NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty will hold a Levee, at St. James's Palace, upon Wednesday, the 11th of May next, at two o'clock:

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the Addresses or Petitions, with the names of the

persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

HER Royal Highness the Princess Alice was confirmed upon Thursday, the 21st instant, at Windsor Castle, in the Private Chapel, by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, and several Members of the Royal Family.

THE Secretary of State for India in Council republishes, for general information, the following Notifications which have been issued by the Government of India, and published in the Calcutta Gazettes, dated 12th and 15th February, 1859.

No. 176 of 1859.—NOTIFICATION.

ON Monday, the 14th instant, the 1st Madras Fusiliers will arrive at Calcutta, to embark for Fort St. George.

It is due to this distinguished Regiment, that it should not leave Bengal without receiving, from the Government of India, a marked acknowledgment of its eminent services. Led by their able and intrepid Commander, the lamented Brigadier

General Neill, the Madras Fusiliers were the first to carry relief and security to Benares and Allahabad: they formed a part of the force which, under Major-General Sir H. Havelock, first penetrated to Cawnpore and Lucknow: they shared in the long-sustained occupation of Alum Bagh, under Lieutenant-General Sir J. Outram, and in the reduction of Lucknow by his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief: and they have borne an active part in the final and complete re-establishment of the Queen's authority in Oude.

After twenty months of arduous service, the Madras Fusiliers are about to return to their Presidency, their work fully accomplished, and their high character as soldiers enhanced.

His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General of India in Council will receive the Regiment with public honours.

The Regiment will arrive at the terminus at Howrah, about four, P.M., and will be paraded at five o'clock P.M., before the Stairs of the Great Entrance of the Government House, there to be received by His Excellency.

The troops in town and garrison will be paraded in front of Government House at half-past four o'clock, P.M.

All the Civil Officers of the Government, the Officers of the Garrison, and General Staff, and all other Military and Naval Officers at the Presidency, except those on duty, are requested to be in attendance at the Great Entrance of the Government House at five o'clock.

All ships of war and Government vessels in the river will be dressed in honour of the occasion.

After their reception by His Excellency the Governor-General, the Madras Fusiliers will march out by the West Gate, and by the river side to the dockyard beyond Hastings Bridge, where they will immediately embark on board their ships. On their march the regiment will be saluted by the fort, and by Her Majesty's ship "Pearl."

No. 196 of 1859.

AGREEABLY to the Notification, No. 176, issued on the 12th February, 1859, the 1st Madras Fusiliers arrived in Calcutta on the afternoon of the 14th instant, and were received by His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General with public honours.

The troops in garrison and the Calcutta Volunteer Guards, cavalry and infantry, paraded in front of Government House, and received the 1st Madras Fusiliers with presented arms.

The Regiment having taken post in front of the Great Entrance of Government House, His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General advanced on the stairs, under a general salute from the assembled troops, and attended by—

The Honourable the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal.

The Honourable the Chief Justice.

The Honourable the Members of the Council of the Governor-General.

The Members of the Legislative Council of India.

The Honourable the Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court.

The Judges of the Sudder Adawlut.

The Major-General Commanding the Presidency.

The Advocate General.

The Venerable the Archdeacon.

The Civil, Military, and Naval Officers of the Presidency. And

The Personal Staff of the Governor-General and of the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal.

After receiving the salute, His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor-General proceeded to address the 1st Madras Fusiliers in the following terms:—

"Colonel Galwey, Officers, and Soldiers of the Madras Fusiliers,

"I am glad to have the opportunity of thanking you publicly, in the name of the Government of India, for the great services which you have rendered to the State.

"More than twenty months have passed since you landed in Calcutta. The time has been an eventful one, full of labours and perils; and in these you have largely shared.

"Yours was the first British Regiment which took assistance to the Central Provinces, and gave safety to the important posts of Benares and Allahabad.

"You were a part of that brave band which first pushed forward to Cawnpore, and forced its way to Lucknow, where so many precious lives and interests were at stake.

