Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to the Queen, at the Drawing-Room upon the 5th of May next, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the Decoration of the Victoria Cross on the under-mentioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Men of Her Majesty's and of the East India Company's Armies, who have been recommended to Her Majesty for that Decoration, in accordance with the rules laid down in Her Majesty's Warrant instituting the same, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, as recorded against their several names; viz.:

Regiment or Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Bengal Artillery ...	Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Tombs, C.B., and Lieutenant James Hills Date of Act of Bravery, 9th July, 1857	For very gallant conduct on the part of Lieutenant Hills before Delhi, in defending the position assigned to him in case of alarm, and for noble behaviour on the part of Lieutenant-Colonel Tombs in twice coming to his subaltern's rescue, and on each occasion killing his man. (See despatch of Lieutenant-Colonel Mackenzie, Commanding 1st Brigade Horse Artillery, dated Camp, near Delhi, 10th July, 1857, published in the Supplement to the London Gazette of the 16th January, 1858.)
24th Bombay Native Infantry	Lieutenant William Alexander Kerr Date of Act of Bravery, 10th July, 1857	On the breaking out of a mutiny in the 27th Bombay Native Infantry in July, 1857, a party of the mutineers took up a position in the stronghold, or paga, near the town of Kolapore, and defended themselves to extremity. "Lieutenant Kerr, of the Southern "Mahratta Irregular Horse, took a prominent "share of the attack on the position, and at "the moment when its capture was of great "public importance, he made a dash at one of "the gateways, with some dismounted horse- "men, and forced an entrance by breaking "down the gate. The attack was completely "successful, and the defenders were either "killed, wounded, or captured, a result that "may with perfect justice be attributed to "Lieutenant Kerr's dashing and devoted "bravery." (Letter from the Political Superintendent at Kolapore, to the Adjutant-General of the Army, dated 10th September, 1857.)

(General Order of Major-General Sir Archdale Wilson, Bart., K.C.B., dated Head Quarters, Delhi City, September 21, 1857.)

Lance-Corporal Henry Smith Date of Act of Bravery, 14th September, 1857	"Lance-Corporal Smith most gallantly carried "away a wounded comrade under a heavy "fire of grape and musketry on the Chaundee "Chouck, in the city of Delhi, on the morning "of the assault on the 14th September, 1857." (General Order of Major-General Sir Archdale Wilson, Bart., K.C.B., dated Head Quarters, Delhi City, September 21, 1857.)

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty,

chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Tidebrook, in the parish of Wadhurst, in the county of Sussex, and diocese of Chichester,

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous parts of the parishes of Wadhurst and Mayfield, in the said county and diocese, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Tidebrook aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester; of the Warden, Fellows, and Scholars of Wadham College, in the University of Oxford, patrons of the said parish of Wadhurst; and of the Reverend Henry Thomas Murdock Kirby, patron of the said parish of Mayfield, in testimony whereof the said

Ashlurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, and Henry Thomas Murdock Kirby, have signed and sealed this representation, and the said Warden, Fellows, and Scholars have hereunto affixed their common seal, we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that all those contiguous parts of the said parishes of Wadhurst and Mayfield described in the schedule hereunder written, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united into one consolidated chapelry for the said church at Tidebrook aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Tidebrook.'

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Warden, Fellows, and Scholars and Henry Thomas Murdock Kirby, testified as aforesaid, that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised alternately by the incumbents for the time being of the said parishes of Wadhurst and Mayfield, and that the first turn should belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Wadhurst.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the parish of Wadhurst, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending from the boundary between the said parish and the parish of Mayfield, along the middle of a rivulet or stream called Snape Brook as far as a point marked by a boundary stone placed on the south-western bank of such stream at the spot indicated by the letter C on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and extending thence in a westerly direction in a straight line to a point in the middle of the road leading from Beal's Oak to Newhouse, opposite to a boundary stone placed on the eastern side of such road, at the spot marked D on the said map, extending thence in the same direction along the middle of such last mentioned road to the middle of the road leading from Rushes Cross to Best Beech Hill, extending thence in a northerly direction along the middle of such last mentioned road, crossing the road leading from Best Beech Hill to Mark Cross to a point situate at a distance of one hundred yards north of the middle of the last mentioned road, extending thence parallel to the middle of the last mentioned road, and at the like distance of one hundred yards therefrom to the boundary of the parish of Rotherfield: And also all that part of the parish of Mayfield, in the said county and diocese, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line extending from the boundary of the parish of Tidehurst, along the middle of a rivulet or stream called the Rother River as far as the middle of the road leading from Merrywether Mill to Sharnden; extending thence in a northerly direction in a straight line to a point in the middle of the road leading from Tidebrook to a place called "Colkin's Mill," opposite to a boundary stone placed on the western side of such road at the spot marked E on the said map; and extending thence in a north-western direction parallel to, but at a distance of one hundred yards south of, the middle of the road leading from Rushes Cross to Stile House, as far as the boundary of the parish of Rotherfield."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed,

