WITH reference to my despatch of the 24th instant, acquainting you, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that I had directed a force of cavalry and infantry to proceed to Buheree, for the purpose of bringing to Bareilly, the Rohilcund Horse under Captain Crossman, I have the honor herewith to transmit copies of reports from Captain Browne, 2nd Punjaub Cavalry, who commanded the detachment, giving an account of the operations which he found it necessary to undertake against the band of rebels in that district.

2. Captain Browne returned to Bareilly this morning, and reports that the band above alluded to have dispersed, and that their leader, Nizam Allie Khan, has taken refuge in the Rampoor territory.

3. The day after Captain Browne left Bareilly, Mr. Alexander received a communication from Captain Crossman, stating that he had changed his mind, and intended to march *via* Moradabad, and not by Buheree; upon the receipt of which I sent to Captain Browne, to acquaint him with this change in Captain Crossman's intentions, and directed him to return to Bareilly by the route already furnished to him, without waiting at Buheree.

4. I feel sure that the march of this force has had a beneficial effect, and that confidence in the Government has been in a great measure restored in those parts.

5. I have every reason to be well satisfied with Captain Browne, who appears to have acted with judgment and discretion.

Captain S. Browne, Commanding 2nd Punjaub Cavalry and Detachment, to the Assistant Adjutant-General, Rohilcund Division, Bareilly.

Camp, Kuthura, May 25, 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit the following report, for the information of the Brigadier-General Commanding.

This morning, on arrival at Durunna, where I had proposed halting for the day, information was brought to Mr. Low, Civil Service, who accompanied the detachment, that Nizam Allie Khan had attacked and burnt the Thannah at Rickah, killing and wounding some of the Burkundauses and Ryots, and that he was at that moment encamped at Mohunpoor, some 4 miles distant, on the direct road to Buheree, with some 300 cavalry and infantry.

I at once decided on moving off and attacking him, after giving the men and horses an hour's rest after the march of 18 miles.

I accordingly marched again at 9-30 a.m. On arrival at Kuthura, I left the baggage there under a small guard. From this place Mohunpoor was visible, and the villagers stated that a portion of Nizam Allie Khan's Force had moved to destroy another village, and that the remainder was still at Mohunpoor. Mohunpoor contained the usual native Gurrie, a small loop-holed enclosure, with a ditch some 7 feet wide and 5 deep, recently repaired.

I made my arrangements accordingly, directing Lieutenant Hoggan to advance in skirmishing order with one company, the remainder in support, and behind them again one troop of cavalry, under Lieutenant Warde, who was instructed, when our infantry gained a footing in the village, to move off to the right, and take up a position there. The remainder of the cavalry I kept on the left, where I considered their services would be principally required.

The infantry at once entered the village, meeting with some opposition, but gradually driving the enemy before them, and setting fire to the village. It now became evident that but very few of Nizam Allie Khan's force had remained at Mohunpoor, and only a few sowars and some 30 infantry were in the village, the remainder having, some two hours previously, gone off on a looting expedition to another village some 3 miles distant.

Being well aware, that the Gurrie would be impracticable to the small force under my command, and without guns, I had desired Lieutenant Hoggan to avoid it; simply clearing the village, and driving out those who could not shelter themselves in the Gurrie was my object, hoping that the cavalry might have an opportunity of cutting them up. In this I was disappointed, owing to the instant flight of the few cavalry, who were in the village, the desperation of a few of their infantry who fought well, and the remainder taking refuge in the Gurrie. When the infantry came up to the gurrie, ascertaining that there was not the most remote chance of effecting an entrance, I ordered them to move off to the left, and form up on the cavalry.

Just at this moment, Nizam Allie Khan appeared in the field, with the remainder of his force, some 100 or so cavalry, and about 150 infantry, and moved down with the intention of attacking me. I formed up the cavalry to receive them. He advanced and took possession of a village on a rising mound. Some few sowars showed themselves through the village in my front, and pulled up there. A little delay and a flight of dust on the Rickah and Sheregurh directions, showed me that Nizam Allie Khan thought "discretion the better part of valour." A pursuit was hopeless; the more so, considering the distance we had already come, the length of time men and horses had been accoutred, and the heat and fatigue all had undergone.