"From that time you have, with little intermission, been in the front of danger.

"You are now returning to your Presidency, your ranks thinned by war and sickness; but you return covered with honour; carrying with you the high opinion of every Commander who has led you in the field; the respect of your fellow-soldiers in that great English Army in which from the beginning you have maintained a foremost place; and the gratitude of the whole community of your fellow countrymen of every class.

"Further, you have the satisfaction of knowing that you do not leave behind you a single spot of ground, upon which you have set your feet, where peace and order have not been restored.

"When you reach Madras, tell your comrades of the Madras Army that the name of the 1st Fusiliers will never be forgotten on this side of India.

"Tell them that the recollection of all that is due to your courage, constancy, and forwardness, will never be effaced from the mind of the Government under whose orders you have served.

"Tell them especially that the memory of your late distinguished leader is cherished and honoured by every Englishman amongst us, and that, though many heroic spirits have passed away since the day when he fell in front of you in the streets of Lucknow, not one has left a nobler reputation than General Neill. I now bid you farewell, Fusiliers; and I wish you a speedy and prosperous voyage to your own Presidency. You are indeed an honour to it."

At the close of the address, the 1st Madras Fusiliers marched away, amid the cheers of a very large concourse of spectators, to embark on board their ships.

A PROCLAMATION,

*For Dissolving the present Parliament and
Declaring the Calling of another.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the fifth day of May next: We do for that end publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said Thursday the fifth day of May next; and We, being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our people, and to have their advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving subjects Our Royal will and pleasure to call a new Parliament: and do hereby further declare, that, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We have given order that Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland, do, respectively, upon notice thereof, forthwith issue out writs in due form, and according to law, for calling a new Parliament: and We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament, to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in, Our said Parliament; which writs are to be returnable on Tuesday the thirty-first day of May next.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this twenty-third day of April, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-second year of Our reign.

A PROCLAMATION,

*In order to the Electing and Summoning the
Sixteen Peers of Scotland.*

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Tuesday the thirty-first day of May next ensuing the date hereof; in order, therefore, to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-house, in Edinburgh, on Tuesday, the tenth day of May next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be

absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said city, to take special care to preserve the peace thereof, during the time of the said election, and to prevent all manner of riots, tumults, disorders, and violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days, at least, before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such election.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to amend the law of copyright," it is among other things enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any person, not being the proprietor of the copyright, or some person authorized by him, to import into any port in the United Kingdom, or into any other part of the British dominions, for sale or hire, any printed book, first composed, or written, or printed and published in any part of the United Kingdom, wherein there shall be copyright, and reprinted in any country or place whatsoever out of the British dominions. And whereas by the Customs Consolidation Act, 1853, an Act of the eighth and ninth Victoria, chapter ninety-three, entitled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British Possessions abroad," was repealed; and by the Act now in recital, books wherein the copyright is subsisting, first composed, or written, or printed in the United Kingdom, and printed or reprinted in any other country, are absolutely prohibited to be imported into the British Possessions abroad; but it is thereby provided, that nothing therein contained shall be taken to prevent Her Majesty from exercising the power to suspend in certain cases such prohibition, vested in Her by the tenth and eleventh Victoria, chapter ninety-five, entitled "An Act to amend the law relating to the protection in the colonies, of works entitled to copyright in the United Kingdom."

And whereas by the last recited Act it is enacted, that in case the legislature, or proper

legislative authorities, in any British possession shall be disposed to make due provision for securing or protecting the rights of British Authors in such possessions, and shall pass an Act or make an Ordinance for that purpose, and shall transmit the same in the proper manner to the Secretary of State, in order that it may be submitted to Her Majesty; and in case Her Majesty shall be of opinion that such Act or Ordinance is sufficient for the purpose of securing to British Authors reasonable protection within such possession, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if she think fit so to do, to express Her royal approval of such Act, or Ordinance; and thereupon to issue an Order in Council, declaring that so long as the provisions of such Act or Ordinance continue in force within such colony, the prohibitions contained in the aforesaid Acts of the fifth and sixth Victoria, and eighth and ninth Victoria, or in any other Acts against the importing, selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing foreign reprints of books, first composed, written, printed, or published, in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended so far as regards such colony, and thereupon such Act or Ordinance shall come into operation, except so far as may be otherwise provided therein, or may be otherwise directed by such Order in Council.

