WHEREAS the CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY COMMISSIONERS, appointed for the purposes of the Act of the 19th and 20th Vict., cap. 88, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the said Act, have framed the following additional Statutes, dated the 17th day of April, 1860 (in substitution for certain Statutes previously submitted to the College and objected to by the Governing Body thereof), for the future regulation of GONVILLE and CAIUS COLLEGE, in the said University of Cambridge; and whereas the said Statutes have been laid before the Governing Body of the said College, and before the Visitor thereof, and no objection has been made thereto, and have been this day laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same are published in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act; AND NOTICE is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons mentioned in the 39th section of that Act, within one month after this publication, to petition Her Majesty in Council against the approbation of the said Statutes, or of any part thereof.

STATUTES FOR GONVILLE AND CAIUS COLLEGE IN THE UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the nineteenth and twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Cambridge, of the Colleges therein, and of the Colleges of King Henry the Sixth at Eton," do hereby, in execution of the powers given to us by the said Act, make the several Statutes next following for the future regulation of Gonville and Caius College in the University of Cambridge.

STATUTE 1.

A.—OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COLLEGE.

The College shall consist of a Master, thirty Fellows, and thirty-six Scholars; but subject to the provisions in these Statutes contained, for the increase or diminution of the number of Fellows or Scholars.

STATUTE 6.

D.—OF ELECTIONS.

Election of Fellows and Seniors.

The Election of Fellows shall take place on such day or days in every year as shall be appointed from time to time by the Master and Seniors.

All vacancies occurring in the Fellowships of the College shall be filled up at the latest within one year from the occurrence of the vacancy.

The Fellows shall be chosen from among Graduates of the College, or, if the Master and Seniors shall at any time think fit, of the University, who have distinguished themselves in the studies of the University, or in some department of science, learning, or art.

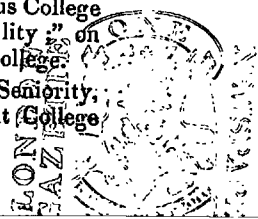
The Fellows shall be elected by the Master and Seniors at a College Meeting, and they shall choose that person (being otherwise duly qualified according to these Statutes) whom they shall think to be of the greatest merit, and most fit to be a Fellow of the College, as a place of religion, learning, and education.

The Master shall be always present at the election, unless prevented by urgent cause.

In the election that person, if any, shall be held to be elected who obtains the votes of a majority of the Electors present. But if no person shall have obtained such majority, there shall be a second, and if requisite a third scrutiny, which shall be final; and if even at this third scrutiny no one obtains such majority, then that person shall be held to be elected who obtains, on this third scrutiny, more votes than any one else; or in case two or more have an equal number of votes greater than that obtained by any other candidate, then that one of such persons for whom the Master shall give his casting vote.

Every Fellow so elected shall within thirty days after his election or appointment, make in the College Chapel, and in the presence of the Master and the Registrary, the following declaration:—
"I, A.B., do solemnly declare, That I am *bonâ fide* a member of the Church of England, and I do sincerely promise that I will discharge the duties of a Fellow of Gonville and Caius College to the best of my judgment and ability," on which he shall become a Fellow of the College.

On the occurrence of a vacancy in the Seniority, the place shall be filled up at the next College



Meeting following such vacancy. The Fellow who may then be first on the Roll of Fellows shall be elected, unless in the judgment of the Master and Seniors there shall be good cause to the contrary, and in that case, the Fellow next in order on the Roll shall be so elected, and so on in succession. The election shall be decided by such votes as are required for a College Order.

Every fellow on becoming a Senior shall, before proceeding to act in that capacity, make in the College Chapel, and in presence of the Master and Registrary, the following declaration:—"I, A.B., do solemnly declare, That I am *bonâ fide* a member of the Church of England, and I do sincerely promise that, in addition to the duties of a Fellow of Gonville and Caius College, I will discharge the duties of a Senior thereof to the best of my judgment and ability;" on which he shall become a Senior

STATUTE 20.

G.—OF THE SCHOLARS.

The vacancies in the Scholarships of the College shall be filled up annually from among the Students of the College, or (if the Master and Seniors think fit) from among Students of the University, who shall have distinguished themselves in the studies of the College or University, or in any Examination that may be directed by the Master and Seniors to take place upon the Election to such Scholarships: Provided that it shall not be compulsory to elect in any one year a number of Scholars greater than one-third of the number of Scholarships in the College.

Such Scholarships shall be tenable until the Scholars are of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts; and it shall be lawful for the Master and Seniors, in any case which shall appear to them of special merit, to prolong the tenure of any such scholarship until the holder thereof is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts.

