PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

No Presentations will take place at the Drawing Room on the 19th of May.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card

above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the Addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

WHEREAS by the "Passengers Act, 1855," it is amongst other things enacted, that before any passenger ship shall be cleared out, the Emigration Officer at the port of clearance, shall satisfy himself that there is on board a sufficient quantity of pure water, carried in tanks or casks, to secure throughout the intended voyage the issue of three quarts, daily, to each statute adult, for the use of the passengers, exclusive of the quantity prepared for cooking; and whereas it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for permitting the use on board passenger ships of an apparatus for distilling water, and for

defining, in such case, the quantity of fresh water to be carried in tanks or casks for the passengers.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and in exercise of the authority vested in Her by the said "Passengers Act, 1855," hereby order as follows:

Any passenger ship may be cleared out and proceed on her voyage, having on board in tanks or casks only half the quantity of pure water required by the said Act to be carried for the use of the passengers, provided;

1. That there be on board such passenger ship an efficient apparatus for distilling fresh water from salt water, of the description commonly known as Normandy's Patent, or of such other description as may, with the sanction of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, be notified in the London Gazette, as having been approved by the Emigration Commissioner.

2. That the owners, charterers, or masters of the ship, before clearance, lodge with such Emigration Officer a certificate from some competent person, to be named by the Emigration Officer, declaring that the apparatus is of one of the descriptions above specified, and that it has been, within the seven days immediately preceding the date of such certificate, examined by a competent person, and is then in good working condition, and stating the number of imperial gallons of pure fresh water which it is capable of producing in every twenty-four hours.

3. That the Emigration Officer is satisfied that this number of gallons is not less than the whole number of persons about to proceed on the intended voyage of such ship; that is to say: the whole number of cabin passengers, passengers, and crew.

4. That there is rated on the ship's articles and on board the ship, some person or persons who, to the satisfaction of the said Emigration Officer, shall be competent for the proper management and repair of such distilling apparatus.

And to prevent all doubts on the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered, that the terms "Passenger Ship," "Emigration Officer," "Statute Adult," and "Master," shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said "Passengers Act, 1855."

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Widnes aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Chester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Prescott, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Widnes.'

"And with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of Chester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being:

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the township of Widnes, in the parish of Prescott, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Chester, which is situate to the south and west of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary between the said township of Widnes and the township of Ditton, in the same county and diocese, in the middle of a certain drain dividing such townships, at a point which is opposite to the middle of the south-western end of another drain which divides the Widnes Turn Marsh from the close numbered 682, on the tithe map of the parish of Prescott, and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of such last-mentioned drain, to the middle of a lane called Marsh-lane; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of such last-named lane, and along the middle of Dog-lane, and of Runcorn-road, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Lugdale-lane; and extending thence, south-eastward and southward, along the middle of such last-named lane to the middle of the cross road leading from the said Runcorn-road to a place called Green Oaks, and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of such last-mentioned cross road to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Tan House Lane; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of

such last-named lane to the end thereof; and extending thence in a straight line due south, to the boundary of the said township of Widnes."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Widnes, in the parish of Prescott, in the county of Lancaster, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Widnes," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of an Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three; and of an Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the tenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, section sixteen; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, section three; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, section one; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Ilfracombe, in the parish of Ilfracombe, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church, of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Ilfracombe aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Ilfracombe, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, and

thereon edged pink, should be assigned to the said church, and the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip and Saint James, Ilfracombe.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Mill Chanter, Incumbent of the said parish of Ilfracombe, shall continue to be such incumbent, all the fees which shall be payable in respect of the performance of burials at the said church of Saint Philip and Saint James, Ilfracombe, shall be paid by the minister thereof to the said John Mill Chanter.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"All that part of the parish of Ilfracombe, in the county of Devon, in the diocese of Exeter, which is situate to the east and north of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary of the said parish, in the middle of a certain footpath leading from the eastern side of Capstone Hill to Compass Hill, at a point opposite to where a boundary stone marked with letters St. P. & St. J. has been placed, and extending thence southward along such last-mentioned footpath, and along the middle of the road which connects the roads called Compass Hill and James's Place to the middle of the last-named road, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-named road to the middle of the road in front of a certain Wesleyan chapel, and extending thence southward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to the middle of the bridge which carries such road over the town-mill stream, and extending thence up the middle of such last-named stream to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a wall forming the western boundary of the garden numbered 348 on the tithe-apportionment map of the said parish of Ilfracombe, and on the map hereunto annexed, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such wall to the middle of the public path called the Backway, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such last-mentioned path to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a passage called Down's Passage, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such last-named passage to the middle of Fore-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such last-named street to its point of junction with High-street and Portland-street, and extending thence eastward and southward along the middle of such last-named street, and southward along the middle of the Barnstaple Turnpike-road to the boundary of the said parish of Ilfracombe."

that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Ilfracombe, in the parish of Ilfracombe, in the county of Devon, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Philip and Saint James, Ilfracombe," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Tideswell, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Wormhill.'