And whereas an Act has been passed by the Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly, of the Island of Jamaica, (c. 21 of 1858), "To amend the law of copyright in books, and for the protection of British Authors," whereby provision is made for protecting the rights of British Authors in the said colony: And whereas Her Majesty has expressed Her royal approval of the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by the authority of the same, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that so long as the said Act shall remain and continue in force within the said colony, all prohibitions in any of the said hereinbefore recited Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or in any other Acts thereof contained against the importing into the said colony, or against the selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing therein foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended so far as regards the said colony.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the third clause of an Order made by Her Majesty in Council on the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, to regulate the trade of Her Majesty's Settlements on the River Gambia and their dependencies, it was provided that no goods should be imported into, nor any goods ex-

ported from, the said settlements by sea from or to any place other than a British Possession except into or from the port of Bathurst.

And whereas by the fourth clause of the said Order it was provided, that articles not otherwise prohibited than by the law of navigation, might be warehoused in the said Settlements under the conditions therein mentioned; and whereas by the forty-third clause of the said Order provision is made for payment of a duty on the re-exportation of coal from the aforesaid Settlements to any foreign place in any foreign ship.

And whereas the above recited provisions have become in part nugatory, and are in fact (so far as respects French subjects) repugnant to the terms of a convention made on the seventh of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of the French, and to a certain statute, made and passed in the session of Parliament held in the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to remove doubts as to the operation of a Convention between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French relative to Portendic and Albreda," to wit, the aforesaid Convention of the seventh of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And whereas it is expedient that the above recited provisions of the aforesaid Order in Council should be repealed, and that further provision should be made respecting the trade of the aforesaid Settlements and their dependencies, as is hereafter contained.

1. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of all powers enabling Her on that behalf, doth Order, and it is hereby ordered, that the above mentioned third, fourth, and forty-third clauses of the aforesaid Order in Council of the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, shall be, and they are hereby repealed.

2. And Her Majesty, by and with such advice as aforesaid, and in pursuance of all such powers as aforesaid, doth further Order, and it is hereby further ordered, that French vessels in the River Gambia shall be subject to the same duties, tolls, and regulations, as British vessels; and every article imported or exported in French vessels shall pay the same duty as is or may be imposed upon the like article when imported or exported in British vessels. And it is further ordered, that all vessels arriving within the River Gambia shall come to anchor, shall enter inwards and outwards, and shall pay all duties and charges at the port of Bathurst.

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England

it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit ;

And whereas by an Order in Council of the sixteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, certain regulations were made in respect of burials in the churchyard of Holy Trinity, Brompton, in the parish of Kensington, and burials were directed to be wholly discontinued, from and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the said churchyard, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the use of the family vaults and graves in Holy Trinity Churchyard, Brompton, which were in existence on the eighteenth of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, be permitted, subject to the following conditions, viz. That no human remains be disturbed ; that in the vaults and brick graves each coffin be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and be separately entombed in an air-tight manner ; that in earthen family graves a layer of earth not less than one foot thick be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin ; and that no coffin shall be buried within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, measuring from the top of the coffin.