I regret to add, that Lieutenant Hoggan, Commanding the Detachment of 17th Punjaub Infantry, was severely wounded. He has my thanks for his endeavours on the occasion of the attack on the village.

To Mr. Low, Civil Service, I am indebted for the excellent information he procured for me, and his making himself useful in the field.

I have omitted to mention above, that the loss of the enemy in the village was about 20 killed.

SIR,

IN continuation of my report of yesterday, I have the honour to state, that information was conveyed to me of the evacuation of the little Gurrie in the village I attacked yesterday, and in it this morning were found 10 dead of the enemy. The Gurrie was made over to the charge of one Mohun Sing; a friendly Zemindar, who occupied it with some of his followers.

Nizam Allie Khan yesterday made for Jawum, about a mile on the Bareilly side of Buheree; he remained there a short time only, and then continued his flight towards Sheregurh. Reports received this morning state, that he has now left Sheregurh, and that a number of his followers have deserted him, some 50 horsemen only remaining with him. I trust this may prove correct. The informants are the Hindoo population of the villages round about, who have been much oppressed by Nizam Allie Khan's plundering parties.

Captain Crossman, with the Rohilkund Horse, has not arrived, nor can I obtain any information whatever regarding him. I have to-day again addressed that officer by cossid, informing him of my arrival here, and that I will halt here tomorrow in the hope of his arrival; but that, should he not arrive, or I obtain no authentic intelligence regarding him, it was not my intention to delay here any longer, but to move towards Bareilly by the route furnished me.

As my object in coming out here was to escort Captain Crossman's party into Bareilly, I trust that the Brigadier-General will approve of the course I intend adopting in halting one day, with the view of carrying out the purpose for which I was detached; but at the same time I do not consider I should be justified in remaining out here any longer.

P.S.—4 P.M.—Since the above was written, Mr. Low informs me, that Nizam Allie Khan is at Budouree raising followers. Budouree is some five miles distant, nearly north-west of this.

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 19, dated 26th instant.

Yesterday, some few hours after the despatch of my letter, I had ascertained from a cossid, and from some travellers from Huldwanee, that Captain Crossman had that morning marched for Kala Doongee, which being the first march by the Moradabad road, I determined on not remaining another day at Buheree, and accordingly this morning marched here.

I am glad to be able to state, that the attack on the village of Mohunpoor has had an excellent effect. Nizam Allie Khan's followers have dispersed; the band is broken up; Nizam Allie Khan himself has fled to the Nawab of Rampore's district.

To-morrow morning I will proceed to Chahee.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.

THE Right Honorable the Governor-General is pleased to direct the publication of the following despatch from the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Army, dated 10th June, 1858, forwarding one from Brigadier-General Sir E. Lugard, K.C.B., Commanding Azimgurh Field Force, reporting the operations of his force, since the 14th ultimo, the date of his last report.

Brigadier-General Sir E. Lugard, K.C.B., Commanding Azimgurh Field Force, to the Chief of the Staff.

SIR, Camp, Jugdespore, May 27, 1858.

I HAVE the honor to report to you, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the following operations of the force under my command since the 14th instant, the date of my last report.

2. On the 16th, I despatched a party under the command of Major Lightfoot, 84th Foot, to burn the house of Hurkissen Sing and the village of Buradhee, in which it was situated; the village of Urailla, the inhabitants of which had aided the rebels and evinced an inimical spirit, was destroyed at the same time.

3. On the 18th, I moved out against the rebels, who had established themselves at Metahi, where Ummer Sing had a large house, about two miles from Jugdespore. On our approach, the rebels opened fire from the two 12-pounder howitzers they captured from the Arrah party on the 23rd ultimo, and showed in great force; but so soon as the line of infantry advanced, they retired into the jungle, carrying away their guns; upon which I destroyed the house and village, and returned to camp; the loss of the rebels must have been severe, as the fire from the battery guns, under Lieutenants Campbell and Bradford, was very good. My own casualties were small, as shown by the accompanying return.

