TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the

existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord

Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written*, upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

#### ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the Addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

THE following Addresses to the Queen, on the occasion of the assumption of the direct Government of India by Her Majesty, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India, have accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously.

To Her Most Excellent and Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, QUEEN of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Colonies and Dependencies thereof in Europe, Asia, Africa, America, and Australasia.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the President and Members of the Madras Native Association, resident in Madras, on behalf of ourselves and of our Members residing in the

provinces of the Presidency, beg to approach your Royal Throne with the most dutiful and respectful expression of our feelings of unfeigned loyalty towards your Imperial Person, Crown, and Family; and of the deep satisfaction and thankfulness with which we have received the Gracious Proclamation, that, on the 1st of November, informed all the inhabitants of British India, that your Majesty had been pleased to assume the rights, prerogatives, and immediate Government of your vast and populous dominions in India; an auspicious event which we have long looked forward to with anxious hope and expectation, and have repeatedly prayed for in our various petitions to the Imperial Legislature. The happy day has at length arrived, when we are permitted to address our petitions and make known our sentiments directly to the Government of your Majesty, as the rightful and beneficent Sovereign of our country; and while we offer our heartiest felicitations to your Most Gracious Majesty on that occasion, so fraught with honour to your Throne, and advantages to all classes of your Indian subjects, we beg to assure your Majesty, that in no part of your Majesty's vast and flourishing Empire, are to be found subjects of the British Crown, more loyally affectionate and obedient than the natives of India, resident within the limits of the Presidency of Madras.

With all loyal and humble submission, we ask your Royal leave to subscribe ourselves your Majesty's most dutiful and faithful subjects.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

That the Lord our God would set you above all nations, that all blessings shall ever come upon you, the Prince, your Illustrious Consort, the Prince of Wales and your Royal Family, and that your Majesty's Sovereignty may be blessed in this our city, the land of our birth, and in all your Majesty's possessions, both in India and other parts of the globe, shall ever be our earnest and heartfelt prayer.

We, your Majesty's Hindu Christian inhabitants, with the profoundest respect, subscribe ourselves your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects.

Royapooram in Madras, December 10, 1858.

To Her Most Excellent and Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, QUEEN of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Colonies and Dependencies thereof, in Europe, Asia, America, and Australasia.

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of Masulipatam.

*May it please your Majesty,*

1. YOUR Majesty's liege subjects of this ancient town beg to approach your Majesty's Throne and tender their allegiance and welcome on the auspicious occasion of your Majesty's assuming the direct Sovereignty of these wide dominions.

2. They beg to avail themselves of this opportunity to record their high and grateful sense of the benefits they have enjoyed under the Administration of the Honourable East India Company, who, as trustees for the Crown, have for nearly a century ruled India, extending their protection to them all in the enjoyment of their civil and religious immunities.

3. Your Majesty's Proclamation has given joy and assurance to all classes of your Majesty's subjects, who trust, that as time advances, the ties of affection between your Majesty and the subjects may be drawn closer and closer, and the loyalty for which Madras has of late been so happily remarkable may become more and more conspicuous.

4. Your Majesty's gracious declaration in regard to two subjects, always dear to the natives of India, has commanded universal applause, thankfulness and confidence. Both the tenures of land and the forms of religious belief in this country are as various and diversified as they are throughout the earth. India, in fact, is a world in miniature. That a country so constituted cannot be otherwise well governed than on the most liberal principles of forbearance, toleration, and perfect neutrality, is doubtless obvious to your Majesty.

5. Your Majesty has rightly judged of their attachment to their lands inherited from their forefathers. The rights in the lands are the growth of centuries. Your Majesty's subjects, therefore, are rejoiced to learn your Majesty's desire to protect them, and ever feel confident that the greatest indulgence will be shewn in dealing with all questions connected with them.

6. Higher than their paternal land, your Majesty's subjects regard their religion, their laws, and their customs. They therefore feel happy and exceedingly thankful for the declaration of your royal pleasure, that "none be in anywise favoured, none molested, or disquieted, by reason of their religious faith or observances."

7. Your Majesty's subjects are most desirous of participating in those benefits of western science and civilization which have made the nations of Europe so powerful, and which have raised England to such ascendancy over the world. They therefore hope that the education and advancement of the people will be a subject always next to the heart of your Majesty.

8. Your Majesty's subjects have read with peculiar satisfaction the gracious terms of your Majesty's amnesty to the misguided thousands still in arms against the paramount authority. They regard that amnesty as the rainbow of God after the Deluge, and trust that such events may never again occur.

9. It is centuries since a Sovereign of Hindoostan sat on the throne to receive in state the

homage of the millions of this land. Your Majesty's liege subjects pray, therefore, that your Majesty will condescend to bless this country with a royal visit at no distant date, and so grant them an opportunity of prostrating themselves at your Majesty's throne, and personally tendering their allegiance and admiring in their Sovereign what is universally admitted to be, the emblem on earth of those queenly virtues which rarely reside but in heaven.

10. In conclusion, your Majesty's subjects, fully sensible of the truth and sincerity of your Majesty's touching declaration, that "in their prosperity will be our strength, in their contentment our security, and in their gratitude our best reward," and always considering it their particular fortune to be under such a powerful and civilized Government as that of Great Britain, will ever continue attached to your Majesty's Person and Throne. They pray that your Majesty's reign may ever be bright as the morning star, and that your Majesty may enjoy all the happiness and comfort God vouchsafes to a virtuous Sovereign, whose delight ever is in obeying His commands, and ruling her subjects well. They further pray, that wisdom may guide the counsels of your Majesty's Ministers, and that heroism may strengthen your Majesty's warriors; that the rod of the magistrate may never be lifted, nor the sword of the soldier never unsheathed, but at the bid of justice; and that your Majesty's gentle mercy may always temper the severity of stern justice, so that all your Majesty's humble and poor subjects may ever have reason to love, honour, obey, and bless their gracious Sovereign.

