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THE following papers have been received at the East India House.

No. 1.

Major-General H. G. Roberts, Commanding Rajpootana Field Force, to the Adjutant-General of the Army, Bombay.

Camp before Kotah, April 7, 1858.

SIR,

No. 97.

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the successful assault of Kotah, on the 30th of March last, by the troops I have the honor to command. I arrived with the 1st Brigade, opposite Kotah, on the morning of the 22nd ultimo, and encamped to the westward, on the left bank of the Chumbel. The 2nd Brigade and siege train joined in the evening; the 13th Native Infantry, under Captain Adams, had joined the previous evening, having made forced marches to do so.

2. A reconnoissance having been made, it was determined by the Commanding Engineer, that two batteries should be erected on this side the river, one near the village of Sukkutpore, and the other at Kennaree; the object was to keep down the fire of some of the enemy's guns, which enfiladed the ferry, and, by high elevation, threw round-shot into my camp; these batteries were completed and opened fire on the morning of the 24th.

The enemy were 6000 in number.

3. On the 26th instant, I sent 200 men of Her Majesty's 83rd, and the Rifle Company of the 13th Regiment Native Infantry, under command of Lieutenant-Colonel Heatley, of the former regiment, into the portion of the town held by the Maha Rao, who, since my arrival, had, on two successive mornings, been assaulted by the rebels, and an attempt made by them to carry the place by escalade. I have to thank Lieutenant-Colonel Heatley for the able manner in which he commanded this detachment, and the service it rendered up to the time of the assault, and beg to bring Colonel Heatley's services, on this account, prominently to his Excellency's notice. On the 28th I was joined by the Belooch Horsemen, under Lieutenant Macauley.

4. On the 28th, the position of the left battery was changed to the left of the village of Kenaree. Late on the evening of this day, Her Majesty's 8th Hussars arrived, under Lieutenant-Colonel De Salis.

5. On the 27th and 28th, two 12-pounders and six 8-inch mortars were, by the indefatigable

labour of the artillery officers and men, aided by working parties of infantry, got into position in the town. A slack fire of two shots per hour from each piece, at certain points named, was opened from these guns; and, towards evening, a large magazine of the enemy, followed by several smaller ones, was exploded.

6. Up to this time, a strong fire had been kept up on the Rajah's quarter of the town by the enemy.

7. On the morning of the 30th, quick firing was commenced from all the guns and mortars, and continued till about $\frac{1}{2}$ -past 11 A.M., when, all being reported ready, the firing ceased by signal, and the troops, who had been passed over the river in the morning, told off into their respective columns of assault, entered the rebels' quarter through the Khetonepole gate. The 1st column, as per margin,* under Brigadier Parke, led; they at once wheeled off to the right, and on reaching the Futteydar bastion, they wheeled to the left, thus outflanking and turning all the enemy's guns in position, in the various streets leading directly towards the defences occupied by us.

8. Brigadier Parke then continued his march as directed, on the Joorawan Boorz, the broad ramp of which I had the gratification of seeing the detachment of his noble regiment ascending, under command of Major Thellusson, as steadily as on parade.

The enemy, on his nearing the top, ran for it, or let themselves down by ropes, abandoning 3 guns to the Brigadier, who moved rapidly on, turning again to his left, to the Soorujpole gate, which, after slight resistance, he also occupied, with its large bastions, on which were 3 more large guns. Brigadier Parke had thus outflanked, and at length taken the enemy's position in this portion of the city in reverse; and, on finding this, and on the steady advance into the heart of the city of the 2nd column,† under Lieutenant-Colonel Holmes, who followed the 1st column till he reached the 3rd bastion from the Futteydar bastion, and then turned to his left for the Soorujpole gate, and of the 3rd column,‡ under Lieutenant-Colonel Raines,

Her Majesty's 95th Regiment, the enemy made off in every direction in which they could see a chance of escape.

