

**A**T the Court at *Windsor*, the 29th day of *November*, 1859,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Right Honourable George Sir Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the following modifications:

**CHICHESTER.**—From and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the burial-ground of the parish of *Saint Pancras*, Chichester, with the exception of family vaults and brick graves which were in existence on the twenty-eighth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

That in the churchyard of the parish of *Saint Paul*, Chichester, burials be limited to the bodies of parishioners, except in the case of family vaults and graves which were in existence on the twenty-eighth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

That in the churchyard of the parish of *Saint Peter the Great*, or *Sub-deanery*, burials be forthwith discontinued within five yards of the infant school and playground; that burials be limited to the bodies of parishioners, except in the case of family vaults and graves which were in existence on the twenty-eighth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine; that, with the exception of family vaults and graves, no grave be re-opened; that the grave space for the burial of persons above twelve years of age be nine feet by four feet, and those for the burial of children under twelve years of age, six feet by three feet; and that in family vaults and brick graves, each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

**HINDERWELL, YORKSHIRE.**—Forthwith in the parish church of Hinderwell, and in the old parish churchyard.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twelfth day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the

London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twelfth day of January.

The Queen has (upon the petition of the Reverend George Staunton Simcocks, Clerk, and Robert Few, Gentleman, his trustees) been pleased to give and grant unto George Staunton Lynch (a minor), eldest son of Henry Cormick Lynch, late of Leigh Park, in the county of Hants, Esquire, deceased, who was the second son of Mark Lynch, of Duras Park, in the county of Galway, in that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Ireland, by Victoire, his wife, daughter of Richard Wolsley Cormick, of Wolsley Park, in the Island of Grenada, Esquire, deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he may in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of his cousin, Sir George Thomas Staunton, of Leigh Park aforesaid, Baronet, deceased, henceforth take the surname of Staunton in addition to, and after his present surname of Lynch, and bear the arms of Staunton quarterly, in the first quarter with those of Lynch, and that the said surname and arms may in like manner be taken and borne by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
