# His Majesties Gracious Declaration 

To all His Loving Subjects for

LIBERTY of CONSCIENCE.

## JAMESR.

$T$ baving pleafed slmighty God notonly to bring $V$ s to the Imperial Croim of thefe King doms through the greateft difficulties, but to prejeive Us by a more than ordinary Providence upon the Throne of Our Royal Ancefors, there is nutbing nour that We fo earnefty defire, as to Ejtablifh Our Goorrnment on fuch a Foundation, as may make Our Subjefts happy, and wnite them to U's by Inclination as reefl ds Duty; Which We think can be done by no Thicans fo offectunlly, wo by gronting to them the free $E x$. recife of their Religion tro the time to come, and add that to the perfoct Enioyment of their Property, whbich bads never been in any cale mnaraided by $U$ s fince Our caming to the Cronns: Which being the tuo thirgs Men value moft, fholl ever be preferved in thefe Ktigdoms, during Our Reign cver them, as the trueft Metbods of tbjeir Peace and Our Glory. Lexe cannot but beartily mijh, as it will eafily be beitiverd, that all the People of Our Dominrons atere Mcmbers of the Catholick Cburch, yet We humbiy thank Almoghty God, it is, and batb of Iong timadien Our conftant Senfe and Oprinion (ubbich, upprs diverfe Occafions We bave declared) that Conf(iense ought not to be conftrained, nor Peptle forced in matters of meer Religion: It bas ever been directly contrayy to Our Inc.ination, as We think it is to the Intereft of Gcvermnent, utbich it dyfirors by fpoiling Trade, depppulating Countries, and difcourrgging Strangers; and finaly, that it never obtaned the End for yolich it trasmepployed: And in this we are the more Confirned by terer Reffeciions We bave made upon the Condace of the four lift Reigns. For aftor allthe fieguent and prefing Endearoirs that were afed in each of them, to redice this Kumg dom to an exale Conformity in Relyeion, it is viflible the Succelfs bas nct ayJtrenti the Defign, and that the Difficulty is invincti c; We therefore out of Oat Princely Care and Affetion mito allo: i Lovirg Subjetts, that they may tive at
 onconnugeyment of Strangers, havet thonigit fit by wittue of Owt Noval Perer gative, to iffue forth thes our De-

In the furf Place IFct do Eeclare, that Hie trill Prot.at and M. intain Oir Arch-Bifh.ts, Bifhops, axd C'eygy, and all otpri Qur Subects of the churth of England, in the fiee Exercije of tbe.r Re igion, ${ }^{\text {d }}$ by Lant Efathiflised, and in the griet und futh Enjoyment of all ti:tr Peffifions, witho it aty Meleldation or Difturiente nis.atojecer.

We do likeewife Declare that it is Our Royal Willand Pleafure, Th, it from benceforth the Execution of all and all manner of Pendl Latrs in Matters Ecclefiaftical, for not coming to Chatrch, or not Receiving the Secrament, or for any other Non-conformity to the Rolipion Eftablyfued, or for, or ly Reafon of the Exercife of Relagion in dny mamner tubatfocver, be immediately Sufpended ; And the furtber Exccurtion of the frid Penal Latts and every of them is bercby Sulfended.
And to the end tbat by the Libery becreby Granted, the Peace and Security of Our Goverment in the Pratice thereof, may not be indangered, We bave thought fit, and do poyely Araitly Cbartge and Commandall Our Loving Subjetis, That is bic do firely give them Leave to Mect andScrve God after their orrn WWay and Manner, be it in Private Houlfes or Places purpofeli'y Hired or Built for that ufe; fo that they take offecial care, that nothing be Preached or Tauglyt among $\mathcal{A}$ them? urbich may any ways tend to Alemate the Hearrs of Our People from Us or Our Gcvernmert; And that their Meetings and Afferblics be peaceably, opcnty, and publickly beld, and all Pery ons freely ndmitted to them; And that they do fignifie and make known to fome ome or more of the next fuffices of the Peace, trbat Place or Places they fet apart for thofe ufes.
And that all Our Subjects may emjoy fuch their Religious Affemblies twith greater Afirrance and Protectia om, Wc bave thought it requifite, and do bereby Command, That no Difterbance of any kind be made or ziven unto them, under Pain of Ourr Difpleafire, and to lefurtber proceeded agn ninft mith the uttermoft feverity.
And for as much as We are deffrouss to bave the Ben nefit of the Servicc of all Our Leving Subjefts, which by the Law of Nature is infeparably amexed to, and inhberent in Our Royal Perfon: And that none of Our Subjets may for the future be under any Difcourngement or Difability strbo are otbervife tell inclined and fit to ferve $V_{s}$ ) by Reafon of fome Oaths or Tefts, that bave been uffually Adminififed on fuch occafions: WWe do herely firtber Declare, That it is Our Royal Will and Pleafire, That the Oatts commonly called, The Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and alfo the feveral Tefts and Declarations mentioned in the Alas of Pariament made in the 25th and 3oth years of the Reign of Our late Royal Brother King Charles the Second, Jhall not at any time bereafter be Required to be Taken, Declared or Subffribed by any Perfon or Pe:-m Sons unbatfoever, trbo is ar faall be Imployed in ary of fice or Place of Truft either Civul or Militany, imder V's or in Our Govermment. And Wi' do fintber Deelare it to be Our Pleafure and Intentionfrem time to time bereafter, to Grant Our Reyal Difpenfations under Our Great Seal to allour Loving Si ljetts fo to be imployed, inbo flall nat take the faid Oaths, or Subfribe or Declare the fritid Tefts or Declarations in the abovementioned Afts and ctary of them.

And to the end that all Our Levirg Subiects may re* ccive and enjor the full Benefix and Advartate of Oar Gracious Indulgence berefr intended, and n:ay ic Aiguited and Diftharged from all Pains, Pene tirs, Ferfettirres, ana luffibuitites by them or any of them inculped or forfoited, or toblich they faall ir may at thay
