"Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues, authorized to be levied by the said Act, are paid and collected;

And whereas the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond are erecting, and about to light, two new lighthouses, at High Whitby, on the coast of Yorkshire;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, upon the completion and lighting of the said lights, there shall be paid in respect of such lights, for every British vessel, and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels, which may pass or derive benefit from such lights, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and for every foreign vessel not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed. that the said tolls, in respect of the said lighthouses, shall be levied by the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, subject to the abatement or discount of twenty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of ten per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five; and subject also to the further abatement or discount of fifteen per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of fifteen per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, provided for by an Order in Council, dated the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven; and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, sanctioned by the said Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

HEREAS by "The Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1856," it is enacted that when the burgesses entered on the burgess roll of the borough, shall exceed one thousand three hundred in number, it shall be lawful for the council, with the consent and approbation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to declare that after a time, to be specified in a resolution to be passed by the council for that purpose, the council shall consist of a mayor, six aldermen, and eighteen councillors, and that the borough shall be divided into three wards, and with the like consent to appoint a barrister to divide the borough into three wards, and to set out within the period of one calendar month after the date of his or their appointment, the extent, limit, and boundary lines of such wards, and what portions of the borough shall be included therein respectively, but so, nevertheless, that no ward shall, at the time of such division, contain less than three hundred burgesses, and the barrister setting out such wards shall apportion among such wards the eighteen councillors of the borough, and in assigning the number of councillors to each ward, the said barrister shall, as far as in his judgment he may deem it to be practicable, have regard as well to the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in such ward as to the aggregate amount of the sums at which all the said persons shall be so rated: Provided always, that the number of councillors assigned to each ward shall be a number divisible by three, and a copy of the particulars of such division into wards, and of the number of

councillors so assigned to each ward, shall be signed by the barrister who made the same, and forthwith transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and subject to the approval of Her Majesty by the advice of Her Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and another copy of such particulars shall be delivered to the town clerk of the borough, to be by him safely kept among the public documents of the borough; and the borough shall, after such publication, be deemed to be divided into wards accordingly; and the number of councillors so assigned to each ward of the borough shall, after such publication as aforesaid, be the number of councillors to be elected in such ward, and shall so continue until the same shall be altered by the authority of Parliament.

And whereas, John Robert Davison, Esquire, the barrister appointed by the council of the said borough of Middlesbrough, under the provisions of the said recited Act, has made an Award, bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, dividing the said borough into three wards, and allotting the number of councillors to each, and the same has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Award (copy whereof is hereunto annexed), into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, and doth

hereby declare, Her approval of the same; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct, that the said Award, together with this Order, be published in the London Gazette, in pursuance of the said Act.

AWARD ABOVE REFERRED TO.

To all to whom these presents shall come, I, John Robert Davison, Esquire, of the Middle Temple, London, Barrister-at-Law, send greeting. Whereas by the second section of "The Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1856," it is enacted that the word or expression "Borough," when used in that Act, should mean the Municipal Borough of Middlesbrough, in the North Riding of the county of York, as it existed, and according to the limits thereof, at the time of the passing of that Act; and also that the word "Council" in like manner should mean the Council of the Borough. And by the fourth section of the said Act, after reciting that the borough was not then divided into wards, but that the rapidly increasing population thereof rendered it expedient that provisions should be made for effecting such division at a future period, and for increasing the number of the council, it was enacted, that when the burgesses entered on the burgess roll of the borough should exceed one thousand three hundred in number, it should be lawful for the council, with the consent and approbation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to declare that after a time, to be specified in a resolution to be passed by the council for that purpose, the Council should consist of a mayor, six aldermen, and eighteen councillors, and that the borough should be divided into three wards, and, with the like consent, to appoint a barrister to divide the borough into three wards, and to set out, within the period of one calendar month after the date of his appointment, the extent, limit, and boundary lines of such wards, and what portions of the borough should be included therein respectively, but so, nevertheless, that no ward should, at the take effect from the time specified in the resolution

