Fixed Light on Craney Island Shoal.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given Notice, that on and after the 15th day of November, 1859, a light would be exhibited from the light-house recently erected on the Craney Island Shoal, about a hundred feet from the light-vessel hitherto moored on the west side of the entrance to Elizabeth river, near Norfolk, coast of Virginia, and which on that date would be removed.

. The light is a *fixed white* light, elevated 52 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in ordinary weather from a distance of about 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is by a Fresnel lens of the fifth order.

The lighthouse is a square wooden building, with watch room and lantern above its centre. It is erected on an iron screw pile foundation, octagonal in plan, 21¹/₂ feet above high-water ordinary springs, and painted red. The sides of the building, and the watch room below the lantern, are painted white, and the roof slate colour.

A fog bell and fog horn are sounded alternately from the lighthouse in foggy weather.

Rossello.

Also, that on and after the same date the present *fixed white* light exhibited from the lighthouse at Port Marsala, province of Trapani, on the west coast of Sicily, would be varied by a *flash* every *three minutes*.

The light is elevated 55 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of about 12 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by refracting lenses.

Alteration of Light on Rudha Mhail.

THE Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses have given notice, that with reference to Notice to Mariners No. 82, dated 8th December, 1858, the following change has been made in the light exhibited from the lighthouse on Rudha Mhail, at the north entrance of the Sound of Islay, by which that portion of the *red* light hitherto seen in the direction of Oronsay, and also over that island seaward, is now masked.

The present light, which is a *fixed* light, shows red from about N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. to N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. or in the direction of Colonsay; but no portion of it is scen seaward of that island, being intercepted by its height. It is masked from about N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. to N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. or in the direction of Oronsay; and it shows white as formerly from about N. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. round westerly, to N.N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. excepting where intercepted by the land.

Caution.—Mariners are again cautioned that the white light when seen in any direction from the westward is to be regarded as a warning light, and is not intended to encourage an attempt to pass between Islay and Oronsay, but to indicate a vessel's position so as to enable her to keep an offing. The red light which shows in the direction of Colonsay, indicates to vessels their approach to that island when navigating the northern part of the Sound of Islay. The white light when seen in any direction from the eastward is a leading light for the Sound.

The light-tower is cylindrical, coloured white, and rises 13 feet above the adjoining dwellings of the light-keepers. It stands at about half a mile to the westward of Calella village, and 57 yards from the margin of the sea. Its position is given as lat. 41° 36' \pm 0" N.; long. 2° 39' 38" East of Greenwich.

3. The duplicates of the petitions and schedules, and all books, papers and writings filed therewith, will be produced by the Clerks or Assistant Clerks of the said County Courts, for inspection and examination, at the Offices of the said County Courts respectively, at the Towns aforesaid, and copies of the petition and schedule, or such part thereof as shall be required, will be provided according to sec. 106 of the Act
