**GENERAL ORDER BY HIS EXCELLENCY
THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.**

Camp, Hooshiarpore, March 28, 1860.

HIS Excellency the Governor-General of India gladly embraces the opportunity afforded by the return of Her Majesty's 53rd Regiment to England, to place on record the sense entertained by the Government of the services rendered in this Presidency by this excellent regiment.

The 53rd Regiment arrived in India in December, 1844, and proceeded to the North-Western Provinces.

It was present in the campaign of the Sutledge, and engaged in the battle of Aliwal, in January, 1846, and at the battle of Sohraon, on the 10th of February, 1846, which closed that campaign. It took part also in the campaign of the Punjab, and was present in the battle of Goojerat.

After several years of service in the Upper Provinces and in the Punjab, in the course of which, while at Peshawur in 1851 and 1852, the Regiment was frequently engaged in successful expeditions against the border tribes, the 53rd Foot proceeded to the Presidency, and it was in garrison in Fort William in the early part of the memorable year 1857, when the late mutinies broke out in the Native Army of Bengal.

The Governor-General willingly bears testimony to the importance of the service rendered at that time by the Regiment at the Presidency.

The 53rd Foot proceeded to the North-Western Provinces while the general disturbances were at their height; and at the brilliant affair at Khujiva on the 1st of November, 1857, where about two companies were engaged successfully, in concert with the "Shannon's" Naval Brigade, against a very superior body of Rebels and Mutineers, the Regiment lost its gallant and lamented Commander, Lieutenant-Colonel Powell, C.B.

Of this action it was appropriately remarked, in the despatch of His Excellency the Com-

mander-in-Chief, "This fight affords one more instance of what the British Soldier will perform in spite of every disadvantage and extraordinary fatigue. This was a soldiers' fight, if ever there was one."

With the detachment of the 53rd, on this occasion, it will be remembered that a Company of the 93rd Highlanders, a small party of the Royal Engineers, and a dépôt detachment, likewise fought, the whole winning for themselves the admiration and gratitude of their fellow countrymen.

The 53rd Regiment served at the memorable relief of the garrison of Lucknow, achieved by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, in November, 1857; and, after having been present at the relief of Cawnpore, and at the action on the Kalanuddee, both directed by His Excellency in person; at the actions at Futtehghurh and at Shumsabad, and the storming of Meeangunge; the Regiment was engaged in the capture of Lucknow, by the Commander-in-Chief, in April, 1858.

Lastly, the Regiment was employed in the taking of Sultanpore, and the passage of the Goomtee, under Major-General Sir Hope Grant, K.C.B., and in the final subjugation of Oude.

The field services of the 53rd Foot, however, have not been more conspicuous than its discipline and good conduct throughout the period of its employment in India.

The Governor-General takes his leave of this fine Regiment with a very hearty farewell.

**GENERAL ORDER BY HIS EXCELLENCY
THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.**

Camp, Deenanuggur, March 17, 1860.

THE 1st Battalion of Her Majesty's 60th Royal Rifles is about to embark at the presidency to return to England.

His Excellency the Governor-General cannot allow this very distinguished regiment to leave the country, without publicly acknowledging its services in India.

In October, 1845, the 1st Battalion 60th Royal Rifles landed at Bombay from England.

Towards the close of 1848 it formed part of the column of troops from the Presidency of Bombay, which co-operated with the army of Bengal in the campaign of the Punjab. The battalion was engaged in the siege of Mooltan, and in the capture of that fortress in January, 1849; at the battle of Goojerat in February of the same year; and in the brilliant pursuit of the fugitive hosts of Sikhs and Afghans, which terminated in the establishment of the British power at Peshawur.

While at Peshawur for a considerable period, the battalion distinguished itself in several operations against the border tribes.

In 1857, soon after the breaking out of the late mutinies, the battalion was engaged in the important action on the Hindoun; and, having joined the army before Delhi, its services were pre-eminent in the memorable siege and capture of that stronghold of the rebel forces.

The battalion subsequently formed part of the retrieving column under Colonel Sir John Jones, which, marking its progress by successive victories over the rebels and mutineers, proceeded into Rohilcund, and assisted in taking the city of Bareilly.

Subsequently the battalion 'participated in the final operations in Oude, directed and carried to a completely successful conclusion by the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief.