4. On the 20th, Mr. Burrows, railway contractor, commenced, at my desire, cutting down the jungle in the vicinity of Jugdespore, so as to obtain a broad clear road through it, in the direction of Arrah, and, fearing that the rebels might creep up and fire upon the workmen, who, if once struck, would no doubt abandon the work altogether, I sent my horse artillery and cavalry, under Lieutenant-Colonel Robertson, Military Train, round to the south-west of Duleppoor, where the main body of the rebels were established, to endeavour to divert their attention. In a few hours, receiving a report from the Lieutenant-Colonel that the enemy were following him into the open country in great numbers, I hastened from camp with a few companies of the 10th Foot, the battery guns, and some cavalry, direct upon Metahi, in the hope of getting between them and the jungle; in this I partially succeeded and inflicted severe punishment upon them. I regret, however, that Lieutenant Dawson, Military Train, was killed, and Lieutenant Maxwell, Royal Horse Artillery, with Serjeant H. Robinson, Royal Horse Artillery, and Private R. McGuire, 10th Foot, were wounded in this skirmish.

5. From the operation of the 20th instant, it seemed to me that, by a combined movement upon the rebels, I might possibly crush them, and capture their 2 guns, which they prized greatly, and

invariably withdrew so rapidly into the jungle when we advanced, that there was little chance of taking them by any direct attack.

6. It was my earnest wish to have had a small force to co-operate with me from the south, but as Colonel Corfield had declared his inability to assist me in any way, I decided upon making a final assault upon the rebels on the 26th instant with my own force.

7. My plan was to endeavour to draw the enemy out from the jungle, as I did on the 20th, then to make a feeble attack upon them at Metahi, so as to occupy them without actually driving them in, whilst a body of infantry moved down through the thick jungle direct from Jugdespore, and came upon their rear.

8. This, I am happy to say, succeeded almost beyond my expectation, and resulted in the capture of the 2 howitzers, 2 elephants, and the complete dispersion of the rebels.

9. The horse artillery and cavalry under Lieutenant-Colonel Riddell, Royal Artillery, left camp as soon as day broke, and moved round to the south-west of Duleppoor, attracting the attention of the rebels, who evidently expected an attack, and made their arrangements accordingly.

10. Eight companies of the 10th Foot, under the direction of Brigadier Douglas, C.B., were formed in the jungle close to Jugdespore post, prepared to move down when I should send the order; and the remainder of the troops available, consisting of two companies 10th Foot, five companies 84th Foot, 100 of Rattray's Sikhs, Punjaub sappers, with 4 battery guns (Cotter's) under Lieutenant Campbell, and some cavalry, I moved direct upon Metahi, leaving the camp in charge of a party of the 84th Foot, with some Sikh sowars under Captain Creagh, and the post at Jugdespore with a company of the Madras Rifles, under Captain Bolton.

11. Major Carr, whom I had moved from Arrah to the east side of the jungle, I reinforced with another company of the 84th Foot, and 50 Sikh cavalry, and directed to patrol along, and watch the Eastern limit of the jungle.

12. The movement upon Metahi apparently convinced the rebels that the attack was to be the same as on the 20th, and they lined the same banks, and took up the same position as before. I now directed Brigadier Douglas' column to move down, and so soon as I ascertained they had penetrated the jungle as far as where I was, without the enemy perceiving it, I advanced my skirmishers, and the rebels most fortunately fired their howitzers, and thus showed us their exact position.

13. A cheer and a rapid rush settled the affair: the guns were secured by the Grenadier Company of the 84th Foot, whilst the 10th pursued the rebels through the jungle south, down to Chitowrah, and through the dense jungle to the west of that place, scattering them, and driving them completely out into the open county, at a distance, however, of several miles from where the artillery had been posted. Two elephants were captured, and many rebel sepoys killed in this rapid pursuit, which nothing but the excitement of the chase, and the high spirit and powers of endurance of the soldiers enabled them to carry out. The greater proportion, however, at last dropped, thoroughly exhausted, and it was some hours before they could move to camp, then distant some seven miles.