It shall be lawful for the Master and Seniors from time to time to open any number of Scholarships for competition amongst persons who shall not yet have commenced residence in the University, or shall be at the commencement of such residence, though their names may not be on the boards of the College; such Scholarships to be tenable until the time of a later Examination for Scholarships in the College, or for such period of tenure as the Master and Seniors shall think fit.

Every person elected to any such Scholarship as last mentioned, if not already a Student of the College, shall forthwith procure admission into the same, and shall receive no emoluments from his Scholarship until he shall have commenced residence in the University.

It shall be competent for the Master and Seniors, at any time, if they think fit, to give a preference in adjudging one or more of the Scholarships of the College to excellence in one or more of the learned or Oriental languages, or in special departments of Mathematics or of Physical Science, or of any other branch of the University Studies.

The election of Scholars shall be vested in the Master and Seniors, together with such other Fellows as may have been appointed by them to take part in ascertaining the merits of the Candidates.

The election shall be conducted in the same manner, and shall be governed by the same rules, as in the case of Fellows.

STATUTE 28.

L.—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE INCOME OF THE COLLEGE.

Payments for College Purposes.

A separate account shall be kept of the property of the Davy Trust.

When and as existing interests shall determine the Perse Trustees shall pay annually to the College all sums to which the Perse Fellows or Scholars, or any members of the College, are entitled by virtue of the trust. This and all other College property, except that belonging to the Davy trust, shall be consolidated, and the net income arising therefrom (subject to such payment, if any, as may become due to the University Chest to be applied to purposes for the benefit of the University at large) shall be applied in manner following four separate accounts being kept of the same; that is to say:—

Account No. I.—The *College Account* shall be an account of the income of all property belonging to the College, except that of the Davy Trust, the College Building Fund, and the Endowment Fund. Every year, so soon as the accounts of the College have been made up and signed by the Auditors, the clear annual balance shall be ascertained, and divided into 469 equal parts or shares, of which

The Master shall receive	35 shares.
Each of the 12 Senior Fellows	15 "
Each of 18 Junior Fellows	10 "
Each of 9 Scholars	3 "
Each of 9 other Scholars	2 "
Each of 6 other Scholars	1½ "
Each of 12 other Scholars	1 "

And eight shares shall be carried to the credit of the Endowment Fund.

Provided, that if any person shall have been Master or Fellow for a part only of the year ending on the day on which the accounts are closed for the audit, he shall be entitled only to one-fourth part of a dividend for each quarter of a year, or part of a quarter greater than one-half, during which he may have been Master or Fellow. And if, by reason of unfilled vacancies of any Fellowships or Scholarships, there be left any dividends or portions of dividends to which no person has a claim, such dividends or portions of dividends shall be carried to the credit of the Endowment Fund.

Over and above the above dividends, the President shall receive 50*l.* for the discharge of the duties of his office; and the Master 100*l.*; and each of the Seniors who shall have resided at least one-half of the year ending on the day on which the accounts are closed for the audit, 50*l.*, as an allowance for commons.

In order to constitute the above number of Foundation Fellowships, the twelve Fellowships, founded respectively by Dr. Wendy, by Mrs. Joyce Frankland, by Mr. Matthew Stokys, by Mr. Bartholomew Wortley, and by the Rev. S. C. Smith, and also the six Fellowships founded by Dr. Stephen Perse, shall be incorporated with the Foundation of the College, and their emoluments consolidated, so as to form eighteen Junior Foundation Fellowships.

Account No. II.—The *Reserve Fund*, which shall form the subject of this account, shall consist of 35,000*l.* Government Stock. The dividends accruing from this stock, or so much of it as may at that time be standing in the Reserve Fund account, shall be carried to the College account

(No. I.), and be added to that year's income. It shall be lawful to use any portion or portions of this stock, not together exceeding 20,000*l.* for the improvement of the College estates, from time to time, by inclosing, building, draining, or otherwise; or by purchasing of land-tax, rentcharges, or other adverse interests attaching to the same; or to meet any large or unusual outlay, which in the judgment of the Master and Seniors it may be necessary or expedient to make. And it shall be lawful to use any portion of the 35,000*l.* for restoring any building damaged or destroyed by fire. Provided that, whenever any amount of stock be sold for any of the above purposes, one-thirtieth part of it shall be replaced at the next audit, and one-thirtieth part at each succeeding audit, by payment from the annual income of the College account (No. I.) of such a sum of money as will purchase the requisite amount of stock, and so on until the whole amount borrowed be replaced.

Account No. III.—The *College Building Fund*, which shall form the subject of this account, shall consist of the present Building Fund, and of such annual payments as the Master and Seniors may from time to time direct to be made to it. It shall be used for the purpose of erecting new buildings in or in connexion with the College, for restoring old ones, and repairing damage done to any such buildings by fire.

