In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Puerto Rico, again calling the attention of the masters of vessels trading with that island to the necessity of their being provided with a Manifest, whether of cargo or ballast, certified by the Spanish Consul at the last port of departure, or, in the absence of the Consul, with a Certificate from two Merchants, declaring that such Certificate has been given in the absence of any Spanish Consular Agent. The infraction of this regulation will render the master of a vessel liable to a fine of 100 dollars, which will be strictly enforced.

No. 11.) MEDITERRANEAN—ARCHIPELAGO.

Light on Andros Island.

THE Minister of Marine of Greece has given notice, that on and after the 27th of February, 1859, a light would be exhibited from the light-house recently erected on Cape Kabanos, the northern extreme of Andros, one of the western isles of the Archipelago or Ægean Sea.

The light is a *revolving* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every *three minutes*. It is placed at an elevation of 708 English feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 30 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, and of the first order.

The light tower is about 70 feet in height, and stands in lat. 37° 59' 18" N., long. 24° 47' 15" east of Greenwich, nearly.

THE Commercial Agents for the Government of New South Wales (Messrs. Lloyd, Beilby, and Co., No. 2, Royal Exchange-buildings), have received instructions to give publicity to the following:

Captain Denham, of Her Majesty's ship *Herald*, reports the existence of a rock, with as little as seven feet water over it, in the hitherto deemed fairway of the south passage into Moreton Bay.

The said rock lies nearly midway upon a line drawn between the outer extreme of Cape Moreton and Flinders's Rocks, and bears from the light-house N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. (easterly), distant 2 miles.

A ship can keep seaward of it by night, so long as the light is not brought southward of S.S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., or, by day, she will be, at least, $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile *outside* of it, so long as Mount Tempest (bearing S.S.W.), is open of Cape Moreton; while, if bound into the bay, a safe passage between it and the cape will be ensured by not opening Ridge-tree Head northward of North Point, with which it closes, but is seen *over*, on the bearing of S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.

Whenever the weather is not clear enough to make out the distant objects, or a stranger is navigating himself into the pilot ground of Moreton Bay, he should, according to the wind, hug the foot of the Cape, which is bold on the south hand, or borrow upon the breakers of Flinders Rocks on his north hand, rather than make free with the midway line of the said south passage, until the suggested Black Buoy, denotes the actual position of this fearful danger, lying as it does, outside the boarding limits of the local pilots.