9. Many were shot and bayoneted; many escaped by letting themselves down by ropes from the walls, and others threw themselves over, and were dashed to pieces. Some occupied houses, and fought till slain. Lieutenant-Colonel Holmes, finding that Brigadier Parke had possession of the Soorujpole gate and Joorawan bastion, both considered the keys of the place, with marked spirit and energy pushed on, and took a number of guns, particularly those in a detached work called the Futtay ghurree; and entering through the gate from the Rampoor division of the town, took the Lalpoora gate. The reserve,* under Brigadier Macan, was pushed along to the left, and went on gallantly, till it communicated with Colonel Holmes's column at the Rampoor gate.

10. By half-past 2 p.m., Kotah was completely in our hands. I left in the afternoon sufficient troops in the city, and at the gates, to secure our success, and withdrew the remainder to our camp.

11. From several explosions of powder our loss has been more than I had expected. I may, however, be permitted to congratulate his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief on the smallness of it, when compared with the magnitude of the work to be accomplished. The gallantry of the troops, European and native, and good judgment of the officers in command of the columns, greatly tended to this.

12. I beg to bring to his Excellency's notice the immense aid I received from Major Tremehere, commanding Engineers, and of Captain Cumberland, and the officers of Her Majesty's and the East India Company's Engineers, and Sappers and Miners. The work of the Artillery has been almost beyond belief, Lieutenant-Colonel Blake commanding up to noon 29th inst.; Captain Aitken and Petrie, and Lieutenant Brown, with their officers under them, deserve the highest praise. There being no reserve artillerymen, I was obliged to take men from the Horse Artillery and Field Batteries; and Lieutenant-Colonel Price, of the Royal Artillery, who arrived and took command on the 29th, and to whom I am much indebted, informs me that the men working the siege guns had been on duty without intermission for 36 and 48 hours.

13. To Major Wray, Field Commissary of Ordnance, my most especial thanks are due for the uninterrupted hard work and the energy he has displayed throughout. The several Brigadiers have conveyed to me their marked approbation of their Staff Officers.

14. The superintendence of the Medical Department, under Doctor Burn, and the arrangements for the Field Hospital, under Field-Surgeon Hockin, were very satisfactory.

15. The Commissariat, under that able officer, Captain Lucas, left me nothing to desire. His arrangements have been most complete throughout.

16. The able and ever ready assistance afforded me by my personal Staff, I have most thankfully to acknowledge. The nature of the operations required much energy and exertion from them all; it was unsparingly given, and I would beg to bring to his Excellency's most favourable notice the names of Captain Hardy, Assistant Adjutant-General, Captain Ballard, C.B., Assistant-Quartermaster-General, and Lieutenant Newall, my aide-de-camp, all of whom were nearly the whole day engaged in the city with the columns conveying

my orders. I should not omit to bring to his Excellency's favourable notice the good services rendered by Lieutenant Heathcote, Deputy Assistant-Quartermaster-General.

I need hardly say that the arrangements for crossing the river, and march of the columns through the Rajah's part of the town, were so good that no confusion occurred of any sort. I must not omit a conspicuous act of gallantry performed by Lieutenant Cameron, Her Majesty's 72d Highlanders, reported by Brigadier Parke, as having headed an attack up a narrow entrance of a house, defended by a party of desperate men, two of whom he slew, and was himself desperately wounded.

17. My escort, composed of a party of Guzerat Irregular Horse, under a most able native officer, Meer Mahomed Ally, did me good service.

18. Above 400 of the enemy were killed, and numbers of prisoners taken, some of whom have been tried and executed; others await trial.

19. The conduct of the detachments of native infantry, of the 10th, 12th, and 13th Regiments, deserve the highest praise.

20. I regret there was no opportunity for the Cavalry to distinguish themselves in these operations; but the 1st Lancers, under Captain Anderson, detachment of the 2nd Cavalry, under Captain Simpson, and Scinde Horse, under Major Malcolm Green, the whole under the direction of Lieutenant-Colonel Owen, have shown the best spirit throughout, and performed the harassing duties of outpost and patrol in a manner to have earned my warmest thanks. They are now joined by a squadron of Her Majesty's 8th Hussars and Colonel Blake's Troop of Horse Artillery, in pursuit of the enemy, and, should opportunity offer, I have no doubt of having the gratification of reporting a splendid result.

