WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eight years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the office of County Coroner," it was enacted "that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration a petition presented to Her as directed by the said Act by the Justices of any county in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, praying the division of such county into two or more districts for the purposes of the said Act, to order that such county should be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of the said Act, as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and to determine at what place, within such district, the Court for the Election of Coroner for such district should be holden, as in the said Act is provided."

"And whereas Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Wilts, in Quarter Sessions assembled, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, duly certified under the hands and seals of three of the Justices, present when such petition was agreed to, setting forth that there are three Coroners for the said county of Wilts, each of whom was elected for, and acts in, and for the said county, without any authoritative limitation of districts, and that the petitioners deem it expedient to define and settle the districts in which each of

such Coroners shall act in the said county, in order that all persons may know to which Coroner they should apply in any case of sudden or unnatural death, in their respective parishes, and in order that confusion and rivalry may be avoided between the three Coroners of the county, who have equal and undivided jurisdiction, and in order to ensure a more expeditious and economical discharge of the duties of the office; and praying Her Majesty that the said county may be divided into three different parts or districts, in pursuance and for the purposes of the said Act; such districts to be called respectively, the First, or North Wilts district; the Second, or Middle Wilts district; and the Third, or South Wilts district.

And the said petition further states that the said petitioners had assigned the First or North Wilts district to Mr. William Burt Whitmarsh, who holds the office and acts as Coroner at Chippenham; and that they had assigned the Second, or Middle Wilts district to Mr. George Sylvester, who holds the office of and acts as Coroner at Trowbridge; and that they had assigned the Third, or South Wilts district to Mr. Richard Monkhouse Wilson, who holds the office of and acts as Coroner at New Sarum. And that the petitioners had given such notice to every such coroner as is required by the said Act; and that, having due regard to the size and nature of each of such proposed districts, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and all other circumstances which appeared to them fit to be considered, in carrying the provisions of the said Act into execution, and having also conferred with, and heard the observations and objections of every such coroner, at their meeting held for such purpose, they humbly submitted the following as the parishes and places to be comprised in and form the three coroners' districts

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the like advice, that the second, or Middle Wilts District, shall comprise the parishes and places above mentioned, as submitted in the said petition, to form such district, and which are above stated as forming, or to form the same; and that the court for the election of a coroner for such district shall be holden at Devizes, and that the poll shall be taken, in respect of any such election, at Devizes aforesaid, and at such other places as may be appointed pursuant to the said Act.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the like advice, that the third, or South Wilts District, shall comprise the parishes and places above mentioned, as submitted in the said petition, to form such district, and which are above stated as forming, or to form the same; and that the court for the election of a coroner for such district shall be holden at New Sarum, and that the poll shall be taken, in respect of any such election, at New Sarum aforesaid, and at such other places as may be appointed pursuant to the said Act.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Catherine, situate at Rowsley, in the parish of Bakewell, in the county of Derby and diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the parishes of Bakewell, Darley, and Youlgreave, in the said county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous parts of the said parishes should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Catherine, situate at Rowsley, in the parish of Bakewell aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lichfield, as Bishop of the Diocese, and in right of his see, patron of the rectory and parish of Darley aforesaid, and of the Most Noble William, Duke of Devonshire, patron of the vicarage and parish of Youlgreave aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Lichfield, patrons of the vicarage and parish of Bakewell, aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their Common or Capitular Seal), we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Bakewell, Darley, and Youlgreave, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, (all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured respectively pink, yellow, and green), should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Catherine, situate at Rowsley aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Catherine Rowsley.'

