TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to the Queen, at the Drawing-Room upon the 5th of May next, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

A PROCLAMATION.

In order to the Electing a Peer of Scotland.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS George Sholto, Earl of Morton, was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Thursday the third day of June next ensuing, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said George Sholto, Earl of Morton, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law): and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: and We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this seventh day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and in the twenty-first year of Our reign.

THE following papers have been received at the East India House :—

No. 1.

Brigadier-General G. H. Macgregor, C.B., Military Commissioner, to the Secretary to Government with the Governor-General.

*Allahabad, Camp Mobaruckpore,
February 25, 1858.*

SIR, No. 179.

I HAVE the honor to report for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor-General that the three brigades of this force, under the immediate command of Maharajah Jung Bahadoor, this day completed the passage of the River Gogra with all its baggage and stores. The Fourth or Belwa Brigade will arrive on the other side to-day, and will cross, if possible, to-night, if not, to-morrow morning.

2. In reporting the successful result of much anxiety and labour, for the information of his Lordship I would wish to give a detailed account of the whole operation, that the government may be fully aware of the difficulties which we have had to encounter, but which have at last been overcome.

3. From the time of our arrival at Goruckpore, the passage of the Gogra was the great obstacle which presented itself to my mind, in the way of our advance into Oude.

4. I am aware that the river was at least as large as the Ganges, and much more rapid, and that the southern bank was studded with forts which commanded the stream. That the enemy lined the banks in great numbers and occupied every ghat, and that they had removed all the boats to the right bank, from where the river washes the Azimgurh district, to Byram Ghat.

5. On consulting the Maharaja, and laying all these things fully before him, he said that he left the matter entirely in my hands, that he would move his troops as I wished, but that I must make the arrangements for crossing.

6. As I had not only to prepare the crossing, but to defend the Goruckpore district as well, I recommended to his Excellency to send a brigade to Belwa, opposite Fyzabad, and to support it with another at Bustee. Subsequently the reports of the collection of rebels at Fyzabad became so urgent, and represented them in such numbers, that the officers in military charge determined to unite their brigades, and this rendered it necessary for support to be sent from Goruckpore to Bustee. The Maharaja immediately despatched a brigade at my request.

7. Lieutenant Sankey, of the Madras Engineers, had previously reported himself in camp, and I immediately took him into consultation; and, after establishing workshops for the collection of materials at Goruckpore, this officer set off to do the same both at Bustee and Belwa, and by my directions he made a survey of the river from Fyzabad to below Tadah. He reported two places suitable for crossing, the best at Belwa itself, the other, good, but not quite so good, at Phoolpoor.

8. The rebels were at this time in force at Tadah, and Mohamed Hosein expressing his intention to invade Goruckpore, if we went on to Fyzabad. The collector of Azimgurh also wrote to me about the defenceless state of his district, so I resolved to cross at Phoolpoor, which would have the effect of turning the enemy, as far as both districts were concerned.

9. Bridge materials were rapidly prepared at Goruckpore, Bustee, and Belwa, all this time, and from the disposition of the troops and these in-

cessant preparations, the enemy was completely deceived. He commenced throwing up batteries to oppose us at Belwa, and crossed a large force to annoy us at Byram Ghat, who advanced towards Belwa. The bearing of the enemy waxing more insolent every day, I sent orders to Captain Plowden, in military charge, to advise the Goorkha officer in command to march out and fight the enemy. The very gallant action at Shahgunge ensued, of which I had the honor to enclose Captain Plowden's report in my letter No. 146 of the 7th instant. The result was the dispersion of the enemy; and, notwithstanding all their boasting, oath-taking, &c., they have never since ventured to attack our post at Belwa, which it was of importance to keep up to the last.

10. Previously to this, fearing that the rafts proposed by Lieutenant Sankey might not be found sufficient, though they were all he could make with the wretched dingees he could collect from this and from that nullah, I had despatched Captain Reid, 37th Native Infantry, to Gopalpore, to collect there, and at Barhul Ghaut, a fleet of large boats; this being the nearest point at which we could procure them. Captain Reid collected the boats, boatmen, and a large quantity of materials, and put platforms on the boats; and on his reporting all ready, I directed Colonel Rowcroft, then at Burhu, to escort the boats up the river to Phoolpoor.

11. Simultaneously the Maharajah, with the head-quarters, marched to Bustee from Goruckpore, and the Bustee Brigade was pushed across country to Hainsur first, and Chupra afterwards, to support and reinforce Colonel Rowcroft. He advanced with the boats up the river, and as the fleet was threatened by the fort of Chundepore, Captain Sothely landed the escort, and captured the fort, after the gallant affair of which I had the honour to enclose his report in my letter No. 177 of the 24th instant.

12. At this time the head-quarters of the Maharajah had moved to the Manja, opposite Phoolpoor, arriving there on the 17th instant, and as the river here made a reach from the left to the right bank, where it ran under the village of Phoolpoor, and where, the whole channel being one, it was to be crossed, a workshop was established on our side, about two miles above where the bridge was to be. Here the rafts and bridge materials were got ready.

13. It was in contemplation to cross a force on the rafts to seize the village of Phoolpoor, but as the enemy had collected a considerable force, with guns, immediately opposite the workshop, and opened a fire, though it fell short, yet the boatmen were frightened and temporarily ran away, so that idea was abandoned.

