FOR the information of Major-General Sir J. Hope Grant, K.C.B., commanding in Oude, I have the honour to report that, having ascertained from my spies, that two leaders named Bulle and Bulkurreem Sing, with a body of rebels, were located in the village of Chainpore, on the edge of the jungle under the Nepaul Hills, about 20 miles north-east of Dhukeeree, I resolved to make a night march, and surprise them if possible. I accordingly marched at 5 P. M. on the 31st ultimo, with the troops noted in the margin,\* leaving my camp under protection of a company of the 3rd Sikh Infantry, with instructions to move up to Siswa, early the next morning.

\* 3rd Sikh Infantry.—2 European Officers; 9 Native Officers; 373 Non-Commissioned Officers and Rank and File. Troop of Native Cavalry.—3 Native Officers; 48 Non-Commissioned Officers and Sowars.

At 9 P. M., I had arrived within six miles of the position supposed to be occupied by the enemy : as I considered it would be unadvisable to reach it before day-light, I bivouacked for the night, marching again at 2 o'clock A.M., and succeeded just as the day broke, in surprising and capturing 20 rebels, 3 elephants, 2 camels, 17 horses, besides a large quantity of arms of all descriptions. Amongst the prisoners captured were sepoy of the 42nd, 60th, and 67th Regiments of Native Infantry.

I was now informed that the remainder of the rebels, with Bullee and Bulkurreem Sing, occupied a line of topes running along the edge of the Terraie, and within half a mile of it. Leaving the prisoners in the charge of a small guard, I at once pushed on with the remainder of the troops ; but fearing that the enemy might obtain information of my approach, I advanced with the cavalry, with a view to getting between them and the Terraie to cut off their retreat, and keep them in check till my infantry could come up. This I succeeded in doing, but the rebels, apparently all regular sepoy, and about 200 strong, turned out and attacked me in a most determined manner. Seeing this I at once charged them. I was received by a volley of musketry, and before I could rally my cavalry the enemy had made a hasty retreat into the dense jungle in their front. When the infantry came up, I followed for some distance, but losing all trace of them was obliged to give up the pursuit, and marching westward along the edge of the Terraie reached this at 5 P.M., yesterday, having gone over upwards of forty miles in 24 hours.

I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the detachment. All exerted themselves and endured with equal cheerfulness the fatigue of a long and harassing march in one of the hottest days I ever experienced in India.

WHEN halted at Goonah, waiting the final instructions of Brigadier-General Sir Robert Na-

pier, K.C.B., regarding my return to Agra, I have the honour to report, for the information of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief, that I received reliable information that a party of rebels, under Feroze Shah and three local chiefs, were in the village of Patun, about fifty miles distant.

2. I moved off with my force at 4 P.M. the same evening, and reached Kuchnar Serace, thirty miles off, the next morning. During the afternoon the intelligence I had previously received of the position of the rebels was confirmed. I divided my force into three columns.

One under Lieutenant-Colonel Custance, C.B., 6th Dragoon Guards, was directed to move on Gurhpara, a village in the jungle, and one of the resorts of the rebels.

A second, under Lieutenant-Colonel Sawyer, 6th Dragoon Guards, with the camp and baggage, proceeded to Billakhera.

While I went myself with the third, the force noted in the margin,\* to Patun.

3. The village is situated at the foot of a range of hills, and on three sides is surrounded by it. Gurhpara is about five miles to the south-west, and Billakhera six miles to the west. On reaching Patun I found the rebels had left. One man belonging to the village informed me they had gone to Muthanub, three miles distant, and situated deeper in the jungles. As the inhabitants of Patun were known to be in favour of the rebels, I rejected his intelligence, but I decided on remaining at the village to make further enquiries.

4. I had directed the men to carry one day's cooked provisions in their haversacks; and had planned, if I should find the rebels at Patun, to drive them on to my columns at Gurhpara and Billakhera, and expected to rest at night at the latter place. I had therefore neither tents nor cooking things with me, and the rebels, who were really at Muthanub, thinking from the absence of an encampment, my force was a party of the Gwalior troops, assembled on one of the hills to attack us.

5. The men were well dressed, and they came down in skirmishing order with so much regularity that I was at first doubtful whether they did not belong to another British force who had mistaken us for rebels.

