REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S
LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty

at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come, to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock* on the day but one *previous* to each Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to the Queen; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

May it please your Majesty,

The gracious letter with which your Majesty has been pleased to honour this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, has been received by us with profound respect.

We can never cease to remember the gratifying terms in which your Majesty has annually assured our predecessors and ourselves, of the constant and undiminished interest hitherto taken by our beloved Sovereign in our National Church, and it cannot fail to be encouraging to us to be reassured of the continuance of the cordial good will and friendly spirit still animating your Majesty

with a firm determination to uphold and secure to this ecclesiastical establishment the full enjoyment of all its rights and privileges, and to watch, with pleasure and with care, over its liberties and its interests.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, inclosing copy of a French Imperial Decree authorizing the negotiation in France of Foreign Railway Shares, and of which the following is a translation:

Art. 1.—The negotiation at the Paris and Provincial Bourses, of Shares issued by Railway

Companies on account of railways constructed beyond the French territory, is regulated by the laws and regulations applicable to the negotiation of French securities of a similar nature, subject, however, to the conditions mentioned in the following Articles:

Art. 2.—The Companies must prove that they are constituted in conformity with the laws of the country where they are formed.

For this purpose they must remit to the Minister of Finance, and to the Syndical Chamber of Share Brokers (Agents de Change), authentic copies of:—

1st. The authorised public acts by which their formation has been sanctioned, and which have empowered them to construct a railway or railways.

2nd. The statutes, statements of special conditions (cahiers de charges), and in general all the documents by which they have been regulated or modified.

Art. 3.—The Companies are obliged to show that their shares as also their bonds, if they have issued any, are officially recognised (estées) in the country to which the railways belong.

Art. 4.—The shares must not be of less than 500 francs. All those which have been issued should be paid up to the extent of seven-tenths.

They will not be authentically placed upon the list of the French Bourses until they have given rise to operations sufficiently numerous for their course to be appreciated.

Art. 5.—The bonds can be negotiated and quoted in France when the capital (capital social), or that portion of such capital which is represented by shares shall have been paid up, and the issue in France of such bonds shall have been authorised by the Ministers of Finance, of Agriculture, of Commerce, and of Public Works.

Art. 6.—It is forbidden to any sharebroker to assist to negotiate the shares of foreign Companies previous to their being admitted by the Syndical chamber of Sharebrokers as negotiable.

It is equally prohibited before such admission has been signified, either to publish the course of these shares in France, or to announce subscriptions open in France for shares and bonds of foreign Companies.

Art. 7.—Nothing is to prejudice any authorization granted previously to the promulgation of this decree.

CRIMEAN AND BALTIC MEDALS.

AGENTS OF TRANSPORTS IN THE BLACK SEA AND BALTIC.

*Department of the Accountant-General
of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have been pleased to take a favourable view of the claims of the Officers who served as agents for transports during the late war, with reference to their having awarded the Crimean and Baltic Medal. Such Officers therefore as served as agents for transports in the Black Sea, between the 14th September, 1854, and the 9th September, 1855, or who served in the Baltic, during the operations in that sea in the years 1854 and 1855, should make application to the Accountant-General of the Navy (producing a certificate of identity, and specifying the period during which they were employed in the Black Sea or in the Baltic, as the case may be), when if their claims be satisfactorily established, the medal will be awarded to them.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the Decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers of Her Majesty's Army, who have been recommended to Her Majesty for that Decoration, in accordance with the rules laid down in Her Majesty's Warrant of the 29th of January, 1856, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in the Crimea during the late War, as recorded against their several names; viz.:

Regiment or Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
2nd Dragoons	... Serjeant Henry Ramage Date of Act of Bravery, 26th October, 1854	For having, at the battle of Balaklava, galloped out to the assistance of Private McPherson, of the same Regiment, on perceiving him surrounded by seven Russians, when by his gallantry he dispersed the enemy, and saved his comrade's life. For having, on the same day, when the Heavy Brigade was rallying, and the enemy retiring, finding his horse would not leave the ranks, dismounted and brought in a prisoner from the Russian lines. Also for having dismounted on the same day, when the Heavy Brigade was covering the retreat of the Light Cavalry, and lifted from his horse Private Gardiner, who was disabled from a severe fracture of the leg by a round shot. Serjeant Ramage then carried him to the rear from under a very heavy cross fire, thereby saving his life, the spot where he must inevitably have fallen having been immediately afterwards covered by the Russian cavalry.
3rd Regiment, late of the 80th Regiment	Brevet-Major Mark Walker Date of Act of Bravery, 5th November, 1854	For having, at Inkerman, distinguished himself in front of his Regiment, by jumping over a wall, in the face of two battalions of Russian infantry, which were marching towards it,—for the purpose of encouraging his comrades by his example to advance against such heavy odds,—which they did, and succeeded in driving back both Battalions.
57th Regiment	... Colour - Serjeant George Gardiner Date of Acts of Bravery, 22nd March and 18th June, 1855	For distinguished coolness and gallantry upon the occasion of a sortie by the enemy, and when he was acting as Orderly Serjeant to the Field-Officers of the trenches,—Left Attack upon Sevastopol,—in having rallied the covering parties which had been driven in by the Russians, thus regaining and keeping possession of the Trenches. Also, for unflinching and devoted courage in the attack on the Redan, on the 18th June, 1855, in having remained, and encouraged others to remain in the holes made by the explosion of shells, from whence, by making parapets of the dead bodies of their comrades, they kept up a continuous fire until their ammunition was exhausted, thus clearing the enemy from the parapet of the Redan. This was done under a fire in which nearly half the officers, and a third of the Rank and File of the Party of the Regiment were placed <i>hors de combat</i> .
Late of 6th Dragoons	... Surgeon James Mouat, C.B., (now Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals) Date of Act of Bravery, 26th October, 1854	For having voluntarily proceeded to the assistance of Lieutenant-Colonel Morris, C.B., 17th Lancers, who was lying dangerously wounded in an exposed situation after the retreat of the Light Cavalry at the battle of Balaklava, and having dressed that officer's wounds in presence of, and under a heavy fire from the enemy. Thus, by stopping a serious hemorrhage, he assisted in saving that officer's life.

Regiment or Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Royal Engineers ...	Captain Howard Craufurd Elphinstone Date of Act of Bravery, 18th June, 1855	For fearless conduct, in having, on the night after the unsuccessful attack on the Redan, volunteered to command a party of volunteers, who proceeded to search for and bring back the scaling ladders left behind after the repulse; and while successfully performing this task, of rescuing trophies from the Russians, Captain Elphinstone conducted a persevering search, close to the enemy, for wounded men, twenty of whom he rescued and brought back to the Trenches.
Royal Engineers ...	Colour - Serjeant Henry McDonald Date of Act of Bravery, 19th April, 1855	For gallant conduct, when engaged in effecting a lodgment in the enemy's Rifle Pits, in front of the Left advance of the Right Attack on Sevastopol; and for subsequent valour, when, by the Engineer Officers being disabled from wounds, the command devolved upon him, and he determinately persisted in carrying on the sap, notwithstanding the repeated attacks of the enemy.
Royal Engineers ...	Colour-Serjeant Peter Leitch Date of Act of Bravery, 18th June, 1855	For conspicuous gallantry in the assault on the Redan, when, after approaching it with the leading ladders, he formed a caponnière across the ditch, as well as a ramp, by fearlessly tearing down gabions from the parapet, and placing and filling them until he was disabled from wounds.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant, under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and, from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And whereas it is expedient that regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom, and the islands of Martinique, Guadeloupe, and Curaçoa respectively (direct or through any foreign country), there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform British rate of six pence.

And we direct that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between the said islands of Martinique, Guadeloupe, and Curaçoa or any of them, and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom (whether through any colony or foreign country or not), there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, the rates of British postage following (that is to say),

For the conveyance of every such letter between the islands of Martinique, Guadeloupe, and Curaçoa, or any of them and any part of the United Kingdom, a rate of sixpence; and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage, as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country.

And we direct that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we direct that in all cases in which any letter in respect of which any rate of postage is chargeable by this Warrant shall pass through a foreign country, any foreign postage payable thereon shall be charged and paid thereon in addition to the British postage.

And we further direct that nothing in this Warrant contained shall in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege granted by the said recited Act, in favour of petitions and addresses forwarded to Her Majesty by the post, nor the privilege granted by the same Act to members of each House of Parliament to receive by the post petitions and addresses to Her Majesty and petitions addressed to either House of Parliament, not exceeding thirty-two ounces in weight exempt from postage; nor shall anything in this Warrant contained in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company, now by law enjoy of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

And we further direct that nothing in this Warrant contained shall be deemed and construed to extend to any letters or packets posted in or addressed to France, or any foreign country through France, and transmitted between France or foreign countries through France, and the islands of Martinique, Guadeloupe, and Curaçoa, or either of them, all of which last-mentioned letters and packets shall be charged and chargeable with the same rates of postage as if this Warrant had not been signed.

And we further direct that the term "by the post," used in this Warrant, shall, as to the sea conveyance, include the conveyance by any British packet boat, and the said term shall also include the sea conveyance by any private ship.

And we further direct that this Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of July, 1858.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant duly made at any time hereafter, to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
