WHEREAS by the 333rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that subject to the provisions contained in the 5th part of that Act, it shall be lawful for every pilotage authority by bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its districts all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section.

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, being a pilotage authority within the aforesaid provision, has submitted for the consent of Her Majesty in Council certain bye-laws, a copy whereof is set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, with respect to pilotage by masters and mates of ships in the districts of the said Corporation.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that the said bye-laws are proper and reasonable.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve of, and signify her consent to, the said bye-laws, as bye-laws of the said Corporation.

Schedule above Referred to.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations fixing the Terms and Conditions of Granting Pilotage Certificates to Masters and Mates of Ships by the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, and for punishing any breach of the terms and conditions on which such Certificates are to be held.

1. The master or mate of any ship applying for a certificate of pilotage, to be granted to him by the said Corporation, shall make his application

in writing, and in such application shall be set forth the name and age of the applicant, the limits in respect of which such certificate is required, and the name and tonnage of the ship of which the applicant is acting as master or mate at the time, and the port to which such ship belongs, and the name of her owner or owners.

2. If the certificate be required to authorize the person holding it to pilot, not only the ship of which he is then acting as master or mate, but any one or more ships belonging to the same owner or owners, the application must specify the names and tonnages of all ships in respect of which he is desirous of being examined, the port or ports to which such ships belong, and the name or names of such owner or owners.

3. A testimonial of the sobriety and good conduct of the applicant must accompany his application.

4. In cases where the certificate is required to be granted for or from the Humber, the application and testimonial must be delivered at the Wardens' Clerks Office in the Trinity House, in Kingston-upon-Hull, and the applicant shall submit himself to be examined as to his capacity by the Wardens and Brethren of the said Corporation.

5. In cases where the certificate is required to be granted for the limits within which pilots are licensed for the ports of Goole, Gainsburgh, Wisbech, or Spalding, or any other port at which Sub-Commissioners of pilotage are appointed by the said Corporation, the application and testimonial must be delivered at the office of the Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage for such port respectively, and the applicant shall submit himself to be examined by the said Sub-Commissioners as to his capacity to pilot within the said limits respectively, and if the certificate be required in respect of two or more of such districts, the application and examination must be made and had in each place.

6. Every application for renewal of any certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall be made in writing, and shall be deposited seven days at least before the period of the expiration of such certificate, in the said Wardens' Clerks Office at Kingston-upon-Hull, in cases where such certificate shall have been granted for or from the Humber, and in the office of the said Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage, at such one of the outports as such renewed certificates may be required for, but any such application may be entertained although not made within the said specified time, if the pilotage authority think fit.

7. Every application for a transfer from one ship to another of any certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall be made in writing and signed by or on behalf of the person requiring such transfer, and shall specify the name and tonnage of the ship to which such certificate is required to be transferred, and the port to which such ship belongs, and the name or names of her owner or owners, and in case such last mentioned ship shall not belong to the same owner as the ship in respect of which the former certificate was granted, every such application shall be accompanied by a testimonial from the owner of the ship in respect of which the former certificate was granted, of the sobriety and good conduct of the master or mate applying for the transfer.

8. Every person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall from time to time, and at all times in obedience to the order or summons of the Acting Warden of the Trinity House, under the hand of their Secretary for the time being, delivered or offered to him, or left at his residence, or on board the ship in respect of which he holds a certificate, attend the Brethren of the said Corporation at their Boards or Committees, or their Secretary for the time being, according to the tenor of such order or summons at the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, to answer any complaint or charge which may be made against him for misconduct, affecting his character, conduct, management, or competency, as a certified master or mate as aforesaid; and every person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, upon a certificate of qualification from Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage, shall, in like manner, attend at the said Trinity House, or before the said Sub-Commissioners of the port or place for which such certificate shall be so granted, in obedience to the order or summons of the said Secretary or of the said Corporation, or of the said Sub-Commissioners under their hands, or the hands of the major part of them, delivered, offered, or left as aforesaid, to answer any complaint or charge which may be made against him for misconduct as aforesaid.

