SIR, No. 478A.

IT having been brought to the notice of the Commander-in-Chief, that the services of the 2nd Battalion Military Train, under Lieutenant-Colonel J. P. Robertson, have not been adequately acknowledged in the despatches connected with the relief of Lucknow, in November, 1857, and the capture of that city in March last, his Excellency desires to rectify these omissions.

2. The Military Train joined the force, under the personal orders of the Commander-in-Chief, just prior to the relief of Lucknow, and, with portions of Her Majesty's 9th Lancers and Punjaub Cavalry, under Brigadier A. Little, was usefully and actively employed at the Dilkhoosha in protecting the stores and covering the rear of the troops engaged in the relief of the residency, during which period the cavalry were daily engaged with the enemy.

3. At the capture of Lucknow, the Military Train again rendered good and gallant service, particularly on the occasion of an attack made on our troops at Alum Bagh, on the 16th March, when a very large force of the enemy's horse was kept in check and regulsed, principally by the

fire of artillery, aided by the bold countenance shown by the Military Train.

4. His Excellency has pleasure in bearing witness to the efficient service rendered by the 2nd Battalion Military Train, and while recommending the Corps to the favorable consideration of the Right Honorable the Governor-General, trusts that his Lordship will order steps to be taken to rectify the omission of acknowledgements for the services of the corps in the despatches above adverted to.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward, for submission to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief and Government, the accompanying despatch from Major W. A. Orr, Commanding Field Force Hyderabad Contingent, reporting his successful attack on the rebels at Belowah.

I sent Major Orr with the force detailed by him, from Calpee down the road to Jhansie, to clear it of a band of rebels under the Chief of Belowah, who were endeavouring again to reorganize, and to cut off our communications with Jhansi.

Major Orr, in crushing rapidly and effectually this rebel, did essential service to the Government and my force, for which I beg to recommend him strongly to his Excellency, submitting to his favorable notice, at the same time, the officers named in his despatch, as well as the under-mentioned native officers and men who have been recommended to me by him for distinguished conduct:

SIR, *Camp at Belowah, May 31, 1858.*

No. 165 of 1858.

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Major-General Commanding in Central India, that I attacked the rebel Thakoor Burjore Sing this morning, killing and dispersing his whole band.

2. Late yesterday evening, being then at Orai, I received from Captain Pinkney information which I thought might be relied upon, that Burjore Sing was at his stronghold of Belowah. I determined to move at once, and by making a forced march, surprise and surround him. I

accordingly moved from Orai at 10 P.M., with the whole of my force,* and from Girtan, a village half way to this, I pushed on ahead with the cavalry at a rapid pace. The distance from Orai to this is about 19 miles.

3. We arrived about day-break. I at once threw my cavalry round the whole place, and waited for the infantry and guns. The alarm was speedily given, and a fire opened upon us from the Ghurry, which, however, did no execution. The rebels in a short time appeared outside the fort and town in a large mass, numbering from 200 to 250. Under the cover of a garden they formed up, and moved forward in a compact body, and in regular formation. Collecting some of my picquets, but keeping others to watch the Ghurry, I advanced the Cavalry† against this mass, with the view to embarrass and impede their progress, until the artillery and infantry, which then appeared in sight, should come up.

4. The guns of the Light Field Battery having got within range. I opened with shell and shrapnell and with good effect. The cavalry then charged and cut up a number of both horsemen and foot; but the rebels threw themselves into some deep and strong ravines running towards the Betwah, and to attack or dislodge them from which was very difficult. These ravines are of the same nature as those about Calpee, and many of them are filled with a mass of prickly thorn bushes. The enemy fought desperately. In such ground, and fighting under such disadvantages, it was to be expected that our loss would be heavy. I much regret to say, our casualties are heavier than I had even feared would be the case, and we have lost 7 killed and 4 wounded in the infantry alone. Burjore Sing was present, but I much regret to say, effected his escape. His horse and standard were taken, and he himself only got away by threading the ravines on foot, and having stripped himself of almost all his clothing. He lost every thing he had with him. His horses, camels, and all his property were captured.

