*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the

Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

No Presentations will take place at the Drawing Room on the 18th of May next.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that

Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

#### ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who shall read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

The **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS, by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable ; and may from time to time alter the amount thereof ; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues, authorized to be levied by the said Act, are paid and collected. And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting and about to light certain new lighthouses at the undermentioned places, viz. :

- 1st. On Corran Point, Loch Eil.
- 2nd. On the Island of Phladda, north entrance of Jura Sound.
- 3rd. On MacArthur's Head, Sound of Islay.

Now therefore Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, upon the completion and lighting of the said lights respectively, there shall be paid in respect of each of the said lights for every British vessel, and for every foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United King-

dom upon paying the same duties as are payable by British vessels which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage : and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage ; and for every foreign vessel not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed. And that the said tolls in respect of each of the said lighthouses shall be levied by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of thirty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine ; and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the consolidated tables of light duties, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis ;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification ; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require ; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before

such representation is so considered ; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish :

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made two representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-second of February last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifth day of April last ; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State ; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the twenty-second day of May instant (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz. :

**LONG SUTTON, LINCOLNSHIRE.**—Beneath the *parish church* of Long Sutton, in the county of Lincoln, and in the *churchyard* within five yards of all dwelling-houses ; and from and after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the rest of the churchyard, with the exception of vaults and brick graves which were in existence on the tenth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in which each body shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and also with the exception of reserved family grave-spaces which can be opened without exposing human remains.

**EAST MOLESEY, SURREY.**—Beneath the *parish church* of East Molesey, in the county of Surrey ; and from and after the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the *parish churchyard*.

"the burial of the dead in the metropolis ;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification ; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, **by and with the advice of Her Privy Council**, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require ; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered ; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish :

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications ;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the seventh day of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the nineteenth day of April last ; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State ; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the twenty-second day of this instant May (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows ; viz. :

**WARKWORTH, NORTHUMBERLAND.**—Beneath the *Parish Church* of Warkworth, in the county of Northumberland, and in the *churchyard* within four yards of the church (provided nevertheless that Mr. Thomas

George Smith and Miss Isabella Smith, of Togston, may, at their decease, be interred in their family vault in the said church); and from and after the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the whole of the churchyard except in vaults and brick graves which were in existence on the twenty-sixth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and which can be opened without exposing human remains, and in which each coffin shall be embedded in powdered charcoal and be separately entombed in stone or brickwork properly cemented.

**COLYTON, DEVONSHIRE.**—Wholly in Colyton Church, and in the churchyard, except for the burial of the widowers and widows of those already buried therein.

**AMESBURY, WILTSHIRE.**—In the parish churchyard of Amesbury, except in now existing walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an airtight manner, and except in other graves for the burial of widowers and widows of those already buried in the churchyard.

**LAMERTON, DEVONSHIRE.**—In the parish church of Lamerton; and on and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the parish churchyard, except in graves not less than five feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of coffins, or the indecent disturbance of remains.

**SHEFFIELD.**—In the burial-ground of the Old Chapel, Hill Top, Attercliffe, in the parish of Sheffield, with the exception of vaults and family graves which were in existence on the twelfth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and are free from water, provided that in the vaults and brick graves, each body be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and that in the family earthen graves no body be buried without a covering of four feet and six inches of earth, measuring from the upper surface of the coffin to the level of the ground.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy

Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In BEVERLEY Minster Churchyard from the first day of May to the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the churchyard of KIRKBY MISPERTON from the first April to the first October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the old churchyard of LLANDAFF from the first May to the first June.

In the churchyard of MIDDLEWICH from the first June to the first October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the churchyard of the parish of ODIHAM from the first day of May to the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the churchyard of PITTINGTON, in the county of Durham, to the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the churchyard of Holy Trinity, ROTHERHITHE, to the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, on the same conditions as those contained in the Order in Council of the thirteenth May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

In the burial-grounds of YEOVIL to the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" beyond the limits of the metropolis, and "to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the following modifications:

**GRINTON, YORKSHIRE.**—Forthwith in the parish church of Grinton, in the county of York, and in the Independent Chapel, Reath, and from and after the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the Parish Churchyard and in the burial-ground of Saint Mary's Chapel, Muker, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, in which each body shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

LAVINGTON, WILTS.—Forthwith in the *parish church* of Lavington, in the county of Wilts, and on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the *parish churchyard*, the *Independent* and *Baptist Burial-grounds*, except in existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or bones.

LEE, KENT.—Forthwith in the vaults and catacombs beneath *Saint Margaret's Church*, Lee, in the county of Kent, and that the entrance to the vaults be closed with brickwork :—That, with the exception of family vaults and graves, the burials in the Old and New Churchyards be restricted to the bodies of parishioners; and, with the same exception, that only one body be buried in each grave, and that no new grave be made except in unoccupied ground.

STAMFORDHAM.—Forthwith in the *parish church*, and on and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the *parish churchyard*, except in graves not less than five feet deep which can be opened without the exposure of bones and coffins.

KINGSTON-ON-HULL.—Wholly on and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the burial-ground of the parish of *Holy Trinity*, in *Castle-street*.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation had been duly given to the churchwardens, or other persons having the care of the vaults in the churchyard of SAINT JOHN ZACHARY, in the city of London, has made a representation, stating that he was of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health, an order should be made for the adoption of the measures hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the vaults in the said churchyard of SAINT JOHN ZACHARY, do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures in respect of such vaults; viz.:

1. That the coffins contained in the public vault in the said churchyard be laid down and covered with earth and powdered charcoal, and that the entrance be filled up with earth, and closed with brickwork.

2. That the work be effected under the superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the city of London, and that disinfectants be used whenever necessary.