WHEREAS the major part of the governing body of ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE, in the University of CAMBRIDGE, in pursuance of the Act of the 19 and 20 Vict., cap. 88, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the Good Government and Extension of the University of Cambridge, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of King Henry the Sixth, at Eton," made a Statute, on the 7th of December, 1857, for putting an end to the option of the Master of the said College, in respect of certain Benefices, and for otherwise commutting the rights of the Master in relation thereto, and for making him compensation out of the College Revenues ; and whereas the said Statute was duly laid before the Commissioners, appointed for the purposes of the above-recited Act, as required thereby, and was on the 12th of this instant April, approved by them, and has been this day laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same is published in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act ; and NOTICE is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons mentioned in the 39th section of that Act, within one month after this publication, to petition Her Majesty in Council against the approbation of the said Statute, or any part thereof.

STATUTE above referred to.

WHEREAS the major part of the Governing Body of the College of Saint John the Evan-

gelist, in the University of Cambridge, acting in pursuance of the powers and directions contained in an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the nineteenth and twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the Good Government and Extension of the University of Cambridge, of the Colleges therein, and of the College of King Henry the Sixth at Eton," on the 7th day of December, 1857, made and passed a Statute, which was duly signed by them, and except as to the signatures thereto, was in the words and figures following ; that is to say :—

Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Father in God, John, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, Lord Keeper of the Great Seal of England, did, by an instrument under his hand and seal, grant, assure, and convey unto the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge, the perpetual donation and patronage of four Ecclesiastical Benefices ; to wit, the Rectory of Souldern, in the county of Oxford, the Rectory of Freshwater, in the Isle of Wight, the Rectory of Aberdarron, in the county of Caernarvon, and the Rectory of Saint Florence, in the county of Pembroke.

And whereas it was covenanted and agreed, between the said John Lord Bishop of Lincoln and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars, that it should be lawful to and for the Master of the said College for the time being, to assume and retain unto himself any one of the said benefices at every avoidance.

And whereas the late Isaac Pennington Knight, Doctor of Physic, and Fellow of the said College did, by his last will and testament, give to the Master of the said College for the time being, two hundred pounds a year, if he be Rector of Freshwater aforesaid, but not otherwise.

And whereas the said Isaac Pennington did further provide, that if it should happen that the Master be not Rector of Freshwater, then the said sum should accumulate as fast, and as long, as by the law it might, by making fresh purchases in the funds, always, however, upon this condition, that the accumulation do stop for the time, and the Master receive not only the original two hundred pounds a year, but also the interest of all the accumulation whenever he is Rector of Freshwater.

We, the undersigned, being the major part of the Governing Body of the said College, named in the 19th and 20th Vict., cap. 88 acting in pursuance of the powers and directions contained in the said Act, hereby make a statute, that, from the date hereof, it shall not be lawful for the Master of the said College for the time being, to assume and retain unto himself any one of the said benefices at any avoidance.

That from the 21st of December, 1857, the Master of the said College shall receive yearly a variable sum, equal in amount to three times the dividend of a Junior Fellow for the current year, together with a fixed annual payment of seven hundred and ninety pounds from the general revenues of the College, which sums shall be in lieu of the statutable or customary payments heretofore made to the Master by the Senior Bursar, the Junior Bursar, and the Steward of the said College, and shall also include compen-

sation for the diminution of income, consequent upon the Master's power to assume and retain unto himself any one of the said benefices at any avoidance being put an end to.

That the Master continue, as heretofore, to have the use, profits, and enjoyment of the farm at Thriplow, in the county of Cambridge, and of the Dove House Close, in the parish of Saint Clement, in the town of Cambridge, and likewise to receive his share of the rents of the lands at Staplehurst, in the county of Kent.

That the College continue, as heretofore, to pay all rates and taxes in respect of the Master's lodge, and of the stable and coach-house, and to keep the same in good and substantial repair; the expense of painting and papering the interior of the Master's lodge being defrayed by the Master.

That the whole of the annuity, together with any accumulation, arising under the will of the said Isaac Pennington, henceforth cease and determine, and become part and parcel of the general estate of the College.

Now we, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of the said Act, do hereby, in execution of the powers given to us by the said Act, approve of the said statute, in the words and form above recited.

Given under our Common Seal this twelfth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.