time of such division, contain less than three hundred burgesses; and that the barrister setting out such wards should apportion among such wards the eighteen councillors of the borough; and in assigning the number of councillors to each ward the said barrister should, as far as in his judgment he might deem it to be practicable, have regard as well to the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in such ward as to the aggregate amount of the sums at which all the said persons should be so rated. Provided always that the number of councillors assigned to each ward should be a number divisible by three, and that a copy of the particulars of such division into wards and of the number of councillors so assigned to each ward, should be signed by the barrister who made the same and forthwith transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and, subject to the approval of Her Majesty, by the advice of Her Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and another copy of such particulars should be delivered to the town clerk of the borough, to be by him safely kept among the public documents of the borough, and that the borough should, after such publication, be deemed to be divided into wards accordingly, and that the number of councillors so assigned to each ward of the borough should, after such publication as aforesaid, be the number of councillors to be elected in such ward, and should so continue until the same should be altered by the authority of parliament

And whereas by "The Middlesbrough Improve-ment Act, 1858," the limits of the existing borough (which last-mentioned expression was thereby defined to mean the borough as it existed, and according to the limits thereof at the time of the passing of that Act), were altered, extended, and straightened so as to include all the lands, houses, buildings, roads, and works situate within a line or limits in the same Act particularly described and set forth. And it was thereby enacted that the lands, houses, buildings, roads and works. so then added to the existing borough, and included within the borough (which expression the borough, when used in the now reciting Act, is thereby declared to mean the Municipal Borough of Middlesbrough as altered and extended by that Act) should thenceforth be and be deemed part thereof to all intents and purposes whatsoever, in the same manner in all respects as if such lands, houses, buildings, roads and works had been comprised in the existing borough, and made part thereof by the royal charter of incorporation of the said borough in the now reciting Act recited or referred to, and that all the powers and provisions of the Municipal Corporation Acts, then applicable to the existing borough, and of the said two herein recited Improvement Acts then applicable to the existing borough, should respectively apply to the lands, houses, buildings, roads and works by the now reciting Act added to, and included within, the said borough, and should thenceforth be put in force throughout the same in all respects as if the borough had been described in such charter of incorporation, instead of the then existing borough. And whereas by the sixth section of the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1858," it is, after reciting the said fourth section of the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1856," and stating that it was expedient that the time at which under such section the division of the borough into wards would take effect should be more clearly defined, enacted that the division of the borough into wards should after such approval and publication as required by the said section,

passed by the council for that purpose, and the borough should from such time be deemed to be divided into wards accordingly, and the number of the councillors assigned to each ward of the borough should as from such time be the number of councillors to be elected in such ward. And whereas by the ninth section of the same Act, it was enacted that all the powers and provisions of the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1856" (in the now reciting Act called "The Second Improvement Act") applicable to the division of the then existing borough into wards and incident thereto, should, subject to the provisions of the now reciting Act, apply to the borough as altered and extended by the now reciting Act. And whereas, at the time of the passing of the resolution next hereinafter mentioned, videlicet, on the fourth day of this instant month of August, the burgesses entered on the existing burgess roll of the borough amounted in number to one thousand five hundred and thirty. And whereas at a special meeting of the council of the said borough of Middlesbrough lawfully convened and held in the Council-room in the Corporation-hall in the said borough, on Wednesday the fourth day of this instant month of August, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyeight, it was, as appears by resolutions or orders of such meeting, under the hand of Henry Thompson, Esquire, the mayor presiding at such meeting, and also under the corporate common seal of the borough, in pursuance and by the authority of the said recited Acts, that is to say, of the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1856," and the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1858," and of each of them, resolved, ordered, ordained, and declared. And they the council of the borough of Middlesbrough did, in pursuance of and by the authority aforesaid, and of all other powers and authorities in anywise enabling them in that behalf, resolve, order, ordain, and declare as follows; that is to

First. That from and after the fifteenth day of October in this present year, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the council of the borough of Middlesbrough should consist of a mayor, six aldermen and eighteen councillors, and that the borough should be divided into three wards.

