The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the Common Fund in the said Act mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the First Schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same Schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the lands and premises, tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, and other hereditaments, particularly described in the Second and five following Schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this Scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, that the land described in the Second Schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the district of Saint Mary Boongate, in the county of Northampton and diocese of Peterborough; that the land described in the Third Schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and

become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the parish of Wolvey, in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester; that the land described in the Fourth Schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the district chapelry of All Saints, Child's Hill, Hendon, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London; that the land described in the Fifth Schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of Godmersham, with the chapelry of Challock annexed, in the county of Kent and diocese of Canterbury; that the tithes, or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, described in the Sixth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llansaintffraid, commonly called Llansaintffraid yn Mèchan, in the county of Montgomery and diocese of Saint Asaph, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Llansaintffraid or Llansaintffraid yn Mèchan, and that the same tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last mentioned shall be and be deemed to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of twenty pounds now payable by us to the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Llansaintffraid yn Mèchan, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the fifteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight; that the tithes, or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, described in the Seventh Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llangranog, in the county of Cardigan and diocese of Saint David's, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Llangranog; and we further recommend and propose, that all our estate and interest in the land described in the Eighth Schedule hereunto annexed shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the parish of Wolsingham, in the county and diocese of Durham.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit, when there shall be sufficient means for that purpose; and

that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice or church, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein or in any other Scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

THIRD SCHEDULE.

FOURTH SCHEDULE.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of April, in the year

one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following ; that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parishes of Llanfihangel y Traethau, Llandecwyn, and Llanfrothen, in the county of Merioneth and in the diocese of Bangor.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the said parishes of Llanfihangel y Traethau, Llandecwyn, and Llanfrothen, respectively hereinafter mentioned and described, should be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England by Louisa Jane Oakeley, of Plas Tanybwch, in the county of Merioneth, Widow, upon an understanding that the annual payment hereinafter mentioned should be made by us to the minister or incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall be appointed and licensed, and to his successors ministers or incumbents thereof for the time being, and so soon as such district shall have become, under the provisions of the herein secondly named Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the said new parish.

"And whereas by a deed bearing date the twelfth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and made or expressed to be made between the Reverend John William Trevor, Clerk, M.A., Treasurer of the Cathedral Church of Saint Daniel in Bangor, in the county of Carnarvon, of the first part, the said Louisa Jane Oakeley, of the second part, David Williams, of Bron Eryri, in the said county of Merioneth, Esquire, of the third part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fourth part, which deed is enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery at Westminster, a clear annual sum of thirty pounds has (inter alia) been granted and secured to the minister or incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as a church shall have been erected and consecrated therein, and a minister or incumbent appointed thereto, and to his successors ministers or incumbents thereof, and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, by means of a rentcharge charged upon and payable out of the tithes, commutation rentcharges, or sums of money arising out of lands situate in the said parishes of Llanfihangel y Traethau and Llandecwyn, forming part of the endowments of the trusteeship of the said Cathedral Church of Saint Daniel in Bangor.

"And whereas arrangements are now in progress for the provision of a church to be appropriated and used as and for the church of the said district or new parish, and also of a house of residence for the minister or incumbent thereof, and sites or a site for such church and house of

residence have been given by the said David Williams.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us by the said John William Trevor, Louisa Jane Oakeley, and David Williams, and it appears to us to be expedient that in consideration of the premises the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto, should be assigned to the said Louisa Jane Oakeley, her heirs and assigns, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Christopher Bishop of Bangor, testified by his having signed and sealed this Scheme, that all those parts of the said parishes of Llanfihangel y Traethau, Llandecwyn, and Llanfrothen respectively described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Penrhyn.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the rentcharge of thirty pounds granted by the said deed of the twelfth day of August last past shall be perpetuated and confirmed, and that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the said secondly named Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes then of the said new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or incumbent as aforesaid ; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or incumbency of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount so payable by us shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or incumbent making the vacancy or his personal representatives, and the minister or incumbent succeeding to such district or new parish ; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or incumbent of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum any land, tithe, or other hereditament of equal value at the least should be conveyed or secured to such minister or incumbent and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other Scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and absolutely

vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Louisa Jane Oakeley, her heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