14. On the 19th, Colonel Rowcroft, having made a long march, arrived about sunset, simultaneously with the fleet at Nowrainee, about four miles below Phoolpoor. On hearing of his approach, I sent my military secretary to bring me intelligence of what he was going to do, and that officer finding from Captain Reid that the boats were all ready, and the fort of Nowrainee on the right bank deserted, and knowing my wishes in regard to Colonel Rowcroft's crossing, I having requested him to do so at Chupra, urged him to cross at once, which Colonel Rowcroft consented to do, and the passage being effected that very night, we were established on the right bank of the river. In the morning Brigadier Junga's Doje's Brigade crossed at Nowrainee, and Colonel Rowcroft's advancing with the united force, completely defeated the rebels in advance of Phoolpoor on the 20th, and thus secured the tête du pont and the peaceable passage of the river. I had the honor to forward Colonel Row-

croft's report of this very successful action in my letter No. 178 of this date.

15. At 12 o'clock on the 21st, the first boats having come up, were fixed in position, and by 12 o'clock at night on the 23rd, through the untiring exertions of Lieutenant Sankey, the Naval Brigade and all concerned, the bridge over this large and rapid river was reported ready.

16. On the morning of the 24th the Naval Brigade crossed to this side with Colonel Rowcroft, I having determined to leave it for the defence of Goruckpore; immediately afterwards a brigade passed across from this side, and then the stream of carts commenced and continued passing all night, completing it entirely in the course of to-day.

17. This morning the Maharajah and the third brigade passed over, leaving nothing on this side.

18. As soon as it was well manifest that the bridge was a fact, I sent orders to Captain Baring, with the concurrence of the Maharajah, to evacuate Belwa on the 24th, and come here in two marches. Captain Baring marched yesterday, and I expect him here in the course of the day, when, as his cattle will be too tired to cross the sand on this side of the bridge, he will remain for the night, and crossing early in the morning, form the rear guard of the army which marches to-morrow fourteen miles to Ukberpoor.

19. Having thus laid before his Lordship a short narrative of the events connected with the passage of the Gogra by the army of his Excellency Maharajah Jung Bahadoor, there remains only for me the pleasing duty of bringing to the notice of his Lordship the names of those officers to whom I am principally indebted for the success which has attended this difficult operation.

20. To Lieutenant Sankey, Engineer of the force, my best thanks and acknowledgments are due. The energy with which this officer engaged in his work, and the skill with which he built the bridge in the extraordinary short time of two days and a half, merit every commendation. I have the pleasure to inclose a copy of his report, in which he mentions honorably the exertions of Lieutenant Garnault of the engineers, and Lieutenant Mylne of the artillery, placed at his disposal for this duty, and he also praises the services of that excellent Goorkha officer, Colonel Lall Sing, of the Maharajah's artillery.

21. To Captain Reid's zeal and activity I am indebted for the collection of the fleet of boats, a work to which he brought great energy and experience. His services are elsewhere honorably mentioned both by Captain Sotheby and Colonel Rowcroft.

22. I have in other communications had the pleasure of bringing to the notice of his Lordship the names of those officers who distinguished themselves in the various actions which took place in the course of this operation, but I must again do myself the pleasure of mentioning the name of Captain Sotheby, Royal Navy, who was entrusted with the difficult and responsible duty of escorting the fleet up the river, a duty which he achieved in the most successful manner. I would also beg to acknowledge the services of the naval brigade in the construction of the bridge. It was principally through their agency that the work was completed so soon. I am likewise desirous of acknowledging the services of Captain Williamson of the Jumna steamer. She has thus far proved the navigability of the river, and she rendered good service in the attack on Chandepore.

23. I also beg to bring to the notice of his Lordship the services of my Military Secre-

tary, Lieutenant McAndrew. His exertions to complete the success of my plans have been indefatigable. I have had at times to employ him out of the sphere of his duties, and have always found him most valuable from the very commencement of the campaign.

SIR,

IN reporting for the information of Brigadier-General MacGregor the completion last night of the bridge over the Gogra, I beg to draw your attention to the following circumstances attending a work, which, though not very symmetrical, will I trust prove well adapted to the object in view, namely, the transferring of the naval brigade, under Colonel Rowcroft, from the right to the left bank, and the advance of his Highness the Maharajah's force, with guns and baggage, into Oude.

2. After the occupation of the village of Nowraimee on the night of the 19th instant, and the combat of Phoolpoor the following evening, the fleet of boats which had been so skilfully conducted up the stream from Deoree Burhul by Captain Reid, 37th Native Infantry, were enabled to take up their position near the village of Phoolpoor, which I had already selected with the General's approval as the most convenient site for the bridge.

3. The boats were numerous and of a very convenient size for manœuvring, viz., from 300 to 400 manuds burthen; they were well equipped, and each provided with a strong platform, which Captain Reid had seen to, during his stay at Deoree Burhul.

4. The superstructure for the roadway, with anchors, cables and gear of all kinds, being previously prepared, it merely required an exertion in placing the boats, fixing the material of the roadway, cutting ghauts to lead down to the river, with roads of approach on either bank, to establish quickly the communication between Goruckpoor and Oude.

5. The first boat was anchored a little before noon on the 21st instant, and the bridge reported open at midnight on the 23rd instant, thus occupying two and a half days in construction.

6. 49 boats were anchored in a stream of 300 yards in width, and running at 5 miles an hour. The bottom on the right bank being hard kunker rock, difficulty was found in getting the anchors to hold, but some of the naval brigade coming to my aid, all boats were in position the second evening.

7. To secure the bridge against the effects of high winds, and overcome difficulties of the current and bottom, several iron anchors passed up stream, and strong guy ropes from either shore, as well as from the steamer (which had been anchored in the middle of the stream for the purpose), to different points of the bridge.

8. The approach on the left bank lay over alternating loose and hard sand for about half a mile, and the road had to undergo a certain amount of preparation; in addition to cutting the ghaut leading down from the plain on which the camp was pitched.

9. On the right bank there was a little more

work, the road having to be made for a mile or more, but the ground being stiff clay, no difficulty was found in making a practicable road.