Second. That I, the said John Robert Davison, should be, and I was thereby appointed to divide the borough into three wards, and to set out within the period of one calendar month after the date of that my appointment the extent, limit, and boundary lines of such wards and what portions of the borough shall be included therein respectively, and also with full power to have and exercise all and every other the powers and authorities of the said two last-mentioned Acts incident to such division which became vested in me by virtue of that my appointment, and of the said Acts. And whereas, on the fifth day of this instant month of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, did by a writing under his hand signify his consent unto and approbation of the said resolutions or orders. Now, therefore, I the said John Robert Davison, having this day attended at the Corporation Hall in the said borough of Middlesbrough, in pursuance of public notice to that effect, and having had produced before me the said existing Burgess Roll, a plan of the borough, and the said resolutions or orders, and also the said consent unto and approval thereof, and having heard witnesses and examined fully into the premises, do, by virtue of the powers and authorities in me vested as aforesaid, hereby divide and set out the said

borough of Middlesbrough, as altered and extended by the said secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, into three wards of such extent and limit, and with such boundary lines respectively as are hereinafter mentioned and set forth; that is to say:

NORTH EAST WARD.

All those portions of the borough situate within the following boundary line or limits; (that is to

A line commencing at the mid-channel line of the river Tees opposite the extreme northwestern point of the borough of Middlesbrough, as defined in the "Middlesbrough Improvement Act, 1858," thence in a straight line to the present extreme north-western point, and thence to and along the western side of a row of houses, and of their appurtenances there situate, to and up to the centre of a stell or watercourse at the south-western corner of certain lands, works, and buildings belonging to and in the occupation of Thomas Snowdon and William Randolph Innes Hopkins, heretofore part of lands called "Bell's Inclosure" and "Salt land," thence along the centre line of the said stell or watercourse in an easterly direction for about eighty yards to the western boundary of a certain triangular piece of land lately belonging to the Stockton and Darlington Railway Company and now belonging to and occupied by the said Thomas Snowdon and William Randolph Innes Hopkins, thence in a southerly direction along the western boundary of the said triangular piece of land to the centre of the Middlesbrough branch of the Stockton and Darlington Railway, thence in an easterly direction across the said railway, and thence in a north-easterly direction along the eastern side of the said branch railway to the point where the said branch railway crosses a stell or watercourse which forms the boundary between the land of the said Stockton and Darlington Railway Company and the lands of Thomas Hustler, Esquire, thence in an easterly direction in a line along the centre of the said last-named stell or watercourse to a certain fence at or near the north end of Stockton-street, which said fence forms the boundary-fence between the lands of the said Thomas Hustler, Esquire, and those of Joseph Pease, and the other owners of the Middlesbrough estate, thence in a southerly direction along a line running immediately on the western side of the said fence to a point opposite to the centre line of West-street and parallel with such centre line, thence direct across certain land of Joseph Pease and others and Stocktonstreet to and along the centre line of West-street, thence through the centre of the Market Place, through the Market House, and along the centre line of East-street to the centre line of the northeastern end of Cleveland-street, thence along the centre line of Cleveland-street to the point where that street intersects the centre line of Lower Feversham-street, thence along the centre line of Lower Feversham-street to the point where that line intersects the centre line of Grey-street, thence along the centre line of Grey-street to the south end of that street, thence in a straight line across the Stockton and Darlington-Railway and lands of Joseph Pease and others to the nearest point in the centre line of the Marton-road (which road also belongs to the said Joseph Pease and others), thence along the centre line of the Martonroad, first in a south-easterly, and then in a southerly direction to the point where such centre line intersects the boundary line of the borough, thence, first in an easterly, afterwards in a southerly, and again in an easterly direction along such boundary line to the centre of a certain stream or watercourse called Ormesby Beck, forming the boundary between the parishes of Middlesbrough and Ormesby, thence in a northerly direction along the centre of the said stream and parish boundary to the point where the eastern boundary fence of the Middlesbrough and Guisbrough Railway intersects or crosses the said stream or parish boundary, thence along the said eastern boundary fence of the said Middlesbrough and Guisbrough Railway to the point where the said eastern boundary fence intersects the line of a certain private road leading from Middlesbrough to Ormesby; thence across such road, thence along the centre of a certain newly formed stream or watercourse, which at present forms the boundary between the lands of James White Pennyman, Esquire, and of the said Joseph Pease and others, to a point where the said newly formed stream or watercourse takes a decided turn to the east, which said point is distant fifty yards from the south fence of the Middlesbrough and Redcar Railway, and thence in a straight line in an easterly direction along the centre of the said stream so far as it extends, and fifty yards distant from the said south fence of the said Middlesbrough and Redcar Railway, and thence in a straight line, at the like distance and parallel with the same south fence, to the point where such straight line intersects a certain stream at or near Cleveland Port, called Normanby Beck otherwise Spencer Beck, thence along the midstream of the same beck to the Middlesbrough and Redcar Railway, and thence proceeding along the southern fence of the same railway to the one and three quarter mile post from Middlesbrough on the same railway, thence in a northern direction at right angles with the line of the said Middlesbrough and Redcar Railway at the said mile post to the midchannel line of the river Tees, thence along such midchannel line upwards in a northwesterly direction to the said first-named point in the said midchannel line opposite the said extreme north-western boundary of the borough.