9. No certificate granted by the said Corporation will authorize the person therein named, to pilot any other ship than the ship or ships therein specified, and of which he may be actually master or mate at the time; and if any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall pilot or conduct any ship liable to be piloted other than the ship, or any of the ships therein specified, or of which he shall not be actually master or mate at the time, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

10. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall add to or in any manner alter such certificate, or make or alter any endorsement thereon, or shall be privy to any such certificate or endorsement being altered, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

11. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall lend such certificate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

12. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall be drunk when he is or should be piloting the ship of which he is master or mate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

13. Every person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall from time to time conform himself strictly to all directions with regard to his ship, which shall be given to him by

any of the Haven Masters or Dock Masters, or Assistant Dock and Haven Masters, appointed by the said Corporation under any Act of Parliament or Charter.

14. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall offend against any of the preceding regulations, he shall for every such offence, whether the same shall subject him to any pecuniary penalty or not, but in substitution for such penalty (if any), be liable to have his certificate annulled and forfeited, or suspended, at the discretion of the Brethren of the Trinity House.

15. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall refuse or neglect immediately on request, to produce and show the same to the Commodore or Headsman of the Pilots of the District, or to any Pilot licensed by the said Corporation, for the limits within which the person holding such certificate shall then actually be, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

16. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Corporation, shall, when and as required by the Secretary of the said Corporation for the time being, or by any Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage, on whose certificate of qualification such certificate was granted, refuse or neglect to produce, and when annulled, forfeited, or suspended, shall refuse to deliver up his certificate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

17. On the death of any person holding a certificate, the person or persons into whose hands such certificate may happen to fall, shall, without delay, transmit the same to the said Corporation, or the Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage for the District within which the deceased was examined.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, section nineteen; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, section nineteen; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at the Lickey, in the parish of Bromsgrove, in the county and diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous parts of the parishes of Bromsgrove and King's Norton, and of the chapelry dis-

trict of Christ Church, Cats-hill, in the said county and diocese, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of the Holy Trinity, situate at the Lickey aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Worcester, and of the Reverend William Villers, Vicar of the parish of Bromsgrove aforesaid, and as such Vicar Patron of the said chapelry district of Christ Church, Cats-hill, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation, and of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Worcester, Patrons of the said parishes of Bromsgrove and King's Norton (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their capitular seal) we humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that all those contiguous parts of the said parishes of Bromsgrove and King's Norton, and the chapelry district of Christ Church, Cats-hill, described in the schedule hereunder written, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth in the map hereunto annexed, should be united into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity at the Lickey aforesaid, and that the same should be named "The Consolidated Chapelry of the Lickey."

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Dean and Chapter and the said William Villers (testified as aforesaid) that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to, and be exercised by, the incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Bromsgrove.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All those several parts of the parish of Bromsgrove and the district chapelry of Cats-hill, both in the county and diocese of Worcester, which are situate on the eastern side of an imaginary line, commencing on the boundary between the said parish of Bromsgrove and the parish of Tardbigge, at a point in the middle of the road called Blackwell-road, leading from Blackwell Railway-station to Watery-lane, and extending thence northward along the middle of the Blackwell-road aforesaid, to the middle of Watery-lane aforesaid, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such last-named lane to the middle of Rock End-lane, and extending thence in the same direction along the middle of such last-named lane to the middle of the highway, leading from Tardbigge to Birmingham, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-named road, as far as the junction of the Old and New Birmingham roads, and extending thence northward along the middle of the old Birmingham road aforesaid, to a point opposite to the middle of the southernmost end of a certain lane, called Sandy-lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such last-named lane to the middle of a lane called Linehouse-lane, leading from Linehouse to Upper Cats-hill, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such last-mentioned lane, to the middle of the old Birmingham road aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite the middle of a certain lane called Beacon-lane, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-men-

tioned lane to the middle of the road, known as the Alvechurch highway, leading from the old Birmingham road through Lydiate Ash, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road, crossing the new Birmingham-road aforesaid to the middle of a road called Halesowen-road, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-named road to a point opposite the middle of Chadwick-lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned lane to the middle of the new Birmingham-road aforesaid, and extending thence in the same direction along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the middle of a lane called Wetty-lane, and extending thence north-eastward and northward along the middle of such last-named lane, to the boundary dividing the parish of King's Norton from the parish of Bromsgrove aforesaid.

