AT the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 23rd day of *January*, 1860,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending Seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant-ships belonging to a subject of such Foreign Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient;

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant-ships in the dominions of Her Majesty the Queen of Spain;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant-ships belonging to subjects of Her Majesty the Queen of Spain, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships; Provided always that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent court, and until his sentence (if any) has been carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Secretary of State for India, in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was graciously pleased by Her Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirtieth day of April last, to promise and declare that the Bounties of Ten Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Five Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for Her Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the age of forty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should, on or before the fifteenth day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Her Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for raising men for the service of the Royal Navy: and whereas Her Majesty was also graciously pleased by Her said Proclamation to declare that all Able-bodied Landsmen, not above the age of twenty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the sum of Forty Shillings each man as Her Majesty's Royal Bounty:

And whereas the time limited for Payment of the said Bounties, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, was, by Order in Council of the eleventh day of June last, prolonged and extended from the said fifteenth day of June to the thirty-first day of July last; and whereas by certain other Orders in Council, the said Bounties have been since reduced to Eight Pounds and Four Pounds respectively, and lastly to Six Pounds and Three Pounds respectively; and the time limited for the payment of the said last-mentioned reduced Bounties was lastly prolonged and extended to the thirty-first day of January instant; and it being judged expedient for Her Majesty's Service that Bounties should, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, be continued to be paid for some time longer, but that the same be further reduced to Four Pounds and Two Pounds respectively; Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered that the time limited for payment of Bounties of Four Pounds to Able Seamen, and

of Two Pounds to Ordinary Seamen, be prolonged and extended from the first day of February next to the thirty-first day of March next, inclusive; Whereof all persons concerned are to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Cardigan, in quarter-sessions assembled at Aberayron, on the eighteenth day of October last, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the said county is insufficient, and praying that the towns of Llandyssil and Aberayron may be polling places for the said county, within which such places are situate:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said towns of Llandyssil and Aberayron shall be polling places for the county of Cardigan; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS in and by an Order in Council, made at the Court at Whitehall, and bearing date the fourteenth day of February, in the year one thousand six hundred and seventy-one, upon the Petition of the Judges and Advocates of His Majesty's Ecclesiastical and Civil Law Courts, then residing at Exeter House, in the Strand, setting forth that they had, at their own charge, built Public Rooms and Conveniences at Doctors' Commons, for holding those His Majesty's Courts of Judicature, which were there kept before the then late dreadful Fire, and humbly desiring His Majesty's leave to adjourn the said Courts thither from Exeter House, where they then were, His late Majesty, the then King, Charles the Second, was pleased to give His gracious approbation and leave, that the said Courts should be adjourned and removed as desired; and by a Declaration in Council of His Royal Will and Pleasure, His said Majesty gave leave and authority to the said Judges to adjourn and remove the said Courts of Judicature respectively to the said ancient place of their residence, and there to keep and continue them as before the said dreadful Fire they were there kept and settled in all respects whatsoever. And His said Majesty in Council thereby declared, that all Processes which should from thenceforth issue out of any of His Majesty's said Courts of Judicature, should be returnable in the Common Hall of Judicature in Doctors' Commons, situate in the parish of Saint Bennet's, Paul's Wharf, in London, and not elsewhere.

And whereas the High Court of Admiralty of England then was, and still is, one of the said Courts, and, in pursuance of the said Order in Council, was adjourned and removed to the said Common Hall of Judicature, in Doctors' Commons, and hath since constantly held its sittings, and hath been kept and continued in the said Common Hall. And whereas all Processes issuing from and out of the said Court, in any causes, suits, actions, appeals, or other proceedings in the said Court, instituted in the said Court prior to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, were and are returnable in the said Common Hall, and not elsewhere.

And whereas it is expedient, that the said High Court of Admiralty of England, should cease to hold its sittings in the said Common Hall of Judicature in Doctors' Commons aforesaid, and should be adjourned and removed to Westminster Hall, in our City of Westminster.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke and annul the said hereinbefore recited Order in Council, so far as the same relates to the said High Court of Admiralty of England, but no further or otherwise, and to order and appoint, and it is hereby ordered and appointed, that the said High Court of Admiralty of England shall hold its sittings in any of the Courts in Westminster Hall, which can be conveniently used for the purpose. And it is hereby further ordered and appointed, that all Processes already issued, or which may be issued from and out of the said Court in any causes, suits, actions, appeals, or other proceedings, instituted in the said Court prior to the said first day

of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and which shall not have been returned before the date of this Order, shall be returned into the Court at Westminster, in which the said High Court of Admiralty of England may be holding its sittings, on the days in which they would heretofore have been returnable in the said Common Hall of Judicature in Doctors' Commons: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or taken to prevent the Judge of the said Court, or any of his Surrogates, from doing any act in Chambers as heretofore.