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Magaret, situate at Wormhill, in the parish of Tideswell, in the county of Derby, to be called "The District Chapelry of Wormhill," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discon-

tinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the Minster Churchyard, BEVERLEY, from the first of May to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In St. John's Churchyard, in St. Mary's additional churchyard, in the Cemetery, in Ebenezer and Zion Burial-grounds, and in the Tabernacle and Bethany Burial-grounds, all in the borough of CARDIFF, from the first of May to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In the churchyard of the parish of CLAYBROOK, near Lutterworth, from the first of June to the thirty-first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In the burial-ground of St. Martin's Chapel, FENNY STRATFORD, in the parish of Bletchley, from the first of May to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In the churchyard of MALTBY, Yorkshire, from the first of May to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

In the burial-ground of Trinity Church, ROTHERHITHE, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, on the following conditions, viz., that only one body be buried in each grave; that no ground which has been buried in be reopened, except in the case of family vaults and graves, provided that one foot of earth be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin, and that no body be buried without a covering of four feet at least; that no body be buried within three yards of the wall of the church, of the National Schools, or of any dwelling-house; and that the only bodies interred be those of parishioners of Holy Trinity parish, except in the case of persons having relatives already buried in this churchyard.

Whereas by an Order in Council of the eleventh of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued in the churchyard of MERE, Wilts, from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, which period was afterwards extended to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and it seems fit that the said order be varied; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments in the said churchyard be discontinued, except for those whose husbands, wives, or children have been buried therein, provided that each coffin be embedded in charcoal, and entombed in an airtight manner.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be discontinued from and after the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the New Parochial Burial Ground in the parish of PETERBOROUGH, and it seems fit that the said order be varied; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following vaults and graves in the said burial-ground be excepted from the operation of the above-mentioned Order in Council, until the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy; viz.: vaults or brick graves therein in which, at the time of the passing of the Peterborough Improvement Police and Cemetery Act, 1850, there was a right of private sepulture.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be discontinued from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the burial-ground of Grosvenor-street Chapel, STALEYBRIDGE, and it seems fit that the said order be varied; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, burials be wholly discontinued in the said burial-ground of Grosvenor-street Chapel, STALEYBRIDGE, and that, in the meantime, with the exception of family vaults and graves, no more than one body be buried in each grave, and that no grave be opened within five yards of any dwelling-house or school.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Thomas Sotheron Estcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the following modifications;

SEVEN OAKS, KENT.—Forthwith in the vaults and graves beneath the *parish church* of Seven Oaks, Kent, and, with the exception of now existing vaults and family graves, in that part of the *churchyard* lying between the street and a line drawn on a level of the west end of the body of the church; and that, in the other part of the churchyard, with the exception of vaults and family graves, only one body be buried in a grave, and that, with the same exception, no grave be reopened—and that no human remains be exposed; that in vaults and brick graves in any part of the ground each coffin be separately entombed in brick or stone work, and that in family earthen graves,—one foot of earth be left between each coffin, and that no coffin be deposited within five feet of the surface of the ground.

KINGTON, HEREFORDSHIRE.—Forthwith in *Kington Church*, Herefordshire; and also, on and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the *churchyard*, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be entombed in an airtight manner.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representa-

tions, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-seventh day of June next;

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-seventh day of June.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by, or under the directions of, the churchwardens, or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do, or cause to be done, all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish; provided always, that no such representation should be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Thomas Sotheron Estcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation had been duly given to the churchwardens, or other persons having the care of the vaults under the several churches and chapels hereinafter mentioned, has made a representation, stating that he was of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an order should be made for the adoption of the measures hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the vaults under the undermentioned churches and chapels respectively, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures in respect of such vaults; viz.:

SAINT JOHN, HORSLEYDOWN.

That the coffins in the vaults beneath the church of Saint John, Horsleydown, be covered with soil and charcoal, and enclosed by brickwork in an air-tight manner.

Also, that air-tubes leading to the top of the building be erected, and for the security of the

workmen employed, that the work be conducted under the supervision of the Officer of Health for the district, McDougall's powder, or other disinfectants being used if necessary.

SAINT ALPHAGE, GREENWICH.

1. That the coffins contained in the vaults beneath the parish church of Saint Alphage, Greenwich, be covered with earth and powdered charcoal.

2. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district, and that McDougall's powder, chlorine, or other disinfectants, be used whenever necessary.

CONGREGATIONAL CHAPEL, GREENWICH ROAD.

1. That the coffins contained in the vaults beneath the congregational chapel, Greenwich-road, be covered with earth and charcoal.

2. That the ceiling of the vaults under the chapel be plastered, and all direct communication cut off between the vaults and the interior of the chapel.

3. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district, and that McDougall's powder, chlorine, or other disinfectants, be used whenever necessary.

SAINT PAUL, DEPTFORD.

1. That the coffins in the vaults beneath the parish church of Saint Paul, Deptford, and also in the vaults under the steps of the west entrance of the church, be covered with fresh earth and powdered charcoal.

2. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district, and that McDougall's powder, or other disinfectants be used whenever necessary.

WESLEYAN CHAPEL, MARY ANN BUILDINGS, DEPTFORD.

1. That the coffins in the vaults under the Wesleyan Chapel, Mary Ann Buildings, Deptford, be covered with fresh earth and powdered charcoal.

2. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district, and that McDougall's powder, chlorine, or other disinfectants, be used whenever necessary.

SAINT MARY, ROTHERHITHE.

1. That the coffins in the public vaults beneath the parish church of Saint Mary, Rotherhithe, be covered with fresh earth and concrete, and that the existing entrance be bricked up.

2. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district, and that McDougall's powder, chlorine, or other disinfectants, be used whenever necessary.
