A DESPATCH, dated July 24th, of which the following is an extract, has been received by Lord John Russell from Lord Bloomfield, G.C.B., Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Prussia :

I have the honour to inform your Lordship, that Her Royal Highness the Princess Frederick William of Prussia, Princess Royal of Great Britain and Ireland, was safely delivered of a Daughter, at the New Palace, at Potsdam, at ten minutes past eight o'clock this morning.

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Vestry Room in Saint Mary's Church, in the said parish, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the twenty-ninth day of March last, it was resolved,—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding Vestry or other Meetings for the transaction of any business of or relating to the said parish of Horncastle, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish.
