The Court to change the Mourning on Thursday, the 4th of October next; viz.:

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippetts, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday, the 7th of October next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

Monsieur Frederick von Voss, Grand Veneur and Chamberlain of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, to deliver a letter from His Royal Highness notifying the death of the late Grand Duke and his own accession:

To which audience he was introduced by Viscount Palmerston, K.G., acting for Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Whitehall, September 18, 1860.

The Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration that upon the decease of Thomas Anthony third Viscount Southwell, without issue male, on the twenty-ninth day of February last, the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell devolved upon his nephew Thomas Arthur, now Viscount Southwell, as eldest surviving son and heir of Arthur Southwell, Esquire, commonly called the Honourable Arthur Southwell, a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army, next brother of the said Thomas Anthony Viscount Southwell; and that according to the ordinary rules of honour the younger brother and sisters of the said Thomas Arthur,

now Viscount Southwell, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them in case their late father Arthur Southwell had survived his brother the said Thomas Anthony third Viscount Southwell, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Charles Francis Xavier Southwell, Esquire, Marcella Mary Agnes Southwell, Spinster, Jane Mary Matilda, wife of the Right Honourable John David Fitzgerald, one of the Judges of the Court of Queen's Bench in Ireland, Mary Paulina Southwell and Margaret Mary Southwell, Spinsters, brother and sisters of Thomas Arthur, now Viscount Southwell, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence and precedence, as if their late father the said Arthur Southwell had survived his brother the said Thomas Anthony Viscount Southwell, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Viscount Southwell:

And Her Majesty has been further pleased to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in the College of Arms.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 27.) NORTH ATLANTIC—RIVER ST. LAWRENCE.

Prince Shoal, off the Entrance of Saguenay River.

INFORMATION has been received of a shoal having recently been discovered in the St. Lawrence, off the entrance of the Saguenay River, on which Her Majesty's ship Hero grounded on the 18th of August last.

This shoal is a small rocky patch, having 3 fathoms of water over it, and is in a S.S.E. direction, half a mile from the 4 fathom patch already laid down in the Admiralty charts. Lark Point bears from it W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., and the black buoy on Vaches Patch N. by W.

The western sides of Brandy Pots and White Islet in line, which clears the Lark Reef, leads on this shoal. Brandy Pots should therefore be kept open to the southward of, or just touching, White Islet, S.S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W., which will lead about half a mile to the eastward of the shoal.

BAY OF FUNDY—PARTRIDGE ISLAND.

Steam Whistle to Partridge Island Lighthouse.

IN order to warn vessels of danger when approaching Partridge Island, near St. John, in the Bay of Fundy, a steam whistle has been fitted at the lighthouse on that island, and will be used during fog.

The shrill sound of this whistle, *once a minute*, having been heard from a position eight miles to windward of it, has proved the efficiency and utility of this addition.
