I feel assured that the future government of this country will be stamped with those high and refined principles of impartiality, liberality and justice, which have ever adorned the British crown; and it shall always be my pride and ruling passion not only to religiously conform to the articles of the treaty entered into with the Honourable East India Company, your Majesty's late trustees for the government of India, but to the utmost of my power to uphold the dignity and supremacy of the British throne, and faithfully to inculcate the same sentiments of regard and respect which I entertain for your Majesty's person and government, into the minds of all my native subjects, assuring them in return of your Majesty's gracious protection.

I beg leave humbly to convey to your Majesty the expression of my deep and lively appreciation of your Majesty's kind and benevolent sentiments in respect to the dignity and honour of the native princes of India, as well as your Majesty's gracious resolution to permit no aggression to be made upon them, but to secure them in the enjoyment of their ancient rights, usages and customs. Whilst acknowledging with heartfelt gratitude the justice and liberality of these intentions, I beg to express my firm confidence that my sovereign rights and privileges could not be in better keeping than in your royal hands, and that under your Majesty's wise and enlightened sway, they will be scrupulously recognised.

I beg, at the same time, to represent my deep conviction, that in your Majesty's rule over these territories will be found the surest guarantee for that prosperity and social advancement which your Majesty is so anxious to promote amongst all classes of your Majesty's Indian subjects.

It is my earnest hope that the benevolent and merciful call contained in your Majesty's Proclamation may have the immediate and happy effect of restoring peace and tranquillity in the disturbed provinces of the north-west, and of leading back those misguided chiefs and their followers to a dutiful submission to your Majesty's rule, which cannot fail to ensure their future contentment and happiness.

THE Queen having been graciously pleased, by a Warrant under Her Royal Sign Manual bearing date the 13th of December, 1858, to declare that Non-Military Persons who, as Volunteers, have borne arms against the Mutineers, both at Lucknow and elsewhere, during the late operations in India, shall be considered as eligible to receive the decoration of the Victoria Cross, subject to the rules and ordinances already made and ordained for the government thereof, provided that it be established in any case that the person was serving under the orders of a General or other Officer in Command of Troops in the Field, when he performed the Act of Bravery for which it is proposed to confer the decoration ;—Her Majesty has accordingly been pleased to signify Her intention to confer this high distinction on the undermentioned Gentlemen, whose claims to the same have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, as recorded against their names ; viz. :

The Force fell into an Ambuscade on the night of the 29th of July, 1857, and, during the retreat on the next morning, Mr. Mangles, with signal gallantry and generous self-devotion, and notwithstanding that he had himself been previously wounded, carried for several miles, out of action, a wounded soldier of Her Majesty's 37th Regiment, after binding up his wounds under a murderous fire, which killed or wounded almost the whole detachment ; and he bore him in safety to the boats.</p>

WHEREAS by the 410th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may, from time to time, alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected. And by the 413th section of the said Act, it is enacted that every local authority holding any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, at any place within the jurisdiction of any of the said General Lighthouse authorities, may, if they think fit, surrender or sell the same

to such General Lighthouse authority, and such authority may, with the consent of the Board of Trade, accept or purchase the same, the purchase money (if any) to be paid out of the said Mercantile Marine Fund, and thereupon such lighthouse and its appurtenances, or such buoy or beacon as the case may be, shall become vested in such authority, and such authority shall be entitled to receive all dues lawfully payable in respect thereof at the time of such surrender or sale, or if Her Majesty by Order in Council so directs, such dues as might be fixed and made payable, if the same were a new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, and such lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, and the dues payable in respect thereof, shall, after such surrender or sale, be subject in all respects to the same regulations as other lighthouses and light dues, buoys, and beacons provided for by the said Act.

And whereas, by virtue of, and pursuant to, the said 413th section, of the said Act, the Commissioners of Harbours in the Isle of Man, being the local authority holding the lighthouse at Douglas Head, in the said island, within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, propose to surrender the said light-

house to the said Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, on or before the first August next, and the said Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, having obtained the consent of the Board of Trade, propose to accept the said lighthouse; and the said lighthouse and its appurtenances will, accordingly, upon the completion of the said surrender, become vested in the said Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses on or before the first day of August next.

Now therefore Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in her in that behalf by the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that, on and after the first day of August next, there shall be paid in respect of the said lighthouse, at Douglas Head aforesaid, for every British vessel, and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom, upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and for every foreign vessel, not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed; and that the said tolls, in respect of the said lighthouse, shall be levied by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of thirty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Duties, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty,

by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Thomas Southerton Estcourt, late one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the thirteenth of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-seventh of June last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the fifteenth of July instant, except as is herein otherwise directed, as follows; viz.:

SEVEN OAKS, KENT.—In the vaults and graves beneath the *parish church* of Seven Oaks, Kent, and, with the exception of now existing vaults and family graves, in that part of the *churchyard* lying between the street and a line drawn on a level of the west end of the body of the church; and it is ordered that, in the other part of the churchyard, with the exception of vaults and family graves, only one body be buried in a grave, and that, with the same exception, no grave be reopened—and that no human remains be exposed; that in vaults and brick graves in any part of the ground each coffin be separately entombed in brick or stone work, and that, in family earthen graves, one foot of earth be left between each coffin, and that no coffin be deposited within five feet of the surface of the ground,

KINGTON, HEREFORDSHIRE. — In Kington Church, Herefordshire; and on and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be entombed in an airtight manner.