Account No. IV.—The *Endowment Fund*, the subject of this account, shall consist of such payments as are hereinbefore directed to be made to it, and of the interest and dividends which may from time to time accrue from their investment. The annual income, or any part of it, may be used for providing stipends for new Fellows and Scholars, or for augmenting those already provided for the Master, Fellows and Scholars; but any augmentation must be made *pro rata*, so that all such stipends may be proportionally affected.

When so soon as the interests to be regulated by the previously existing Statutes shall have expired or otherwise determined to such an extent as may in the judgment of the Master and Seniors enable the distribution hereinbefore prescribed to be partially carried into effect, without prejudice to such of those interests as may not have expired or otherwise determined, the Master and Seniors shall from time to time, as circumstances will permit, bring into operation so much and such part or parts of the prescribed distribution as they shall deem most expedient.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to enable a majority of two-thirds of the ratepayers of any parish or district, duly assembled, to rate their district in aid of public

improvements for general benefit within their district.

An Act to repeal a certain enactment for restraining the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland from lending money on mortgage.

An Act to abolish the jurisdiction of the Ecclesiastical Courts in Ireland in cases of defamation, and in England and Ireland in certain cases of brawling.

An Act to amend the law relating to petitions of right, to simplify the proceedings, and to make provisions for the costs thereof.

An Act to amend certain provisions in the Bankrupt Law of Scotland.

An Act for making a railway from Tenbury, in the county of Worcester, to the Severn Valley Railway, near Bewdley, in the county of Worcester.

An Act for making a railway from Letterkenny to the Londonderry and Enniskillen Railway, in the county of Donegal, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from the Great Southern and Western Railway, near Charleville, to the Limerick and Foynes Railway, near Patrick's Well, and also a short line of railway at Limerick, to be called "The Cork and Limerick Direct Railway," and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Salisbury and Yeovil Railway Company to make a deviation from their authorised main line near Yeovil, and for other purposes connected with their undertaking.

An Act for vesting in a body of Trustees to be called "the Upper Mersey Dues Trustees" a certain portion of the Liverpool Town and Anchorage Dues, and for other purposes.

An Act to continue and amend two Acts passed in the first and tenth years of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, relating to certain roads and bridges in the counties of Lanark and Dumbarton.

An Act to incorporate a Company for the Improvement of Buildings, and for other purposes

An Act for extending the time for the completion of portions of the Dorset Central Railway, for enabling the Somerset Central Railway Company to subscribe to the undertaking, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Hereford, Hay and Brecon Railway Company to relinquish the Junction of their line with the Shrewsbury and Hereford Railway, and in substitution therefor to form a Junction with the Newport, Abergavenny, and Hereford Railway.

An Act to enable the Mid-Wales Railway Company to make a deviation in their authorized Railway, and to construct Railways to connect their Railway with the Hereford, Hay and Brecon, and the Brecon and Merthyr Junction Railways, and for other purposes.

An Act to alter, amend, and extend the powers of the Acts relating to the Port Carlisle Dock and Railway and Carlisle and Silloth Bay Railway and Dock Companies, to enable the Port Carlisle Dock and Railway Company to raise additional Capital, to enable both or either of the said Companies to run over and use portions of the railways of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Carlisle Railway Company, to compel the Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Carlisle Railway Company to afford facilities and accommodation upon their railways to the traffic of the said Companies, and for other purposes.

An Act to empower the Stockport, Disley, and Whaley Bridge Railway Company to raise additional money, and for other purposes connected with their undertaking.

An Act for amending "The Abergavenny Improvement Act, 1854," for enabling the Commissioners to construct works, and supply their district with Water and Gas, and for other purposes.

An Act for renewing the term and for more effectually repairing and maintaining the road from the Marchburn, through Kelso, in the county of Roxburgh, to Lauder, in the county of Berwick, with a branch from the said road near Fansloan-end, in the county of Berwick, through the village of Earlston, to the Roxburghshire turnpike road.

An Act for enabling the Oswestry and Newtown Railway Company to raise additional capital, to lease their undertaking, and for other purposes.

An Act to provide for alterations in the appointment of Overseers, Collectors, and other Poor Law Officers in the Township of Leeds, for the incorporation of overseers for specific purposes, and for the levying and collection of poor rates in that township, and for other purposes.

An Act to amalgamate the Jedburgh Railway Company with the North British Railway Company, and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the period limited by "The Swansea Harbour Act, 1859," for the construction and completion of the works authorised by "The Swansea Harbour Act, 1854."

An Act for making a Railway from Llandrindod, in the county of Radnor, to Llandovery, in the county of Carmarthen, to be called "The Central Wales Extension Railway," and for other purposes.

