## A PROCLAMATION.

In order to the Electing a Peer of Scotland.

VICTORIA, R.

**W**HEREAS David, Earl of Leven and Melville, was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, we do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Thursday the fifteenth day of November next ensuing, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said David, Earl of Leven and Melville, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law): and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: and We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this twenty-sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in the twenty-fourth year of Our reign.

CONVENTION between Her Majesty, the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, the Prince-Regent of Prussia, the Emperor of Russia, and the Sultan, respecting Measures to be taken for the Pacification of Syria.

*Signed at Paris, September 5, 1860.*

**S**A Majesté Impériale le Sultan voulant arrêter, par des mesures promptes et efficaces, l'effusion du sang en Syrie, et témoigner de sa ferme résolution d'assurer l'ordre et la paix parmi les populations placées sous sa souveraineté; et Leurs Majestés la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, l'Empereur d'Autriche, l'Empereur des Français, Son Altesse Royale le Prince Régent de Prusse, et Sa Majesté l'Empereur de toutes les Russies, ayant offert leur coopération active, que Sa Majesté le Sultan a acceptée;

Leurs dites Majestés et Son Altesse Royale ont résolu de conclure une Convention à cet effet, et ont nommé pour leurs Plénipotentiaires, savoir:

Richard Prince de Metternich-Winneburg, Duc de Portella, Comte de Königswart, Grand d'Espagne de première classe, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre Royal d'Albert de Saxe et de l'Ordre Ducal d'Ernest de Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Grand Officier de l'Ordre Royal de Léopold de Belgique, Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur, Chevalier Honoraire de l'Ordre de St. Jean de Malte, Chambellan actuel de Sa Majesté Impériale et Royale Apostolique, son Ambassadeur Extraordinaire près Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français;

Sa Majesté l'Empereur de toutes les Russies, M. le Comte Paul de Kisséleff, son Aide-de-camp général, Général d'Infanterie, Membre du Conseil de l'Empire, Chevalier des Ordres de Russie, décoré du double portrait en brillants des Empereurs Nicolas I et Alexandre II, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre Impérial de la Légion d'Honneur, ayant le portrait du Sultan en diamants, &c., &c., &c., Son Ambassadeur Extraordinaire et Plénipotentiaire près Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français ;

Et Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Ottomans, Ahmed Vefik Efendi, décoré de l'Ordre Impérial du Medjidie de deuxième classe, &c., &c., &c., Son Ambassadeur Extraordinaire près Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français ;

Lesquels, après s'être communiqué leurs pleins pouvoirs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, sont convenus des Articles suivants :—

#### ARTICLE I.

Un corps de troupes Européennes, qui pourra être porté à douze mille hommes, sera dirigé en Syrie pour contribuer au rétablissement de la tranquillité.

#### ARTICLE II.

Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français consent à fournir immédiatement la moitié de ce corps de troupes. S'il devenait nécessaire d'élever son effectif au chiffre stipulé dans l'Article précédent, les Hautes Puissances s'entendraient sans retard avec la Porte, par la voie diplomatique ordinaire, sur la désignation de celles d'entre elles qui auraient à y pourvoir.

#### ARTICLE III.

Le Commandant-en-chef de l'expédition entrera, à son arrivée, en communication avec le Commissaire Extraordinaire de la Porte, afin de combiner toutes les mesures exigées par les circonstances, et de prendre les positions qu'il y aura lieu d'occuper pour remplir l'objet du présent Acte.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Leurs Majestés la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, l'Empereur d'Autriche, l'Empereur des Français, Son Altesse Royale le Prince Régent de Prusse, et Sa Majesté l'Empereur de toutes les Russies, promettent d'entretenir les forces navales suffisantes pour concourir au succès des efforts communs par le rétablissement de la tranquillité sur le littoral de la Syrie.

#### ARTICLE V.

Les Hautes Parties, convaincues que ce délai sera suffisant pour atteindre le but de pacification qu'elles ont en vue, fixent à six mois la durée de l'occupation des troupes Européennes en Syrie.

#### ARTICLE VI.

La Sublime Porte s'engage à faciliter, autant qu'il dépendra d'elle, la subsistance et l'approvisionnement du corps expéditionnaire.

#### ARTICLE VII.

La présente Convention sera ratifiée, et les ratifications en seront échangées à Paris, dans le délai de cinq semaines, ou plus tôt si faire se peut.

En foi de quoi, les Plénipotentiaires respectifs l'ont signée, et y ont apposé le sceau de leurs armes.