14. I am happy to say no casualty occurred in my force.

15. I take this opportunity of bringing to the notice of his Excellency, as I promised in a former report, the excellent conduct of the troops under my command, from the 29th March, the date of our quitting Lucknow, and throughout these operations; the work has been most arduous, but the

spirit and cheerfulness of the soldiers have never failed. The whole of the troops named in the margin,* with their respective commanding officers, have earned my warmest thanks, and merit his Excellency's approbation.

16. To Brigadier Douglas, C.B., I feel much indebted for the zealous manner in which he has invariably carried out all my instructions. I am also much indebted to Lieutenant-Colonel Riddell, commanding the artillery, for his able and indefatigable assistance, as well as to the several officers commanding the regiments and detachments before named.

17. Of the merits of the divisional and personal staff of this force, I cannot speak too highly, or recommend them in sufficiently strong terms to the notice of his Excellency.

18. Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, Chief of my Staff, Major Sir H. M. Havelock, Bart., Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General, and Captain Wilkinson, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General have aided me in every possible manner, with untiring zeal and energy. Lieutenant McNeill, my Aide-de-Camp, with Captain Middleton, extra Aide-de-Camp, (latterly also Deputy Judge Advocate-General to the Force,) deserve my best thanks; they are both very intelligent and active staff officers, and have rendered me much assistance; the exertions of Captain Stevenson, Brigade-Major, have been most indefatigable, as have been those of Major Turner, Adjutant, Royal Artillery, and Captain Young, Royal Artillery, Commissary of Ordnance: with the Commissariat Officers, Captain Roberts, Captain Holland and Lieutenant Bates, I have been well satisfied, as also with Captain Creagh, Postmaster, lately in charge of the Military Chest.

19. I beg most especially to recommend to his Excellency's notice, Doctor Gordon, Surgeon of the 10th Foot, and Senior Medical Officer in charge of this force; his exertions have been untiring; though at times suffering from sickness, he never quitted his post, but continued his valuable superintendence; I feel more indebted to him than I can express. To the other Medical Officers of the force also much credit is due.

20. It affords me much pleasure to bring to the notice of his Excellency, Serjeant Edward Connor, 10th Foot, who has performed the duties of Deputy Provost and Deputy Baggage-Master to this Force, with a zeal and untiring energy that could not be surpassed. A more trustworthy, intelligent, and hard-working public servant, or a braver soldier does not exist.

21. I have also to record my best thanks to Mr. Macdonell, Civil Service, who has accompanied my camp in this district as Special Commissioner; to Mr. Madocks, Civil Service, Collector of Behar; and to Mr. Charles Kelly, Railway Engineer, for the very valuable assistance they have given me.

THE Right Honorable the Governor-General is pleased to direct the publication of the following despatch, from the Assistant Adjutant-General of the Army, dated 9th June, 1858, forwarding one from Brigadier-General J. Jones, C.B., commanding Shahjehanpore Field Force, reporting his operations against Mohumdee, from the 24th to 26th May inclusive.

No. 18.

Brigadier-General J. Jones, C.B., Commanding Shahjehanpore Field Force, to the Deputy Adjutant-General of the Army.

Camp, Shahjehanpore,

SIR, June 1, 1858.

THE Shahjehanpore Field Force crossed the river by the bridge of boats during the night of the 23rd, and formed in order of battle in front of the village of Loodipore.

At daylight the force advanced, and found the enemy in position at the fort of Burnai.

The following was the order in which the troops advanced:—The heavy guns along the road in the centre; First brigade on the right, consisting of the 79th Highlanders and 1st Seikhs, supported by Her Majesty's 82nd Regiment; Captain Hammond's Battery, the Carabiniers, and Captain Lind's Horse being on the right flank; 2nd Brigade on the left of the heavy guns, composed of the 60th Royal Rifles and 1st Punjaub Rifles, supported by the 64th Regiment; Lieutenant-Colonel Tombs' Troop Horse Artillery, 9th Lancers, and Captain Cureton's Cavalry on the left flank.

The Sappers and Miners were in rear of the heavy guns, and Captain Austen's Battery in support.