WEST WARD.

All those portions of the borough situate within the following boundary line or limits; (that is to say): A line commencing by a junction with the north-east ward immediately on the western side of the boundary fence between the lands of Thomas Hustler, Esquire, and those of Joseph Pease and the other owners of the Middlesbrough Estate at a point opposite the centre line of Weststreet and parallel with such centre line, thence in a southerly direction along a line running immediately on the western side of the said lastmentioned fence, and of the other fences lying to the southward thereof (and forming continuously a line of boundary fences between the lands of the said Thomas Hustler, Esquire, and the lands of Joseph Pease and others,) up to the extreme south-west corner of a certain plantation called the "Long Plantation," belonging to the said Joseph Pease and others, being the point where the southernmost of the said boundary fences joins the land of James Robertson Bryant, thence in a straight line in a southerly direction to the north-western corner of the boundary wall or fence of the Middlesbrough cemetery, thence along the western side of the western boundary wall of the said cemetery, as far as the southwestern corner of the said cemetery, and thence in a straight line in continuation of the said western boundary wall to the northern fence of an occupation road, leading out of the highway from Middlesbrough to Linthorpe, to a certain farm-

house, buildings, and premises belonging to Henry Walker, and ealled "Oldgate Farm," thence in an easterly direction along the line of the lastmentioned fence, to the centre of the said highway leading from Middlesbrough to Linthorpe (and which same highway is called Linthorpe-road), thence in a northerly direction along the centre line of such road, and across the Stockton and Darlington railway to the southern end of Sussexstreet, thence along the centre line of Sussexstreet to South-street, thence along the centre line of South-street in a straight line to the point in the market-house, where such line intersects the boundary line of the said north-east ward, thence in a north-westerly direction along such boundary line, to the point where the same line reaches the west side of the said boundary fence between the said lands of Thomas Hustler, Esquire, and those of the said Joseph Pease and others.

MIDDLE WARD.

All those portions of the borough, situate within the following boundary line or limits (that is to say): A line commencing in the market-house at the point of junction between the North-east Ward and the West Ward, as hereinbefore defined or set out, and proceeding thence in a southeasterly direction along the boundary line of the North-east Ward, as before defined, in East-street, Cleveland-street, Lower Feversham-street, across the Stockton and Darlington Railway, and lands of Joseph Pease and others, and to the centre line of Marton-road, thence along the boundary line of the North-east Ward, as before defined in such road, to the point where such last-mentioned boundary line intersects the boundary line of the borough, thence along the same boundary line to the eastern side of the said highway called Lin. thorpe-road, thence along such eastern side to and as far as a point immediately opposite the south-eastern extremity of the West Ward, as before defined, thence to the centre of the said highway, called Linthorpe-road, thence along the castern boundary line of the West Ward, as before defined, in Linthorpe-road, across the Stockton and Darlington Railway, in Sussex-street, South-street, the market-place, and market-house, to the beforementioned point of junction between the Northeast Ward and the West Ward in the market-

Each of such three wards, containing at this present time upwards of three hundred burgesses: And I do hereby apportion and assign to each of the said three wards six councillors.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, sections nineteen and twenty, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section

one, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the tenth June, in the year one thousand eight hundeed and fifty-eight, in the words following; that

