THE Port of Dublin Corporation hereby give notice, that a lighthouse has been erected on Ballinacourty Point, on the northern side of Dungarvan Bay, from which a Light will be exhibited on the night of the 1st of July, 1858, and thenceforth will be lighted during every night, from sunset to sunrise.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the light, by Mr. Halpin, Superintendent

of Lighthouses.

Dungarvan Harbour Lighthouse is built on Ballinacourty Point, on the northern side of the entrance channel, in lat. 52° 4′ 27" N., and long. 7° 33′ 05" W., bearing from Carickapane Rock, N.N.W., distant 9 cables' lengths; from Helvick Head, N. ½ E., distant ½ nautic miles; from Whitehouse Spit, E. by S., 3½ cables' lengths.

The light will be fixed; visible from between the bearings of W. and S.E. \(\frac{1}{2} \) S.; coloured green from W. to N.W. b W.; will have a sector of red colour in the direction of the Carrickapane Rock; and in all other directions will be of the natural appearance; its focal plane is 58 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather the uncoloured bright light should be seen, from seaward, at a distance of about 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric of the 3rd order.

The tower is circular, of light gray limestone, 44 feet in height from its base to the top of ball over dome.

Note.—Mine Head intermittent Light, 4 miles distant, S.W. b W., from Helvick Head, marks the approach from the westward to Dungarvan Bay, and will be seen further eastward than the range of the Dungarvan Harbour Light.

In the entrance of Dungarvan Bay keep clear of the red colour of the light, to avoid the Carrickapane Rock; and on the northern side, keep outside the limits of the green colour of the light, to avoid Carrignagaddy, and the rocks which extend half-a-mile eastward of Ballinacourty Point.
