His Majesty this day in Council, was pleased to Command, That this His ensuing Order be published in the *Gazette*.

HIS Majesty being informed, That several Parishes in and about London, and divers other Parts of the Kingdom have as yet made no Collections, or at least not returned them, for the Redemption of such of His Subjects as are in Slavery in Barbary, pursuant to the Letters Patents, the late King of Blessed Memory caused to be issued for that purpose; His Majesty is pleased to Direct, That the Archbishops, Bishops, and all Others exercising any Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, do cause strict Enquiry to be made concerning the Returns of all such Collections; And take care that the Rectors, Vicars or Curates of the several Parishes, where no such Collections have been made, do earnestly Exhort their Parishioners to give their charitable Contributions towards the Redemption of His Majesties Subjects remaining still in Captivity; And that all Persons, who have Monies in their Hands already Collected, or which shall be Collected for this purpose pursuant to the said Letters Patents, Do pay the same to Mr. Charles Duncomb Goldsmith in Lombard-street, London, who is hereby authorized to receive the said Collections, and when it amounts to a considerable Sum, to pay the same into the Exchequer. And His Majesty did further Order, That Certificates be from time to time transmitted to His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council of all Monies received by them, and paid to the said Mr. Duncomb, That the same may be employed for and towards the Redemption of the said Captives.

Vienna, Jan. 2. The Advices from *Upper Hungary* tell us, That Major General *Heusser* continues to have a very watchful Eye upon the Enemy, who are drawing their Troops together to conduct a great Convoy to *Agria*, having Orders from the Grand Visier to relieve that place at what price soever it be. We have an account from *Sirvia*, That in pursuance of the Orders they had received from the Council of War here, a Convoy of Provisions had been sent from thence to *Five Churches*, and the other places possessed by the *Imperialists* on the *Crave*, guarded by 1500 Horse and 400 Foot. The *Sieur Bruninx* is arrived here in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the *States-General* of the *United Provinces*. The *Moscovite* Ambassadors are expected about the middle of this month. The Prince of *Lubomirski*, who lately arrived here from *Poland*, parted from hence two days ago for *Venice*. We are told from *Poland*, that the King is sending an Ambassador hither.

Hamburgh, Febr. 11. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That the *Moscovite* Ambassadors parted from *Lemberg* the 21st of the last month, intending to make all the haste they could in their Journey to *Vienna*.

Brussels, Febr. 14. This week arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from *Madrid*, with the King of *Spain's* Ratification of the Agreement made between the Commissioners of the Two Crowns in the late Conference at *Philipville*; by which the Town of *Walcourt* and one or two Villages with the Lands thereon depending, situate between the *Sambre*

Sambre and the *Meuse*, are yielded to the *French*, in lieu of their Pretensions on the *sides of Namur*. The *Count de Bergeyck* is going for *Spain*, being made one of the *Supreme Council of Flanders*. The *Duke of Holftein* intends likewise to take a Journey to *Spain*. The Letters from *Vienna*, of the 30th past, give an account that the *Emperor* had resolved to take into his Protection the *Republick of Ragusa*, they paying his Imperial Majesty a yearly Tribute of 10000 Ducats. The *Advices from Hungary* say, That *Tockley* continued at *Temeswar*, endeavouring to get a Body of Men together in order to relieve *Apria*, according to the repeated Orders he had received from the *Grand Visier*. And that he had sent some Succors to *Montgatz*, the *Garison* of which place was before in great distress.

Brussels, Febr. 18. Our *Governor-General* went yesterday to *Amwerp*, where he will stay some days. The *Marriage* of the *Count d'Egypt* with the *Princess of Aremberg*, *Widow of the Marquis de Grana*, late *Governor-General* of these Countries, was declared the 16th Instant; They were Married privately some days before. We had by the last Letters from *Spain* the News of the death of the *Viceroy of Oran*.

Hague, Febr. 18. The *Deputies of Utrecht* having finished the Affairs they were sent hither upon, are returned home. The *Deputies of the African Company* of these Counties, have had this week several Conferences with the *Heer Van Dieft*, and the *Intendant Rayle*, and the *Brandenburgh Ministers*. The *Mareschal de Scharnberg* arrived here on Sunday last.

Paris, Febr. 15. The *Duke de Choiseul*, first Gentleman of the *King's Bed-Chamber* and *Governor of Paris*, dyed here the 13th Instant, after a long Sickness, in the 63 year of his Age. We have an account by an Express from *Rome*, That the *Duke d'Estrees*, *Ambassador Extraordinary of France*, dyed there the 30th of the last month of an Apoplexy. The *King* has given the *Government* of this City to the *Duke de Gesars* first Gentleman of his *Bedchamber*: But the *Government of Lorraine*, Vacant by the death of the *Mareschal de Crequi*, is not yet disposed of.

Boston in New-England, Decemb. 27. The 20th Instant arrived here *Sir Edmund Andros*, His Majesty's *Governor in chief of New-England*, having been received with all Expressions of Joy and Respect. The *Governor* and the *Members of the Council* being sworn, an Order was published to continue all Officers *Civil* and *Military*; and a general Council is appointed to be held here the 30th of this Month, of which Notice has been given to the *Neighbouring Colonies*.

Dublin, Febr. 7. His Excellency the *Earl of Tyrconnell* appointed by His Majesty to be *Lord Deputy of Ireland*, having been detained 16 days at *Holyhead* by contrary Winds, arrived here yesterday about Two of the Clock in the Afternoon. He was received at the *Water-side* by most of the Nobility and Persons of Quality in *Town*, and conducted hither by a great number of the Officers of the *Army*, and other Gentlemen on Horseback, and a great Train of Coaches with Six Horses. Being indisposed by a very rough and stormy Passage, his Lordship went directly to his own House; There never was seen so great a Concourse of People at any chief *Governor's Landing* as at His, expecting their general Satisfaction by loud Acclamations as he passed through the Streets, by Ringing of

Bells, and by Bonfires at Night throughout the City, together with all other publick demonstrations of Joy.

Westminster, Febr. 10. The Body of the *Lady Mary* was this Evening privately Enterr'd in the Vault of the *Royal Family* in *King Henry VII's Chappel*, having been received at the *West-gate* of the *Abby* by the *Lord Bishop of Rochester* *Dean of Westminster*, and the *Prebendaries*, attended with the *Quire*, with the usual Ceremonies.