is to may:
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Englan l, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, section nine, of the Act of the fourteenth and fif-teenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninetyseven, sections nineteen and twenty, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at New Bolingbroke, in the parish of Bolingbroke, in the county and diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous parts of the parishes of Bolingbroke, Asgarby, Frieston, Mavis Enderby, Miningsby, Raithby, and Revesby, in the said county and diocese, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter, situate at New Bolingbroke aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, patron in right of his see of the said parish of Asgarby, of Sir John James Smith, of No. 30, Berkeley-square, in the county of Middlesex, and of the Down House, in the county of Dorset, Baronet, patron of the said parish of Bolingbroke, of the Reverend William Morley, of Mavis Enderby aforesaid, Clerk, patron of the said parish of Mavis En-derby, of the Most Noble James, Duke of Montrose, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, patron in right of the Crown of the said parish of Miningsby, and of the Right Honourable Frederic, Baron Chelmsford, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, patron in right of the Crown of the said parish of Raithby, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that all those contiguous parts of the said parishes of Bolingbroke, Asgarby, Frieston, Mavis Enderby, Miningsby, Raithby, and Revesby, described in the schedule hereunder written, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united into one consolidated chapelry for the said church at New Bolingbroke aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Peter, New Boling-

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said John, Bishop of Lincoln, John James Smith, William Morley, James Duke of Montrose, and Frederic Baron Chelmsford, testified as aforesaid that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry shall belong to, and be exercised by, the trustees named in the Act of the fifty-eighth year of His Majesty King

George the Third, chapter forty-six.
"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All those several parts of the parishes of Asgarby, Bolingbroke, Frieston, Mavis Enderby, Miningsby, Raithby, and Revesby, being the allot-

ments belonging to such parishes, and situate in the West Fen, all in the county and diocese of Lincoln, respectively bounded by and comprised within an imaginary line, commencing at a point (marked A on the map hereunto annexed) in the centre of the bridge by which a certain road called Stickney Road is carried over Medlam Drain, and extending thence in a north-westerly direction along the middle of such drain to a point opposite to the middle of another drain joining the same, which is known as Small Drain, and forms the southern boundary of Mavis Enderby allotment, and extending thence in an easterly direction along the middle of such last-mentioned drain to the centre of the bridge by which the Hagnaby Lock road is carried over the same drain, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road, until it trends eastward on meeting the drain forming the boundary between Raithby allotment and Hagnaby allotment, and extending thence still northward along the middle of such last-mentioned drain to the middle of another drain forming the northern boundary of the Raithby Fen allotment aforesaid, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned drain to the middle of Medlam Drain aforesaid, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned drain to a distance of eighty-eight yards, to a point opposite the middle of another drain intersecting the Revesby Fen allotment, and extending thence westward to the middle of the road called Seven Miles Road, and extending thence northward for a distance of twelve yards along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite the middle of another drain interseeting the said Revesby Fen allotment, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned drain to the middle of the Revesby Bank Road, and extending thence in a southwesterly direction along the middle of such lastmentioned road crossing the lane called Occupation-lane, and extending thence southernly to the middle of the road called Chapel Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to the middle of Seven Miles Road aforesaid, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the middle of the Stickney Road aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to the point at which the said imaginary line commenced."

"And whereas a sum of three thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence, three pounds per centum consolidated bank annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by Robert Hanbury, of Poles, in the said county of Hertford, Esquire, upon the understanding that the annual payment hereinafter mentioned should be made by us to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall have become, under the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the said new parish.

said new parish.

"And whereas the said Robert Hanbury has covenanted and agreed with us to provide, at his own cost, and expense a church to be offered for approval by us, and for consecration by the bishop of the diocese as the church of the said district, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and for the use and service of the minister or incumbent, and of the inhabitants thereof.

"And whereas it is intended that one-half part at least of the sittings in the said church shall be free and unappropriated, and that the remainder of the said sittings shall be let at annual rents, after a rate or scale to be fixed and determined by us, in accordance with the provisions of the herein thirdly mentioned Act, and that the proceeds of the said rents shall be applied according to the provisions of the same Act.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Bishop of Rochester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Ware, and also all that part of the said parish of Great Amwell, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Christ Church, Ware.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the annual sum of one hundred pounds shall be paid by us in each and every year by equal halfyearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said secondlymentioned Act, and so soon as such district shall have become according to the provisions of the the same Act a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then of the said new parish; and that the first of such payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or incumbent, as aforesaid; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or incumbency of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or incumbent making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or incumbent succeeding to such district or new parish: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or incumbent of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, tithe rentcharge, or other hereditament, should be conveyed or secured by us to such minister or incumbent, and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, and the exoneration of our common fund from the payment of the whole, or, as the case may be, from a proportionate part of the said annual sum of one hundred pounds.

