(No. 33.) MEDITERRANEAN—COAST OF SPAIN.

Light on Cape Tiñoso.

THE Minister of Marine at Madrid has given notice, that on and after the 10th October, 1859, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on Cape Tiñoso.

The new light will be a *fixed white* light, at an elevation of 479 English feet above the level of the sea, and in ordinary weather should be visible from a distance of 20 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric, of the first order.

The light tower is cylindrical, and stands on a rocky precipice, over a rectangular building painted red with yellow windows. Its position is in lat. 37° 31' 17" N. and long. 1° 9' 8" West of Greenwich.