10. The valuable services of Captain Reid are well known to the Brigadier-General, and therefore need no comment from me, but I would beg to bring to the notice of the Brigadier-General the very valuable aid I have had from Lieutenant Garnault, of the engineers, and Lieutenant Mylne, of the artillery. Their labor has been unremitting both night and day in bringing the work to a satisfactory conclusion.

11. The Clashes, placed at my disposal by his Highness the Maharajah, have rendered the most efficient aid in keeping the communications perfect by a supply of jhowa when needed, and Colonel Lall Sing has been indefatigable in directing their labor.

I BEG that you will acquaint his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief that I had an affair with a body of about 300 rebels at a village called Jalimpore 7 miles hence, just across the Shah Gurh frontier.

2. The enemy were quite unaware of my approach till I was within a mile of them; they posted themselves in a village, with a densely wooded hill in their rear.

3. They opened fire on me with Zumbooruks, but after a few rounds from my guns, and seeing the infantry approach to storm the hill-side, they retired deliberately into the jungle.

4. The head-quarters of the 31st Native Infantry, under Major Hampton, and 150 of the Hyderabad Contingent Infantry, under Captain Hare, in skirmishing order, ran them through the jungle and on the hills, until they were totally dispersed and had lost their zumbooruks and plunder, together with their two loads of gunpowder. Some of the enemy were killed and our loss nothing.

5. By order of Major-General Sir H. Rose, K.C.B., I am now going to make a feint on Shahgurh and await further orders at Bamoie, the fourth march on the Calpee road from Saugor.

*Camp Rowneeah, near Daondpore,
March 4, 1858.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor-General, that when on the line of march, on the 26th ultimo, from Mobarukpoor to Ukberpoor, at as Maharajah Jung Bahadoor and myself were proceeding along the road, we were informed that at a fort near at hand, some 40 rebels were there.

2. The Maharajah remarked that they might rob the carts, and sent some of his body guard to see what they were. They rode up to the place and completely surprised them, and actually got into the place. The men inside proposed submission, and said they would lay down their arms in two ghurries (about forty minutes) if allowed that time to prepare. Unaccountably the Goorkahs fell into the trap, and left the place for that time, and on their return, reinforced by three companies, they were fired on, and several were killed and wounded.

3. The news of this reached us immediately after our arrival in camp, and the Maharajah first despatched his brothers, and subsequently in my company went himself back to the place, about six miles.

4. I have the pleasure to inclose the reports of the officers in charge of brigades present, as well as that of Lieutenant Sankey, Madras Engineers,, which will put his Lordship in possession of the style of place and the manner of its capture.

5. Previous to the arrival of the Maharajah, though I believe arrangements for an assault were made by Generals Ranodeep Singh and Dere Shumshere, yet no progress had actually been made. The arrival of his Highness gave a spur to the whole body. He immediately directed an assault, caused the bugles to be sounded, and in an hour after his arrival I accompanied him into the place.

6. I cannot speak too highly of the courage and gallantry shown by the officers and men engaged in this little, but desperate affair. The heavy list of casualties will show to his Lordship the strength of the defences, and the desperation with which they were held. It was manifest from this day's work that the Goorkhas were capable of anything in the way of an assault, when animated by the presence of the Maharajah, and I was very much pleased indeed with their demeanour throughout, for the service was really a trying one.

7. I beg to bring to the notice of his Lordship the excellent arrangements of Generals Ranodeep Singh, second in command, and Dere Shumshere, the Maharajah's brothers. Their dispositions insured the capture of the place, and prevented the escape of the enemy.

8. Brigadier Sunnuck Sing and Jodh Adhikaree were on the field, and greatly exerted themselves. Captain Edmonstone records the distinguished gallantry with which the former led on his men, who bore the brunt of the affair.

9. Colonel Koochun Sing, Lall Sing and Ramchunder Sing Allie, as well as Major Captain Balla Bahadoor Pandey and Rung Soor Bishtee, Jugga Bahadoor Gaitu, and Major Jungbeer Kooner Ranajee are also honorably mentioned.

10. The conspicuous gallantry of Lieutenant Sankey, Madras Engineers, was the admiration of every one. It was by his advice the gun was brought up which breached the wall, and he was the first man in the fort, followed by the rifle regiment, with Captain Edmonstone. The latter officer's conduct was most gallant and praiseworthy.

11. I am also indebted to Captain Baring, the senior officer present, in charge of a brigade, as well as to Captain Holland and Lieutenant Mylne of the Artillery, and Captain Lane, Lieutenant Cory, and Lieutenant Garnault, all of whom exerted themselves greatly.

12. Captain Brander, Deputy Assistant Commissary-General, was on the field, and opportunely set fire to the village at the only part of the fort where there was no bamboo hedge, thus preventing the escape of the rebels.

13. Dr. Chalmers's activity and attention to the wounded was most conspicuous.

Captain Baring to Captain MacAndrew, Military Secretary to Brigadier-General Macgregor, C.B.

SIR, *Camp Sultanpoor, March 2, 1858.*

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Brigadier-General Macgregor, C.B., that on the morning of the 26th ultimo, whilst on the march from Phoolpore to Ackberpore, with the brigade of which I have military charge, and which is commanded by Brigadier Jodabeer Adhikaree, instructions were received to detach a party (strength as per margin*) for the purpose of dislodging a body of insurgents entrenched at the village of Berozepore; this I am happy to say was satisfactorily effected, after a very obstinate defence, of which I subjoin the following particulars:—