#### " SCHEDULE

" The District of PENRHYN, being—

" All those parts of the parishes of Llanvihangel y Traethau and Llandecwyn, in the county of Merioneth, and in the diocese of Bangor, lying to the north of the river or estuary called or known as Traeth Bach, and also all that part of the parish of Llanfrothen, in the same county and diocese, lying to the south-west of an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary between the last-named parish and the parish of Llanvihangel y Traethau, in the middle of the high road leading from Llanfrothen to Penrhyn, and thence extending northward along the middle of the said road to a point opposite to the southern boundary of the farm called or known as Ty Mawr, and near a public well; and thence extending in the same direction along the boundary between the aforesaid farm of Ty Mawr and the farms called or known respectively as Ty Fry, Cae Merched, and Hendre Heunyd, to the base of the hill called or known as Hirynys; and thence continuing in the same direction along the north-eastern side of the last-named hill, at its base to the water of Traeth Mawr, near to Ynysceiliog."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, been delivered or transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the said parishes of Llanvihangel y Traethau, Llandecwyn, and Llanfrothen respectively, and no objection has been made thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bangor.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Smannel, in the parish of Andover-with-Foxcott, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Smannel aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those parts of the said parish of Andover-with-Foxcott, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Smannel-with-Hatherden.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: provided always, that the said fees to be so received as aforesaid, shall be reserved for and paid over to the Reverend Charles Henry Ridding, incumbent of the said parish of Andover-with-Foxcott, during such time as the said Charles Henry Ridding shall remain such incumbent.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All those parts of the parish of Andover-with-Foxcott, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, which are comprised within the boundaries of the hamlets of Swanhill, otherwise Smannel, Enham Kings, Little London, Woodhouse, Wildhern, and Hatherden."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Smannel, in the parish of Andover-with-Foxcott, in the county of Southampton, to be called "The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Smannel-with-Hatherden," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Com-

missioners, with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

"And with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being:

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such

(No. 36.) IRELAND.—SOUTH AND EAST COASTS.

*Fixed Light in Dungarvan Bay.*

THE Port of Dublin Corporation has given notice, that on and after the 1st of July, 1858, a harbour light will be exhibited all night from the lighthouse recently erected on Ballinacourty point, on the northern side of Dungarvan Bay, south coast of Ireland.

The light will be *fixed*, and visible between the bearings, from a vessel, of W. and S.E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  S. It will show *green* bearing from West to N.W. by W., and *red* in the direction of Carrickapane rock, but in all other directions it will be *white*. The light will be placed at an elevation of 52 feet above the level of the sea at high water, and its *white* appearance should be seen from seaward at a distance of about 10 miles in clear weather.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses, of the third order.

The light tower is circular, of light gray limestone, 44 feet in height, and stands in lat.  $52^{\circ} 4' 27''$  N.; long.  $7^{\circ} 33' 5''$  west of Greenwich, with Helvick Head S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles; Carrickapane rock S.S.E. 9 cables' lengths; and Whitehouse Spit W. by N.  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cables' lengths.

Directions.—The intermittent light on Mine Head, S.W. by W. 4 miles from Helvick Head, marks the approach from the westward to Dungarvan Bay, and can be seen farther eastward than the range of Dungarvan harbour light.

A vessel in the entrance of Dungarvan Bay must keep clear of the red colour of the light to avoid Carrickapane rock; and on the northern side of the bay keep to the southward of the green

This buoy, which is placed as a guide to vessels taking the channel between the Butter Pladdy and the main, lies in 5 fathoms at low water, with South Rock lighthouse N.E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E.; North Rock beacon N.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.; Kerney point North; and St. Patrick rocks perch S.W. by W.

(No. 37.) **BALTIC—COAST OF PRUSSIA.**

*Fixed Light at Swinemünde.*

THE Department of the Interior of Prussia has given notice, that a light is exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on the eastern side of the harbour of Swinemünde, or port of Stettin, at the mouth of the river Oder, in the Baltic sea.

The light is a *fixed white* light, placed at an elevation of 211 feet above the sea, and visible from E. by S. round northerly to S. by W. It should be seen in ordinary weather from the deck of a vessel at a distance of 21 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, by Fresnel lenses, of the first order.

The light tower is built of yellow brick, and is a prominent landmark from the offing. It bears due south, distant rather more than a mile from the harbour light on the east mole head, and stands in lat.  $53^{\circ} 54' 59''$  North; long.  $14^{\circ} 17' 38''$  east of Greenwich.

Directions.—When the state of the weather prevents pilots from going to sea, and yet it is possible for vessels to enter the harbour of Swinemünde, if desirable to attempt it, a red flag will be hoisted on the signal beacon on the eastern harbour pier.

In this case the new lighthouse must be steered for, bearing S. by E., which will lead to the outermost *black and white striped* buoy (called a roads buoy) at a distance of nearly a mile from the east pier head. From this the two beacons, one in the middle of the east pier, and the other on the eastern downs or sand hills, will appear in line about S.S.E., and kept so, will lead the vessel into the harbour, along the pier at half a cable off (leaving all *white* buoys on the starboard hand), as far as the second lighter bridge of the east pier, at 4 cables' length above the lantern beacon.

At this point, where the vessel must be kept a little to the southward with the least possible headway, the pilot-boat will be in attendance with the pilot.

Should the buoys have been carried away, or

removed owing to the lateness of the season, the vessel's course will be directed by the red flag from the signal beacon being inclined pointing towards the side to which she is to steer, and when the flag is kept upright the course is not be altered.

Should there be no pilot-boat out, and the red flag is not hoisted on the signal beacon, the vessel must not attempt the port, but continue at sea.