An Act for making a Branch Railway from the Oswestry and Newtown Railway at Llynellys, to the Porthywaen Lime Rocks, in the county of Salop.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, translations of a Royal Decree respecting the importation of foreign brandy into Portugal, and of a Government Order consequent thereon, which have been transmitted by Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, from which the following are extracts :—

I.—ROYAL DECREE.

Article 1.—Foreign brandy of the strength of 33 degrees, according to Cartier's hydrometer, shall pay a duty of 1,500 reis, or 6s. 9d. sterling, per almude.

Foreign brandy imported in bottles or jars, and all which may exceed 33 degrees by the above-named hydrometer, shall pay a duty of 2,000 reis, or 9s. sterling, per almude.

The Government shall designate the custom-houses at the seaports, as well as the fiscal stations, through which this article can be admitted.

II.—GOVERNMENT ORDER.

In virtue of the authorization conceded to the Government by the last paragraph of the first article of the above Royal Decree, His Majesty the King hereby determines that foreign brandy is permitted to enter the Custom-house of Barca de Alva, in transit for Oporto, at which Custom-house only the same can be cleared for consumption on being accompanied by a proper pass.

NAVAL UNIFORMS.

The following is the description of the Uniforms which, in pursuance of Her Majesty's pleasure, are in future to be worn by the Officers, Seamen, and Boys of the Royal Navy, viz. :—

ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET.

DRESS UNIFORM.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted, ten buttons in each row, three inches apart across the breast; white collar sloped off in front, one and three quarters inch gold lace of the Navy pattern along the top and front edges, and one inch lace along the bottom edge, coming partly on the coat; blue cuffs, with one and three quarters inch lace round the top; white slash pointed flaps in the sleeve with three small buttons, and one inch lace round the outside edge; four rows of five-eighths of an inch distinction lace round the sleeve above the cuff, at such distance from each other as place them within the length of the slash, *the upper row to form a circle, two inches diameter, in the centre of the top sleeve of all the coats of Officers of the Military Branch*; pointed blue flaps on the skirt, laced all round with one and three quarters inch lace, and three buttons under them; a row of one inch lace to encircle the hip buttons and form a point above them on the seam; and bottom of lappel and front and back edges of the skirt to be laced with the same; the skirts to begin at one-fifth the circumference from the front edge, and to be lined with white kerseymere; one button at the bottom of each plait.

Buttons.—Raised, gilt, and one inch in diameter, indented with a round rim, and within, an anchor and a cable, and a crown over between two wreaths of laurel; the small buttons to be half an inch in diameter.

Epaulettes.—Two gold epaulettes with embroidered straps, oak leaf and acorn pattern, with pearl crescent and edging, three stars within the crescent and one star on the strap, above it crossed batons surmounted by a crown; a double row of dead and bright loose bullions three inches long, and one inch and a quarter in circumference.

N.B. — The devices on all the Executive Officers' epaulettes to be embroidered in silver according to patterns, except batons and swords, which are to be solid.

Trowsers.—Blue cloth, with one and three quarters inch gold lace down the outside seam, to be worn over boots, between the 1st October and the 30th April; and white duck, over boots, between the 1st May and 30th September.

Cravat or Stock.—Black silk.

Hat.—Cocked; the flaps eight and a half inches in the back, seven and a half inches in the front, five and three quarters inches at each corner, bound with gold lace two inches wide, showing one inch on each side. Black silk cockade, five inches wide, looped with six gold dead and bright bullions, three and a half eighths of an inch wide, the two centre twisted, with a button of the same size and pattern as that on the coat; and tassels with five gold and five blue bullions each.

Sword.—The hilt solid, half basket guard, with raised bars, and crown and anchor badge, lion-head back piece, white fish skin gripe, bound with three gilt wires; outside length, five inches and three quarters; inside length, four inches and a half. The blade slightly curved, thirty-one inches and a quarter long, and one inch and three eighths

wide at the shoulder, with a flat back and the blade ground hollow to within eleven inches of the end, with a double-edged spear point.

Scabbard.—The top and middle lockets to be four and three inches and a half long respectively; to have loops and rings, and to be ornamented with embossed oak leaves in bas-relief; the chape to be seven inches and a half long, and to have oak leaves, as above, round the upper part, and a honeysuckle ornament at the end.

Sword Knot.—Blue and gold rope, twenty-three inches long, with ditto ditto vellum basket-work head, and twelve gold bullions; a piece of the same sort of cord, fourteen inches and three quarters long, is to be fixed to the hilt, to which the knot is attached.