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, William, Duke of Devonshire, and the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Lichfield (testified as aforesaid) that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Catherine Rowsley, shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Most Noble Charles Cecil John, Duke of Rutland, his heirs and assigns for ever,

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Catharine Rowsley, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Darley, in the county of Derby, and diocese of Lichfield, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which lies to the north-west of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary between the said parish of Darley, and the parish of Bakewell, in the same county and diocese, in the middle of the river Derwent, at a point opposite to the confluence of such river, and of a certain brook called North Wood Car Brook, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such brook, to the middle of the road leading from Northwood to Bumper Castle, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such road to the middle of the road leading from the village of Darley aforesaid, to the Old Chesterfield-road, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said road leading from Darley aforesaid, to the Old Chesterfield-road to the boundary of the said parish of Darley; and also all those portions of the said parish of Bakewell, and of the parish of Youlgreave, in the same county and diocese, wherein the present incumbents of such parishes respectively possess the exclusive cure of souls, which lie eastward of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary between the townships of Great Rowsley and Nether Haddon, in the said parish of Bakewell, at the point where such boundary joins the boundary between the said parish of Bakewell, and the parish of Edensor, in the same county and diocese and extending thence south-westward along the boundary between the last-named townships to the middle of the road leading from Bounds Corner Wood to Haddon Hall, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the middle of the northern extremity of Haddon Park-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road to the middle of the Rowsley, and Bakewell turnpike-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned turnpike-road to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of a road leading from Bakewell to Pilhough, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned road, for a distance of six hundred and eighty-four yards, to a point opposite to a boundary stone marked 'R. St. C. C. Ch. No. 1,' placed on the southern side of the same road, and extending thence in a straight line due south to a point in the middle of the road leading from Pilhough aforesaid to Stanton, which is opposite to a boundary stone marked 'R. St. C. C. Ch. No. 2,' situate on the northern side of the same road, and extending thence in a straight line due south to a point in the middle of the road leading from the village of Stanton Lees to Stanton, and which is opposite to a boundary stone marked 'R. St. C. C. Ch. No. 3,' situate on the northern side of the same road, and extending thence eastward and southward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 56^B, on the map annexed to the award made upon the inclosure of lands, in the township, hamlet, or manor of Stan-

ton, in the said parish of Youlgreave, and on the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 125^a, A, on the same maps, and extending thence westward, northward, and southward along the middle of such fence, and along the middle of the fence which divides the close numbered 125^a, B, on the same maps from the said close numbered 56^a, B, and from the close numbered 56^a, D, on the said maps, to a point in the middle of the fence forming the northern boundary of a certain small inclosure also numbered 125^a, B, on the aforesaid maps, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence to the middle of the road leading from Stanton Lees aforesaid to Birchover, and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road to the boundary between the said parishes of Darley and Youlgreave."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint Catherine, situate at Rowsley, in the parish of Bakewell, in the county of Derby, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Most Noble Charles Cecil John, Duke of Rutland, his heirs and assigns for ever.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for uniting the office of Lecturer of the parish of Saint Nicholas, in the city of Durham, with its emoluments and endowments to the Perpetual Curacy of the same parish, and for annexing to the said Perpetual Curacy the reversion of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments now forming part of the emoluments and endowments of the said office of Lecturer.

"Whereas the perpetual right of patronage, presentation, or nomination to the said Perpetual Curacy of the said parish of Saint Nicholas, is

duly vested in the Most Honourable Frances Anne, Dowager Marchioness of Londonderry, as tenant for life under certain limitations contained in an indenture of settlement, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and the right of patronage, presentation, or nomination to the office of Lecturer of the said parish of Saint Nicholas is duly vested in George Townshend Fox, Clerk, and the said George Townshend Fox has been duly nominated and licensed to and is now the incumbent or perpetual curate of the said perpetual curacy, and has been duly nominated and licensed to and now holds the office of Lecturer aforesaid.

"And whereas the emoluments and endowments of the said office of Lecturer, consist of a stipend or annual payment of four pounds, charged upon a messuage or tenement and land situate in or near the Market Place in the city of Durham, and the other emoluments and endowments of the said office of Lecturer consist of the rents and profits arising from certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments comprised in two several indentures of lease, bearing date respectively the twelfth day of May, in the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, and the eighteenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and particularly described in the Schedule hereunto annexed; the reversion of which lands, tenements, and hereditaments expectant on the determination of the said indentures of lease of the twelfth day of May, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven; and the eighteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, is now vested in us.

"And whereas the said Frances Anne, Marchioness of Londonderry, and the said George Townshend Fox, as such patrons as aforesaid, are desirous of uniting the said Perpetual Curacy and office of Lecturer with all emoluments and endowments to the same respectively belonging.