5. But though he has this time escaped capture, his power and influence must for the present be completely broken by the death or dispersion of his entire band; and I trust the example made, will have a good effect throughout this disturbed part of the country. I estimate the killed at between 120 and 150, and I have 35 prisoners, who will be brought to trial upon the charge of being in arms against the British Government.

6. I am in possession of the fort or ghurry, and have commenced the necessary steps for having it dismantled, and its defences destroyed. This would have detained me here to-morrow, even had the long march of last night, and to-day's operations, not rendered a day's halt necessary.

7. I beg to bring to the favorable notice of the Major-General, the names of all the officers engaged. Their gallantry, alacrity, and zeal were most marked, and deserve my best thanks.

THE Right Honorable the Governor-General is pleased to direct the publication of the following two despatches from Brigadier F. Berkeley, C.B., commanding Soraon Field Force, dated the 15th and 18th instant, the former reporting the capture of the village and fort of Dehaign, and the latter reporting the subsequent capture of the Fort of Tiroul.

No. 9.

Brigadier Berkeley, C.B., Commanding Soraon Field Force, to Major-General Sir W. Mansfield, K.C.B., Chief of the Staff.

SIR, *Camp, Soraon, July 15, 1858.*

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that I yesterday attacked and captured the village and fort of Dehaign, employing for that purpose the force as per margin.*

2. The rebels retired into the fort on our approach, allowing the skirmishers to occupy the village with very little opposition.

3. I directed patrols of cavalry to encircle the fort, and posted the Horse Artillery, with a cavalry escort, on ground where they would have a good view of any rebels attempting to escape from the north side.

4. On the arrival of the heavy guns, I caused

them to open in the direction pointed out to us by natives, but it was impossible to judge what effect was produced, the fort being completely hidden by trees and thick scrubby jungle. I determined therefore to attack at once with the infantry, and ordered the 7th Punjaub Regiment to advance in skirmishing order, supported by the detachment of the 54th Regiment, under command of Major Gillum, the 24-pounder howitzer followed close in rear, guarded by a company of Her Majesty's 32nd Light Infantry.

5. The 7th Punjaub Infantry, in two bodies, respectively headed by Lieutenant Gordon, who was in command of the regiment, and Captain Colls, of the 32nd Light Infantry, Field Engineer, dashed gallantly forward, and following the enemy rapidly up, entered the wicket along with them, closely followed by the detachment, Her Majesty's 54th Regiment.

6. About two hundred and fifty of the rebels were killed in the ditch, the rest were rapidly chased through the jungle, and cut down in every direction; about a hundred and fifty of those that escaped from the fort were cut up by the Cavalry and Horse Artillery, but several parties succeeded in getting off, owing to the paucity of cavalry; in all about five hundred were killed.

7. Dehaign cannot properly be called a fort; it is a large area of jungle surrounded by a dilapidated earthen wall and ditch, and fenced with a thorny abattis; in the centre is a square brick-house, in this I have left a strong Seikh picquet to protect the labourers Mr. Willock has procured to cut the jungle, level the walls, &c., when that is done, the picquet will be withdrawn and the house destroyed; no guns were found in the fort.

8. Both Officers and men exerted themselves to the utmost, and I trust will be considered to have merited the approbation of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. Mr. Willock, Joint Magistrate, accompanied me, and rendered every assistance in his power.

9. I enclose herewith a return of casualties, which I am happy to say, are very few; also a nominal roll.

Brigadier Berkeley, C.B., Commanding Soraon Field, to Major-General Sir Wm. Mansfield, K.C.B., Chief of the Staff.

