THE accompanying report which has just reached me of an encounter with the rebels, by a Field Detachment under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Gottreux, of the 1st Madras Native Infantry, I have the honour to submit for the information of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-chief, and am gratified to find that all conducted themselves so much to the satisfaction of their commander on the occasion ; and I beg to bring the names of the officers mentioned by Lieutenant-Colonel Gottreux to the favourable notice of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief; Lieutenant Osborne, Political Agent of Rewah, and his Deputy, Mr. Coles, have by their information of the position of the rebels, materially contributed to their defeat.

A special report will be made by me without delay, on the gallant conduct of Private Addison, of Her Majesty's 43rd Regiment.

Sir,

UNDER instructions received when in camp at Punghuttee, on the 1st instant, to proceed in command of a party to look up a body of mutineers who were in the hills, near the village of Surbhungah, I have the honour to report for the information of Major-General Whitlock, commanding Saugor Field Division, that I left camp at quarter past five p.m., on that day, with the troops detailed in the margin* for that purpose.

2. Having marched until half an hour after midnight, we reached an open plateau in the hills, situated about three miles from Surbhungah, where we bivouacked for the remainder of the night. A spy of Mr. Cole's came up, and reported that the fellows we were in search of had shifted their camp, and were then about three miles from us, in some dense jungle in the neighbourhood of Kurrereah ; the head man of that village arrived shortly afterwards, confirming the report, and as he was acquainted with the enemy's locality, he was detained to be our guide in the morning. The baggage and all followers, were left in this place under an escort, with instructions to follow to Kurrereah in a couple of hours. We started at half-past five for the rebel camp, and shortly after came in sight of their fires. On our being observed, the enemy opened a sharp fire on us, and commenced their retreat, leaving their baggage ponies in their rear.

3. Lieutenant and Adjutant Gompertz, Acting Staff-Officer, was detached with the cavalry, a little in advance of the main body, and intercepting the enemy's retreat, came into close conflict with them, during which many were killed. The main body moved on as fast as the nature of the ground would allow, for about two miles, many detached small parties of the artillery and infantry having hand to hand encounters with similar parties of the enemy, who were found, as

we progressed, hiding in the ravines and jungle. Lieutenant Osborne, Political Agent of Rewah, was wounded by a sword cut on the right hand. He was at the time he was attacked, closely followed by three men of the 43rd Light Infantry, two men of the artillery being a few paces in front of him. Private Henry Addison, of the 43rd Light Infantry, seeing him attacked and on the ground, rushed forward to defend and cover him in a most gallant manner. In doing this, I much regret having to record, that he received two very severe sword cuts, one on the left leg which rendered immediate amputation of the limb above the knee necessary, and another causing compound fracture of the left fore-arm. The heroism displayed by Private Addison in thus placing himself between Lieutenant Osborne and his assailant at the critical juncture he did, thereby saving that officer's life, may, I hope, be deemed worthy of the Victoria Cross, for which honour I earnestly beg to recommend him.

4. Finding that the rebels had all fled, and that any further pursuit would be fruitless, I recalled my party, and we retraced our steps to the village, breakfasted, and reached our camping ground at Bursingpore, at half-past four P.M., having gone over some thirty miles in twenty-four hours, exclusive of the ground covered in the pursuit. Having given the men a good night's rest here, we proceeded after breakfast to Kothee, and arrived there at six P.M., on the 3rd instant.

5. The party of rebels whose defeat I have described, appeared to be all trained soldiers, and I should say numbered from 250 to 270, of whom 45 to 50 were killed, but exact numbers could not be ascertained, as the fighting ground covered an extensive space. Their wounded it is impossible to give any account of; three prisoners were taken, two of whom were fully armed. One was he said in the Maharajah's Contingent, and the other a relative of a sepoy, killed at Punghuttee in September last. The third prisoner was a mere lad. The two former were hung, and the latter brought on, as also a woman and two children, who were found near the rebels' camp;

several articles of clothing belonging to the late Bengal army, percussion arms and pouches, with Delhi arsenal stamps on them, were also found.

6. In bringing this report to a close, it affords me gratification to bear testimony to the admirable conduct of the troops, Europeans and Natives, and to the efficient and cheerful manner in which both officers and men did their duty; my thanks are due to Captain Palmer, Royal Artillery, in command of the party of that arm; to Lieutenant Gompertz, Staff Officer, I am much indebted, for the assistance he afforded me, and for the very efficient way in which he managed his small detachment of cavalry: the service of Doctor Abbott attached to the Rewah agency, the medical officer who accompanied the expedition, have my commendation, for the attention and care he bestowed on the wounded; the gallantry of Jemadar Mahomed Khan, in charge of the Rewah Sowars, and of Sikh Sowar Khan Singh, who received a gun shot wound in the right shoulder, have been brought to my notice, for favourable report by Lieutenant Gompertz, and I have much pleasure in doing so; I cannot omit to mention in this report, the name of an old and most meritorious native officer Subadar Purwarish Khan, of the 1st Madras Native Infantry, who was in command of the men of the regiment, he is a most zealous and very superior officer of good family, and if my honest recommendation should prove the means of his obtaining any reward I shall have much pleasure in feeling that I was instrumental to it.