"And also all that part of the said parish of King's Norton, in the said county and diocese of Worcester, which is situate to the west of that portion of the Birmingham and Gloucester Railway, which lies between Grovely-lane and the road leading from Alvechurch to Northfield."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation; together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at the Lickey, in the parish of Bromsgrove, in the county of Worcester, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Bromsgrove, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Act mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the First Schedule

hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the lands and premises, tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, and other hereditaments particularly described in the second and third schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereafter mentioned; that is to say; that the land and tithes, or rent-charge in lieu of tithes, described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the parish of Bole, in the county of Nottingham and diocese of Lincoln; that the land described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being

of the perpetual curacy of Muggleswick, in the county and diocese of Durham; and we further recommend and propose, that all our estate and interest in the land described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the parish of Dunnington, in the county and diocese of York.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit; and that, if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice or church, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to comprise certain portions of the ancient chapelry of Meltham, the chapelry district of South Crosland, and the particular district of Saint James, Meltham Mills, in the townships of Meltham and South Crosland, in the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York and diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the said ancient chapelry of Meltham, chapelry district of South Crosland, and particular district of Saint James, Meltham Mills, in the said parish of Almondbury hereinafter mentioned and described, such parts not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of four thousand pounds, three pounds per centum consolidated annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England by the

children of Charles Brook of Healy House in the said county of York, Esquire, namely, by William Brook of Healy House aforesaid, Esquire, the Reverend James Brook, of Helme, in the said parish of Almondbury, Clerk, the Reverend Alfred Brook, of Bournemouth, in the county of Hants, Clerk, the Reverend Arthur Brook of East Retford in the county of Nottingham, Clerk, Frances Brook, of Healy House aforesaid, spinster, and Anne, wife of the Reverend Frederick George Blomfield of No. 3, Finsbury Circus, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk, respectively, and a sum of one thousand pounds three pounds per centum consolidated annuities, has also been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the said Governor and Company of the Bank of England by Charles Brook aforesaid, upon the understanding that the annual payment herein-after mentioned should be made by us to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall have become, under the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes then to the perpetual curate thereof.

"And whereas the said Charles Brook, William Brook, James Brook, Alfred Brook, Arthur Brook, Frances Brook, and Anne wife of the said Frederick George Blomfield, have by an instrument in writing under their respective hands, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, signified to us their desire that the right of patronage of the said district or new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, should be vested in and be exercised by the said William Brook, his heirs and assigns, and the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Almondbury jointly.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said ancient chapelry of Meltham, and all that part of the said chapelry district of South Crosland, and all that part of the said particular district of Saint James, Meltham Mills, in the township of Meltham and South Crosland, in the said parish of Almondbury, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Helme.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said secondly-mentioned Act, and so soon as such district shall have become,

according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes then to the perpetual curate of the said new parish, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or perpetual curate as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us and to the patrons and to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, house, tithe, tithe rent-charge, or other hereditament, should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said William Brook, his heirs and assigns, for ever, and the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Almondbury jointly.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

“SCHEDULE.

“The district of Helme being,—

“All that part of the ancient chapelry of Meltham, and all that part of the chapelry district of South Crosland, and all that part of the particular district of Saint James, Meltham Mills, respectively situate in the townships of Meltham and South Crosland, in the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York and diocese of Ripon, which lie to the north and west of an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary between the township of Meltham and the township of Lingards at the northern angle of certain waste land called Deer Hill End, and thence extending towards the south-east along the boundary of the said waste land to the middle of the Blackmoor and Deer Hill End Road, and thence extending towards the north-east along the middle of the said road until it is joined by the road known as Hassock's Road, and thence extending towards the east along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with the Holt Head and Meltham Road, and thence continuing towards the south-east along the middle of the last-mentioned road