On arriving in front of the enemy's position, I was reinforced by a portion of 1st Brigade (strength as per margin†) under the military charge of Captain Edmonstone, whose proceedings are annexed. The difficulty of our operations was materially increased by the enemy's position being completely surrounded by an impenetrable hedge of bamboos, which prevented our ascertaining the nature of the defences within. Under the circumstances, I deemed it expedient to suggest to the General, Dere Shumshere, that he should open with shell from the guns on the south side, sending a regiment out on each flank to prevent the escape of the enemy. After firing for some time, and finding that we made little or no impression on the position from its natural defences, we determined on altering our tactics, and moved up 3 guns to the east side. I now suggested to the General the propriety of pushing the men up to the place in extended order, under cover of the guns, with a view of taking it by assault. This plan was adopted, and at this juncture his High-

ness the Maharajah Jung Bahadoor arriving on the ground, his presence so stimulated the troops that they rushed on with a cheer, and succeeded in obtaining a lodging in the bamboo fence and trench within it. The assailing regiments finding that they were here unexpectedly opposed by a high wall and bastion, the necessity for bringing up a gun to bear on it became manifest, and accordingly, with great labour, a 6-pounder, from Major Jungbheer Koothur Ranajee's battery, was dragged through the outer fence of bamboos, and brought up to within a few yards of it. Five or six rounds having effected a partial breach, Lieutenant Sankey, Madras Engineers, followed by the men, carried the place by storm; it was then fired. Nothing could exceed the gallantry of all engaged, the Goorkhas charging with great bravery.

General Ramdeep Sing and Dere Shumshere were most assiduous in carrying out all concerted plans. Brigadier Jodheer Adhikaree behaved most gallantly throughout, as well as Lieutenant-Colonel Ramchunder Allie, commanding the Poorana Gooruck Regiment, and Major Captain Bulia Buhadoor Panday, commanding the 2nd company of the Singenath Regiment. Captain Edmonstone gallantly led the men of the rifle regiment into the entrenchment, and also afforded me valuable assistance during the day. I beg to bring his name prominently to the notice of the Brigadier-General, as well as that of Lieutenant Sankey, Madras Engineers, whose conspicuous bravery elicited the admiration of all. To Captain Holland I am deeply indebted for the activity he displayed, and the excellent practice made by the guns he had charge of. I annex his report.

I beg to bring the names of Captain Lane, Lieutenant Corey, and Second-Lieutenant Carnault, who assisted me throughout the day, and did good service in the entrenchment, to the Brigadier-General's notice, as well as that of Dr. Chalmers, the only medical officer present, whose activity in attendance on the sick, both within and without the entrenchment, was remarkable.

In conclusion, I beg to bring to the notice of the Brigadier-General all those officers mentioned in the 11th paragraph of Captain Edmonstone's letter, and 2nd paragraph of Captain Holland's.

Captain Holland to Captain Baring, in Military Charge, 2nd Brigade 1st Division, Goorkha Force.

Camp, Sultanpoor, March 2, 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to inform you that according to instructions received during the line of march from Phoolpore on the afternoon of the

† Rifle Regiment, Kalepershad Regiment, 2 companies Sooruj Dull Regiment, and 7 guns.

26th ultimo, three guns of the battery under my charge were detached with a portion of your brigade to attack the rebels at Berozepoor. On arriving near that village, I found the battery attached to Brigadier Sunnuck Sing's Brigade, under charge of Lieutenant Mylne; after a short consultation, the guns opened fire (chiefly with shells) on the south face of a dense bamboo tope, in which the rebels were said to be posted, at a distance of about 500 yards. After a few rounds I moved the 3 guns under my charge round to the east face of the tope, and opened fire, at about 200 yards, at a loop-holed wall, which appeared about 5 feet above the level of the ground; finding, however, after a short time, that from the nature of the defences, our fire was of little effect, it was resolved to carry the place by assault. Accordingly, after a short pause, and as soon as the skirmishers began to advance, I opened and continued a sharp fire from 3 guns, under cover of which a lodgment was effected within the outer bamboo enclosure and ditch; it was then discovered that there was an inner entrenchment and wall, which it was found necessary to breach. Accordingly, a 6-pounder gun was, with great difficulty, dragged through the bamboo fence and outer ditch, to within a few feet of the inner wall; after a few rounds, a breach was effected, through which the Goorkhas, headed by Lieutenant Sankey, Madras Engineers, poured in, and carried the place. Immediately after the first lodgment, I distributed portions of port fire and lighted slow match among the Goorkha riflemen, to set fire to the houses and bamboo tope on the west side; this was done almost simultaneously with the final assault.

2. In conclusion, I beg to state that I observed, with the utmost satisfaction, the precision of fire of the guns under Lieutenant Mylne, who makes particular mention of the professional services of Colonel Lall Sing, and Captain Bhyrut Bahadur, of the Nepalese Artillery, I also beg to bring to your favourable notice, the names of Major Jugheer Kooner, and Captain Indr Bheer Lama, of the Artillery under my charge.

February 27, 1858.

Sir,
UNDER instructions from the Brigadier-General, conveyed to me by yourself, I have the honor to report for his information, the circumstances that came under my notice in the assault and capture yesterday, of the small fortified position of Berozepore, Jumalpoore.

2. On the line of march, about 6 miles from Akburpore, at about 9 A.M., a report was brought from the rear to Brigadier Sunnuck Sing, commanding the brigade of which I am in military charge, that a small body of rebels had been discovered in a fortified position about a mile to the westward of the road along which we were advancing. With my concurrence, the Brigadier upon this gave orders for 3 companies of the rear regiment, the Kalee Pershad, to be detached, if possible, to capture or destroy the party, the remainder of the regiment was halted at that post, and the rest of the brigade continued its march.

3. A short time subsequently, five musket shots were heard from the direction of our right rear, and immediately afterwards, the brigade being distant about 3 miles from Akburpore, another

report was brought from the rear that the detached companies had received a severe check, and met with considerable loss. I immediately directed that the intelligence should be sent to the Maharajah, and galloped on myself to camp, to report the circumstances to the Brigadier-General.