The enemy opened their guns in quick succession, and for a few minutes their fire was heavy; but the effect produced by our 24-pounders was soon seen; the enemy withdrew his bullock guns at once, continuing the fire with the guns he had horsed. As the line advanced, these also were withdrawn, and the fort was entered without any attempt at a stand.

The force rapidly continued its advance, the right bringing right shoulders forward, the Carabiniers and Captain Hammond's Battery at the trot.

When in pursuit of the enemy, one of the ammunition waggons of Captain Hammond's battery accidentally exploded, when, I regret to say, three men were killed.

I was particularly anxious that the left should push on with still greater rapidity, but the enemy seemed to be equally aware of the necessity of checking us here. He threw masses of cavalry round our flank, and a few of his horsemen were found ready to charge when any opportunity offered.

The Mooltanee Regiment of Cavalry were charged by a large body under cover of a top of

trees; about thirty of them were enabled to get into the rear of the regiment, whilst some galloped up to the front, and discharged their carbines.

Those who had got into the rear of the regiment were cut to pieces, when Captain Cureton dashed at the body in his front, broke, and pursued them to some distance, killing the commandant of cavalry and another officer of rank.

The pursuit was kept up by the infantry for a few miles, when they were obliged to halt, and was continued by the light field guns and cavalry to a considerable distance; but the overpowering heat of the sun rendered it advisable to place the European portion of the troops under cover as soon as possible.

I encamped six miles beyond the fort of Burnai, which I caused to be blown up, one damaged gun being there taken.

Early on the 25th, I was close to Mohumdee. The enemy's cavalry were seen formed on the road. I ordered up the light guns, 9th Lancers, and Captain Cureton's Cavalry, but a few rounds from Captain Austen's Battery dispersed the party.

The town and fort were found to be evacuated, and they were immediately occupied.

Under the superintendence of that able officer of engineers, Captain Drummond, they were soon destroyed. One damaged gun was taken in the fort, and four were found concealed in a neighbouring garden.

The enemy had commenced his retreat from Mohumdee, about noon on the 24th; his families and valuables had been carried far into the jungles that skirt the north-eastern portion of Oude.

The cavalry was employed, during the 26th, in clearing the country in the direction of the enemy's retreat, and to the right and left of Mohumdee. One party of Mooltanee Cavalry, under Lieutenant B. Williams, discovered a fort in which was found a large quantity of gunpowder, which was used in blowing it up; 3 guns were dug up there, and a large number of gun carriages evidently manufactured at Futtygurh. Three other guns were discovered in a village close at hand; several of the villages round were burnt, and, after completely scouring the country, the force returned to Shahjehanpore, which it reached on the morning of the 29th.

I have the honor to enclose a list of casualties, and a return of the ordnance captured.

The troops behaved admirably; for two days the heat was excessive, and, notwithstanding every possible precaution, I regret to say that, on the 24th and 25th the loss of European troops by stroke of the sun amounted to twenty-seven.

I am much indebted to Brigadier Hagard, commanding Cavalry Brigade; Lieutenant-Colonel Tombs, C.B., command Artillery Division; Brigadier Taylor, C.B., commanding 1st Infantry Brigade; and Brigadier Coke, C.B., commanding 2nd Infantry Brigade; also to the several officers commanding regiments and detachments of the force.

My staff as usual afforded me every assistance in carrying out my orders.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the rectory of All Saints, Southampton, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, for the patronage of the rectory of Bramdean, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas the patronage of the said rectory of All Saints, Southampton, is vested in your Majesty and your successors, in right of the Crown, and the value of the said rectory does not exceed twenty pounds in the king's books; and whereas the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, is seized in right of his see of the patronage of the said rectory of Bramdean, and the value of such last-mentioned rectory does not exceed twenty pounds in the king's books.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Frederic, Baron Chelmsford, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, and the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange and the relative value of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to

your Majesty, that having regard to the more onerous nature of the duties to be performed by the incumbent of the said rectory of All Saints, Southampton, as compared with those to be performed by the incumbent of the said rectory of Bramdean, the value of the said rectory of All Saints, Southampton, is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the said rectory of Bramdean; and that the particulars of such benefices, respectively, are as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable Frederic Baron Chelmsford, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, and of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof the said Frederic Baron Chelmsford hath signed, and the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, hath signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any further or other assurance or conveyance in the law, the patronage of or right of nomination to the said Rectory of All Saints, Southampton, shall be assigned and transferred from your Majesty and your successors in right of the Crown, and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may be exercised by the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, and his successors in the said see, and that in exchange for the same the patronage of or right of nomination to the said rectory of Bramdean shall in like manner be assigned and transferred from the said bishop and his successors, and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may be exercised by your Majesty and your successors in right of the Crown.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of an Act passed in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter twenty-six; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of July, in the year one

thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the words following; that is to say :