into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Tidebrook, in the parish of Wadhurst, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act, and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church shall belong to, and be exercised alternately by, the incumbents for the time being of the parishes of Wadhurst and Mayfield, and that the first turn shall belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Wadhurst; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty, section one; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate in the township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the parish of Bebington, in the county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Tranmere aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Chester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said township and chapelry district of Tranmere, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Tranmere.'

"And with the like consent of the said John,

Bishop of Chester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Benedict Arthure, Incumbent of Saint Catherine's church, in the said township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the said parish of Bebington, shall continue to be such incumbent, all the fees which shall be payable in respect of the performance of the said offices in the said church of Saint Paul, Tranmere aforesaid, shall be paid by the incumbent thereof to the said Benedict Arthure.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the parish of Bebington, in the county and diocese of Chester, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending from the western boundary of such township along the middle of a lane, called Prenton-lane, in an easterly direction, and also along the middle of Well-lane, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the fence which divides the close, numbered 406 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Bebington, and on the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 407 on the same maps, and extending thence northward and eastward along the middle of such fence, and alternately eastward and northward along the middle of the fences dividing the closes, numbered respectively 436 and 441, on the said maps, from the closes, numbered respectively 407, 437, 440, and 442, on the same maps, to the middle of the road leading from the church of the district of Saint Paul aforesaid, to Tranmere Ferry, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the western end of the fence dividing the close, numbered 214 on the said maps, from the close numbered 326 on such maps, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned fence to the middle of the Birkenhead, Lancashire, and Cheshire Junction Railway, and extending thence southward along the middle of such railway as far as a point marked A on the said map hereunto annexed, in the centre of the bridge which carries such railway over a road or lane running between certain premises, known as Birkenhead-buildings, and certain other premises, known as Liverpool-buildings, and extending thence along the middle of the last-mentioned lane, and across the road leading from Rock Ferry to Tranmere Ferry aforesaid, and along the middle of the fence dividing the close, numbered 259 on the said maps, from the close, numbered 263 thereon, to the River Mersey."

Tranmere, in the township and chapelry district of Tranmere, in the parish of Bebington, in the county of Lancaster, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Tranmere," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester:

Foreign Office, April 21, 1858.

NOTICE is hereby given, that in order to facilitate still further the obtaining of passports by British subjects desiring to proceed to the Continent, passports will henceforth be issued to any British subject who shall produce or send to the Passport Department of the Foreign Office, or to any one of the undermentioned agents at the outports, a certificate of his identity, signed by any mayor, magistrate, justice of the peace, minister of religion, physician, surgeon, solicitor, or notary, resident in the United Kingdom. Every such certificate must bear the signature of the person in whose behalf it is granted; and when it is forwarded to the Foreign Office by post, it must, if it be required that the passport should be sent by return of post to the person who granted the certificate, in order that he may deliver it to the applicant for the passport, be accompanied by a Post Office order for the amount of the fee; or if forwarded by post to an agent at an outport, the postage must be prepaid. But an agent at an outport will only deliver passports to persons applying for them there in pursuance of such certificate, and will not send them by post to any persons whatever. The application for the passport if addressed to "Her Majesty's Secretary of State, Foreign Office, London," should have the word "PASSPORT" conspicuously written upon the cover. If the applicant for a passport be a naturalized British subject, his certificate of naturalization, with his signature subscribed to the oath printed on the third page of it, must be forwarded to the Foreign Office with the certificate of identity granted on his behalf; and his certificate of naturalization will be returned with the passport, to the person who may have granted the certificate of identity, in order that he may cause such naturalized British subject, not being a servant included in his employer's passport, to sign the passport in his presence. But the agents at the outports are not authorised to grant passports to naturalized British subjects, nor to citizens of the Ionian States.

