Rum, 100,000 gallons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

Soap, 200 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

Sugar, 150 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards, or earlier if preferred by the party tendering.

The rum, sugar, and pepper to be exempted from the Customs' duties, and parties tendering are to state where they are respectively lying.

Samples of the rum to be sent in pints for each Import Mark, and the average strength of each to be stated, and not an average Mark Ex of different marks or strengths of several imports; and any parcel of rum that is found not to be of the same quality, mark, or average strength of the sample tendered and accepted, will be rejected by the Officers.