His Imperial Majesty the Sultan wishing to stop, by prompt and efficacious measures, the effusion of blood in Syria, and to show his firm resolution to establish order and peace amongst the populations placed under his sovereignty ; and their Majesties the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Prussia, and His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, having offered their active co-operation, which His Majesty the Sultan has accepted ;

Their said Majesties and His Royal Highness have resolved to conclude a Convention to that effect, and have named for their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say :

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Henry Richard Charles Earl Cowley, Viscount Dangan, Baron Cowley, a Peer of the United Kingdom, Member of the Privy Council of Her Britannic Majesty, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Her said Majesty to His Majesty the Emperor of the French ;

His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, Richard Prince of Metternich-Winneburg, Duke of Portella, Count of Königswart, a Grandee of Spain of the first class, Grand Cross of the Royal Order of Albert of Saxony, and of the Ducal Order of Ernest of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Grand Officer of the Royal Order of Leopold of Belgium, Knight of the Legion of Honour, Honorary Knight of the Order of St. John of Malta, Actual Chamberlain of His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty, His Ambassador Extraordinary to His Majesty the Emperor of the French ;

His Majesty the Emperor of the French, M. Edward Anthony Thouvenel, a Senator of the Empire, Grand Cross of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, Grand Cross of the Imperial Order of the Iron Crown of Austria, of the Imperial Order of St. Alexander Newski of Russia, decorated with the Imperial Order of the Medjidie of the first class, &c., &c., &c., his Minister and Secretary of State for the Department of Foreign Affairs.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Prussia, the Prince Henry VII of Reuss-Schleiz-Köstritz, Knight of the Royal Order of the Red Eagle of the fourth class, of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem of Prussia, &c., &c., &c., his Chargé d'Affaires *ad interim* at Paris ;

His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, the Count Paul de Kisséleff, his Aide-de-Camp Gene-

ral, General of Infantry, Member of the Council of the Empire, Knight of the Orders of Russia, decorated with the double portrait in brilliants of the Emperors Nicholas I and Alexander II, Grand Cross of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, having the portrait of the Sultan in diamonds, &c., &c., &c., his Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the Emperor of the French ;

And His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, Ahmed Vefik Effendi, decorated with the Imperial Order of the Medjidie of the second class, &c., &c., &c., his Ambassador Extraordinary to His Majesty the Emperor of the French ;

Who, after having communicated to each other their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles :—

#### ARTICLE I.

A body of European troops, which may be increased to twelve thousand men, shall be sent to Syria to contribute towards the re-establishment of tranquillity.

#### ARTICLE II.

His Majesty the Emperor of the French agrees to furnish, immediately, the half of this body of troops. If it should become necessary to raise its effective force to the number stipulated in the preceding Article, the High Powers would come to an understanding with the Porte without delay, by the ordinary course of diplomacy, upon the designation of those among them who would have to provide it.

#### ARTICLE III.

The Commander-in-chief of the expedition will, on his arrival, enter into communication with the Commissioner Extraordinary of the Porte, in order to concert all the measures required by circumstances, and to take up the positions which there may be occasion to occupy in order to fulfil the object of the present Convention.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Their Majesties the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Prussia, and His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, promise to maintain sufficient naval forces to contribute towards the success of the common efforts by the re-establishment of tranquillity on the coast of Syria.

#### ARTICLE V.

The High Parties, convinced that such a period will be sufficient to attain the object of pacification which they have in view, fix at six months the duration of the occupation of the European troops in Syria.

#### ARTICLE VI.

The Sublime Porte undertakes to facilitate, as far as lies in her power, the furnishing supplies and provisions for the expeditionary corps.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Paris within five weeks, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipoten-

tiaries have signed it, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

RELATING TO THE PRECEDING TREATY.

#### *Protocole d'une Conférence tenue au Ministère des Affaires Étrangères, le 3 Août, 1860.*

Sa Majesté Impériale le Sultan voulant arrêter, par des mesures promptes et efficaces, l'effusion du sang en Syrie, et témoigner de sa ferme résolution d'assurer l'ordre et la paix parmi les populations placées sous sa souveraineté ; et Leurs Majestés la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, l'Empereur d'Autriche, l'Empereur des Français, Son Altesse Royale le Prince Régent de Prusse, et Sa Majesté l'Empereur de toutes les Russies, ayant offert leur co-opération active, que Sa Majesté le Sultan a acceptée ; les Représentants de Leurs dites Majestés et de Son Altesse Royale sont tombés d'accord sur les Articles suivants :—

[Here follow Articles I to VI, as above.]

Il est entendu que les six Articles précédents seront textuellement convertis en une Convention qui recevra les signatures des Représentants soussignés, aussitôt qu'ils seront munis des pleins pouvoirs de Leurs Souverains, mais que les stipulations de ce Protocole entreront immédiatement en vigueur.