as far as a point opposite to the middle of Elm Lane, and thence extending towards the north-east along the middle of the said lane to the point where it is crossed by a footpath leading from Upper Hey to the village of Meltham, and thence extending towards the south-east along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of two hundred and five yards to a point opposite to a boundary stone placed on the eastern side of the said footpath and marked with the initial letters ‘H. D. B.,’ and thence extending towards the east in a direct line to the middle of another footpath leading from Elm Lane aforesaid by Broadlands Bottom to the foot bridge over the stream called or known as Brighthouse Dyke, and thence extending towards the south-east along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath to the middle of the said footbridge over the stream called or known as Brighthouse Dyke as aforesaid, and thence continuing towards the east and north-east along the middle of the said stream as far as the middle of a lane leading to Spinks Mire Mill, and thence extending towards the south-east along the middle of the last-mentioned lane to the middle of the Lockwood and Meltham Trust Road, and thence continuing towards the north, along the middle of the last-named road, until it is joined by a lane leading to Bent Ley Mill, and thence extending towards the north-east along the middle of the last-named lane to the north-east end of the said mill, and thence continuing towards the north-west and south-west along the boundary of the same premises, as indicated by boundary stones marked with the initial letters ‘H. D. B.,’ to the middle of the Lockwood and Meltham Trust Road, aforesaid, and thence extending towards the north along the middle of the said road until it is joined by a footpath leading to High Brow through Well Heads Wood, and thence extending towards the north-west along the middle of the said footpath to High Brow, and thence continuing in the same direction along the middle of another footpath leading from High Brow along the ridge of the hill by the eastern side of certain sandstone quarries, and above the places called or known as Lower Edge, Crosland Edge, Edgemoor, and Green Lane Top, to the middle of an occupation road leading from a place called or known as Top of Croft to the Old Wakefield and Austerlands Road; and thence extending in the same direction along the middle of the last-named occupation road to the Old Wakefield and Austerlands Road aforesaid, thence crossing the last-named road and continuing in a direct line to the boundary between the townships of South Crosland and Linthwaite.”

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provision of the said secondly-mentioned Act, been delivered or transmitted to the incumbents and patrons of the churches of all the parishes or districts out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and patrons have severally and respectively consented to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-one, section one; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter forty-one, section one; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for setting out and constituting districts for spiritual purposes, and annexing such districts to the consecrated Churches of All Souls, Ancoats; Saint Matthias, Salford; Saint Philip, Salford; Christ Church, Salford; Saint Bartholomew, Salford; Saint Matthew, Manchester; Saint Peter, Manchester; Saint Thomas, Old Trafford; Saint Paul, Hulme; and Christ Church, Moss Side; respectively situate within the original limits of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster and diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that districts for spiritual purposes should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the several consecrated churches herein-before mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Manchester which is described in the first part of the Schedule hereunder written, and which is coloured pink and grey on the map numbered 1, hereunto annexed, should be severed and disannexed from the said parish of Manchester, and should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church called All Souls Church at Ancoats aforesaid, and should become a district for spiritual purposes and be named 'The District of All Souls, Ancoats;' that all that part of the said parish which is described in the second part of the said Schedule, and which is coloured pink on the map numbered 2, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Matthias, Salford, and should become a district for spiritual purposes and be named 'The District of Saint Matthias, Salford;' that all that part of the said parish of Manchester which is described in the third part of the said Schedule, and which is coloured pink on the map numbered 3, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Philip, Salford, and should become a district for spiritual purposes and be named 'The District of Saint Philip, Salford;' that all that part of the said parish of Manchester which is described in the fourth part of the said Schedule, and which is coloured pink and yellow on the map numbered 4, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church called Christ Church, Salford, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Christ Church, Salford;' that all that part of the said parish which is described in the fifth part of the said Schedule,

and which is coloured pink on the map numbered 5, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of Saint Bartholomew, Salford, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Bartholomew, Salford;' that all that part of the said parish which is described in the sixth part of the said Schedule, and which is coloured pink on the map numbered 6, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of Saint Matthew, Manchester, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Matthew, Manchester;' that all that part of the said parish which is described in the seventh part of the said Schedule, and which is coloured blue, yellow, and green on the map numbered 7, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Peter, Manchester, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Peter, Manchester;' that all that part of the new parish of Saint Matthew, Stretford (heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester), which is described in the eighth part of the said schedule, and which is coloured pink on the map numbered 8, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Thomas at Old Trafford, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Thomas, Old Trafford;' that all that part of the new parish of Saint George, Hulme (heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester), which is described in the ninth part of the said schedule, and which is coloured blue on the map numbered 9, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Paul, Hulme, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Hulme;' and that all those several parts of All Saints District in Chorlton-on-Medlock of the said parish of Manchester, and of the new parishes of the Holy Trinity, Rusholme, Saint Paul, Withington, and Saint Margaret, Whalley Range (which new parishes were heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester), which are described in the tenth part of the said schedule, and which are coloured green, pink, yellow, orange, and blue on the map numbered 10, hereunto annexed, should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church called Christ Church, Moss Side, and should become a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Christ Church, Moss Side.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"FIRST PART.