" And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the grant of the said sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, as aforesaid, the right of patronage of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, should be assigned to and be vested in the said William Cotton, his heirs and assigns, in manner hereinafter recommended and

proposed.
"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Saint Leonard, Bromley, and all that part of the said parish of Saint Anne, Limehouse, and all that part of the said parish of All Saints, Poplar, and all that part of the said new parish of Trinity, Mile End Old Town, described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, excepting only out of such part of the said parish of Saint Anne, Limehouse that portion of the same which is particularly described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be together constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named "The District of Saint Paul, Stepney."

" And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, under the provisions of the herein firstly mentioned Act, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted I been delivered or transmitted to the incumbents

Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised, by the said William Cotton, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

"FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The district of SAINT PAUL, STEPNEY; being-

"All that part of the parish of Saint Leonard, Bromley, and all that part of the parish of Saint Anne, Limehouse, and all that part of the parish of All Saints, Poplar, and all that part of the new parish of Trinity, Mile End Old Town, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point upon the boundary between the parish of Saint Leonard, Bromley, and the new parish of Trinity, Mile End Old Town, in the middle of Bow Common Lane, and thence extending towards the south along the middle of the said lane and of North-street, forming a continuation thereof, to the middle of the bridge over the Limehouse-cut, and thence continuing towards the west along the middle of the Limehouse-cut aforesaid, as far as a point opposite to a wall extending at right angles from the said Limehouse-cut to the eastern end of the street or road known as Copenhagen place, and thence extending towards the north along the said wall to the middle of Copenhagen-place aforesaid, and thence extending towards the west along the middle of Copenhagenplace, and towards the north-west along the middle of the street or road known as Featherstone-buildings to Rhodeswell-road, and thence continuing towards the north along the middle of the lastnamed road to its junction with the road called or known as Saint Paul's-road, and thence continuing towards the south-east along the middle of the lastnamed road as far as the middle of the bridge which carries the railway called or known as the Blackwall Extension Railway over the same road, and thence continuing towards the north-east along the middle of the said railway as far as a point opposite to the middle of a ditch forming the houndary of certain property belonging to William Cotton, of Walwood House, in the parish of Leytonstone, in the county of Essex, Esquire, and thence extending first towards the north and then towards the east and then again towards the north along the middle of the said ditch to the middle of Bow Commonlane aforesaid, and thence extending towards the south-east along the middle of the said lane to the point where the said imaginary line commenced.

" SECOND SCHEDULE.

" All that portion of the parish of Saint Anne, Limehouse, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London upon which the National Schools for the education of the poor of the said parish are erected, together with the appurtenances belonging to the said premises, and the boundaries of which land and premises, with the buildings thereon, are marked by stones marked with the initial letters "L. N. S."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts and to the patrons respectively of the churches of the parishes out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken; and whereas certain observations and objections which have been offered by the incumbent of the church of the said new parish of Trinity, Mile End Old Town, to the said scheme have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has notwith-standing such observations and objections been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates, which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of colonial posts."

And whereas it is expedient to make regulations for the transmission by the post, within Gibraltar, of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the before mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows; that is to say:

On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in Gibraltar, and transmitted by the post, addressed to a place within that colony, there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of postage of one penny.

On every letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in Gibraltar, and transmitted by the post addressed to a place within that colony, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage. On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

The postage of all such letters as aforesaid shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage-duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant.

If any letter (whatever may be the weight thereof), sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted without having thereon or affixed thereto, any postage stamp, or having thereon or affixed thereto, a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under the provisions of this Warrant, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged in the first mentioned case with the full amount of postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid, together with the further and additional rate of one penny, and charged in the second mentioned case with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon. or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid, together with the further and additional rate of one penny.

The rates of postage chargeable on letters transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of postage now chargeable by law thereon.

The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant, under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October, 1858.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas a Treaty hath been lately entered into between Her Majesty and the Queen of Spain for regulating the communications by post between their respective dominions, and it is expedient for the better carrying out of the same that certain regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare, as follows:

1. On every letter, not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, and on every letter, not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, addressed to the United Kingdom, transmitted by the post, viâ France, or direct by packet-boat between the United Kingdom and any place in Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage of sixpence.