Sword Belt.—Blue morocco leather, lined, full one inch and a half wide in the girdle; single, *one inch wide*, sword slings on carriages; the whole embroidered in gold, with oak leaves and acorns down the middle, and margined with a straight line near each edge. Gilt mountings with circular clasp in front, two inches diameter, laurel embossed edges, crown, anchor, and laurel on the centre: embossed carriage buckles, plain girdle buckles, and rings, the latter one inch and three quarters diameter in the centre; a plain, strong gilt hook attached to the ring to suspend the sword short.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted, eight buttons in each row, with padded turn-down collar; pointed flaps with three notched holes, and buttons under; round cuffs, with three buttons, the sleeves laced the same as the full dress coat, omitting the slash.

Buttons.—The same.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

Waistcoats.—White or blue cloth or kerseymere, single breasted with small buttons.

Trowsers.—Blue cloth, with or without gold lace on the seams; in warm climates or on the home station in summer, Officers may wear white duck.

Cravat or Stock.—Black silk.

Hat.—The same, or without lace.

Sword.—The same.

Scabbard.—The same.

Sword Knot.—The same.

Sword Belt.—Black morocco leather, of the same width as in full dress, but without embroidery, with round slings; the mountings and edges to be the same as in dress.

ADMIRAL.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Admiral of the Fleet, except that there are to be three rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and the

Epaulettes—are to have lace straps, with three stars, within the crescent, above them crossed sword and baton, surmounted by a crown.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Admiral of the Fleet, except that the

Coat—is to have three rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes—The same as in dress.

VICE-ADMIRAL.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as an Admiral, except that the

Coat—is to have two rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and

Epaulettes—two stars only within the crescent, under the crossed baton and sword.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as an Admiral, except that the

Coat—is to have two rows only of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

REAR-ADMIRAL.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as an Admiral, except that the

Coat—is to have one row only of distinction lace on the sleeves; and

Epaulettes—one star, of a larger size, within the crescent, under the crossed baton and sword.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as an Admiral, except that the

Coat—is to have one row of distinction lace on the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

COMMODORES OF THE FIRST CLASS,
AND CAPTAINS OF THE FLEET WHEN
NOT FLAG OFFICERS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same as a Rear-Admiral, with the following exception:

Epaulettes.—The same pattern as the Admirals, but the bullions to be *bright*, with an anchor and chain cable within the crescent, above it a star, surmounted by a crown.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as a Rear-Admiral, except that the epaulettes are to be the same as in dress.

COMMODORES OF THE SECOND CLASS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Commodores of the First Class, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The one and three-quarters inch lace on the cuffs, the lace on the bottom edge of lappel and on front and back edges of skirt, to be omitted; the lace round top edge of the collar to be one and a half inch wide, and three-quarters of an inch along the bottom; one and a half inch lace round the flaps, and three-quarters of an inch on slash in sleeve; and one inch to encircle the hip buttons. The sleeves to have four rows of half inch distinction lace round them.

Buttons.—The same as the Admirals, omitting the laurel wreaths.

Trowsers.—The lace on the outside seam to be one and a half inch wide.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Commodores of the First Class, except that the sleeves are to be laced the same as the dress coat, omitting the slash, and to have notched holes to the three buttons on the cuffs.

Buttons the same as in dress.

CAPTAINS AND COMMANDERS.

DRESS UNIFORMS.

The same as Commodores of the Second Class, with the following exceptions:—

Coat.—The sleeves to have three rows of half inch distinction lace for Captains, and two for Commanders. The lace round hip buttons for Commanders to be omitted.

Epaulettes.—CAPTAINS of three years standing, the same as Commodores. Those under three years standing to be distinguished by the anchor, surmounted by a crown; and

COMMANDERS, by the anchor surmounted by a star, and the bullions to be only two inches and three-quarters long, and one inch and one-eighth in circumference.

Hats.—The same as the Admirals, but bound with black silk instead of gold lace, of the oak-leaf pattern, and looped with four *bright* gold bullions, the two centre twisted.

Scabbards.—The same as the Admirals, but the chape to be only six inches and a half long; both locketts and chapes to be ornamented with fluted threads and scrolls instead of oak leaves.

Sword Belts.—Black morocco leather, lined, the same dimensions as the Admirals, embroidered in gold, with three straight lines, one down the middle, and one at each margin near the edge; gilt clasps, with circular fronts, with embossed laurel edges, crown and anchor in the centre; plain carriage and girdle buckles, and plain gilt ring and hook.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Commodores of the Second Class, with the following exceptions:—

Coat.—To have three rows of distinction lace round the sleeves for Captains, and two rows for Commanders.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

Hats.—The same.

Scabbards.—The same.

Sword Belts.—The same as the Admirals, omitting the laurel in the centre of the clasp.

LIEUTENANTS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Commanders, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The lace to be only one inch wide instead of one inch and a half; and half an inch instead of three quarters of an inch; and the sleeves to have one row of distinction lace round them.