21. As the first object of attack was to seize the Joorawan bastion and Soorujpole gate, I had placed the Cavalry at Gaumuchford to watch the only outlet, namely, the Lalpoora gate; but the rebels had in the morning taken their moveable guns out at the Soorujpole gate, many accompanying them, and, when they saw how the day went, they fled. These two gates, two miles apart, are separated by a belt of thick jungle, stretching out for many miles, quite unfit for cavalry manœuvres, and, moreover, entirely secured the enemy from view.

22. I cannot close this despatch without tendering to Brigadier-General Lawrence, Officiating Governor-General's Agent in Rajpootana, who accompanied me from Nusseerabad, and was with me during the assault, my best thanks for the unwearied aid afforded me by him. I would also beg to bring to most favourable notice the services of Captain Macdonald and his corps of Meenas, who joined me on the march. They have most willingly made themselves useful in many ways, guarding baggage, escorting prisoners, and, as working parties, have elicited the admiration of both Engineer and Artillery Officers observant of them. They were at the Pattunpole gate, and most eager to be employed in the assault, had I required their services on that duty.

23. I beg to enclose a list of casualties and return of captured Ordnance. The latter has subsequently been found not complete; a supplementary return shall be forwarded.

24. A more accurate plan shall be forwarded directly the Engineers have completed their survey now proceeding.

SIR,

WITH reference to my hurried report, dated 12th instant, informing you of the entire defeat, on the 11th instant, of the insurgent chiefs at Amba Pawnee, where a large number of their followers were attacked by a portion of the field force under my orders, and driven from a strong and well-chosen position, the approaches to which, excepting from one point, they had reason to believe inaccessible, I have now the pleasure to express to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief how much I feel indebted to the whole of the officers and men of all arms engaged, for the very gallant and spirited manner in which they commenced and followed up the attack, and in spite of intense heat, unsatiated thirst, and an obstinate resistance of seven hours' duration, gained complete possession of the enemy's stronghold.

2. The co-operation throughout was complete, and both officers and men materially contributed to the success of the day, by displaying much coolness and intelligence as well as courage.

3. As an instance which fell under my own observation, I beg to bring to notice the conduct of Lieutenant Stanley Scott, Adjutant of the Bheel Corps, and Lieutenants Hanson and Sibthorpe, of the 9th Regiment, who, with some twenty men of the latter corps, made an attack, at the termination of the day, on a strong position situated on the summit of a hill, protected by large boulders of stone, and defended by a number of Muckraanees, who, rendered desperate by the certainty of their ultimate destruction, made frequent sallies, sword in hand, and for some time offered a most determined resistance.

4. These officers, taking advantage of the little cover the ground afforded, cautiously but perseveringly advanced in skirmishing order to within twelve paces of their enemy, keeping their men loaded for the final rush. They lost 4 of their number at the onslaught; but 23 of the Muckraanees were left dead on the scene of action.

5. I omitted to mention, in my former letter, that the 4 Mountain Train mortars were brought to bear upon the enemy, with some effect for a short time; but the rapid advance of the troops from both sides rendered their prolonged use dangerous to my own men.

6. Lieutenant Basevi, of the Artillery, was unfortunately severely wounded by a sword cut in a gallant hand to hand encounter with one of the enemy.

7. The Detachment Poona Irregular Horse, under Naib Russuldar Hyat Meer Khan, did excellent service by taking up a position on the enemy's right, and thereby cutting off his retreat in that direction.

8. I beg to enclose the accompanying report from Captain Langston; and, in thanking Captain Birch and Lieutenant Hall for the gallant conduct noticed therein, I would also acknowledge the prompt, able, and successful manner in which Captain Langston conducted the attack on the enemy's rear.

