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Naples, February 8.

TH E 4th Instant a Courier arrived here from *Madrid*, with Orders about the establishing a Fond for the Allowances of the Marquis de *Cogolludo*, named by his Catholick Majesty to be his Ambassador Extraordinary at *Rome*, which are to be paid out of the Revenues of this Kingdom. We have Advice by several Barques arrived from the *Morea*, that the *Turks* continuè, by their frequent Incurfions, to incommode the Garifons of the Places conquered by the *Venetians*, whom they endeavor to deprive of the means of subsisting, by the Ravage they make in the Neighbouring Countries. And that they exercise great Cruelties upon the *Greeks*, who have put themselves under the Protection of the Republick.

Rome, Febr. 26. The Pope having, upon the death of the Duke d'*Estrees* Ambassador of *France*, resolv'd to put in execution the Regulation he formerly made about the Quarters of Ambassadors, the Franchises of the Palace *Farnese* were accordingly taken away, and the Sbirres or Officers of Justice have since very often appeared in that Quarter. The Cardinal d'*Estrees* retired after the death of the Duke his Brother to the Palace of *Pamphilio* near the Gate of *St. Pancrace*. The Queen of *Sueden* has voluntarily quitted the Franchises of the Quarter adjoining to her Palace, which the Sbirres have likewise taken possession of. Signior *Imperiale*, Treasurer General of the Chamber, is gone to *Civita Vecchia*, to give Orders about fitting out the Gallies that are to serve against the *Turks* this Summer, which are to be ready to sail by the beginning of *May*. The Senator *Lando*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of *Venice*, had this week Audience of his Holiness, to whom he gave an account of the Preparations that are making by the Republick for the prosecution of the War.

Venice, March 1. The Elector of *Bavaria* having taken his leave of the Duke of *Savoy*, who is still here, parted from hence the 27th of the last Month for *Padua*, intending to return home by the way of *Vorona* and *Trent*. A Vessel is arrived here from the *Levant*, which met Signior *Venier* cruising with five Men of War in the *Archipelago*. A great Convoy is preparing here for the *Morea*.

Vienna, March 6. The Marquis de *Villars*, Envoy Extraordinary from the M. C. King, had, the first Instant, Audience of their Imperial Majesties, to whom he made the Compliments of Condoleance upon the death of the Empress Dowager. We have an Account from *Olmitz*, That the Ambassadors of *Moscovy* arrived there the 2d of this month. The Letters from *Esperies* of the 26th past inform us, That the Deputies of the Prince and States of *Transilvania* were arrived there with a Convoy of 10000 Sacks of Wheat, as many of Oats, and 100 thousand Florins in Money, with

which they pretended to satisfy the Treaty they lately made with General *Caraffa*, for the taking off the Winter-quarters assigned upon that Country; But that the said General had let them know; that if they did not make good all they had promised, he would send his Troops to lodge upon them; That the Deputies had thereupon sent an Express to Prince *Abafsi*, and had prayed General *Caraffa* to defer the Execution he threatned till his return, which he had consented to. The same Letters say; that an Intelligence which *Teckley* had with some of the chief Inhabitants of *Bartfeld* and *Esperies* had been discovered; and several persons imprisoned for the same. The Imperialists have lately defeated a party of the Garifon of *Montgatz*, of whom 26 were killed, and 6 taken Prisoners. The Empress was this Afternoon brought to Bed of a Princess.

Cologne, March 15. The Prince de *Nassau* Great Prouit of the Cathedral Church of this City, is returned hither from *Strasburgh*. The States of *Juliers* and *Bevgs*, are again assembled at *Duseldorpe*, to consider of what has been proposed to them about making a Present of 50000 Crowns to the future Queen of *Portugal*.

Hamburg, March 11. They write from *Dresden* of the 8 instant, that the Elector of *Saxony* had, upon the Instances of the Imperial Minister at his Court, promised to assist the Emperor with a considerable Body of Men to serve in *Hungary* the next Summer, but that the number of these Succors was not yet declared. And we are told by Letters of the 9th from *Pisdam*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has likewise promised to lend a Body of his Troops, to the Emperor's assistance. The Letters from *Copenhagen* tell us, that a Regiment of Dragoons, and three of Foot, are raising in *Norway*, for the Service of the King of *Denmark*.