"And whereas we are of opinion that the arrangements hereinafter proposed by us would, if carried into effect, conduce to the better cure of souls within the said parish of Saint Nicholas, in the city of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist situate at Pontyrhun, in the parish of Merthyr Tydvil, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Pontyrhun aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Merthyr Tydvil, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Pentrebach.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being; provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Griffith, the present rector or incumbent of the said parish of Merthyr Tydvil shall continue to be such rector or incumbent, all the fees which shall be received in respect of the performance of the said offices in the said church of Saint John the Baptist, Pontyrhun, shall be paid by the incumbent thereof to the said John Griffith.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Pentrebach, being :—

"All that part of the parish of Merthyr Tydvil, in the county of Glamorgan and diocese of Llandaff, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the bridge which carries the Vale of Neath Railway over the Glamorganshire Canal, and extending thence southward along the middle of such canal as far as a point opposite to the middle of the bridge over such canal, called or known as Knook Bridge, and to the north of an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of such last-mentioned bridge, and extending thence in a direct line due east to the eastern boundary of the said parish of Merthyr Tydvil at a point where a boundary stone marked 'P. D. C. 1860, No. 1' is placed, and to the south of an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the bridge which carries the Vale of Neath Railway over the Glamorganshire Canal aforesaid, and extending thence in a direct line due east to the eastern boundary of the said parish of Merthyr Tydvil at a point where a boundary stone marked 'P. D. C. 1860, No. 2,' is also placed."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Pontyrhun, in the parish of Merthyr Tydvil, in the county of Glamorgan, to be called "The District Chapelry of Pentrebach," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Llandaff.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the see of Durham, and now vested in us.

"Whereas, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and duly published in the London Gazette, on the twenty-fifth day of the following month of September, the manor or lordship, lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule annexed to the said Order, which theretofore belonged to the bishoprick of Durham, became vested in us, subject to the several leases in such schedule mentioned.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said manor or lordship, lands, tenements, and hereditaments, and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable.

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said manor or lordship, lands, tenements, and hereditaments heretofore belonging to the said bishoprick of Durham, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section sixty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us out of the Common Fund in the said Act mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the First Schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same Schedule, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

situate within the parish of Llangwm, in the county of Denbigh and diocese of St. Asaph, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Llangwm, in the same county and diocese, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Llangwm; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Fifth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the township of Sheraton and Hulam, in the parish of Monk Heselden, in the county and diocese of Durham, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the tenth canonry in the cathedral church of Durham, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Monk Heselden; that the messuages, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the Sixth Schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered I., situate within the parish of Barmby Moor, in the county and diocese of York, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Barmby Moor, in the cathedral church of York, and now vested in us, and also the annual rents or money payments described in the same Schedule, and therein numbered II., arising out of or upon lands situate within the same parish, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the deanery of the said cathedral church of York, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Barmby Moor; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Seventh Schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered I., arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Fangfoss, in the last-mentioned county and diocese, with their appurtenances, and also the annual rents or money payments in lieu of the tithe of wool and lamb to accrue and renew within the lordship of Fangfoss, which rents or money payments are particularly described in the same Schedule, and are therein numbered II., formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of York aforesaid, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Fangfoss; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Eighth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Freeford, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Hammerwich, in the same county and diocese; that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Ninth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Saint Chad, Lichfield, otherwise Stowe, in the last mentioned county and diocese, and within the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Freeford aforesaid, and to the prebend of Gaia Minor, also in the said cathedral church of Lichfield, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Christchurch, Lichfield, in the same county and diocese; that all our right, title, and interest, whether reversionary or