"All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The All Souls District, Manchester,' as the same is laid down and limited by the provisions of three several Orders of Her Majesty in Council, dated respectively the twenty-seventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and also all those three isolated parts of that portion of the said parish of Manchester, wherein the Dean of

the Cathedral Church of Manchester now possesses or claims to possess the exclusive cure of souls, of which several parts the first is bounded on the east and south by the said territory now forming the 'All Souls District, Manchester,' on the north by the new parish of Saint Jude, Manchester, and on the west by the new parish of Saint Andrew, Ancoats; the second is bounded on the west and north by the River Medlock, and on the south and east in part by the new parish of Saint Silas, Ardwick, and in other part by the district of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw; and the third is bounded on the north-west and north-east by the said River Medlock; and on the south-west and south-east by the said new parish of Saint Silas, Ardwick.

" SECOND PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The particular District of Saint Matthias, Salford,' as the same is laid down and limited by the provisions of a certain Instrument, bearing date the sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and duly registered in the diocesan registry at Chester.

" THIRD PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The Saint Philip's District,' as the same is laid down and limited by the provisions of the undermentioned Orders and Instruments, that is to say, an Order of His Majesty King George the Fourth in Council, dated the nineteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, two several Instruments dated respectively the seventeenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, and the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, duly registered in the registry of the diocese of Chester, and an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, saving and except out of the territory so laid down and limited as aforesaid, all that portion thereof which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the roads called the Crescent, and the Crescent Parade, and to the west of another imaginary line extending along the middle of the Oldfield Road, to the middle of the Crescent Parade aforesaid.

" FOURTH PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The particular District of Christ Church, Salford,' as the same is laid down and limited under the provisions of the undermentioned Orders and Instruments; that is to say, two several Instruments dated respectively the seventeenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, and the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, duly registered in the registry of the Diocese of Chester, and an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six; and also all that part of the portion of the same parish of Manchester which now constitutes 'The Saint Philip's District,' and which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the roads called the Crescent and the Crescent Parade, and to the west of another imaginary line extending along the middle of the Oldfield Road to the middle of the Crescent Parade aforesaid.

" FIFTH PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The particular District of Saint Bartholomew, Salford,' as the same is laid down and limited by the provisions of a certain Instrument bearing date the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and duly registered in the registry of the diocese of Chester.

" SIXTH PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The Saint Matthew's District,' as the same is laid down and limited by the provisions of an Order of His Majesty King George the Fourth in Council, dated the nineteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and of an Order of Her present Majesty in Council, dated the eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, saving and except out of the territory so laid down and limited as aforesaid all that portion thereof which is situate to the east and north of an imaginary line, commencing in the middle of Watson-street, on the boundary between the said Saint Matthew's district and the district of Saint John in Manchester, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-named street, and along the middle of Taylor-street, as far as the middle of Fleet-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-named street to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Bishopsgate-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-named street as far as the middle of Lombard-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-named street to the middle of Lower Mosley-street, and extending thence south-westward and southward along the middle of such last-named street, and along the middle of Albion-street to the boundary of the said Saint Matthew's district.

" SEVENTH PART.

" All that part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester, which now constitutes 'The Saint Peter's District in Manchester,' as the same is limited and laid down under the provisions of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, and also all that part of the portion of the same parish of Manchester, wherein the Dean of the cathedral church of Manchester now possesses or claims to possess the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-west by the district of Saint John in Manchester, on the north-east by the district of Saint Peter aforesaid, on the south by the river Medlock, and on the south-west by the territory now forming 'The Saint Matthew's District,' in Manchester; and also all that part of the portion of the same parish of Manchester which now constitutes the Saint Matthew's district, and which is situate to the east and north of an imaginary line, commencing in the middle of Watson-street on the boundary between the said districts of Saint John and Saint Matthew, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-named street, and along the middle of Taylor-street as far as the middle of Fleet-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-named street to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Bishopsgate-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-named street as far as the middle of Lombard-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of

such last-named street to the middle of Lower Mosley-street, and extending thence south-westward and southward along the middle of such last-named street and along the middle of Albion-street to the boundary of Saint Matthew's district aforesaid.

"EIGHTH PART.

