

Thomas Samuel Wallis (commonly called and known as Doctor Thomas Wallis, sued as Thomas Wallis), formerly of No. 4, Priory-grove, Wandsworth-road, and then and now of No. 3, New Dorset-place, Clapham-road, both in the county of Surrey, Doctor in Music during the whole period, occasionally purchasing musical instruments on commission.

William Charles Mostram, of No. 3, Hope-cottage, Cottage-grove, Stockwell, previously of No. 4, Gloucester-road, Old Kent-road, before that of No. 147, Grange-road, Bermondsey, all in Surrey, Auctioneers' Clerk, and a portion of the same time out of employ, and formerly of Bury Saint Edmunds, Suffolk, Auctioneers' Clerk.

William Lait, late, previously, and formerly of No. 20, Judd-street, New-road, Middlesex, Commission Agent, and now a prisoner in the Debtors' Prison, London.

N.B.—1. Any creditor may attend and give evidence and produce witnesses. Opposition can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.

2. The petition and schedule, and all books, papers, and writings filed, will be produced by the proper Officer for inspection and examination until two clear days before the hearing.

3. Creditors' assignee may be chosen according to the Statute.

4. Persons indebted to the said Insolvent Debtors respectively, or having any of their effects, are to pay and deliver the same to the Official Assignee being the Provisional Assignee of the Court, at the said Court and to no other person.

Whereas it appears to the Court, by the record of Henry Noel, Esquire, Justice of the Peace for the said county of Rutland, made and certified to the Court by the said Justice of the Peace according to the said Act, that the said prisoner is of unsound mind, and therefore incapable of taking the benefit of the said Act in such manner as a person of sound mind might do; and whereas the petition of James Martin Wellington, on behalf of the said prisoner, hath been filed in the Court, it is ordered and appointed, that application shall be made to the Court for the discharge of the said prisoner, at the Court-House, in Portugal-Street, Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, on the 12th day of June, 1858, at the hour of Eleven in the Forenoon precisely, in order that the Court may proceed to the discharge of the said prisoner, if otherwise entitled thereto, according to the true intent and meaning of the said Act.

Smith), formerly of No. 1, Ball-alley, George-yard, Lombard-street, in the city of London, first having an office at No. 103, Fenchurch-street, City, and afterwards carrying on business at Globe-wharf, Lower Fore-street, Lambeth, Surrey, Corn and Flour Factor, and late of No. 43, Guildford-place, Kennington-lane, Surrey, carrying on business as a Corn Factor and Coal Merchant, at Globe-wharf, aforesaid, as Agent on Commission for William Anderson Courtier, under the style of Smith and Courtier, having a Stand at the Corn-exchange, Mark-lane, City, also Travelling on Commission.

James Green, formerly of No. 22, Upper North-place, Gray's Inn-road, then of No. 6, King's-terrace, Bagnigge Wells-road, both in Middlesex, then of No. 73, Free-school-street, Horsleydown, Southwark, Surrey, Clerk to a Bookseller, then of No. 334, Oxford-street, during part of such time, Bookseller's Clerk, and at the same time carrying on business under the style of Green and Company, as Booksellers, Law and General Stationers, and Account Book Manufacturers, then of the same place, carrying on the last-named business only, under the style aforesaid, and late of No. 37, Tottenham court-road, both in Middlesex, in no business or employment.
