TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to the Queen, at the Drawing-Room upon the 5th of May next, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen, of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate at Boldmere, in the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael, situate at Boldmere aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Worcester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would,

in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Sutton Coldfield, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Boldmere.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being :

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, and diocese of Worcester, which is comprised within the district called or known as 'The Coldfield,' as the same is delineated and set forth on the plan of the messuages, lands, and other hereditaments liable to poor rates in the parish of Sutton Coldfield aforesaid, made and taken, pursuant to an order of the Poor Law Board in that behalf duly issued, under date the nineteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, to the Guardians of the Poor of the Aston Union, in the said county of Warwick."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate at Boldmere, in the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Boldmere," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty

in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words following, that is to say :

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property belonging to the prebend of Brewood, annexed to the deanery of the cathedral church of Lichfield.

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments and endowments belonging to the said prebend of Brewood (except any right of Ecclesiastical patronage), will become vested in us on the next avoidance of the same dignity which is now held by the Honourable and Very Reverend Henry Edward John Howard, Doctor in Divinity, Dean of the cathedral church of Lichfield, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable.

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, and so long as the said Henry Edward John Howard shall as such prebendary continue to hold the estates of the said prebend, with his consent, testified by his being made party to such deed or deeds, from time to time to sell, or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend, and which will become so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Cockerham, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John, Ellel.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed, at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the township of Ellel, in the parish of Cockerham, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing in the centre of the aqueduct by which the Lancaster Canal is carried over the river Cocker, and extending thence eastward, northward, and south-

ward along the middle of such river, and of a watercourse which joins such river at a place called the Ford, and which skirts an estate called Whams, as far as the middle of the Dolphinholme-road; and thence extending eastward, along the middle of such last-mentioned road, as far as the middle of the culvert by which the stream which skirts Anyon House Farm is carried under the said road; and thence extending southward, along the middle of such last-mentioned stream, until it meets the river Wyre, forming the boundary dividing the said parish of Cockerham from the parish of Garstang Church Town."

Sister islands apparently open a sail's breadth of Flinders Island, bearing N.E., lead outside the rock; and Chappell Island mount, its breadth open of Hummock Island, S.E. by S., leads through the fairway between the rock and Cape Frankland.

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct:—

ARTICLE 1.—That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk only, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said Township of Bilston.

And at the request of the said Churchwardens and Overseers, We do hereby prescribe and direct, that the said Vestry Clerk shall perform the following duties, in addition to those set forth in the said Act:—

To make out the Rate and Demand Books and Cheque Receipt Books, and all entries therein.

To assist the Overseers in rating new erections liable to be assessed to the Poor Rate of the said Township.

To prepare all documents necessary to obtain orders of removal, and adopt all such subsequent proceedings as the law may require for removal of paupers which he shall be legally qualified to perform.

To superintend the repayment and recovery of all sums of money payable under the order of the Justices of the Peace upon persons for the support of their relatives.

ARTICLE 2.—That an annual salary of eighty pounds shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order by the Overseers of the Poor of the said township.

ARTICLE 3.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at Midsummer-day, Michaelmas-day, Christmas-day, and Lady-day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

ARTICLE 4.—That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said township shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the Wolverhampton Union, in the county of Stafford, a bond, in the penal sum of One Hundred Pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians

of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent; provided that the Guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law officer.

ARTICLE 5.—That the Auditor of the district comprising the said Wolverhampton Union shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the 17th day of March, 1847, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the office of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the said township of Bilston for the time being, appointed under the authority aforesaid, together with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

ARTICLE 6.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