4. Orders were then given that 1 regiment and 2 guns should be sent back to the assistance of the Kalee Pershad, and accordingly I found them on my return in position in an open plain in front of a thick clump of bamboos, apparently joining a tope of mangoe trees to the westward, a hut being visible here and there in both. Closer observation showed a fence of dry bamboos, under the green bamboos, and this, confirmed by the report of a villager who had joined us, was rightly conjectured to be the enemy's position, the rebels within it were said to be from 30 to 40 strong, which also was found to be quite correct.

5. Some delay here took place in consultation as to the best mode of attack, during which the rest of the brigade came up, and, simultaneously with it, Generals Runodeep Sing and Dere Shumshere—yourself joining us at the same time, with, I believe, 1 regiment and 3 guns. You then assumed charge of the operation, but as my brigade was principally concerned in them, I continue the report of what came under my own observation, confining myself, except when absolutely necessary for explanation, to the part taken in them by my own brigade.

6. About half-past 1, P.M., a part of the rifle regiment, the Kalee Pershad regiment, and 2 companies of the Sooraj Dall, with 7 guns, the portion of my brigade actually engaged, the remainder being absent on various guard duties, in all about 800 of all ranks, having been previously placed in skirmishing order on either flank of the village, leaving a party to protect the guns, they (the guns of my brigade, under the direction of Lieutenant Mylne) opened with round shot and shrapnell at a distance of about 350 yards from the southern face of the enemy's position; your 3 guns commencing firing at the same time on my right, about 150 yards further back.

7. After a few rounds, it was decided by the Generals above mentioned, with our concurrence, to move your 3 guns to a point about 300 yards from the enemy's position, immediately opposite its eastern face, which was there partially discernible, and in which the villager whom I had kept with me, declared the entrance to be. The flanking parties were then moved in accordance with our change of position, the guns again opened, and several rounds were fired as before, the guns being advanced from time to time, until they had attained to a distance of about 200 yards from the bamboos.

8. The proper moment having arrived, the Generals, with our concurrence, ordered the assault. The troops of my brigade, stationed as above, having advanced on all sides, as the guns moved on, were then closed up on their respective alignments, and the 2 companies of the Sooraj Dall being kept slightly in the rear as a support, the bugles for the advance sounded. The whole then advanced with a rush, loudly cheering. I stationed myself with the portion of the rifles in the centre, and on arriving at the bamboos, I saw immediately the great strength of the position. It was a small enclosure, barely 30 yards square, with high loop-holed walls, surrounded by a thick fence of green bamboos, rendered completely impervious by a screen of dry bamboos at its base, strongly fixed in the ground, on either side of which was a broad, deep ditch.

9. I went round three sides of the fortification, for it was nothing less, and although I found the

men most eager to get in, to do so at these points was impossible. I then returned to the eastern face, and found the men crowding into the inner ditch, having, with the greatest difficulty forced their way in single file through the bamboos, exposed to a galling fire from the loop-holes, from which they were suffering severely.

10. The only approach to the place, that mentioned by the villager, was at last discovered; at this spot a gun was then forced with great labour into a position within ten or twelve yards of the wall; another, a 12-pounder, belonging to my brigade, under the immediate direction of Colonel Lall Sing, and a third, were placed at right angles to the first one, and the cross-fire thus produced was attended with the happiest results. Lieutenant Sankey, of the Engineers, who had been on the ground the whole day, discovered a small breach made by the first gun; it ceased firing, he enlarged the opening with his hands until it was sufficiently large to admit his head and shoulders, forced himself through it, and was the first man inside; the gallantry of this act, which, as I was standing with him close under the wall, I was an eye-witness of, I venture to bring particularly to the notice of the Brigadier-General. I myself immediately followed the two first Goorkhas, I believe, who penetrated into the enclosure by a ladder which was placed against the wall close to me. I believe they belong to the Rifles, but I regret to say I have been unable to identify them since, as they were separated from me immediately afterwards by the mob. Our men then forced in, through the breach by the ladder and through a narrow opening, apparently the entrance to the place, but which only came half way down the wall, and the enemy (thirty-one bodies were subsequently counted) were all, I believe, instantly cut to pieces.

11. In conclusion, I have only to say that the men of my brigade engaged, behaved admirably throughout, as did all the Nepalese officers under my immediate observation, who carried out the very able directions of Generals Runodeep Sing and Dere Shumshere, with the greatest alacrity; but I may be permitted to particularize Brigadier Sunmuck Sing whose judgment throughout, as well as gallantry in leading his men, was conspicuous. Colonel Lall Sing, commanding the battery attached to my brigade, a most excellent artillery officer, Colonel Koolman Sing, commanding the Kalee Pershad Regiment, also displayed great gallantry, and Major Captain Rung Soor Bistee, who commanded the three companies of the Kalee Pershad, which were detached at first, and suffered so greatly, Lieutenant-Colonel Hurree Bukt, commanding the Rifles, and Major Captain Jugga Bahadoor Guttee, who commanded the two companies of the Sooraj Dall engaged, are also meritorious officers. Lieutenant Mylne rendered great service in directing the operations of the artillery. Annexed is a numeric list of the casualties in the several regiments in my brigade.

SIR,

HAVING been requested by Brigadier-General Macgregor to report on the small Gurree which was captured yesterday by the Maharajah's troops, I have the honor to submit the following concise description of the works, with a sketch plan, illustrating the subject as far as my limited time will permit.

2. Viewed from the outside nothing very suspicious or formidable was discoverable about the place. It had all the appearance of an ordinary clump of bamboos at the corner of a village, which latter, like all inhabited places in this part of the country, was very well screened in foliage. Some newly-planted bamboo slips, eight to ten feet high, all round the clump above mentioned, alone marked the place as differing from others, and on another occasion would be sufficient warning to induce caution in approaching what proved a very hedgehog of fortification.