otherwise, in the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Tenth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebends of Freeford and Gaia Minor aforesaid, and to the prebends of Gaia Major and Hansacre, also in the said cathedral church of Lichfield, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Burutwood, in the last-mentioned county and diocese: and that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Eleventh Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebends of Freeford and Hansacre aforesaid, and to the prebend of Pipa Parva, also in the said cathedral church of Lichfield, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Wall, in the said last-mentioned county and diocese.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend John Graham, clerk, the present perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Chad, Lichfield, otherwise Stowe, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Twelfth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Saint Chad, Lichfield, otherwise Stowe, formerly belonging to the prebends of Freeford, Gaia Minor, and Hansacre aforesaid, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Chad, Lichfield, otherwise Stowe: Provided always, that the annual sum or stipend of fifty-four pounds, now payable by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, shall, upon and after the ratification of this Scheme, be reduced to an annual sum or stipend of twelve pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Gnosall Parr, clerk, the present perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, described in the Thirteenth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebends of Freeford, Gaia Minor, and Hansacre aforesaid, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Michael, Lichfield: Provided always, that the said tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last mentioned, shall be and be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of seventeen pounds, now payable by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend George Alexander Cockburn, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Pickering, with the perpetual curacy of Newton annexed, in the county and diocese of York, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Fourteenth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Pickering, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of York aforesaid and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Pickering: Provided always, that the same tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last mentioned, shall be and be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of fifteen pounds, now payable by us to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Pickering, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the sixth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and also of the annual sum or stipend of fifty pounds, now payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent, under the provisions of another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Jeremiah Williams, clerk, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Hope, in the county of Flint and diocese of St. Asaph, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Fifteenth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Hope, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Hope, in the same county and diocese, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Hope: Provided always, that the same tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last mentioned, shall be and be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of three pounds, now payable by us to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Hope, in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Hope aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Richard Lloyd, clerk, the present perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Llanfynydd, in the last-mentioned county and diocese, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes described in the Sixteenth Schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Hope aforesaid, with their appurtenances, also formerly belonging to the said sinecure rectory of Hope, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and

become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Llanfynydd: Provided always, that the same tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last mentioned, shall be and be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of eighty pounds, now payable by us to the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Llanfynydd, in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Hope aforesaid, and also of the annual sum or stipend of sixty-eight pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole of the tithes or rentcharges in lieu of tithes arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Saint Nicholas, in the county of Pembroke, and diocese of Saint David's, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to or held and enjoyed with the prebend of Saint Nicholas Pen-y-foss, in the cathedral church of Saint

David's, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Nicholas with the vicarage of the parish of Granston, in the same county and diocese annexed.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit; and that, if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any of the said benefices or churches, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-one, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared, and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter forty-one, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for setting out and constituting a district for spiritual purposes, and annexing such district to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Crumpsall, situate within the original limits of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient, that a district, for spiritual purposes, should be set out and constituted for, and annexed to, the said consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Crumpsall:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several parts of the new parishes of Saint Mark Cheetham Hill, and Saint Luke Cheetham Hill respectively (which new parishes were heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester), which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured respectively pink and yellow, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, be severed and disannexed from the said new parishes of Saint Mark Cheetham Hill, and Saint Luke Cheetham Hill respectively, and shall be set out and constituted for, and annexed to, the said church of Saint Mary at Crumpsall aforesaid, and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes, and be named 'The District of Saint Mary Crumpsall.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein named Acts, or either of them, or any other Act of Parliament.

"The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of **SAINT MARY CRUMPSALL**, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Mark Cheetham Hill (heretofore part of the parish of Manchester), in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the east and north of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary between such new parish and the new parish of Saint Paul Kersall Moor, at a point in the middle of the Bury Old Road near its

southern extremity where the said boundary joins the boundary of the township of Crumpsall, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said road to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of Tyson-street, and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of such street for a distance of sixty yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the wall or fence which forms the boundary of the Crumpsall Castle Estate, and extending thence first northward for a distance of twenty yards or thereabouts to and along the middle of the said boundary wall, and then north-eastward along such boundary wall to its termination on the western side of Fountain-street, and continuing thence in the last-named direction to the middle of Fountain-street aforesaid, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-named street to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of the Clarendon-road, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named road to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of the fence which divides the enclosure numbered 260 on the Tithe Commutation map of the said township of Crumpsall, and on the map hereunto annexed, from the inclosure numbered 204 on the same maps, and extending thence southward to and along the middle of such fence to the middle of the Moss Bank-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road, and of the footpath leading from such road to Crumpsall Hall to the middle of another footpath which leads out of the high road leading from Cheetham-hill to Lower Crumpsall to or towards Crumpsall-green, and extending thence northward along the middle of such last-mentioned footpath for a distance of sixty yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of another footpath leading to the Union or Workhouse-road, and extending thence in a direction generally eastward to and along the middle of such last-mentioned footpath to the middle of the said Union or Workhouse-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road to the middle of the high road aforesaid leading from Cheetham-hill to Lower Crumpsall, and extending thence south-westward across the last-named road to the middle of the northern end of the wall or fence dividing the inclosure numbered 296 on the Tithe Commutation map of the said township of Crumpsall, and on the map hereunto annexed, from the inclosures, numbered respectively 294 and 295 on the same maps, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such wall or fence to the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Mark Cheetham-hill from the new parish of Saint Luke Cheetham-hill.