WHEREAS by "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act, or of the rules to be made in pursuance thereof, shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette, such provisions and rules respectively shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order; and any such Order may be in like manner, from time to time, altered or annulled:

And whereas by "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act, or of the rules to be made in pursuance thereof, shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette such provisions and rules respectively shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time altered and annulled; and that in and by any such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act, or "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any orders or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied:

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that all the provisions of the said Acts, and of the rules made and to be made in pursuance thereof, shall extend and apply to the Court of Record of the borough of **DERBY**, in the county of **DERBY**, commonly called the Borough Court;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, all the provisions of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," and of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1854," and of the rules made, or to be made, in pursuance of the said two Acts, shall extend and apply to the said Court of Record of the Borough of **DERBY**, called the Borough Court.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the advice aforesaid, that all the powers or duties exercisable by the Court, or a Judge, under any of the sections of the said "Common Law Procedure Acts, 1852 and 1854," hereby extended and applied to the said Court of Record, shall, as regards matters and proceedings therein, be exercisable and exercised by the Judge of the said Court, or any Deputy or Assistant Judge thereof; that all the powers or duties exercisable by a Master under any of the sections of the said Acts as aforesaid, shall, as regards matters and proceedings in the said Court be exercisable and exercised by the Registrar of the Court or his deputy: and that the powers or duties exercisable by a Sheriff under any of the sections of the said Acts as aforesaid, shall, as regards matters and proceedings in the said Court, be exercisable and exercised, within the jurisdiction of the said Court, by the Serjeant at Mace of the said borough of Derby.

WHEREAS by "The Summary Procedure on Bills of Exchange Act, 1855," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and that within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette such provisions shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and that any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time, altered and annulled; and that in and by such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any orders or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied;

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that all the provisions of the said Act should be extended and applied to the Court of Record of the borough of Derby, in the county of Derby, commonly called the Borough Court;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that within one month after this Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette, all the provisions of the said "Summary Procedure on Bills of Exchange Act, 1855," shall extend and apply to the said Court of Record of the borough of Derby, called the Borough Court.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct that the forms given in Schedules A and B to the said Act annexed, may and shall be so altered as to make the same applicable to the said Court of Record, and the Judge and Deputy or Assistant Judge thereof, instead of to Her Majesty's Superior Courts at Westminster, and the Judges thereof; and that the costs mentioned in the first section of the said Act shall be fixed by the Registrar of the said Court of Record, subject to the approval

of the Judge thereof; and that the Judge of the said Court, or any Deputy or Assistant Judge thereof, shall and may, as to the said Court, exercise all the powers given by the said Act to any Judge or Judges of the Superior Courts at Westminster, in or by the first, second, third, and fourth sections thereof.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-second of October last, to give notice of such representation, and to

order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixth day of December last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the first day of February next, (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz.:

ST. JUST IN PENWITH.—In the *parish church* St. Just in Penwith; and in the *parish burial-ground* and the *Wesleyan Burial-ground*, except so far as may be compatible with the following regulations, viz.; that no coffin be buried less than four feet below the surface of the ground, and that one coffin only be buried in a grave, and no grave be reopened within fourteen years, except to bury another member of the same family, in which case a layer of earth one foot thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffins, unless in a walled grave, in which the coffins shall be entombed in an airtight manner.

HARTING, SUSSEX.—In the *parish church* of Harting, Sussex; and from and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the *churchyard*, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in brick or stone-work, and also with the exception of now existing earthen graves, provided that in these one foot of earth be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; and that no coffin be buried within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, measuring from the top of the coffin.

ALDERSHOTT, HANTS.—From and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the *parish churchyard* of Aldershott, Hants.

ARDLEIGH, ESSEX.—In the *parish church* of Ardleigh, Essex; and from and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the *churchyard*, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves in which each coffin shall be imbedded in powdered charcoal and separately entombed in an airtight manner, and also with the exception of now existing family earthen graves in which one foot of earth shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin, and no coffin be buried within four feet of the surface, measuring from the top of the coffin to the ordinary level of the ground.