3. The fort itself was a complete well surrounded by a ditch, more or less formidable; this again by a belt of high bamboos, which was succeeded by another ditch some ten or twelve feet deep; the row of bamboo slips above mentioned being planted on the immediate lip of the counterscarp of the latter.

4. The works were quite new as indicated by the steps left by the workpeople, as well as their being partially unfinished; they were situated on the south-east corner of the village. A well, inclosed by the outer line of ditch (within a sort of demi lune), lay on the east, and a pond not included in the works on the north. The only immediate entrance on the Gurree was on the pond side, the approach of it leading round the north-east bastion, and, curving round in a narrow thorny path, led out at the east of the well. Nothing could be more difficult of approach, every portion bristling with thorns, and intercepted by ditches and banks.

5. The mud ramparts of the fort were fifteen feet above the level of the ground, the upper portion, for about seven feet in height, consisting of a thin mud wall, was loop-holed in every direction; the lower part, as will be seen from the section in the sketch, being from ten to twelve feet thick, and furnishing a banquette for the defenders.

6. In plan the fort was some sixty feet square, with circular bastions at the angles, the banquette on all sides ten feet wide, having forty feet square for the enceinte, within which the defenders could retire when the fire became too hot and where were two thatched sheds. No steps led to the banquette, a common bamboo ladder being the only means of communication between it and the ground floor; when once, therefore, the defenders were driven from the upper works they were caught in a trap, from which it was impossible to extricate themselves.

7. It would be premature for me to express any very decided opinion as to the mode of attacking such forts from this single example, but two facts are apparent, first, that in cases where all openings are closed by bamboos and thorns, such must be got rid of by fire, or by being cut down;

and, second, the upper portion of the parapet which screens the defenders, must be destroyed by firing shot or shell against it with low charges. Hand grenades, two or three scaling ladders, with half a dozen shovels (fowrah) and pickaxes, with perhaps a small number of sand bags should, in all cases, accompany the attacking party.

SIR,

Dhana, March 5, 1858.

I HAVE the honor to report, that the moveable column under my command (consisting of detachments of corps as per margin)* arrived at the village of Dhana, at 8 o'clock this morning.

2. On my arrival I heard that the enemy was posted in force on the opposite bank of the Jumna at the village of Serowlee, whence they had been firing on the village of Dhana since daylight.

3. On reconnoitring their position I found that the heights and ravines leading from the town were strongly lined with skirmishers, parties of whom were also posted in villages on their flanks. A number of boats lay in the river immediately under the town.

4. I advanced the guns under a strong escort, and extended 2 companies of the 80th Regiment, under Brevet-Major Miller, to skirmish to our right and centre, a company of the 17th Madras Native Infantry, skirmishing to our left; these were supported by two companies of the 17th Madras Native Infantry, under Brevet-Major Gill, of that regiment; my reserve, under Captain the Honorable J. H. Browne, 80th Regiment, I left close to the village of Dhana.

5. On reaching the river's bank the skirmishers opened fire, and the guns, under Captain and Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel Cadell, Madras Artillery, getting into position, shelled the town of Serowlee, with considerable effect, setting fire to part of it.

6. The enemy opened with a heavy fire of galls and musketry, which, however, the long range of the rifles of the 80th Regiment soon checked, though they continued a dropping fire during the rest of the morning.

7. Not being able to procure boats to effect the passage of the river, I withdrew to my position at Dhana, at 10 A.M.

8. From information gathered, I reckon the enemy's force at about 1000 men, including a party of cavalry, which were distinctly seen riding off at speed. I am unable to form an estimate of their loss; but it must have been heavy; on our side I have to report the loss of

IN forwarding, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor-General, the report of Captain Plowden, the British officer in military charge of the advanced division of Maharajah Jung Bahadoor's army, under General Kurruk Bahadoor, of an action which took place on the 5th instant, at the Kandoo Nuddee, between the division and the rebel Nazim Mehndee Hoossein, resulting in the capture of the enemy's only gun, and the loss to him of nearly 600 killed, with casualties to the extent only of 1 killed and 16 wounded on our part, I have the honor to bring to the notice of his Lordship in Council the

extreme gallantry and good conduct of the officers and men engaged.

2. I would particularly bring to the notice of his Lordship the coolness and good management of General Kurruck Bahadoor, who, in most difficult ground, so admirably disposed his troops as to secure the splendid result above-mentioned. To Brigadier Run Sing and Junga Doje my best thanks are due, and they will doubtless merit the approbation of Government.

3. Colonels Luckmun Goonung, Teela Bickram Sing Tappah, Beemul Alie Jusdeen Sing, Purtimur Koer Ranajee, Sri Krishen Sohay, and Soorut Tappah, are favorably mentioned by Captain Plowden, as well as Major-Captains Runojal Sing Tappah, Soojun Singh, and Meerwan Singh, all of whom rendered active and excellent service.

4. Captain Plowden, who mentions the name of Lieutenant Aiteram Bishtah, for his distinguished gallantry, he having cut down 5 of the enemy.

5. My best thanks are due to Captain Plowden, for the sound and judicious advice which he gave regarding the disposition of the troops, as well as to Captain Lane, in military charge of Brigadier Junga Doje's brigade, and to Lieutenants Francis, Gibb, Bogle, Sankey, and Foote, attached to the force, as also to Lieutenant Owen, late 19th Native Infantry, who volunteered his services.

6. The medical officers, namely, Surgeons McClelland and Morton, and Assistant Surgeons Playfair and Gee, are favourably mentioned by Captain Plowden, as well as Mr. Forbes, Civil Service, and Serjeants Hone and King, of the Bengal Artillery.

Captain A. C. Plowden, in Military Charge of a Division Goorkha Force, to Captain MacAndrew, Secretary to Military Commissioner.