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Matthew, Stretford, (heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester,) in the county of Lancaster and diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line, commencing on the boundary between the said new parish of Saint Matthew and the particular district of Saint Bartholomew, Salford, in the middle of the river Irwell, at a point which is opposite to the middle of the northern end of the wall or fence forming the north-western boundary of certain paper-mills known as the 'Throstle Nest Paper Mills,' and extending thence south-westward, eastward, northward, and eastward, along the said wall or fence, and along the walls or fences forming the southern boundary of the said mills, as far as the middle of the north-western end of a lane leading from the said mills to the Manchester and Stretford-road, and extending thence towards the south-east along the middle of such last-mentioned lane, across the Duke of Bridgewater's Canal to the middle of the said road leading from Manchester to Stretford, and extending thence towards the south-west along the middle of such road to a point opposite to the middle of an occupation lane which leads out of the last-mentioned road immediately beyond certain premises known as the Trafford Hotel, and extending thence along the middle of such last-mentioned lane to a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of a house and premises called 'Hayes Leigh,' and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned wall or fence, and along the walls or fences forming the southern boundary of the gardens known as the Manchester Botanic Gardens, and of the gardens respectively attached to the asylums known as the Manchester Deaf and Dumb and Blind Asylums, to the middle of a street called Boyer-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned street, and eastward for a distance of fifteen yards along the middle of a street called Thomas-street, and extending thence south-eastward in a straight line across the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway to the middle of the northern end of the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the house and premises known as Skirton House, and extending thence southward along the middle of such wall or fence, and along the middle of the walls or fences forming the western boundaries of the houses and premises severally known as Seymour Cottage, Brainerd-terrace, Broom House, and Limegrove House, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned walls or fences to the middle of a certain brook, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such brook to the middle of a lane called Trafford-lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned lane to the boundary between the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stretford, and the new parish of Saint Margaret, Whalley Range.

"NINTH PART.

"All that part of the new parish of Saint George, Hulme (heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester) in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the road called the Stretford New Road,

and to the east of an imaginary line extending southward from such last-mentioned road, along the middle of Moss-lane, as far as a point opposite to the middle of Winchester-street, and extending thence along the middle of such last-mentioned street to a point opposite to the middle of Radnor-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned street, and westward along the middle of Cowper-street to the boundary of the said new parish of Saint George, Hulme.

"TENTH PART.

"All that part of the parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster, in the diocese of Manchester which now constitutes 'The All Saints District in Chorlton-on-Medlock,' as the same is laid down and limited by an Order of Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight; saving and except out of the territory so laid down and limited as aforesaid, all that portion thereof which is situate to the north of an imaginary line extending along the middle of Burlington-street as far as the middle of Boundary-lane, and thence northward along the middle of such last-named lane to the boundary of the said All Saints district aforesaid. And also all that part of the portion of the same parish of Manchester wherein the Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Manchester now possesses or claims to possess the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north by the said district of All Saints, Chorlton-on-Medlock, on the east by the new parish of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme, on the south in part by the new parish of Saint Paul, Withington, and in other part by the new parish of Saint Margaret, Whalley Range, and on the west by the said last-named new parish. And also all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Margaret, Whalley Range, which is situate to the north and east of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary between the said new parish and the said district of All Saints in Chorlton-on-Medlock in the middle of a certain road called Green Heys and extending thence southward and westward along the middle of such last-named road to the middle of Moss-lane, otherwise Moss Grove, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such last-named lane or grove to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of a certain other lane, leading from the last-named lane or grove to Pepper Hill Farm premises, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane leading to such farm premises, and south-eastward along the middle of the lane or road leading therefrom, as far as the middle of the culvert by which a certain brook called Longford Brook is carried under the said last-mentioned lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such last-named brook as far as the boundary between the said new parish of Saint Margaret, Whalley Range, and the said new parish of Saint Paul, Withington. And also all that part of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Withington, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the said brook called Longford Brook. And also all that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme which is situate to the west of an imaginary line extending along the middle of Oxford-street, and to the north of an imaginary line extending westward from the middle of Oxford-street aforesaid along the middle of Moss-lane, otherwise Moss Grove."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been duly transmitted to the patrons and incumbents of

the several parishes or ecclesiastical districts affected thereby, all of whom have consented to the same scheme.