M. le Chargé d'Affaires de Prusse toutefois fait observer que la distribution actuelle des bâtiments de guerre Prussiens peut ne pas permettre à son Gouvernement de co-opérer dès à présent à l'exécution de l'Article IV.

#### *Protocol of a Conference held at the Department of Foreign Affairs, August 3, 1860.*

His Imperial Majesty the Sultan wishing to stop, by prompt and efficacious measures, the effusion of blood in Syria, and to show his firm resolution to establish order and peace amongst the populations placed under his sovereignty ; and their Majesties the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of Prussia, and His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, having offered their active co-operation, which His Majesty the Sultan has accepted ; the Representatives of their said Majesties and of His Royal Highness have agreed upon the following Articles :—

[Here follow Articles I to VI, as above.]

It is understood that the six preceding Articles shall be embodied *verbatim* into a Convention, which shall receive the signatures of the undersigned Representatives, as soon as they are furnished with full powers from their Sovereigns, but that the stipulations of this Protocol will come immediately into force.

The Chargé d'Affaires of Prussia, however, points out that the present distribution of the Prussian ships of war may possibly not permit his Government to co-operate at present in the execution of Article IV.

*Protocole d'une Conférence tenue au Ministère des Affaires Etrangères, le 3 Août, 1860.*

LES Plénipotentiaires de la Grande Bretagne, de l'Autriche, de la France, de la Prusse, de la Russie, et de la Turquie, désirant établir, conformément aux intentions de leurs Cours respectives, le véritable caractère du concours prêté à la Sublime Porte, aux termes du Protocole signé ce même jour, les sentiments qui leur ont dicté les clauses de cet Acte, et leur entier désintéressement, déclarent de la manière la plus formelle, que les Puissances Contractantes n'entendent poursuivre, ni ne poursuivront, dans l'exécution de leurs engagements, aucun avantage territorial, aucune influence exclusive, ni aucune concession touchant le commerce de leurs sujets, et qui ne pourrait être accordée aux sujets de toutes les autres nations.

Néanmoins, ils ne peuvent s'empêcher, en rappelant ici les Actes émanés de Sa Majesté le Sultan, dont l'Article IX du Traité du 30 Mars, 1856, a constaté la haute valeur, d'exprimer le prix que leurs Cours respectives attachent à ce que, conformément aux promesses solennelles de la Sublime Porte, il soit adopté des mesures administratives sérieuses pour l'amélioration du sort des populations Chrétiennes de tout rite dans l'Empire Ottoman.

Le Plénipotentiaire de Turquie prend acte de cette déclaration des Représentants des Hautes Puissances, et se charge de la transmettre à sa Cour, en faisant observer que la Sublime Porte a employé, et continuera à employer, ses efforts dans le sens du vœu exprimé ci-dessus.

*Protocol of a Conference held at the Department of Foreign Affairs, August 3, 1860.*

THE Plenipotentiaries of Great Britain, Austria, France, Prussia, Russia, and Turkey, desirous of establishing, in conformity with the in-

tentions of their respective Courts, the true character of the assistance afforded to the Sublime Porte by the provisions of the Protocol signed this day, the feelings which have dictated the clauses of this Act, and their perfect disinterestedness, declare in the most formal manner, that the Contracting Powers do not intend to seek for, and will not seek for, in the execution of their engagements, any territorial advantages, any exclusive influence, or any concession with regard to the commerce of their subjects, such as could not be granted to the subjects of all other nations.

Nevertheless, in recalling here the Acts issued by His Majesty the Sultan, the great importance of which was established by Article IX of the Treaty of the 30th of March, 1856, they cannot refrain from expressing the value which their respective Courts attach to the fulfilment of the solemn promises of the Sublime Porte, that serious administrative measures should be taken to ameliorate the condition of the Christian population, of every creed, in the Ottoman Empire.

The Plenipotentiary of Turkey takes note of this declaration of the Representatives of the High Powers, and undertakes to transmit it to his Court; pointing out that the Sublime Porte has employed, and will continue to employ, her efforts in the sense of the wish expressed above.

## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter sixty-five, for authorizing the Commissioners of the Treasury to further regulate the postage on re-directed letters of commissioned and warrant officers, seamen and soldiers, whilst on actual service, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are empowered by Warrant under their hands, to authorize all letters received by the post on their own private concerns, by commissioned officers and warrant officers, whether in the army or the navy, and midshipmen and master's mates in the navy, whether at home or abroad; and by commissioned and warrant officers, midshipmen, and master's mates, in Her Majesty's Indian military and naval forces, and by seamen employed in Her Majesty's navy, whether at home or abroad; and by serjeants, corporals, drummers, trumpeters, fifers, and private soldiers in Her Majesty's regular forces, militia, fencible regiments, artillery, or royal marines, whether at home or abroad; and by serjeants, corporals, drummers, trumpeters, fifers, private soldiers and seamen, in Her Majesty's Indian military and naval forces, whilst respectively actually employed in Her Majesty's service, to be delivered to all such persons respectively, free of foreign postage, chargeable on or in respect of re-direction on such letters, when such letters shall have been re-directed and again forwarded by the post, and transmitted or sent through any foreign country (the several conditions imposed by the fifty-third section of the Act of the third and fourth Victoria, chapter ninety-six, with respect to letters received by the post by the privileged persons therein mentioned, being duly observed, with respect to letters to be received by the post, by such