"And also all that part of the said new parish of Saint Luke Cheetham-hill (heretofore part of the said parish of Manchester) in the same county and diocese, upon which the National Schools now in use for the education of the poor of the said new parish are erected, together with the appurtenances now belonging to the said premises, and the boundaries of which premises and buildings are marked by boundary stones, inscribed with the initial letters 'C. St. M.N.S.'"

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said firstly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the churches of the respective new parishes, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted, shall be taken, and such incumbents and

patrons have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Manchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parishes of Great Bookham, Little Bookham, Dorking, Effingham, and Mickleham, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the said parishes of Great Bookham, Little Bookham, Dorking, Effingham, and Mickleham, hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, in manner hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account, and into our name, in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by George Cubitt, of Denbies, in the said county of Surrey, Esquire, upon an understanding that the endowment hereinafter mentioned should be provided by us for the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

"And whereas the said George Cubitt has caused to be erected at his own cost and expense a church within the limits of the said district to be appropriated and used as and for the church of the said district, and the said church has been approved by us, and consecrated by the name of Saint Barnabas, Ranmore.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that, in consideration of such benefactions as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto, and to the church thereof, should be assigned to the said George Cubitt in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend, Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all those parts of the said parishes of Great Bookham, Little Bookham, Dorking, Effingham, and Mickleham respectively, which are described in the schedule hereunto annexed, (all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed), shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be together constituted and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas, Ranmore.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the church which has been so approved by us, and consecrated by the name of Saint Barnabas, Ranmore, as aforesaid, shall be and be deemed to be the parish church of the said district.

"And whereas, by a deed, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and expressed to be made between the Reverend Edward Clayton, rector of the rectory of Astbury aforesaid, of the first part, Brooke James Greville, of Hill Street, Berkeley Square, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, the patron of the said rectory of Astbury, as surviving trustee of the Will of John, Lord Crewe, deceased, of the second part, the Right Honourable Hungerford, Lord Crewe, Baron Crewe, of Crewe, in the county palatine of Chester, patron tenant for life in possession of the estates of the said John, Lord Crewe, deceased, of the third part, the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Chester, within whose diocese the said parish and rectory are situate, of the fourth part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fifth part, which deed is intended to be enrolled in your Majesty's High Court of Chancery at Westminster, certain tithe commutation rents-charge or portions of tithe commutation rents-charge, amounting in gross to the sum of two hundred pounds and one halfpenny per annum, issuing, arising, and payable out or in respect of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate in the township of Odd Rode, within the said parish of Astbury, and being portions of the tithe commutation rents-charge belonging to the said rectory of Astbury, have been granted and secured to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall be appointed and licensed, and to his successors, ministers

thereof, and so soon as such district shall have become, under the provisions of the herein-named Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, then to the perpetual curate of the said new parish.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that, in consideration of such grant as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister of the same, and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the perpetual curate thereof, should be assigned to the said Edward Clayton, rector of the said rectory of Astbury, and his successors, rectors of the same rectory.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Chester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Astbury described in the Schedule hereunto annexed (all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed), shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Odd Rode.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Clayton, rector of the said rectory of Astbury, and his successors, rectors of the same rectory for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of **ODD RODE**, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Astbury, in the county and diocese of Chester wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is comprised within the township of Odd Rode."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbent and to the patrons of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted, shall be taken, and such incumbent and patrons have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this

Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Albrighton aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named "The District Chapelry of Albrighton."