Epaulettes.—To be the same as Commanders, with the anchor only within the crescent.

Trowsers.—The lace on the outside seam to be one inch wide.

Hats.—To be looped with only two bullions, twisted.

Sword Belts.—To have only two straight lines, one near each edge.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Commanders, with one row of distinction lace round the sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

Hat.—The same.

Sword Belts.—The same as Commanders.

MASTER OF THE FLEET.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as a Commander, except that the

Epaulettes—are to have crossed anchors, without cables, within the crescent, surmounted by a gold and silver star on the strap.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as a Commander.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

MASTERS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Lieutenants, except that the

Epaulettes—are to have crossed anchors, without cables, within the crescent.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Lieutenant.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

MATES.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Lieutenants, with the following exceptions:

Coats.—The lace to be only three quarters of an inch wide, and the sleeves to have one row of quarter inch braid round them instead of lace.

Trowsers.—To have no lace on the outside seams.

Epaulettes.—Instead of epaulettes, two shoulder straps of the same pattern as Lieutenant's epaulettes, without bullion, with the anchor within the crescent.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

Coats.—The same as Lieutenants, except to have one row of quarter inch braid round the sleeves instead of lace.

Trowsers.—Same as in dress.

Shoulder Straps.—The same as in dress.

SECOND MASTERS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Mates, except that the devices on the straps are to be the same as the Masters.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as the Mates, except that the devices on the straps are to be the same as the Masters.

MIDSHIPMEN.

Coat.—Blue cloth, single breasted, with nine notched holes on each breast, and three on each cuff and pocket-flap, with buttons to correspond, lined with white serge, stand-up collar, with a white turn-back on each side of the collar, with notched hole and button.

Buttons.—The same as other Officers.

Swords.—No swords, but a dirk according to pattern.

Dirk Belts.—The same as the Lieutenant's undress belt, but with frog instead of slings.

Hat.—The uniform cap only.

MASTER'S ASSISTANT.

The same as midshipmen, but instead of the white turn-back, a button-hole of blue twist at each end of the collar, with a corresponding button.

NAVAL CADETS.

The same as midshipmen, but instead of the white turn-back, a button-hole of white twist on the collar, with a corresponding button.

GUNNERS, BOATSWAINS, AND CARPENTERS.

Coat.—Blue cloth; if lined, to be with serge, fall-down collar, blue lappels to button across, and round cuffs; nine buttons on the lappels, and three on each cuff and pocket, with corresponding blue twist button-holes, and three buttons in the folds of the skirts. Plain gilt buttons, with an anchor and cable engraved thereon.

Waistcoat.—White.

Cravat or Stock.—Black.

Hat.—Cap only.

Sword.—Of the same pattern and length as Commissioned Officers, but the back-piece of the handle is to be plain, with a flute round the top and down the back, with a black fish-skin gripe, bound with three gold wires; the etchings on the blade not blued or gilt.

Sword Knot.—Of blue silk, mixed with gold fringe, but no bullion.

Sword Belt.—The same as Mate's undress belt.

PETTY OFFICERS, SEAMEN, AND BOYS.

Blue Cloth Jacket.—To be made of navy blue cloth, double-breasted, with stand and fall collar, sleeves sufficiently large to go easily over a duck and serge frock, to reach to the hip, with an opening at the cuffs on the seam, with two small black buttons, one inside breast pocket on the left side, and seven black horn crown and anchor buttons $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch in diameter, on each side, according to a pattern.

Blue Cloth Trowsers.—To be made of navy blue cloth, of the ordinary naval pattern, fitting tight at the waistband, with two pockets and a broad flap, and stained bone buttons.

Duck or White Drill Frock.—To be made with collar and wristbands of blue jean, each having a border of three rows of $\frac{3}{8}$ of an inch white tape, $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch apart, with one white metal dead-eye button at each of the wrists.

Duck Trowsers.—To be made of white duck, in a similar manner to the blue trowsers, with white metal dead-eye buttons.

Blue Serge Frock.—To be made of the same material and pattern as that now in use.

Pea Jacket.—To be of blue flushing, the same as the present pattern and material, with seven buttons on each side, black horn, navy pattern, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch in diameter.

Black Silk Handkerchief.

Hat.—To be black or white according to climate.

The hat to be four inches high in the crown, three inches wide in the rim, and seven inches across the crown, and made of sennet, covered with brown holland painted black, with a hat ribbon bearing the ship's name; and in warm climates the same hat uncovered.

A chin-stay to be attached to the hat.

Cop.—To be worn at night, and at sea when ordered.

