in reaching such means of conveyance, a sum not to exceed 2*d.*, and railway fare as other constables.

To prosecutors and witnesses not hereinbefore provided for, there may be allowed, for their expenses, trouble, and loss of time in attending the Court where the prosecution takes place, per day, a sum not to exceed 0 3 6

To the same, if entitled to mileage, for each night they may be necessarily detained from home for the purposes of the prosecution at any assizes, session of jail delivery, or session of oyer and terminer, a sum not to exceed 0 2 6

To the same for each night they may necessarily be detained from home for the purposes of the prosecution at a session of the peace 0 2 0

To the same for mileage there may be allowed as follows:—

If resident more than two miles from the Court where the prosecution takes place, if the whole or any portion of the journey can be performed by railway, second-class fare for such whole or portion of the journey, as the case may be, and for a journey or part of a journey performed otherwise than by railway, per mile, each way, a sum not to exceed 0 0 3

In computing the amount to be allowed for mileage, under any of the regulations herein contained, I do direct that no greater allowance be made than at the rate of 3*d.* per mile each way by the nearest available route.

I also direct that no prosecutor or witness allowed for mileage under any of the regulations herein contained, shall be allowed for loss of time occasioned by his or her omission to avail himself or herself of a public conveyance, if available.

I further direct that no prosecutor or witness be allowed, under any of the regulations aforesaid for his attendance, loss of time, trouble, or expenses, in more than one case on the same day.

I further direct that no constable paid by salary be allowed for railway-fare not actually paid.

Exceptions.

I do authorize payment to the officer of a jail whose duties require his attendance in the Court where the prosecution takes place, for giving evidence on a former conviction, a sum not to exceed 3*s.* 6*d.*

I do make the following regulations as to the compensation to be allowed in the cases of prisoners brought by writ of habeas corpus, or other lawful process, to give evidence for the prosecution.

To governors and officers of jails, in whose custody the prisoner is brought, as follows:—

I authorize the following payments to be made to attorneys for the prosecution, giving evidence, over and above the allowances so made to them as attorneys:—

If, in the opinion of the proper officer of the Court, such evidence was necessary, and saved the attendance of another witness.			

And whereas it may become necessary, in certain cases, that scientific persons, unacquainted with the facts to be given in evidence upon the prosecution may be required to attend as witnesses, in order to state their opinion on matters of science in issue on such prosecutions; and it is reasonable in such cases, that the foregoing rates of allowance should be departed from, I hereby direct that the allowances to be made to such persons shall be subject to the decision of the Court before whom such persons may be examined, which may direct such allowances as to such Court may appear reasonable.

Whenever an interpreter shall be employed to interpret on the part of the prosecution, it shall be competent for the Court before whom such interpreter shall be so employed to make him such allowances as to such Court shall seem reasonable: provided always that this regulation is not to interfere with any regulations in force (where such now exist) for the remuneration of interpreters.

In case of the illness or inability of any prosecutor or witness to travel without some special means of conveyance, it shall be lawful for the Court to depart from the foregoing rates of allowances, and to make such other allowances as the justice of the case shall require.

Under the circumstances herein specified under the head of exceptions, I authorize a departure from the rules and regulations herein contained, as well by the examining magistrate or magistrates as by the Courts herein mentioned, except only in the case of an attorney for the prosecution giving evidence: provided always that whenever any allowances, hereinbefore authorized under the head of exceptions, shall have been made, the circumstances under which the general rate of allowances shall be departed from shall in all cases be fully specified by the proper officer of the Court, or magistrate, upon the document by which such allowances shall be authorized. And, lastly, I do order that, notwithstanding anything herein contained, all lawful rules and regulations heretofore

made and in force, under or by reason whereof allowances to a less amount than those hereby authorized are now payable in the cases hereinbefore provided for, shall be and remain in as full force and effect as if this Order had not been made, and shall continue to apply to the persons and the circumstances thereby provided for, although such persons and circumstances may be comprehended within the terms hereof, and that the said rules and regulations shall so far remain unaffected by this Order, and that nothing herein contained shall have the effect of increasing the amount of any rates or allowances which may be lawfully made under such rules and regulations; it being the true intent and meaning hereof that such rules and regulations shall be and remain unaltered, further or otherwise than in the reduction of allowances to prosecutors and witnesses where the rates thereof shall be in excess of those herein contained.