But it is not more by the valour of its officers and men, conspicuous as that has been on every occasion, than by the discipline and excellent conduct of all ranks, during the whole of their service in India, that this regiment has distinguished itself. The Governor-General tenders to the battalion his warmest acknowledgments for the high example it has set in every respect to the troops with which it has been associated, in quarters as well as in the field; and he assures its officers and men that the estimation in which their services are held by the Government of India, confirms to the full the respect and admiration with which they are universally regarded.

In bidding farewell to the battalion, the Governor-General desires that it will accept his best wishes for the welfare of every officer and man belonging to it.

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of the following Notification issued by the Hanoverian Government with regard to the regulations to be observed by Hanoverian Vessels in order to avoid collisions at sea.

(Translation.)

NOTIFICATION

of the Minister of Finance and Commerce regarding the prevention of collision between vessels at sea.

Hanover, 1st April, 1860.

In conformity with other regulations already existing for the marine generally, we hereby issue the following rules to avoid possible collisions between vessels, and to be observed by all Hanoverian Captains of vessels when navigating the open sea, or bays and rivers connected with it, in

so far as these rules are not at variance with some other special rules established in some localities where the vessels are found.

1. When two vessels approach one another in different directions so that if they continue on their respective courses they might risk a collision, both vessels are bound to put their helms to port that they may pass on the port side of each other.

This rule applies to steamers of all kinds as also to sailing vessels whether they are sailing on the port or starboard tack and whether close-hauled or not, unless the circumstances of the case are such as to render a departure from the rule necessary in order to avoid immediate danger, and provided that as regards sailing ships on the starboard tack close-hauled due regard is had to keeping such ships under command.

2. In a narrow channel, every steamer is bound as far as practicable, to keep on that side of the fair-way or mid-channel which lies on her starboard side.

3. When two steamers approach each other from opposite directions at a spot so narrow as that they cannot possibly pass without risk of collision, that vessel which has to steer through the strait in a course that lies between east by south to west (including east and west) must keep herself outside the strait, or go back to make room for the other to pass, and, if on a river, that vessel which steams against the current is bound to observe the same rule to make room for the other to pass.

Every steamer is in fact bound to keep outside the strait, when she sees another coming from an opposite direction, and not able to pass her with safety.

4. In a thick fog as also in a narrow stream filled with vessels, every vessel must according to circumstances diminish her speed.

5. For the violation of these rules the captain is liable to a fine not exceeding fifty thalers.

THE Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Decree, published in the Madrid Gazette, of the 25th ult., by which the Spanish Government has given effect to the arrangement lately concluded with Her Majesty's Government, for the mutual surrender of seamen deserters from British and Spanish merchant vessels.

(Translation.)

ROYAL DECREE.

On the 27th of December, 1859, my minister, accredited at the Court of Great Britain, signed at London a declaration, for the mutual arrest and delivery of seamen deserters from merchant vessels of Spain and of the United Kingdom, and of which the following is a literal copy:

"The undersigned Minister Plenipotentiary of Her Catholic Majesty, has been instructed to make the following declaration,—

"The Consuls-General, Consuls, and Vice-Consuls of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, residing in Spain and her possessions, have the power to arrest and send, either on board their ships or to their respective countries, the individuals of the crew of British merchant vessels who shall have deserted from such vessels; assistance is therefore to be rendered to that effect

by all competent local authorities, after it has been proved by the rolls of registration, or any other authentic document, that the individuals thus reclaimed formed a part of such a crew."

After the production of such evidence, the surrender can no longer be denied, and all possible aid and power is therefore to be rendered to the British Consuls and Vice-Consuls for the discovery of such deserters.

Should any such deserter have besides committed some crime on land, his delivery may then be deferred by the local authorities, until he has stood his trial before the competent tribunal, and undergone the sentence pronounced against him. But this declaration does not apply to such seamen as are Spanish subjects, and have not been naturalized abroad.

The Spanish Government promises to give to this Declaration the force of an international law.

Her Britannic Majesty having approved of these stipulations, by a decree signed in London on the 23rd of January of the present year, we have decreed that the above Declaration, signed in London, and confirmed by Her Britannic Majesty, for the mutual arrest and delivery of seamen deserters from British and Spanish merchant vessels, shall receive full and strict effect and force in each and all of its provisions.