9. I find I have greatly underrated the enemy's loss: 170 bodies were counted the day after the action; the number of killed must, therefore, have exceeded 200.

10. I also learn that, in addition to the 62 men taken prisoners, 445 women and children, and amongst them the wives of some of the chief insurgents, have been brought in. In my former letter their number was under-estimated.

11. I beg to enclose an amended list* of casualties, by which it will be observed that I omitted to mention the name of Captain Birch amongst the wounded; and that, with one exception, the whole of the missing have since been accounted for.

I HAVE the honor to inform you that, in accordance with instructions received from Major Evans, Commanding Satpoora Field Force, I marched with the right column, strength as per margin,† from Pursool, at 1.10 A.M. yesterday.

2. After proceeding some six miles, I detached a party (that had been previously told off for the purpose), consisting of:—1 jemadar, 19 sabres, Poona Horse; 1 ensign, 1 subadar, 40 N.C. rank and file, 9th Regiment Native Infantry; 1 jemadar, 60 N.C. rank and file, Bheel Corps; the whole under Ensign Bonnor, 9th Regiment Native Infantry, to Meina Mata, westward of Pursool, so as to prevent any fugitive rebels escaping in that direction.

3. The remainder of my column continued the route to Amba Pawnee with an advance guard, consisting of detachment 4th Rifles and Bheel Corps, with 6 sowars Poona Horse.

4. On arriving within about two miles of Amba Pawnee, I ordered the advance guard, under Lieutenant Hall, reinforced by the Light Company 9th Regiment Native Infantry, to skirmish to the front. They were immediately fired on by the enemy, who at the same time commenced falling back on their main body, strongly posted on a range of high hills directly in our front.

5. The ground being favourable for cavalry movements, I ordered the Poona Horse to the front, who, dashing forward, cut up several of the enemy, thereby materially accelerating the general retreat to their mountain stronghold.

6. On coming within range, I selected an eligible position for the mortars, and commenced shelling the enemy, who were observed in large numbers crowning the heights. At the same time I threw out skirmishers to the right and left, with a view of hemming in and outflanking the

enemy. Lieutenant Hall, 4th Rifles, commanded on the right, and was accompanied by Captain Birch, who kindly volunteered his services; Lieutenant Hawthorn, 9th Regiment Native Infantry, took the left. I remained to direct operations, Captain Baugh, 9th Regiment Native Infantry, commanding the reserve.

7. The right party, advancing, carried all before them, notwithstanding a heavy fire from the enemy, who were in a great measure sheltered by large boulders of stone, from behind which they were enabled to act with comparative safety; but vain were their endeavours: the men, led in the most gallant manner, defeated all attempts of the rebels to break through, and drove them back at all points with great slaughter.

8. Lieutenant Hawthorn, extending his skirmishers to the left, communicated with the right of Major Evans's column, and then advanced with his main body up the hill, the enemy being thus exposed to a severe cross fire. The summit was gained, and the two columns co-operated.

9. The enemy's position was well chosen, the hill being partially scarped, and it speaks well for the gallantry of the troops employed,—storming so strong a natural fortification under so severe and galling a fire.

10. I then joined Lieutenant Hall, and remained with him till the close of operations. The rest of the column took ground to the right, and ultimately joined the head quarter column on the north side of the hill.

11. Annexed is a list of casualties*.

12. I estimate the enemy's loss at between 150 and 200. My column also took 37 men and 57 women and several children prisoners.

13. I beg to bring to the notice of the officer commanding Field Force, the gallant conduct of Lieutenant Hall, 4th Rifles, and Captain Birch, who, with only some 25 men, kept an overpowering force of the enemy in check, and prevented their escape to the eastward. The behaviour of Boghur Junal Khan, Poona Horse, also deserves notice, in having either shot or cut down several of the enemy.

I HAVE the honor to forward, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief and Government, the accompanying report from Captain Sealy, relative to his encounter with the enemy on the 11th instant.