SIR, *Soraon, July 18, 1858.*

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that, on the 16th instant, I proceeded with the Soraon Field Force as per margin,* to attack the Fort of Tiroul, 7 miles north of this camp.

2. We found the village deserted, and took up our position on the only open side of the fort, which is to the west, without any more resistance than an occasional round shot from the fort.

3. The fort is surrounded on three sides by an impenetrable thorny jungle, a few footpaths being cut in it, which are known only to the natives; it is also surrounded by a very thick thorny abbattis, has six bastions and mounted three guns, the escarp and parapet are about twenty-five feet high, in some places rather less; on the west or open side is the gateway, closing with a strong door, which is the only entrance to the fort. This side was fenced in with a double abbattis, having a passage twelve feet wide between them; in rear of the inner one were trenches and places d'armes for the defenders of the breast-work, who could, if forced, retreat into the fort through the gateway, and leave the attacking part exposed to the close fire of the loopholed walls.

4. Although I call this side open, it is only comparatively so, as, what with the high thorny abbattis, and the trees, it is with the greatest difficulty that a glimpse can be obtained of any part of the wall.

5. The mortars and 24-pounder howitzer did their work luckily and well; and the enemy evacuated the fort in the night, leaving 3 guns, 500 rounds of gun ammunition, and a quantity of powder behind them.

6. I have left 300 of the 7th Punjaub Infantry as a guard in the fort, until arrangements are made by the Joint Magistrate, Mr. Willock, for its destruction, which will be a work of some time.

7. I have to thank Major Mitchell, Royal Horse Artillery, for the good service he rendered in directing the fire of the heavy guns; and Lieutenant Cottingham, Royal Artillery, for the unflagging energy he displayed in working his mortars.

8. I also wish to bring to his Excellency's notice the gallant conduct of Captain Colls, Her Majesty's 32nd Light Infantry, Field Engineer, who guided a small party of Punjaub Infantry under the walls of the place, and succeeded in introducing port-fires into the abbattis. The enemy rushed out, and drove them away, killing the Naique; they then put out the fire, so that no effect was produced, but Captain Colls's endeavour to fire the abbattis was not the less meritorious.

9. Captain Middleton, Brigade-Major, with a covering party of 10 men of Her Majesty's 32nd Light Infantry, also placed, in the middle of the night, before I was aware of the evacuation of the place, a bag of combustibles in the middle of the abbattis in front of the wicket.

10. I received every assistance from all officers engaged; and the Punjaub Infantry, on whom, from necessity, after the artillery, the hard work

fell, were most zealously and ably commanded by Lieutenant Gordon, Her Majesty's 61st Regiment.

11. Mr. Willock, the Joint Magistrate, was kind enough to assist me in everything that lay in his power.

Description of Tiroul.

The fort is of mud and nearly square in form, with seven round bastions connected by curtains. The curtains are about seven feet thick at top, with a loopholed parapet, and on the inside have a sufficient slope to enable the defenders to ascend with ease to the terre plaine. This slope gives a great increase to the thickness of the curtains near their base. The place is surrounded (except at the gateway) by a dry ditch about six feet deep, and the height from the bottom of the ditch to the top of the parapet varies from 20 to 25 feet. On the

north-east and south-east sides there is an impenetrable jungle of trees and thorny underwood.

On all sides there is a breast-work outside the ditch with flanking rifle-pits and a thorny abbattis in front; on the west there are two lines of this abbattis about 15 feet apart, and very thick at the north-west angle; outside the tank, there is an ingeniously contrived labyrinth of entrenchments, screened from view at a distance, a part of which enfilade the approach to the gateway. There is only one entrance to the place. The west front of the fort is comparatively open, and a view of portion of the south-west bastion, and a small part of the curtain can be obtained at the distance of 400 yards; the remainder of the place is concealed by trees. The abbattis forms the greatest obstacle to an attacking column, as the stormers would be delayed by it many minutes, exposed to a close fire from the body of the place and out-works.