seamen, serjeants, corporals, drummers, trumpeters, fifers, and private soldiers respectively, as aforesaid); and also by Warrant under their hands, to reduce or remit the rates of postage, British or Colonial, which might be chargeable by law on or in respect of re-direction on all letters received by the post on their own private concerns, by commissioned officers and warrant officers, whether in the army or navy, and midshipmen and master's mates in the navy, whether at home or abroad; and by commissioned officers and warrant officers, midshipmen, and master's mates in Her Majesty's Indian military and naval forces whilst respectively actually employed in Her Majesty's service, which shall have been re-directed and again forwarded by the post.

And whereas it is expedient to regulate the postage on certain re-directed letters of commissioned and warrant officers, seamen, and soldiers, whilst on actual service, as hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers given and reserved to us, in and by the said recited Act of Parliament, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All letters received by the post on their own private concerns, by commissioned officers and warrant officers, whether in the army or the navy, and midshipmen and master's mates in the navy, whether at home or abroad; and by commissioned and warrant officers, midshipmen, and master's mates in Her Majesty's Indian military and naval forces, and by seamen employed in Her Majesty's navy, whether at home or abroad; and by serjeants, corporals, drummers, trumpeters, fifers, and private soldiers, in Her Majesty's regular forces, militia, fencible regiments, artillery, or royal marines, whether at home or abroad; and by serjeants, corporals, drummers, trumpeters, fifers, private soldiers and seamen, in Her Majesty's Indian military and naval forces whilst respectively actually employed in Her Majesty's service, shall be delivered to all such persons respectively, free of foreign postage, chargeable on or in respect of re-direction on such letters, when such letters shall have been re-directed and again forwarded by the post, and transmitted or sent through any foreign country.

2. Every such letter so to be received by the post by any seaman, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, under or by virtue of this Warrant, must not exceed half an ounce in weight, and the postage of every such letter (unless the same be sent from parts beyond the seas) must be paid (or every such letter, if posted within the United Kingdom, must be duly and properly stamped) upon putting it into a post office established under the authority of the Postmaster General, and must be directed to every such seaman, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, specifying on the superscription thereof, the vessel or the regiment, corps or detachment, to which he shall belong, and the Deputy Postmaster of the place to which such letter shall be sent to be delivered, must not deliver such letter to any person except the seaman, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, to whom it shall be directed, or to some person appointed to receive the same by writing under the hand of the officer in command; and whenever any such



letter so to be received by any such seaman, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, shall be sent from parts beyond the seas without the postage of one penny being prepaid thereon, every such letter must be charged to the party receiving the same with a rate of two-pence. And whenever any such letter so to be received by any such seaman, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier, shall be conveyed by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the masters of such vessels in respect of such letters must in all cases be paid to the Post Office in addition to the postage.

3. In all cases in which a letter sent by the post on their own private concerns, addressed to any commissioned officer in the army or the navy, respectively, whilst actually employed in Her Majesty's service in any of Her Majesty's colonies, or on any foreign station, and before the delivery of such letter at the place of its address, the officer to whom it shall be addressed shall, in the execution of his duty, have removed from that place to any other place (whether at home or abroad) (except as in the next clause of this Warrant is mentioned), every such letter shall be re-directed to such officer at such other place, and shall be forwarded to the latter place, and any postage, British or Colonial, chargeable by law on or in respect of such re-direction, shall be and the same is hereby remitted, and such officer shall not be charged with more than the postage which would have been payable for such re-directed letter in case the same had been delivered at the place to which it was originally addressed.

4. Provided that the last preceding clause shall not apply to any letter sent by the post from any one place in the United Kingdom addressed to any commissioned officer at any other place in the United Kingdom, and who before the delivery thereof at the place of its address shall, in the execution of his duty, have removed from that place to any place beyond the seas, which last-mentioned letter shall be chargeable with the same rates of postage to which it would be liable anything in the said last-preceding clause contained notwithstanding.

5. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six, for the regulation of the duties of postage.

6. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders or directions hereby made, and may make and establish other orders or directions in lieu thereof.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of November next.