And whereas George Douglas, Duke of Argyll, Her Majesty's then Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, did by virtue of the said recited Act, make and issue certain orders, regulations, conditions and restrictions, which he deemed to be necessary and expedient for the purpose of regulating the receipt, transmission and delivery by post of printed newspapers, and certain printed periodical publications, under the provisions of the said Act, bearing date the 24th day of December, 1855.

And whereas it is expedient that certain of the said orders, regulations, conditions and restrictions, so made and issued by the said George Douglas, Duke of Argyll, and bearing date the 24th day of December, 1855, as aforesaid, should be rescinded and revoked, and that certain new ones should be made and issued in lieu thereof in manner hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now I the undersigned, Charles, Baron Colchester, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's

Treasury, given under the hands of two of the said Commissioners (by authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), whose names are hereunder signed and written, do, by virtue of the said recited Act, and of the power for that purpose therein contained, hereby rescind and revoke the following several orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions so made and issued by the said George Douglas, Duke of Argyll, Her Majesty's then Postmaster-General, under the provisions of the said recited Act, bearing date the said 24th day of December, 1855, as aforesaid, and being the thirteenth of the said orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions relating to periodical publications (including newspapers) transmitted by post between places within the United Kingdom, the third of the said orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions relating to British newspapers transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to British colonies and foreign countries, and the fourth of the said orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions relating to newspapers, British, colonial, or foreign, brought into the United Kingdom by packet-boat or private ship, or transmitted by the post between any ports or places beyond the sea, whether through the United Kingdom or not, that is to say—

Periodical publications (including newspapers) transmitted by post between places within the United Kingdom.

13. If any of the foregoing regulations shall be disregarded, any officer of the post-office may detain the publication for examination until the next mail; if the irregularity shall be found to consist merely in not folding the paper so as to expose the stamp or stamps, or in posting the publication within the free delivery of the town or place to which it is addressed without pre-paying the postage of one penny by affixing a postage stamp thereon, a postage of one penny shall be charged in addition to any other postage to which the publication, if properly folded or posted, would have been liable; in the event of any other irregularity, the publication shall be dealt with in accordance with the regulations contained in the Treasury Warrant of the 4th day of June, 1855, relating to the transmission by the post of book packets between places within the United Kingdom.

British newspapers transmitted from the United Kingdom to British colonies and foreign countries.

3. All such newspapers as are unstamped, and all such as are stamped which shall have been published more than fifteen days, may be forwarded to such of the British colonies as are mentioned in certain Treasury Warrants, dated respectively the 22nd day of February, 1855, and the 7th day of July, 1855, under the regulations contained in such Warrants respectively, relating to the transmission by the post of book packets between the United Kingdom and such colonies respectively.

Newspapers, British, colonial, or foreign, brought into the United Kingdom by packet-boat or private ship, or transmitted by the post between any ports or places beyond the sea, whether through the United Kingdom or not.

4. Every foreign newspaper shall be printed in the language of the country from which it shall have been forwarded except in cases specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

And I do, with the like consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, given under the hands of two of the said Commissioners (by the authority aforesaid) whose names are hereunder signed and written as aforesaid, by virtue of the said recited Act, and of the power for that purpose therein contained, make and issue the following orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions which I deem to be necessary and expedient for the purpose of regulating the receipt, transmission, and delivery by post of the said several printed newspapers, and the said several printed periodical publications, under the provisions of the said recited Act, in lieu of the said several regulations as hereinbefore rescinded and revoked as aforesaid, that is to say—

Periodical publications (including newspapers) transmitted by post between places within the United Kingdom.

13. If any of the foregoing regulations shall be disregarded, any officer of the post-office may detain the publication for examination until the next mail; if the irregularity shall be found to consist merely in not folding the paper so as to expose the stamp or stamps, or in posting the publication within the free delivery of the town or place to which it is addressed, without prepaying the postage of one penny by affixing a postage stamp thereon, a postage of one penny shall be charged in addition to any other postage to which the publication, if properly folded or posted, would have been liable. In the event of any other irregularity, the publication shall be dealt with in accordance with the regulations contained in the Treasury Warrant of the 16th day of October, 1857, or of such other regulations as shall for the time being be in force relating to the transmission by the post of book-packets between places within the United Kingdom.

British newspapers transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to British colonies and foreign countries.

3. All such newspapers, whether they shall have been published more than fifteen days or not, may be forwarded to any British colony or foreign country between which and the United Kingdom packets, consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, may be transmitted by the post under or by virtue of any Treasury Warrant now or hereafter in force, under the regulations contained in any such Warrant relating to the transmission of any such packet between the United Kingdom and any such colony or foreign country.

Newspapers, British, colonial, or foreign, brought into the United Kingdom by packet-boat or private ship, or transmitted by the post between any ports or places beyond the sea, whether through the United Kingdom or not.

4. Every Foreign Newspaper may be printed either in the language of the country from which it shall be forwarded or in any other language.

WITH reference to paragraph 14 of the Notification of this department, No. 14, dated 21st February last, notice is hereby given, that the Sub-Treasurers at Fort William, Fort St. George, and Bombay, the several residents at native courts, and the several collectors and other officers in charge of treasuries under the several presidencies and governments, and in the provinces subordinate to the Government of India, have been authorized to receive from the 1st of May next, any sums of money in hundreds of rupees, each being for not less than 500 of Company's Rupees, which may be tendered on loan to the Secretary of State in Council of India, at an interest of Five-and-a-Half per Cent. per annum, subject to the provisions hereinafter specified.