7. I have now only to place on record the valuable services of Mr. Coles, Political Assistant Rewah, who was most indefatigable in promoting the success of the expedition; Lieutenant Osborne and Mr. Coles, both present with the expedition throughout, for their hearty co-operation and support have my sincere thanks.

8. I beg to forward a nominal roll of officers employed, a casualty roll, and a return of arms captured.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was graciously pleased, by Her Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirtieth day of April last, to promise and declare that the Bounties of Ten Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Five Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for Her Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the age of forty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should, on or before the fifteenth day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Her Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for raising men for the service of the Royal Navy: and whereas Her Majesty was also graciously pleased by Her said Proclamation to declare that all Ablebodied Landsmen, not above the age of twenty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the sum of Forty Shillings each man as Her Majesty's Royal Bounty:

And whereas the time limited for Payment of the said Bounties, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, was, by Order in Council of the eleventh day of June last, prolonged and extended from the said fifteenth day of June to the thirty-first day of July last; and whereas by another Order in Council, of the twenty-ninth day of July last, the said Bounties to Able and Ordinary Seamen were reduced to eight pounds and four pounds respectively, and the time limited for the payment of the same was prolonged and extended from the said thirty-first day of July last to the thirtieth day of September, instant; and it being judged expedient for Her Majesty's Service that Bounties should, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, be continued to be paid for some time longer, but that the same should be further reduced to Six Pounds in respect of Able Seamen, and to Three Pounds in respect of Ordinary Seamen; Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the time limited for payment of the said further reduced Bounties of Six Pounds to Able Seamen, and of Three Pounds to Ordinary Seamen, be prolonged and extended from the first day of October next to the thirtieth day of November next, inclusive; Whereof all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

"Whereas all that portion of the lands, tenements, hereditaments and endowments, formerly belonging to the said Treasurer of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London, which constitutes the rectory of Furneux Pelham and Burned Pelham (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and duly published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of the same month and year, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the

Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish ;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications ;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of July last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twelfth day of September instant; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State ; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the fifth day of October next (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows ; viz. :

WROCKWARDINE, SALOP.—In the *churchyard*, except in soil which is free from water and human remains ; and it is ordered that no coffin be buried less than four feet below the surface, or within one foot of any other coffin, unless deposited in a vault or walled grave which is free from water, and in which each coffin shall be entombed in an air-tight manner.

KNAFTON, NORFOLK.—In the vaults and graves beneath the parish church.

LUDGVAN, CORNWALL.—In the parish burial-ground, on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be entombed in an air-tight manner.

EAST STONEHOUSE, DEVON.—In the new part of the parish churchyard of Saint George, Stonehouse ; and it is also ordered that the surface be covered with fresh mould, and a growing vegetation maintained thereon.

wise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit ;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively ; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows ; viz. :

In St. John's Churchyard, in St. Mary's additional churchyard, in the Cemetery, in Ebenezer and Zion Burial-grounds, and in the Tabernacle and Bethany Burial-grounds, all in the borough of CARDIFF, from the first of October to the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine ;

In the parish churchyard HALIFAX, and in the burial-grounds of the Square Chapel, Holy Trinity Church, Salem Chapel, Sion Chapel, St. James's Church, and Hanover-street Chapel, all in Halifax, from the first of September instant to the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty ;

In the new part of All Saint's Churchyard HASTINGS, from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, to the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, provided that, with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body be buried in each grave, that, with the same exception, no grave be reopened, and that the only bodies interred be those of parishioners of All Saints ;

In the churchyard of KINGTON, Herefordshire, from the first of October next, to the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty ;

In the old churchyard of LUDDENDEN, from the first of September instant, to the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty ;

In the churchyard of MELBOURNE, Derbyshire, in the Friends' Burial-grounds, in the New Jerusalem Chapel Burial-ground, and in the Baptist Chapel Burial-ground, in the same parish, from the first of September, to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine ;

In the churchyard of SOWERBY BRIDGE, in the parish of Halifax, from the first of October next, to the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

And whereas by a supplemental Order in Council of the thirteenth of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, varying a former Order, burials were directed to be discontinued, with certain exceptions, in St. Mark's churchyard, in the parish of *Lyncombe and Widcombe*, BATH, on the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and it seems fit that the operation of the said Order be postponed ; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the operation of the said Order of the thirteenth November last be postponed until the first of June, one

thousand eight hundred and sixty, on condition that the precautions referred to in such Order be observed in the meantime.

And whereas by a supplemental Order in Council of the twenty-third of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, varying a former Order, the use of family vaults and graves in Holy Trinity churchyard, BROMPTON, which were in existence on the eighteenth of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, was permitted, subject to certain conditions, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the words "or made in ground never before buried in, for the burial of coffins to be removed from beneath the church," be inserted immediately before the words "be permitted" in the eleventh line from the end of the Order of the twenty-third of April last.