Brussels, March 7. Our Governor General parted from hence yesterday for *Gauit*, to visit the new Fortifications that are making for the security of that City. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 23d of the last Month, give an account that the great Convoy was safely arrived at *Five Churches*; The *Turks* of *Siget* and *Canisa*, who joined together with a design to attack it, retiring with great precipitation, after having made several unsuccessful Attempts upon the Imperial Troops that conducted the said Convoy. That in *Upper Hungary* General *Heusser* continued to have a very watchful Eye upon the *Turks*, to hinder their succouring of *Agria*; And that he had so posted the Troops under his Command, that it would be almost impossible for them to execute their design. That the same care had been taken for the blocking up of *Montgatz*, to prevent the Excursions of that Garifon, who according to the Report of some Deserters, were plentifully provided with all things necessary for their Subsistence. The same Advices say, that the Bassa of *Bosnia* had assembled 6000 Men, and that the Bass

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of Croatia had thereupon drawn together the Imperial Troops quartered on that side to oppose their design.

Brussels, March 11. Our Governor General returned hither this Evening from Flanders by writte from Cleves, that the Troops that are quartered in that Country, had received Orders from the Elector of Brandenburg, to put themselves in a readiness to march; And that it was believed his Electoral Highness would send 10000 Men to the Emperors Assistance against the Turks the next Campaigne. The last advices from Hungary said, that the Turks had surpris'd Mohatz situated on the Danube, not far from Esseeke, in which were 200 Hungarians, who were all killed or taken prisoners. By Letters from Zatmar we hear, that some Turkish Soldiers who came from Temeswar, reported that Teckelej is dead.

Brussels, March 14. The Prince of Nassau parted from hence the 12th Instant, to be present at the meeting of the States of Gelderland, who are now assembled for the granting the usual Subsidies. The States of Haynault are likewise assembled for the same purpose. The Letters from Vienna of the 2d Instant tell us, that Teckelej was neither dead nor wounded as had been reported, but that continuing his Endeavors for the Relief of Agria, he had advanced with several hundred Wagons laden with Provisions and Ammunition as far as a small place called Hir on the other side of the Theysse, but the ways becoming unpassable by the breaking of the Frost, and General Heister being besides posted in his way, he was obliged to retire to Gyula, and from thence to Great Waradin. That the Prince of Transilvania had in part performed the Agreement he made with General Caraffa, about the Contributions he is to pay in lieu of Winter-quarters; but that he absolutely refuses to put himself under the Emperor's Protection, till he sees the Success of the next Campaigne. They write from Croatia, that the Bassa of Boffina was advanced to the River Unna, and that the Militia of that Country was drawn together to make head against him.

Brussels, March 18. Our Governor General who returned hither the 11th from Ghaunt, parted again from hence the 16th Instant for Gelderland, being desirous to visit that Province, where he has not been since he came to the Government of these Countries, at this time, that the States are assembled to grant the ordinary Aids and Subsidies; and its believed his Excellency will return by the way of Limburg and Namur. The Letters from Paris, tell us, that the Most Christian King had declared he was entirely satisfied with the assurances the Emperor had given him of his Resolution to observe the Truce, during the whole Term of it, and that he would on his part maintain a sincere Friendship with the Empire, so long as they Corresponded with his good Intentions.

Paris, March 19. The King has, it's said, named the Marquis de Lovardin to be his Ambassador at Rome. His Majesty has given the Survivance of the Government of Picardy to the Marquis de Charroft Son of the Duke of that Name. The Marquis de Ferrero, Ambassador of Savoy, has had his Audiences of Leave.

Whitehall, March 11. His Majesty has been pleased to Constitute the Right Honourable Henry Lord Arundel of Wardour, Keeper of the Privy Seal; And this day his Lordship was sworn in Council, and took his Place there as Lord Privy Seal.

Whitehall, March 12. His Majesty has been pleased to Create Mr. James Fitz-James, His Natural Son, Duke of Berwick, Earl of Tinmouth, and

Baron Boscworth; And to Confer the Stile and Dignity of a Marquis of this kingdom, upon the Right Honourable William Earl of Powis, by the Title of Marquis of Powis.
