GENERAL ORDER.

No. 1202 of 1859.—His Excellency the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following report from Lieutenant G. Hawthorn, Commanding Field Detachment 24th Bombay Native Infantry, of operations against the rebels at Gonda, on the 19th June, 1859.

His Excellency in Council desires to record his approval of the manner in which these operations were conducted, and offers his thanks to all engaged on the occasion.

I HAVE the honour to forward a report from Lieutenant Hawthorn, of the 24th Bombay Native Infantry, of operations conducted by him against rebels. I shall feel obliged by your bringing prominently to the notice of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief the zeal and perseverance of Lieutenant Hawthorn, resulting in the complete defeat and dispersal of a body of rebels.

Lieutenant George S. Hawthorn to the Brigade Major, 2nd Brigade Gwalior Division, Jhansi.

Sir, Camp, Mow Ranypoor, 3rd July, 1859.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of Colonel Lockhart, C.B., Commanding 2nd Brigade Gwalior Division, that, according to my instructions, I arrived at Torri Futtepoor on the morning of the 15th June last. I there was informed that the rebels, amounting to some 50 cavalry and between 200 and 300 infantry, under their leaders Burgoor Sing, Chutter Sing, and Desput, had left the Goorsera Districts, and pro-

ceeded across the Gosie Desanne to the Hummerpoor Districts. I therefore determined, in concert with Major Davies, Commanding the Jhansi Military Police, to follow them up, and co-operate with Captain Sawyers, of the police in that district.

I accordingly marched on 'Mow Ranypoor, where the intelligence above mentioned was confirmed; left Mow for Alipora on the morning of the 18th ultimo; and, the following day, moved on to Jorun. About twelve o'clock mid-day, intelligence was brought from Alipora that the rebels, under Burgoor and Chutter Sing, were collected at Gonda, on the banks of the River Desanne, some 500 strong. We immediately struck camp, and marched, via Alipora, on Gonda; the strength of my detachment being as per margin;* that of Major Davies, as near as I can say, as per margin† also.

We arrived at Gonda about 4.30 P.M., where we found the rebels, as reported, encamped on the left bank of the river, with dense jungle in their rear. I immediately ordered skirmishers to the front, under Ensign Holland, 24th Native Infantry, and drove the rebels through a dense jungle, some two miles I should say, on to another ghât further up the river, of the existence of which we were unaware. At this place they recrossed the river, and commenced a sharp fire upon us, but more particularly on the cavalry, who were in the open: however, we drove them out of their position; and then the cavalry, under Major Davies, took up the pursuit.

The success was complete; the rebels were completely defeated and dispersed, with, I am glad to say, no casualty on my side. A sowar of Major Davies, I regret to say, had two fingers cut off, while attacking one of the rebels with his spear. About ten or twelve of the enemy were killed, amongst whom was Jowahier, a foster brother of Burgoor Sing, and a man of very determined appearance. Many others were wounded, but hard to state how many, on account of the dense jungle and nullahs innumerable, which favoured their escape.

I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men under my command during this day's work, and more particularly my thanks are due to Ensign Holland for the steady way in which he led the skirmishers,

driving all before him, and eventually enabling the cavalry to take up the pursuit, when infantry were of no further use, and to which I attribute the great success of the day.

(No. 39).—BALTIC, GULF OF BOTHNIA.

Fixed Light on Gottska Sandö Island.

THE Royal Administration of Maritime Affairs at Stockholm has given notice, that on and after the 10th October, 1859, lights would be exhibited from the two lighthouses recently erected on the northernmost point of Gottska Sandö Island, to enable the mariner to avoid the dangerous shoals called the Kopparstenarne.

The lights are *fixed white* lights, and are visible from a vessel between the bearings from N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. (round by east and south) to W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. They are both elevated 140 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in ordinary weather from a distance of 16 miles. They bear N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from each other, distant 260 yards apart, and when in one, on the latter bearing they will lead a mile to the westward of the south-west extreme of the Kopparstenarne.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the third order.

The lighthouses are of iron and wood, of the same height, and coloured red, with the upper parts white. They stand in lat. $58^{\circ} 23\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $19^{\circ} 12\frac{1}{2}'$ East of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Biurö Head.

Also, that on and after the 17th September, 1859, a light would be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on Biurö Head, on the west coast of the Gulf of Bothnia.

The light is a *fixed white* light, and it illumines an arc of the horizon seaward, and part of the coast, from N.W. (round by north and east) to S.W. by W. It is elevated 171 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 18 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the second order.

The lighthouse is a stone structure, 14 feet high, having twelve sides: its position is lat. $64^{\circ} 29\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $21^{\circ} 35\frac{1}{2}'$ East of Greenwich. The keeper's dwelling and outhouses are painted red and situated below the hill in a southerly direction from the lighthouse; they will not be seen far seaward, and then only in an easterly and southerly direction.

The beacon, consisting of a pole surmounted by a barrel, which has hitherto been used as a landmark on Biurö Head, will be removed, as being now needless.

(No. 40).—NORTH COAST OF FRANCE, DOVER STRAIT.

Beacon Light near Calais.

THE Imperial Ministry for Public Works in France has given notice, that on and after the

15th December, 1859, a light will be exhibited during the whole of the night from the iron beacon erected in the early part of the year 1858 on the extreme edge of the beach, at a mile from the coast at Pointe de Walde, and E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Calais lighthouse.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, varied every *twenty seconds* by a *red flash*, without any eclipse; the duration of the white light will be sixteen seconds and of the red flash four seconds. The light will be $34\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the level of the highest tides, and should be visible from a distance of 10 miles.

The beacon is a useful guide to vessels when the beach is covered, but it is left dry at low water ordinary springs. It stands in lat. $50^{\circ} 59\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $1^{\circ} 55' 4''$ East of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Cape Lookout.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of November, 1859, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on Cape Lookout, coast of North Carolina.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, placed at an elevation of 156 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in ordinary weather from a distance of 22 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be a Fresnel lens, of the first order.

The white lights may be seen seaward in clear weather from a distance of 3 miles.

In entering the port by either passage the white light must be left to the northward, and the red light to the southward. If entering by the eastern passage in a vessel of more than 20 feet draught, care must be taken not to pass to the southward of the parallel of the red light; if entering by the western passage it will be necessary to bring the lights in that passage nearly in line, bearing about S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