NEWPORT PAGNELL.—In the *parish church* of Newport Pagnell; and also in the *Baptist Chapel*, the *Wesleyan Chapel*, and the *Independent Chapel*, and under the two adjoining vestries; and from and after the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the *parish churchyard* and the *burial-grounds* of the *Baptist*, *Wesleyan*, and *Independent Chapels*, with the exception of vaults and brick graves which were in existence on the thirty-first of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, which are free

from water and can be opened without the disturbance of human remains, and in which each body shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

BEAUMARIS.—In the *parish church* of Beaumaris, and from and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the *parish churchyard*, except for the burial of wives, husbands, parents or children, brothers or sisters of those already buried therein; no grave to be less than five feet deep, nor opened unless free from remains.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made two representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that

burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Orders in Council of the twenty-second of October and twenty-ninth of November last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixth day of December last, and on the twelfth day of January instant, respectively; and such Orders have been published in the *London Gazette*, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the first day of February next (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

KIRKBURTON, YORKSHIRE.—In the *parish church* of Kirkburton, Yorkshire, and in the *Independent Chapel, Shelley*, and in the *Independent Chapel, Dogley-lane*, in the same parish; also in the *parish churchyard*, within four yards of all dwelling-houses; and from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the whole of the *churchyard*, with the exception of vaults and family graves which were in existence on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and which shall be used on the following conditions, viz.: That no human remains be disturbed; that in vaults and brick graves each coffin be separately entombed in stone or brick work, and that in family earthen graves no body be interred without a covering of four feet of earth, measuring from the top of the coffin to the general surface of the ground.

DONINGTON-UPON-BAIN, LINCOLNSHIRE.—In the *parish church* of Donington-upon-Bain, and in that part of the *parish churchyard* which is south of the church, except for the burial of the husbands, wives, parents, or unmarried children, of those already buried therein, in graves which can be opened without exposure of coffins or undecayed remains.

SAINT CUTHBERT'S STELLA, IN THE COUNTY OF DURHAM.—Under the *church* of Saint Cuthbert's Stella, Ryton, in the county of Durham; and it is further ordered, that the Official Regulations for new burial-grounds, omitting No. 3, be observed with reference to the *churchyard*.

CHICHESTER.—In the burial-ground of the parish of *Saint Pancras*, Chichester, with the exception of family vaults and brick graves which were in existence on the twenty-eighth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and which can be opened without disturbing soil that has been already buried in, and in which each body shall be imbedded in a layer of powdered charcoal, four inches thick, and be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

And it is ordered, that in the churchyard of the parish of *Saint Paul*, Chichester, burials be limited to the bodies of parishioners, except in the case of family vaults and graves which were in existence on the twenty-eighth of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of *St. Helen's*, *ABINGDON*, and in the *Baptist Chapel Burial-ground*, in the same parish, from the first of January to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty;

In the two churchyards of *St. Mary*, and in the burial-grounds of *Salem Chapel*, the *Roman Catholic Chapel*, the *Methodist New Connexion Chapel*, and of the *Independent Chapel*, *BARNSELY*, in the parish of *Silkstone*, from the first of January to the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be wholly discontinued from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the burial-ground of the Independent Chapel, STALEYBRIDGE, and it seems fit that the said Order be varied; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments be allowed in the said burial-ground until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, on condition that no coffin be buried less than four feet below the surface of the ground, unless in a now-existing vault or walled grave, in which each coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and that no vault or grave be reopened unless to bury another member of the family to whom it belongs.

coffin shall be imbedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in an airtight manner.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations had been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the vaults under the churches, and attached to the burial-ground, hereinafter mentioned, has made two representations, stating that he was of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures hereinafter set forth in respect of the same;

SAINT MARY-LE-BOW, LONDON.

1. That the coffins in the vaults beneath the church of Saint Mary-le-Bow, be covered with earth and powdered charcoal, and be then enclosed with brickwork.

2. That the division of the vaults containing the coffins be ventilated by a tube carried to the roof of the church.

3. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the city of London, and that disinfectants be used whenever required.

PADDINGTON STREET BURIAL GROUND, LONDON.

powdered charcoal and fresh earth, and that the existing ventilating openings be closed, and a ventilating tube be carried to the roof of the church.

3. That the works be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the district; and that McDougall's powder, chlorine, or other disinfectants, be used whenever necessary.