In the churchyard of St. John, BACUP, in the parishes of Whalley and Rochdale, and in the Ebenezer and Irwell Terrace Chapel Burial-grounds, in that consolidated chapelry, from the first of July instant to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the churchyard of St. Bartholomew, St. Thomas, St. Philip, St. Martin, St. Paul, and St. Mary, BIRMINGHAM, from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and it is also ordered that the operation of two Orders in Council of the second of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and twenty-sixth of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, so far as they direct only one body to be buried in any grave in the *General Cemetery* in the old parish of Birmingham, and in the Church of England Cemetery at Birmingham, respectively, be postponed from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the parish new burial-ground, and in the Wesleyan Burial-ground, DARLSTON, from the first of July instant to the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the burial-ground of the Primitive Methodist Chapel, DUKINFIELD, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one;

In the churchyard of MELBOURNE, Derbyshire, in the Friends' Burial-ground, in the New Jerusalem Chapel Burial-ground, and in the Baptist Chapel Burial-ground, in that parish, from the first of July to the first of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

In such parts of the Independent, Wesleyan, Association, and Primitive Wesleyan Chapel-yards as are not within three yards of any building, and in Trinity Churchyard, and in the Lower Independent Chapelyard, all in OVER DARWEN, in the parish of Blackburn, from the first of July instant, to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the new parish burial-ground of PONTEFRAC, from the first of July, and in the old burial-ground at *Knottingley*, in the said parish, from the first of May, to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine;

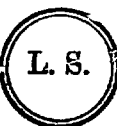

colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant; and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any of such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And whereas by an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of Colonial Posts," power is also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of colonial postage payable by law for the transmission of letters by the post, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any of such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And, whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to them in and by the said several before recited Acts, some or one of them, and of all other powers, enabling them in that behalf, have from time to time, by divers Warrants in writing, under their hands duly made, bearing date respectively, at Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 21st day of July, 1857, the 2nd day of September, 1857, the 16th day of October, 1857, the 13th day of April, 1858, the 15th day of June, 1858, the 19th day of June, 1858, and the 3rd day of December, 1858, made and issued certain regulations, orders, directions and conditions, relating to the rates of postage, and the mode and time of payment thereof, and to the weight, size, and dimensions, and the mode and time of sending, under and subject to, and in conformity with which, the several packets, consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, and the several other packets therein, or in some or one of the said Warrants respectively mentioned, may respectively be transmitted by the post.

And whereas in and by the said recited Warrants, some or one of them, provision is made that where packets transmitted by the post, under the authority of the said respective Warrants, shall not be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the regulations, orders, directions, and conditions therein, or in some or one of them respectively mentioned and contained, such packets shall, in certain cases, be chargeable with certain letter rates of postage therein, or in some or one of the said Warrants respectively mentioned; and it is expedient in all such cases that power should be given to the Postmaster-General to charge such packets with a less amount of postage than such respective letter-rates of postage in the manner hereafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said several hereinbefore recited Acts, any or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order, direct, and declare as follows:

1. In all cases where any packet consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, or any packet consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or the colonial, or other legislatures, may be transmitted by the post, under the authority of the said hereinbefore recited Warrants, or any or either of them, or under the authority of any other Inland or Colonial Book Post Warrant now in force, if any such there be, and any such packet shall be so transmitted as not to be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the regulations, orders, directions, and conditions in the said Warrants or Warrant respectively contained, relating to such packet, and shall, by reason thereof, have become liable, under or by virtue of any such Warrants or Warrant as aforesaid, to be charged with the like rate or amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, or with any higher rate or amount of postage, the Postmaster-General shall, and he is hereby authorized and empowered, at his discretion, either to charge any such packet with the rate or amount of postage to which it shall have become liable under or by virtue of any such Warrants or Warrant as aforesaid, or to charge any such packet with any other rate or amount of postage which he shall think proper, not exceeding the rate or amount of postage to which such packet shall have become liable under or by virtue of any such Warrants or Warrant as aforesaid, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if transmitted in conformity with the regulations, orders, directions, and conditions contained in any such Warrants or Warrant respectively relating to such packet, anything in the said hereinbefore mentioned Warrants, or any or either of them, contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

2. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke the orders, regulations, and directions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, regulations, orders, directions, and conditions, in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.
