NEW REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queeu's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levce excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come, to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock on the day but one previous to each Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord' Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

Madam,

WE your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops and Clergy of the province of Canterbury, assembled in Convocation, approach your Majesty with our humble congratulations on the late happy event of the Marriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal with His Royal Highness Prince Frederick William of Prussia.

In addressing your Majesty on this occasion, we rejoice to know that we are only echoing the voice of the whole country, and expressing the deep interest which is universally felt in an event which so materially concerns the happiness of your Majesty and your Illustrious Consort.

We indulge the hope, that the alliance of the Princess Royal of England with a Prince of the Royal Family of Prussia will tend to connect the two countries still more closely in the bonds of national amity, and thus render a Marriage, which is so gratifying to your Majesty, a source of increased prosperity to the kingdom at large.

We venture to assure your Majesty that our earnest prayers are offered to Almighty God, that He may be pleased to crown this auspicious union with His abundant blessing.

To which Address Her Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

"I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address, and I accept with sincere gratification, your congratulations on the Marriage of my beloved daughter with a Prince of an Illustrious House, whose high character affords the best security for her future happiness.

"I trust that, by the Divine blessing, the hopes and wishes which have been expressed on this happy occasion, in a manner most gratifying to me by yourselves and by all classes of my faithful people will be fully realized, and that this Marriage will not only ensure the lasting happiness of those most dear to me, but also conduce to the best interests of the two great nations whom it connects by a new bond of amity."

Delhi, November 28, 1857. No. 283.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to enclose a Supplementary Roll of Killed, Wounded, and Dead, since the 8th June to the 26th November, 1857, in the Honourable Company's 2nd European Bengal Fusiliers; and I have to regret that their names were omitted in the original roll forwarded on the 26th November, 1857, owing to the difficulties experienced in collecting a correct list. Nearly all the Pay Serjeants of Companies, as well as the Orderly-room Serjeant, having been shot in action, and the regimental records having been left at the Depôt when the regiment proceeded on service in light marching order, there was great difficulty in getting a correct roll.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for fixing the number and emoluments of the minor canons in the Cathedral Church of Landaff, and for confirming certain statutes and rules of the said church.

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Llandaff, that the number of minor canons in the said Cathedral Church is now two, and that it is expedient that there should continue to be two minor canons only therein:

"Now therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their Chapter Seal, that the number of minor canons in the said Cathedral Church of Llandaff shall from henceforth be two, and that there shall be paid by the said Dean and Chapter out of the corporate revenues of the said church to each of such minor canons a fixed annual stipend as such minor canon of one hundred and fifty pounds:

"And we further recommend and propose that, until vacancies shall occur in the three canonries in the said Cathedral Church, which are now held by canons, who were in possession at the time of the passing of the Act above mentioned, the holders of the said three canonries shall out of the monics accruing to us in respect of certain suspended preferments in the said Cathedral Church be reimbursed any sum or sums by which their incomes would by reason of the payments herein recom-mended to be made to minor canons be reduced, and that to this end the Treasurer or other proper officer of the said church be authorized out of the monies so payable to us as aforesaid to retain and pay such sum or sums accordingly:

"And whereas the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Llandaff have proposed to The Right Reverend Alfred Bishop of Llandaff as their Visitor certain alterations in the statutes of their said church, which have been confirmed by such Visitor as statutes and rules of the said church, and have been submitted to us, and are set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, and it appears to us to be proper that the same should be confirmed:

"We therefore further recommend and propose that the said statutes and rules so contained in the said schedule shall be confirmed, and shall become and be statutes and rules of the said Cathedral Church of Llandaff, but not so as to affect any law now in force relating to the licences of curates:

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any

"SCHEDULE.

"We, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Llandaff, acting under the provisions of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, do hereby propose to the Right Reverend Alfred Bishop of Llandaff as Visitor of our Cathedral Church, that the following alterations be made in the statutes thereof.

"Whereas one of the duties of the said church is the cure of souls within the parish of Llandaff, and such duty has been heretofore performed by the minor canons of the said church, or one of them, and it appears to be expedient that such duty should continue to be performed by the minor canons of the said church as curates of us, the Dean and Chapter, with the sanction and under the authority and jurisdiction of the Bishop, We therefore propose that it be ordered and decreed as follows (that is to say); That the minor canons for the time being of our Cathedral Church shall be respectively nominated to the Bishop of Llandaff as curates of us the Dean and Chapter of the said church, to be by him respectively licensed as such curates within the parish of Llandaff, or within such portion thereof as shall be specified in such licenses respectively; and that upon being so licensed they shall respectively be such curates so long as they shall continue to hold the said office of minor canon, and no longer; In witness whereof we, the said Dean and Chapter, have hereunto set our common or chapter seal this nineteenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to

say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Tavistock, in the county of Devon, and in the Diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Tavistock hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our names in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by the Most Noble Francis Duke of Bedford, upon the understanding that the annual payment hereinafter mentioned shall be made by us to the incumbent of the district, hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as one shall be appointed and licensed, and to his gund so soon as such district shall have become, under the provisions of the herein secondly-named Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the said new parish.

"And whereas, it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the transfer of the said sum of five thousand pounds Three Pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, should be assigned to the said Francis Duke of Bedford, his heirs and assigns, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of Exeter, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Tavistock described in the Schedule hereunto annexed (all which part is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed) shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted

a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Tavistock,'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the incum-bent for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said secondly named Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the said new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or November next after the day of the date of the license of such incumbent as aforesaid; and that in case a vacancy in the incumbency of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the incumbent making the vacancy or his personal representative or representatives, and the incumbent succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of the said district or new parish, or, instead of any part of such annual sum, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments should be conveyed or secured to such incumbent and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the date of the publication of such order in the London Gazette as aforcsaid, be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Francis Duke of Redford his heirs and assigns for ever

Duke of Bedford, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"SCHEDULE. The District of Saint Paul, Tavistock, being—

"All that part of the parish of Tavistock, in the county of Devon, and in the Diocese of Exeter, which lies on the western side of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the River Lumborn."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, been given to the incumbent and to the patron of the Church of the said parish of Tavistock, and such incumbent and patron have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approve I by Her Majesty in Council: now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this order shall have been duly published in the London

Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Exeter.

Fixed Lights in Kronstat Roads.

THE Russian Government has given Notice that lights are exhibited from two wooden light-houses erected on Nicholas battery, Kronslott or Castle, on the south side of the roadstead of Kronstat.

The upper or easternmost light is a fixed white light, illuminating an arc of 10° from W.N. W.½N. to W.N.W.½W., and visible in clear weather at a distance of about 9 miles. It is also visible to the eastward from N. by E. to S. by W.

The lower light is fixed, red, and may be seen westward, in clear weather, from a distance of about 8 miles. The limits of its angle of illumination are not strongly defined, and the light can be seen when on the shoals in the roads.

Vessels navigating the western roadstead of Kronstat at night may proceed with safety by keeping these lights in line W. N.W., which leads through mid-channel, or by keeping the white upper light in sight. In order to maintain a clear channel, no vessel will be allowed to anchor on the bearing of these two lights in line.
