NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 1.) PACIFIC—SOUTH AMERICA; COAST OF CHILE.

Fixed and Flashing Light on Huapilacuy Point.

THE Minister of Marine of the Republic of Chile, Santiago, has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of November, 1859, a light would be exhibited from the lighthouse erected on Huapilacuy point, at the entrance to Port San Carlos de Ancud, on the north coast of the island of Chile.

The light is a *fixed white* light, varied every minute by a *flash*. It is elevated 197 feet above the level of the sea at high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the fourth order.

The light-tower is 32 feet high, circular, and painted white; the lantern is painted green. From it the west point of the Isla Doña Sebastiana bears N.N.E.; Huapacho point, W. by N.; and Huachucucuy head, W. by S. Its position, according to the Chilian Notice, is lat. 41° 46′ 15″ S.; long.

74° 1' West of Greenwich; but on the Admiralty Plan of Port San Carlos, Huapilacuy point is in lat. 41° 46′ 45″ S., long. 73° 55′ 45″ W.

Caution.—The mariner will observe, that the above bearing from the light to Huachucucuy head, W. by S., passes to the southward of Huapacho point and Corona head; vessels therefore approaching Port San Carlos from the southward, after rounding Huachucucuy head, should continue steering to the north-eastward (keeping Corona head to the southward of East to avoid the Huapacho shoal) until the light bears S.E. by E., when they can haul to the southward and act according to circumstances.

(No. 2.) MEDITERRANEAN-ADRIATIC.

Fixed Light at Porto di Bari.

THE Sicilian Government has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of December, 1859, a light would be exhibited from a moveable lighthouse placed on the extremity of the mole of the new port, which is being constructed on the north side of the city of Bari, province of Terra di Bari, on the south-western shore of the Adriatic.

The light is a *fixed red* light, elevated 21 feet above the mean level of the sea, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about 5 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is by lenses.

The present position of the lighthouse, by the Sicilian notice, is given as lat. 41° 6' 29" N., long. 16 52' 45" East of Greenwich. By the Admiralty Plan of Porto di Bari it would be in lat. 41° 8' 30" N., long. 16° 54' 30" E.