2. On every letter not exceeding one quarter of an onnce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, addressed to Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands, transmitted through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken for the conveyance of every such letter from any part of the United Kingdom to Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands, whether via France, or direct by packet-boat, an uniform rate of postage of sixpages.

uniform rate of postage of sixpence.

3. All such letters so transmitted as hereinbefore in the first and second clauses of this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight and not exceed-one half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one half of an ounce and not exceeding three quarters of an ounce in weight, three rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding three quarters of an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, four rates of postage.

And for every additional quarter of an ounce in weight, of any letter so transmitted respectively as aforesaid, above the weight of one ounce, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, one additional rate of postage; and every fractional part of such additional quarter of an ounce shall be charged as an additional quarter of an ounce in weight; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight.

4. On letters posted in Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, addressed to any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, transmitted by the post from Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, to Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, without passing through the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance of which shall be by British packet-boat there shall be charged and taken a British postage of two shillings for every ounce weight thereof.

5. On letters posted in Spain or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, addressed to any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, transmitted by the post from Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands to any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, through the United Kingdom, the conveyance from Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands to the United Kingdom being viâ France, or direct by packet-boat, there shall be charged and taken a British postage of two shillings for every ounce weight thereof.

6. On letters transmitted by British packetboat between one port in Spain and another port in Spain there shall be charged and taken a British postage of two shillings for every ounce weight thereof.

7. On letters posted in Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands, addressed to the Philippine Islands, or posted in the Philippine Islands, addressed to Spain or the Balearic or Canary Islands, which may be conveyed between Malta or Gibraltar and Hong Kong, by British packet-boats in the Mediterranean and Indian Ocean, there shall be charged and taken a British postage of two shillings for every ounce weight thereof.

8. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Cuba, and on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in Cuba, addressed to the United Kingdom, and respectively transmitted between Cuba and the United Kingdom by British packet-boat, there shall be charged and taken a British rate of postage of one shilling and sixpence.

9. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between Cuba and any of Her Majesty's colonics, or any foreign countries (France and foreign countries through France, Spain, and the Balearic and Canary Islands excepted) through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken the rates of British postage following; that is to say:

For the conveyance of every such letter between Cuba and the United Kingdom, a rate of one shilling and sixpence, and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country: Provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted from the said rate of one shilling and sixpence in this clause mentioned the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

10. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, transmitted by the post without passing through the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance of which shall be by British packet boat, there shall be charged and taken a

British rate of fourpence.

11. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, transmitted through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken over and above the uniform rate of postage mentioned in the second clause of this Warrant for the conveyance from any part of the United Kingdom to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such letter from any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country to the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct to such port from any such colony or foreign country: Provided that in all cases in which such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

12. All such respective letters so transmitted as hereinbefore in the eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh clauses of this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such letter, if exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four

rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six

rates of postage.

And for every additional ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional ounce shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

13. Every letter, whatever may be the weight of it, posted in Spain, addressed to Gibraltar, and sent by the post to Gibraltar otherwise than by sea, shall be chargeable with a British rate of one penny.

14. If any letter transmitted by the post under the first clause of this Warrant shall be posted without any postage being paid thereon, either in money or by postage stamps, there shall be charged and paid on the delivery of every such letter a postage of double the amount that would have been payable on such letter had the postage thereon been paid when posted; and if any letter transmitted by the post under the first clause of this Warrant shall be posted with a postage paid thereon, less than the sum of sixpence, there shall be charged and paid on the delivery of every such last-mentioned letter the full double postage to which it shall be liable under the provisions of this Warrant, without giving credit for any postage that may have been paid thereon; and if any letter transmitted under the first clause of this Warrant shall be posted with a postage paid thereon, either in money or by postage stamps, less in amount than the sum chargeable under this Warrant, but equal in amount to the sum of sixpence, there shall be charged and paid on the delivery of every such last-mentioned letter double the amount of the difference between the postage so prepaid and the postage which should have

been prepaid under the provisions of this Warrant.

15. The postage of every letter posted in the United Kingdom under the eighth clause of this Warrant, addressed to Cuba, shall be paid at the time of the letter being posted, and if any such letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom without any postage being paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the sum charge-able under this Warrant, every such letter shall and may be detained and opened, and shall be returned or given up to the sender thereof.

