(Translation.)

St. Cruz, September 7, 1859.

AS a precautionary measure, the Provisional Health Board under my Presidency has decided that all vessels, which shall arrive at this Bay, shall anchor to the leeward of this town; and to carry this resolution into effect the pilot-boat shall go off to meet them, for which service they shall be paid, although they may not be admitted on board. I communicate this to you for your information and guidance.

Fixed Red Light on Father Point.

THE Board of the Trinity House at Quebec has given notice, that on or about the 1st of September, 1859, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at the Montreal Ocean Steamship Company's Telegraph and Pilot Station, on Father Point, Rimousky, and that the light would be continued from sunset to sunrise, from the 10th of April to the 10th of December, of each succeeding year.

The light is a *fixed red* light, and may be seen between the bearings W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. (round southerly) to E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. It stands 43 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 10 miles.

The light tower is octagonal and painted white, and its position is in lat. 48° 31' 30" N.; long. 68° 30' 40" W. of Greenwich.

It is placed at an elevation of 30 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 10 to 12 miles, between the bearings of S. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., round easterly, and W. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., and will be exhibited annually from the 25th of August to the 20th of April.

The illuminating apparatus will be of the sixth order. It stands on the extreme point of Fuglenæs, in lat. $70^{\circ} 40' 15''$ N., long. $23^{\circ} 40'$ E. of Greenwich.

Light on Hekkingen.

The light will be a *fixed white* light on Hekking Island, at the entrance of Malang Fiord. It is placed at an elevation of 66 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles, between the bearings of S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., round southerly, and N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., and will be exhibited from the 15th of August to the 1st of May.

The illuminating apparatus will be of the fourth order.

It stands on the north side of the island, in lat. $69^{\circ} 36'$ N., long. $17^{\circ} 50' 30''$ E. of Greenwich.

Light on Andenæs.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, varied by a *flash* every third minute. It is placed at an elevation of 143 feet above the level of high water, and in ordinary weather should be visible at all points of the compass from seaward from a distance of 20 miles, and will be exhibited from the 15th of August to the 1st of May.

The illuminating apparatus will be of the second order.

The lighthouse is a circular tower of iron 114 feet high, and painted red, and stands in lat. $69^{\circ} 19' 30''$ N., long. $16^{\circ} 9'$ E. of Greenwich.

[Variation in 1859, $14\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W.]

Light on Vaag.

The light will be a *fixed white* light and is intended as a guide to either Vaag or North Hellig Vær. It is placed at an elevation of 45 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles, between the bearings of S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., round southerly, and N.W. by N., and will be exhibited from the 15th of August to the 1st of May.

The illuminating apparatus will be of the fifth order.

It stands on the N.E. point of Vaag Island, in lat. $67^{\circ} 26'$ N., long. $14^{\circ} 1' 40''$ E. of Greenwich.

Directions.—Vessels standing for this light should keep along the eastern side of Vaag Island, where there is a clear passage, until they lose sight of the light, when anchorage may be had in 7 to 8 fathoms, good ground.

Alteration of Villa Light.

Also, that on the 15th September, 1859, when it would be re-lit, the light on Villa Oen would show a *fixed white* light varied by a *flash* every four minutes.

The light is placed at an elevation of 127 feet above the level of high water, and should be visible