Considering the very difficult nature of the country, the overwhelming force opposed to him, and the number of bullocks, laden with commissariat supplies, he had to protect, I am of opinion that Captain Sealy acted judiciously in not attempting to join in the attack on Amba Pawnee.

Both officers and men appear to have done their duty gallantly, and I trust that their conduct, as well as that of their commanding officer, will meet with approval.

Captain Sealy's detachment joined the other detachment of the force at this place this morning.

Silawud is Mawassia's camp, and is seven miles to the south of Amba Pawnee.

Captain Sealy, Commanding Detached Column Satpoora Field Force, to the Staff Officer Satpoora Field Force, Amba Pawnee.

Camp, near Balcan, April 12, 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward, for the information of the officer commanding the Satpoora Field Force, the following report of the operations of the column under my command.

2. At daylight on the 11th instant, all baggage and Commissariat supplies being ready, the column, after furnishing the requisite guards and escorts, marched, strength as per margin,* with the intention of co-operating with the other two columns in attacking the enemy at Amba Pawnee.

3. After advancing about a quarter of a mile, three scouts were sent to a high hill on the right, to ascertain if the enemy's scouts could be seen. This not being the case, the column moved on, and, after advancing about half a mile further, a report was sent by the officer of the advance guard, that the leading file heard sounds as of the firing of mortars. Thinking this might proceed from one or other of the columns, I proceeded with my staff-officer to the front, and had scarcely arrived there when some of the enemy were seen on the high hill to our right, and immediately a few shots were fired. The advance guard was instantly thrown into skirmishing order, and as soon as Captain Briggs came up with the 19th Regiment, he was directed to throw out a portion also.

4. About this time the enemy's nokara was heard, and a green standard planted on the high ground on the right, above mentioned, around which a large body of the enemy assembled, while a portion moved to occupy the ravine in our front. The officer of the advanced guard, Captain Anderson, seeing this, proceeded to dislodge them. While so employed, a party of the enemy succeeded in getting to our left front, when Lieutenant Atkins, heading the detachment of the Bheel Corps, arrived, and having driven them off, held this important position with his detachment throughout the operations. It was in the performance of this duty that officer was wounded, and after securing the position was obliged to be conveyed to the rear.

5. In the meantime the Mountain Train was brought into position. The gun was placed so as to keep down the fire from the ravine (which it raked), and from the high ground and the right front, while the howitzer was brought to play on the large body of the enemy, where their standard had been planted, which was shortly removed, and the enemy around it temporarily dispersed, but endeavoured again to bring the standard to the front with the view of planting it, but a round or

two more from the howitzer again caused its removal.

6. The fire of the enemy on our right front, however, continued heavy, and the enemy attempted to descend, but were driven back by the 19th, and an occasional shell from the howitzer.

7. It was about this time that an individual of rank, wearing a red turban, who had attracted the notice of us all, fell wounded, and was carried off. He was supposed to be either Dowlat Sing or Kajee Sing, and, placed under good cover, picked off many of the 19th, and from his piece several shots reached the gun and howitzer at a distance of between 500 and 600 yards. It was only at a few paces from the howitzer that Lieutenant Blair, in the act of conveying orders to the officer commanding, the 19th Regiment was wounded.

8. The fire of the enemy now slackened, and finding that I had expended more than half of the Mountain Train ammunition, I only threw a shell occasionally, when I saw any number of the enemy collected; but seeing from the very determined opposition we had encountered that a large body of the insurgents was around us, and encumbered with my wounded without the means for their transport, and having besides a thousand commissariat bullocks with supplies to protect, I considered it advisable to retire to my original position at Dababowrie. With this in view, and while the fire was slack, I directed the baggage

and commissariat to retire, sending the half of the Poona Horse with them.

9. Finding that the enemy had now in a great measure retired, and fired an occasional shot only, I commenced to withdraw the troops, having as a rear-guard the companies of the 19th Regiment, accompanied by the gun from the Mountain Train, and reached Daba-bowrie, without further casualties, about half-past ten A.M., having been engaged with the enemy about four hours.