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter twenty-six, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for improving the Precincts of the Cathedral Church of Hereford.

" Whereas it is by the first recited Act, amongst other things, enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any sum of money which shall have been invested in the public funds, or in any other security or securities, in trust for any ecclesiastical body, corporate, aggregate, or sole, may, upon an application in writing to us, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter, with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same shall be sold accordingly; and the produce of such sale shall be applied to such purpose, and in such manner as shall appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate.

" And whereas it is by the secondly recited Act enacted, that it shall be lawful for the dean and chapter of any cathedral church under the like authority, to purchase any house or site, being contiguous or near to such cathedral church, or any part of such house or site, and to add to, alter, or improve any such house, or to take down the same and to build another house, or more houses than one, upon the site thereof, or to apply the site of any such house, or any part thereof, by and with the like authority, to the improvement of the cathedral or the precincts thereof.

" And whereas it is by the same Act declared and enacted, that the provisions of the first hereinbefore recited Act, relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, do and shall include and apply to all monies and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Account-General of the Court of Chancery, for or to the credit, or for the benefit of, or in trust for, any dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise, and that the same provisions shall extend, and may be applied to any of the purposes of the now reciting Act.

" And whereas there is now standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, and to the credit of the Dean and chapter of Hereford, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, a sum of six hundred and eighty-nine pounds seventeen shillings and fourpence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities.

" And whereas the piece or parcel of land, particularly described in the schedule hereunder written, is situate contiguous to the said Cathedral Church of Hereford, and belongs in fee to Charles Trokes, of Putson, near to the city of Hereford, Gentleman.

" And whereas it is desirable, with a view to the improvement of the precincts of the said cathedral church, that the said ground and premises should be permanently vested in the said dean and chapter.

" And whereas the said Charles Trokes is willing, for the purpose aforesaid, to sell and dispose of the fee simple in possession of the said ground, for the price or sum of five hundred pounds.

" And whereas an application has been made to us in writing under the seal of the said dean and chapter for the investment of an adequate portion of the said consolidated bank annuities, in such purchase.

" We therefore humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Renn Dickson, Bishop of Hereford, as the visitor of the said Cathedral Church of Hereford, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that so much of the said sum of six hundred and eighty-nine pounds, seventeen shillings and four pence, Three pounds per centum, Consolidated Bank Annuities, as shall be required by the said dean and chapter, for providing the said price or sum of five hundred pounds, together with the amount of the costs, charges and expences, incident to effecting such purchase, may and shall be sold, and that the proceeds of the sale thereof shall be applied to and invested in the purchase by the said dean and chapter of the piece or parcel of ground particularly described in the said schedule hereunto annexed, and that the said dean and chapter shall and may so deal with and appropriate the same and each and every part thereof, as shall in their judgment be most conducive to the improvement of their cathedral and the precincts thereof, in conformity with the provisions of the said secondly recited Act.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and to fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas it is expedient that a further

regulation should be made as to the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this present Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:

1. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the East Indies, without any postage having been paid thereon, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage to which such letter, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, would be liable under the regulations in force relating thereto, every such letter shall, until the 31st day of December, 1858, inclusive, be forwarded charged with the amount of the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence; and from and after the said 31st day of December, 1858, every such letter instead of being forwarded shall be detained and opened, and be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, as directed by the said recited Warrant of the 13th day of August, 1858.

2. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Warrant of the 13th day of August, 1858.

3. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant, under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders, directions, or regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations, in lieu thereof.

4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of September, 1858.
