A DESPATCH has been received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, containing a Decree of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, dated the 30th April, 1859, prohibiting, without a Special Permit from the French Government, the exportation, transit, or reexportation in bond of the following articles:

1. Arms of war of all sorts.

2. Lead, brimstone, gunpowder, saltpetre, nitrate of soda, gun flints, percussion caps, gun stocks, projectiles and other munitions of war of all sorts, army clothing, camp equipage, and military harness and equipments.

3. Horses.

4. Sailing and steam vessels, machinery and parts of machines applicable to navigation, spars and rigging of ships, and all other raw or manufactured articles used for naval and military purposes.