10. During the action, the enemy made an attempt to capture our commissariat, and had detached about two hundred men for that purpose, but were most successfully driven off, and pursued by a party of the 19th Regiment and Bheel Corps, amounting to 54 men, under Subedar Comajee Kuddum of the former corps.

11. I beg to enclose lists of killed and wounded of the column, but have been unable to ascertain the loss on the part of the enemy; it must have, however, far exceeded ours.

12. Before concluding, I consider it my duty to bring to the notice of Major Evans, that the troops behaved throughout the action most satisfactorily, and that I was well supported by all the officers, and am much indebted for their exertions on the occasion.

"And whereas a church has been erected within the limits of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and has been consecrated by the name of the church or chapel of Saint Mark the Evangelist, at Lowmoor, and such church has been approved by us, and is intended to be appropriated and used as and for the church of the said district.

"And whereas a sum of three thousand three hundred and fifty pounds, five pounds per centum perpetual preference stock of the Great Northern Railway Company, has been contributed and transferred to the account and into the names of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne in the books of the said Railway Company by Charles Hardy, of Odsall House, Bradford, in the said county of York, and Gathorne Hardy, late of 35, Eaton-square, and now of 12, Grosvenor-crescent, in the county of Middlesex, Esquires, upon trust that the said Governors should apply the same and the proceeds thereof towards the endowment and maintenance of the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said church or chapel of Saint Mark the Evangelist, at Lowmoor.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us by the said Charles Hardy and Gathorne Hardy, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the provision of the endowment last mentioned the whole right of patronage of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted,

and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, should be assigned to the said Gathorne Hardy, his heirs and assigns, in manner hereinafter mentioned and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said chapelry of Wibsey, in the said parish of Bradford, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mark, Lowmoor.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the church which has been consecrated by the name of the church or chapel of Saint Mark the Evangelist at Lowmoor, and has been approved by us as aforesaid, shall be and be deemed to be the parish church of the said district so recommended to be constituted.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Gathorne Hardy, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for

Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Note from the Russian Minister at this Court, relative to an Imperial Decree establishing a new system for the measurement of vessels in Russia, which is given below, and stating that the rule will be applied henceforth to all Russian vessels without exception; but that with regard to foreign vessels, the method will only be applied in case the Masters are unable to produce either a document establishing their right to hoist the colours, or ship's papers, known in Russia, under the denomination of "Titres de propriété du bâtiment," which documents should certify the number of lasts measured by the ship to which they belong.

(Translation.)

Russian Method of determining the Tonnage or Lastage of Ships.

1. Measure in English feet—

- a. The *length* of the upper deck from the back of the stem to the front of the sternpost.
- b. The *breadth* inside of the under surface of the planking of same deck, taken amidships; and
- c. The *depth* in the ship's well over the keel from the deck planks to the limber boards.

2. Multiply the three preceding dimensions into one another; that is to say: length, breadth, and depth, and divide the product by 130, the quotient will give the capacity of the ship in tons, and by dividing this quotient by 2, the capacity in lasts will be obtained.

3. If there is a poop on the upper deck, or a light deck above the quarter deck, they must in each case be measured, the *length* inside, the *breadth* amidships, and the *height* between the planks of the decks.

Multiply these three dimensions into one another, divide the product by 90, and then divide the quotient by 2, the quotient after the last division must be added to the measurement previously obtained, and the sum total will give the whole capacity of the ship in lasts.

4. Steam vessels are to be measured in the same manner as sailing vessels, but a deduction is to be made from their capacity of three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) of a last for each nominal horse-power of the engine.

3. Notice to produce at the hearing any books or papers filed with the schedule must be given to the Officer having the custody thereof, within the hours above mentioned, on any day previous to the day of hearing.

4. Opposition at the hearing can only be made by the Creditor in person, or by Counsel appearing for him.