The cap to be made round, of No. 1 cloth, and partially stiffened across the crown, similar in shape to that worn by naval officers, without the peak. Diameter across the crown, for men ten inches, for boys nine inches, with a ribbon bearing the ship's name.

A chin-stay to be attached to the cap.

Woollen Comforter.—To be of a dark blue colour.

Badges.—Petty officers and leading seamen are to wear an embroidered mark of distinction on the upper part of the left sleeve of their jacket; viz:—

Chief Petty Officers . . .	{ Crown and anchor, encircled with laurel.
First Class Petty Officers .	{ Crown and cross anchor.
Second Class Petty Officers	{ Crown and anchor.
Leading Seamen	{ The anchor.

On a blue frock the badge is to be white, and blue on a white frock.

Gunnery Instructors and Seamen Gunners are to wear an embroidered mark of distinction on the upper part of the right sleeve of their jackets; viz:—

Gunnery Instructors . . .	{ A gun with rifle and cutlass crossed, and crown over.
Seamen Gunners, 1st Class	{ A gun and crown.
" " 2nd "	{ A gun.

On the blue frock the badge is to be of red cloth, and blue on the white frock.

Badges and buttons of the approved pattern will be supplied to H.M.'s ships for issue.

CIVIL BRANCHES.

The coats of all ranks to be single breasted, at angles with the skirt; the distinction laces to be carried round the sleeves; the epaulettes to have silver instead of gold edging to the straps quarter of an inch wide, to be continued round inside the crescent, and outside below it; the devices thereon to be embroidered in gold and silver; the loops of cocked hats to be of half inch gold lace instead of bullion; the tassels to be flat; and the cap badges and peaks of caps of those Officers entitled to wear them, to be embroidered in gold, as per patterns.

DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF NAVAL HOSPITALS AND FLEETS.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniform and appointments as Rear-Admiral, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Epaulettes.—The sword and baton to be omitted, and instead thereof an additional star on the epaulette strap.

INSPECTORS-GENERAL.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniform and appointments as Commodores of the First Class, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Epaulettes.—To have a crown on the strap, and a star placed within the crescent, omitting the anchor.

DEPUTY INSPECTORS-GENERAL.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniforms and appointments as Captains, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Epaulettes.—To have a crown on the strap, and a star placed within the crescent, omitting the anchor.

STAFF SURGEONS.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniform and appointments as Captains under three years, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Epaulettes.—To have a crown only placed within the crescent.

SURGEONS.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniforms and appointments as Commanders, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be placed on the breast worn by threes.

Epaulettes.—To have a star only placed within the crescent.

ASSISTANT-SURGEONS OF SIX YEARS' SERVICE ON FULL PAY.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniforms and appointments as Lieutenants, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Epaulettes.—The anchor to be omitted.

ASSISTANT-SURGEONS.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS.

The same uniform and appointments as *Mates*, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—Nine buttons to be worn on the breast placed by threes.

Shoulder Straps.—Omitting the anchor.

SECRETARIES TO COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

DRESS AND UNDRRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform and appointments as Commanders, with the exceptions specified above for the civil branches; and,

The Coat.—Eight buttons on the breast by pairs.

The Epaulettes.—To have an embroidered gold and silver star within the crescent.

The Hat.—To have the loop of half-inch gold lace instead of bullion, and flat tassels.

SECRETARIES TO JUNIOR FLAG OFFICERS.

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Secretaries to Commander-in-Chief, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The lace to be only one inch wide instead of one inch and a half, and half an inch



instead of three quarters of an inch, with one row of distinction lace round sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same size as Lieutenants, with silver edging to the straps and crescent as above, but without the devices thereon.

Belt.—The same as Lieutenants.

Hat.—The same as Secretaries to Commanders-Chief, but with a single loop of gold lace.

Or Secretaries to Flag Officers may wear the uniform of the rank they hold.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Secretaries to Commanders-in-Chief, with one row of distinction lace round sleeves.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

Hat.—The same.

Belt.—The same as Lieutenants.

Or Secretaries to Flag Officers may wear the undress uniform of the rank they hold.

PAYMASTERS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Secretaries to Junior Flag Officers.

NAVAL INSTRUCTORS.

Naval Instructors are not required to wear any uniform whatever; but if they do, it is to be the following:

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

Unless in Holy Orders, the same as Secretaries to Junior Flag Officers, except that the eight buttons on the breast of the coat are to be placed at equal distances, and without epaulettes or lace to the trowsers.

ASSISTANT PAYMASTERS

DRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Paymasters, with the following exceptions:

Coat.—The lace to be only three quarters of an inch wide, and one row of a quarter of an inch gold braid round the sleeves.

Trowsers.—To have no lace.