6. When I was satisfied they were rebels, I directed a party, under Brevet-Major Nixon, of the Rifle Brigade, Camel Corps, to proceed through a gorge in the hills, and then to advance up and attack them. At the same time a party of the 4th Sikh Cavalry, under Lieutenant Fane, commanding that corps, was ordered to proceed round the hill to take the rebels in rear, after the party, under Major Nixon, should have driven them back.

7. As it was possible the rebels' skirmishers might have been supported by a strong force behind the hill, I directed Lieutenant-Colonel Ross, of the Rifle Brigade, commanding the Camel Corps, to proceed, with the remainder of his men, in support of Major Nixon, while I went, with the rest of the cavalry, up the brow of the hill, to the left, in the hope of coming up with a party of the rebels who had disappeared in that direction. Major Nixon, however, with his riflemen and Sikhs, did his work so rapidly, that nothing was left for the supports to do. On my reaching the top of the hill not a rebel was in sight. They had

disappeared among the thick jungle, and left no trace by which I could judge of the direction they had taken. I was therefore obliged to give up the pursuit and wait for further information.

8. I beg to enclose copies of the reports of Major Nixon, Camel Corps, and Lieutenant Fane, commanding 4th Sikh Cavalry; and I have to commend the activity and perseverance with which the attack was made, and the pursuit kept up by these officers, and the officers and men under their command. I have also to bring to the notice of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief the alacrity and steadiness with which all my little force moved forward in the hope of coming up with the rebels.

Sir,

ON the 16th instant Brigadier Showers, having detached me with a troop of my regiment, to beat up the jungles at the foot of the hills on which the enemy were posted, near Patun, I have the honour to report that, having no guides, before I had got half a mile from the village, the thick jungle and scrub so impeded my advance that I turned to the left and advanced up the spur of the hill on which the enemy were first seen.

By this time Captain Nixon, with the Rifles, had crowned the heights on my left, driving their skirmishers across the valley below, and the horsemen of the party were seen going off at a gallop on the opposite side of a deep nullah.

I followed immediately, but on account of the dense jungle, only succeeded in capturing five or six ponies, and seven camp followers, (one of whom was said to be a Sepoy). The main body I afterwards heard had broken into two parties, the mounted men flying along the foot of the hills, and the footmen up the ravine to the left.

The whole country was a mass of heavy jungle, but Kote Duffadar Hurree Sing, whom I had detached with four Sowars, to beat up a ravine, came across two of the fugitives, sabred one and shot the other. As one of the captured camp followers reported to me that the rebels had encamped the night before at a village called Muthame, I went there and found traces of their having been there very recently. In fact from the marks, I should say they left only to attack us at Patun.

Sir,

IN accordance with the direction of Brigadier Showers, Commanding Column, I have the honour to report to you for his information, that, on receiving your orders, I moved with a force as per

margin,\* at 11 A. M., on the 16th instant, to oppose a line of skirmishers which was moving down the hills towards our position outside the village of Patun.

I extended half of my men in skirmishing order, the remainder being in support under the command of Lieutenant Ramsbottom, and I directed Lieutenant Austin to continue the extension to the left with the natives under his command. The enemy, whom I believe to have been dismounted Sowars, about 60 in number, descended the hill in very good order, until my skirmishers had arrived at the foot of it, which was about one-third of a mile from the village, when I opened fire on them. They returned this without any damage to us, and those directly opposite to our skirmishers retired quickly over the brow of the hill; those to my left escaping by the ravines, and through the long grass and thick jungle, in a north-easterly direction. I pursued the rebels who had retreated to my front, as quickly as the steepness of the hill and bad nature of the ground would admit of. On reaching the other face of the top of the hill, I perceived about 100 of the enemy in a body 900 yards from me in the plain beneath, which was covered with jungle. They were mounting their horses, and I again opened fire, emptying several saddles, and producing an immediate flight. They retreated very rapidly through the jungle to the south-east, when owing to the exceeding thickness of the jungle, I lost sight of them, but continued to advance with my skirmishers so as to support Captain Fane, who was pursuing with the 4th Seikh Cavalry, in case my assistance should be required.

After proceeding at a fast pace for three miles, I came up with Captain Fane's force; and all the enemy having disappeared, and there being no traces through the jungle by which they could be pursued, I returned with the skirmishers to camp. The supports coming in half an hour afterwards.