16. Registered letters may be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant upon the payment of such additional charge or rates of postage, or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct or appoint: Provided that all rates of postage and additional charges or rates, from time to time payable thereupon, shall be prepaid, and that no payment shall be made thereupon on the delivery of any such registered letters.

17. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company, are now by law entitled to of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

18. All packets consisting of printed British newspapers posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to Spain, or the Balearic, or the Canary Islands, either via France or direct by packet boat, all which respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto; and on every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage of two pence.

19. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than British newspapers) posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic, or the Canary Islands, may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to Spain, or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, either viâ France, or direct by packet boat, which respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto; and on every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage of four pence.

20. All such respective packets transmitted under the 18th and 19th clauses of this Warrant hereinbefore respectively contained shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to

say:

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces in weight, and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage.

of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates

of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

21. All packets consisting of printed newspapers, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all other printed papers posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, may be transmitted by the post from Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country to Spain, or the Balearic or the Canary Islands, through the United Kingdom, either via France, or direct by packet boat, which respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto; and on every such packet, if not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for the transmission thereof as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of three pence.

And on every such packet exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such packet, if exceeding two ounces in weight and not exceeding four ounces in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, eight rates of postage. And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, twelve rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, sixteen rates

of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight, of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding two ounces in weight.

22. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the 18th, 19th, 20th, and 21st clauses of this Warrant shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say:

Every packet shall be sent in a cover open at the ends, or in any other manner which will admit of an examination of its contents.

It shall contain no enclosure, nor any writing, signs, or mark, either within or without, other than the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, the printed title of the publication, and the printed name and address of

the publisher, or of the vendor.

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom under the provisions of this Warrant shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same shall be registered by the proprietor or printer thereof at the General Post Office, in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

No packet transmitted by the post under this Warrant, which in length, or breadth, or width shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post under the pro-

visions aforesaid.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 18th and 19th clauses of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the Post-office at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint, and the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted by the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant; and upon every such packet which shall be posted in Spain, the Balearic or the Canary Islands, the postage thereof, with any transit rate payable thereon, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

23. If any packet transmitted by the post under the 18th, 19th, 20th, and 21st clauses of this Warrant, be sent otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by, or under the 22nd clause of this Warrant, the same shall and may be detained and opened, and at the

option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination and any such packet; on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with any rates of postage the Postmaster-General may think fit, not exceeding the rates that would be chargeable on such packet as an unpaid letter.

24. All packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers posted in Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post to the United Kingdom, either via France, or direct by packet-boat, at the rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say,) if via France, at the rate of fivepence for every British pound net weight thereof, and if direct by packet-boat, at the rate of tenpence for every British pound

net weight thereof.

25. All packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers posted in Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, addressed to any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, or posted in any foreign country, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, may be respectively transmitted by the post through the United Kingdom, the conveyance between Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, and the United Kingdom being via France, or direct by packet-boat, and all such respective packets shall be charged, and chargeable with a rate of postage of tenpence for every British pound net weight thereof.

26. All packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers posted in Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, addressed to any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country, or posted in any foreign country addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, may be respectively transmitted by the post otherwise than through the United Kingdom, the sea conveyance being by British packet boats, and all such respective packets shall be charged and chargeable with a rate of postage of five pence for every British pound net weight thereof.

27. All packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers posted in Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, addressed to the Philippine Islands, or posted in the Philippine Islands, addressed to Spain, or the Balearic or Canary Islands, which may be conveyed between Malta or Gibraltar and Hong Kong by British packet boats in the Mediterranean and Indian Ocean shall be charged with a British postage of five pence for

every British pound net weight thereof.

28. The respective letters and packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets, which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

29. The rates of postage chargeable on letters, printed newspapers, and other printed papers, transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon; and as to the postage to be collected and received on letters transmitted under the provisions of this Warrant from Spain, or the Balearie or Canary Islands, addressed to the United Kingdom, two reals de vellan shall be considered equivalent to the sum of sixpence sterling.

30. The term "packet boat" used in this Warrant shall include the conveyance by any British !