And whereas the said scheme, together with the maps or plans thereto annexed, has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Llanddeniolen, in the county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Bangor.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Llanddeniolen hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas by a deed bearing date the sixteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and made or expressed to be made between Thomas Assheton Smith, of Tedworth, in the county of Hants, and Vaynol, in the said county of Carnarvon, Esquire, of the one part, and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part, which deed is enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery at Westminster, a clear annual sum of two hundred pounds has been granted and secured by the said Thomas Assheton Smith to the minister or incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall be appointed and licensed, and to his successors, by means of a rent-charge to be issuing and payable out of and charged upon certain lands and hereditaments mentioned or described in the said deed:

"And whereas the said Thomas Assheton Smith has also caused to be erected at his own cost and expense, a church within the limits of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, to be appropriated and used as and for the

church of the said district; and the said church has been approved by us and consecrated by the Right Reverend Christopher, Bishop of Bangor, by the name of Llandinorwig Church; and it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the benefactions aforesaid the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto, and to the church thereof should be assigned to the said Thomas Assheton Smith, and the person or persons for the time being beneficially entitled to the mansion house and demesne lands of Vaynol, in the said county of Carnarvon, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Christopher, Bishop of Bangor, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Llanddeniolen described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named "The District of Llandinorwig."

"And we further recommend and propose, that the church which has been so approved by us and consecrated by the said Christopher, Bishop of Bangor, by the name of Llandinorwig Church as aforesaid, shall be and be deemed to be the parish church of the said district.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Thomas Assheton Smith and the person or persons for the time being beneficially entitled to the mansion house and demesne lands of Vaynol, in the said county of Carnarvon, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

All that part of the parish of Llanddeniolen, in the county of Carnarvon, and in the diocese of Bangor, which lies to the east of an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the southern boundary of the said parish in the middle of the river Seiont, and opposite to the middle of the river called or known as Afon-Bryn'Refail, and thence extending towards the north and east along the middle of the last-named river as far as the middle of the bridge which carries the road leading from Pont-Penllyn to Llanddeniolen Church over the same river, and thence extending towards the north-west along the middle of the last-named road, until it is joined by another road leading by Llys Llywelyn, Blaen-y-Cae, and Fron Chwith, to the road leading from Llandinorwig to Port

Dinorwig, and thence continuing towards the north-east along the middle of the said road leading by Llys Llywelyn, Blaen-y-Cae, and Fron Chwith, to the middle of the road leading from Llandinorwig to Port Dinorwig aforesaid, and thence extending towards the north-west along the middle of the last-named road, until it is joined by another road leading by Castell to the road leading from Rhiwlas to Pentir, thence extending towards the east along the middle of the said road leading by Castell to its junction with the road leading from Rhiwlas to Pentir aforesaid, and thence crossing the last-named road and extending obliquely in a direct line across a field or inclosure numbered 96 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Llanddeniolen until it crosses the northern boundary of the same parish at or near a place called or known as Pentir Summer House."

And whereas the draft of the said Scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts been duly delivered or transmitted to the incumbent, and to the patron of the church of the parish of Llanddeniolen (out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken) and such incumbent and patron have severally consented to the said Scheme.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bangor.

All vessels arriving from the coast of Tripoli will be subjected to a quarantine of fifteen days, to commence from the discharge, for purification, of any susceptible cargo which might be on board; and all vessels arriving from the above-mentioned coast, and having had sickness on board during their voyage will be subjected to such further extension of the above quarantine as the authorities may deem proper.

Vessels arriving from the coasts of Tunis, Egypt, or Syria, will be subjected to a quarantine of five days, to commence from the discharge of any susceptible cargo on board, or, if having had sickness on board during the voyage, to a quarantine of not less than fifteen days.

Vessels arriving from Malta, without having touched at any intermediate port, or without having obtained free pratique at any intermediate port at which they may have touched, will be subject to five days' quarantine, or, if having had sickness, &c., on board during the passage, to a quarantine of fifteen days, or more, as may seem fit to the authorities. Such vessels having obtained free pratique at intermediate ports will be subject to quarantine according to circumstances.

Vessels arriving from Algiers, Morocco, Candia, Salonica, and the Asiatic shores of the Turkish Empire, will be subject to the visit of a medical officer, and such measures as may be necessary, previous to their admission to free pratique.