The charge on the issue of a passport, whatever number of persons may be named in it, is, for the present, six shillings, and that sum is to be paid on the delivery of the passport; or if it is desired that the passport should be sent by post, then that sum must be forwarded with the application for the passport, by Post Office order made payable to the "Chief Clerk of the Foreign Office," at the Post Office, Charing Cross.

The necessary instructions upon this point have been sent by the General Post Office to every money-order office throughout the kingdom.

But any person whose certificate of identity has been received from the country, may obtain his passport by calling for it at the Foreign Office on the day following the receipt of the application, either in person or by deputy—the deputy, in the latter case, exhibiting a signed authority from his principal, in order that the signature may be compared with the signature in the certificate; but in this case the words "Passport will be applied for at the Foreign Office," must be added to the certificate of identity.

The form of application heretofore adopted by banking firms will continue to be used by them.

The general Regulations for Passports as now amended are as follows:

1. Applications for Foreign Office Passports must be made in writing; and inclosed in a cover addressed to "Her Majesty's Secretary of State, Foreign Office, London," or to an agent at one of the specified outports, with the word "PASSPORT" conspicuously written on the cover.

2. The charge on the issue of a passport, whatever number of persons may be named in it, is, for the present, six shillings, which sum includes five shillings stamp-duty.

3. Foreign Office Passports are granted only to British-born subjects, or to citizens of the Ionian States, or to such foreigners as have become naturalized either by Act of Parliament or by a certificate of naturalization granted by the Secretary of State for the Home Department. When the party is a "Naturalized British subject," he will be so designated in his passport; and if his certificate of naturalization be dated subsequently to the 24th of August, 1850, his passport will be marked as good for one year only; but this regulation will not preclude any person whom it affects from obtaining, at any future period, on his producing his

old passport, a fresh passport for a further limited period of one year, without being required to pay a fresh charge.

4. Passports are issued at the Foreign Office, between the hours of eleven and four, on the day following that on which the application for the Passport has been received at the Foreign Office; but the passport will be issued at the outports immediately on application, accompanied by the production of a certificate of identity, within such hours as may be fixed with regard to the convenience of persons desirous of embarking for the continent.

5. Passports are granted to all persons either known to the Secretary of State, or recommended to him by some person who is known to him, or upon the application of any *Banking Firm* established in London, or in any other part of the United Kingdom; or upon the production of a certificate of identity, signed by any Mayor, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Physician, Surgeon, Solicitor, or Notary, resident in the United Kingdom.

6. A Passport cannot be sent by the Foreign Office, or by an agent at an outport, to a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate.

7. Foreign Office Passports must be countersigned at the Mission in London, or at some Consulate in the United Kingdom, of the Government of the country which the bearer of the passport intends to visit.*

8. A Foreign Office Passport granted to a British-born subject or to a citizen of the Ionian States or to a "Naturalized British subject" whose certificate of naturalization is dated previously to August 24, 1850, is not limited in point of time, but is available for any time, or for any number of journeys to the continent, *if countersigned afresh* by the Ministers or Consuls of the countries which the bearer intends to visit; but a passport granted to a "Naturalized British subject" whose certificate is dated subsequently to the 24th of August, 1850, is only available for the period for which the passport was originally granted.

* It is requisite that the bearer of every passport granted by the Foreign Office should sign his passport before he sends it to be *viséd* at any Foreign Mission or Consulate in England; without such signature either the *visa* may be refused, or the validity of the passport questioned abroad. And Travellers who may have any intention of visiting the Austrian States at any time in the course of their travels on the Continent, are particularly and earnestly advised not to quit England without having their passports *viséd* at the Austrian Mission in London; but there is no necessity for the *visa* to a Foreign Office Passport of either the Prussian or Sardinian authorities in the United Kingdom.