Epaulettes.—Two shoulder straps, the same as Mates, without the device, but with silver edging to the straps and crescents.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Paymasters, except one row of quarter of an inch gold braid round sleeves of coats instead of lace.

Epaulettes.—The same as in dress.

CLERKS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as the undress uniform of the Assistant Paymasters, but without the shoulder strap.

Hat.—Cap only; no sword.

ASSISTANT CLERKS.

The undress uniform of Clerks, omitting the gold braid round sleeves of coats.

INSPECTOR OF MACHINERY.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform as Secretaries to Commander in Chief, except that the coat is to have eight buttons on the breast placed by fours.

Epaulettes.—To have a gold anchor within the crescent, surmounted by a gold star.

CHIEF ENGINEERS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same uniform as Secretaries to Junior Flag Officers, except that the coats are to have eight buttons on the breast placed by fours.

ASSISTANT ENGINEERS—FIRST CLASS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as Assistant Paymasters, except that the coats are to have eight buttons on the breast placed by fours; and to wear the uniform cap instead of the cocked hat.

Swords.—Of the Regulation pattern.

ASSISTANT ENGINEERS—SECOND CLASS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The undress uniform of Assistant Engineers of First Class.

Caps.—Same as First Class; no sword or dirk.

ASSISTANT ENGINEERS—THIRD CLASS.

DRESS AND UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The same as the Second Class, omitting the gold braid round the sleeves of coats.

Caps.—The same as First Class; no sword or dirk.

MEMORANDA.

Full dress is to be worn only on State occasions.

The undress coat, with epaulettes, cocked hat and sword, are to be worn at Courts Martial.

On all special duties, such as Medical Surveys, examination of Candidates, &c., as well as upon ordinary occasions of duty, frock coat, with the cap and sword, is to be considered sufficient dress.

Trowsers.—On all occasions of full dress, officers shall wear white trowsers, over boots, between the 1st May and 30th September, and blue trowsers, between the 1st October and the 30th April.

Great Coats.—The great coats for Officers are to be of blue cloth, double breasted, with the number and arrangement of buttons according to the undress uniform assigned to their respective ranks, omitting the pocket flaps; with padded turn-down collar, and with the rows of lace or braid round the sleeves the same as the undress coats.

All Officers, except Midshipmen, Masters' Assistants, Clerks' Assistants, Cadets, and Warrant Officers, may wear a blue frock, made according to the directions given above for great coats, with the same distinctions of lace or braid on the sleeves.

Admirals and Commodores of the First Class may wear epaulettes with their frock and great coats, and on such occasions the cocked hat and sword must also be worn.

Jackets.—All Officers may wear *on board their ship*, a round jacket, without skirts, with their respective arrangement of buttons and distinction lace, double breasted for the Military Branch, except Midshipmen, Masters' Assistants, and Cadets, who are to wear single breasted jackets, the same as the Civil Branch.

Caps.—are to be of blue cloth, the diameter of the top to be eight inches, with a black mohair band $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide. Admirals and Commodores of the First Class, and Officers of the Civil Branches ranking with them, to have the peak embroidered all round in gold; Commodores of the Second Class, Captains and Commanders, and Officers of the Civil Branches ranking with them, the peak embroidered on the front edge only; and all other Officers a plain peak.

The Military Branch to be distinguished by the embroidery on the peak, which is to be of oak leaves, and a device placed in the front of the cap, consisting of a crown embroidered in gold and silver and a silver anchor, surrounded by gold laurel wreaths.

The Civil Branches by plain embroidery and the same device embroidered in gold. The peaks of all caps not embroidered to be of patent leather, when embroidered, to be of blue cloth bound with patent leather.

Round Hats.—Officers, during bad weather when on board their ships, may wear a round black hat, with a narrow black band and buckle, and a black silk or leather cockade, with a loop of gold lace half the width of the broad lace on their dress coats, or, if they have no lace on their coats, of black silk ribbon. Midshipmen, Masters' Assistants, and those ranking with them, and Cadets, to have a loop of gold twist.

Belt.—The sword belt to be worn over the coat.

The new regulations may be adopted at once by Officers requiring uniforms, and they are to come into full force after 1st January 1861.

My Lords desire that the Commander in Chief and the Captains of Her Majesty's ships will prevent any Officer serving under their command from deviating, in any way whatever, from the foregoing Regulations.

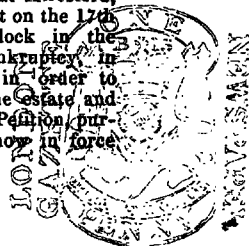

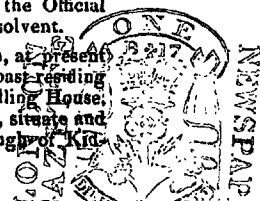