Sir, *Before Lucknow, March 11, 1858,*

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier-General MacGregor, C.B., particulars of an action in which the advanced division of the Goorkha force under my military charge, was engaged, on the 5th instant, against a force of the enemy, amounting to 4000 men, under the command of Nazim Mehndee Hoossein, which resulted in a loss to the rebels of nearly 600 killed, and the capture of 1 gun, whilst the casualties on our side were 1 killed and 16 wounded, 2 of the latter having since died.

2. Having received information that the rebels had taken up a strong position on the Kandoo Nuddee, and had erected a battery by the side of the bridge on the Lucknow road, for the purpose of disputing our passage; moreover, that they had advanced across the bridge, I proposed a plan of attack, which was approved of by General Kurruck Bahadoor, and successfully carried out.

3. The division, consisting of the strength as per margin,* advanced in quarter distance columns, at deploying distances, 5 regiments, forming the first line, and 2 on either flanks as a reserve.

4. On viewing the enemy, who was posted in detached parties extending from our left to right front, I halted the columns and deployed into line.

* 13 guns, 7 Regiments of Infantry; aggregate force, 3,800.

I was much deceived as to the nature of the ground between us and the enemy; what at first appeared to be level, with a few fields of cultivation in front of the Right Brigade, afterwards proved to be deep ravines, with bush jungle, though the ground in front of the left brigade was a plain facing the enemy's battery. At this point our guns opened; after a few rounds from the right, or Brigadier Run Singh Bahadoor's Brigade, which caused the enemy in front to retire into the ravines, the advance was sounded. The Right Brigade had scarcely advanced fifty yards, when the enemy opened a sharp fire of musketry from a jungle on our right front; presuming he was in greatest force in that direction, I requested Brigadier Run Singh Bahadoor to make an oblique movement in that direction, which at once brought him in contact with the rebels. The brigade rushed gallantly into the jungle with a loud cheer, formed a line of skirmishers, and forced the rebels to make a rapid retreat. The Goorkhas were quite at home in this mode of warfare; their pursuit was so rapid through the ravines that numbers of the rebels were very soon overtaken, shot, and cut down. Many instances of individual bravery on the part of the Goorkhas were brought to my notice; there were several who each cut down three or four of the enemy. The pursuit was followed up for two miles, when the enemy having disappeared through a thick jungle, the "assembly" was sounded, and we formed our camp on the Nuddee.

5. The part taken in the engagement by the left or Brigadier Junga Doje's Brigade, under the military charge of Captain Lane, is described by that officer, in a letter to my address, which, together with one from Lieutenant Gibb, in charge of the batteries of the division, are herewith annexed.

6. I have now the pleasure to record the meritorious services of the Nepalese officers. General Kurruck Bahadoor displayed great coolness and a generous confidence in my advice. Brigadier Run Singh Bahadoor, a smart and intelligent officer, led his brigade with great coolness and spirit, ably assisted by the following colonels of regiments:—Luckmun Goonung Kalee, Bahadoor Regiment; Teela Bickram Singh Tappah, Roodroo Doje Regiment; Beemul Alie, Nia Goonuck Regiment; and Captain Major Runojal Sing Tappah, Commanding Nursing Dull Regiment; also Colonel Jusdeer Sing, and Major Soojun Sing, commanding batteries. Captain Lane brings to my notice the services of Brigadier Junga Doje, and the following colonels commanding regiments in his brigade, viz.:—Colonels Purtimur Koer Ranajee, Sirmath Regiment; Sri Krishen Sohay, Junganath Regiment; and Soorut Tappah, Shumshere Dull Regiment; and Captain Meerwan Sing, Junganath Regiment, who, together with the non-commissioned officers and men of the division, merit the approbation of His Highness the Maharajah.

7. My best thanks are due to the British officers attached to the division, for the ready assistance I received from all in the field, and have great pleasure in submitting their names for favourable notice, viz.:—Captain Lane, in charge of Brigadier Junga Doje's Brigade; Lieutenants Francis, Gibb, in charge of the batteries of the division, Robertson, Bogle, who, though attached to the rear division, joined Lieutenant Gibb's batteries; Lieutenants Owen, late 19th Regiment Native Infantry, and Sankey, Madras Engineers; and Lieutenant Foote, attached to the advanced regiments of the Right Brigade; Surgeons McClelland, Morton, and Assistant-Surgeons Playfair and Gee, were unremitting in their attention to the wounded, both in the field and subsequently.

8. I cannot conclude without offering my best

thanks to Mr. Forbes, of the Civil Service; he was well to the front with a small party of sowars; his intimate knowledge of the country we have passed through, and accurate information he gathered, has been of great service.

9. Brigadier Run Sing Bahadoor has brought to my notice the gallant conduct of Lieutenant Aiteram Bishtah, of the Roodroo Doje Regiment, who cut down five of the enemy.

10. Lieutenant Gibb mentions for favourable notice the names of Serjeants Hone and King, Bengal Artillery.

Captain Lane to Captain Plowden, in Military Charge, 2nd Division, Ghoorka Force.

Camp Hydengurh, March, 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to furnish the following report of the part taken by the brigade under the command of Brigadier Junga Doje, to which I am attached in military charge, during the action with the enemy on the morning of the 5th instant.

After passing Mussafir Khand, about one mile and a half, on emerging from some mangoe groves upon an open plain, we perceived the enemy in our front occupying the banks of the Kandoo Nullah. The brigade was formed into line, and the guns advancing opened fire on the enemy, which was replied to by one gun in position on the opposite side of the Nullah, and a smart fire of matchlock men posted amongst the ravines on this side. The gun was soon silenced by the excellent practice of our guns, under the immediate superintendence of Lieutenant Gibb. The order for the general advance of the brigade was then given, one regiment being told off to remain in support of the guns, the brigade taking ground to the left, slightly turned the enemy's flank, and advancing rapidly across some open ground under a heavy fire, at once became engaged with the enemy among the ravines; from these they were soon driven with considerable loss across the Nullah into the heavy jungle on the opposite bank, and closely pursued by our men, were shot and cut down in large numbers.

General Kurruck Bahadoor seeing the enemy in full flight, keeping two companies for the protection of the guns, granted permission to the remainder of the regiment in reserve to join in the pursuit.

The pursuit was continued for some distance, when the men becoming much scattered from the denseness of the jungle, I deemed it expedient to advise the recall being sounded.

The troops returning to the bridge on the Lucknow road, took possession of the gun.

I beg to record the services of Brigadier Junga Doje, of Colonel Partimur Koer Ranajee, Commanding the Sirnath Regiment, of Colonel Sri Krishen Sohay, of the Junganath Regiment, of Colonel Soorut Tappah, of the Shumshere Dull Regiment. I am desirous that their conduct, as well as that of all the officers and men under them, should be brought to the favourable notice of His Highness the Maharajah.

I especially wish to mention the zeal with which Captain Meerwan Sing of the Junganath Regiment led his men to the attack.

Lieutenants Francis and Gibb, each in their own department afforded me every assistance, as did also Lieutenant Sankey, of the Madras Engineers.

My acknowledgements are also due to Lieutenant Owen, of the late 19th N. I. who kindly volunteered his services, and rendered me valuable assistance.

Lieutenant Bogle, of the Bengal Artillery, who arrived from the Head Quarter's Camp during the engagement, did good service.

Doctors Morton and Playfair were in constant attendance on the brigade, and all their arrangements met with my entire approbation.

Before concluding, I wish to bring to the favourable notice of the Brigadier General, the good conduct of Serjeants Hone and King, attached to the guns of the brigade, especially that of the former, through whose excellent practice the enemy's gun was so speedily silenced.

I am happy to report that notwithstanding the heaviness of the enemy's fire, not a single casualty occurred in the brigade.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier-General Macgregor C.B., the proceeding of the Nepalese Light Field Batteries (strength as per margin)* engaged in the action of yesterday, at the Kandoo Nuddee.

The batteries formed up in line in the centre, at 1000 yards, and came into action at a range of about 800 yards from the enemy's position. After a few rounds of round shot and shrapnell, the enemy's only gun was silenced, after which the infantry advanced rapidly.

Previously to the infantry advancing, 4 guns, under Colonel Jusdeer Sing, moved off to the right flank; owing to a deep dry nullah, a little in front of the centre guns, they could not be advanced further.

I hope you will bring to the notice of the Brigadier-General the efficient services of Colonel Jusdeer Sing, and Major Loojun Sing, commanding batteries, and of all the officers and men under their respective commands, also the ready assistance given to the Nepalese Artillery by Lieutenant A. Bogle, Bengal Artillery, and by Serjeants Hone and King, of the Bengal Artillery, who laid their guns very effectively, the former in particular, who, in two shots silenced the enemy's gun.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, forwarding copies of Orders recently issued by the Board of Health at that capital, and containing regulations to the following effect in respect to the quarantine to be observed by vessels entering the port of Lisbon.

In addition to the necessary drugs and means of purification and fumigation, quick-lime must be provided for coating such parts of the vessel as are not painted in oil, or covered with a material which can be washed.

The Health Officer at Belem will point out to the masters of vessels undergoing quarantine, the quantity and quality of drugs required for the necessary purposes of purification.

The Health Officer, for the convenience of masters of vessels subjected to a quarantine of observation, can order the discharge of the cargoes into the lazaretto, or into lighters.

The quarantine can be prolonged until the Health Officer shall consider the fumigation of the vessel complete.

The whiteliming and other purification required, will extend to vessels anchored off the Custom House, but will not, however, be allowed to affect the discharge of cargoes.

The quarantine for baggage will date from the

time of its purification in the lazaretto, and the cost of the drugs, &c., necessary for fumigation being borne by the owner of the baggage.

THE Port of Dublin Corporation hereby give notice, that a lighthouse has been erected on Ballinacourty Point, on the northern side of Dungarvan Bay, from which a *Light* will be exhibited on the night of the 1st of July, 1858, and thenceforth will be lighted during every night, from sunset to sunrise.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the light, by Mr. Halpin, Superintendent of Lighthouses.

Dungarvan Harbour Lighthouse is built on Ballinacourty Point, on the northern side of the entrance channel, in lat. $52^{\circ} 4' 27''$ N., and long. $7^{\circ} 33' 05''$ W., bearing from Carickapane Rock, N.N.W., distant 9 cables' lengths; from Helvick Head, N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ nautic miles; from Whitehouse Spit, E. by S., $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables' lengths.

The light will be *fixed*; visible from between the bearings of W. and S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.; coloured *green* from W. to N.W. b W.; will have a sector of *red* colour in the direction of the Carrickapane Rock; and in all other directions will be of the *natural appearance*; its focal plane is 58 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather the uncoloured *bright* light should be seen, from seaward, at a distance of about 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric of the 3rd order.

The tower is circular, of light gray limestone, 44 feet in height from its base to the top of ball over dome.

NOTE.—Mine Head *intermittent* Light, 4 miles distant, S.W. b W., from Helvick Head, marks the approach from the westward to Dungarvan Bay, and will be seen further eastward than the range of the Dungarvan Harbour Light.

In the entrance of Dungarvan Bay keep clear of the *red* colour of the light, to avoid the Carrickapane Rock; and on the northern side, keep outside the limits of the *green* colour of the light, to avoid Carrignagaddy, and the rocks which extend half-a-mile eastward of Ballinacourty Point.
